DAIRY FACTS

BUTTER FROM SWEET CREAM

Because of Its Better Keeping Qualities Larger Use of It Is Urged by Dairy Division.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The dairy division, United States Department of Agriculture, advises a larger use of sweet cream butter, because of its better keeping quality.

The United States navy is a large consumer of this kind of butter, made according to the navy specifications from unripened or sweet cream, instead of from the cream ripened to sourness, of which most creamery butter is made. For several years past it has been the practice of the Navy department to contract for butter made of sweet cream in large amounts to supply the officers and sailors. This butter is packed under the supervision of the dairy division of the United States Department of Agriculture. During the war, the personnel of the navy being enlarged, a much greater quantity of butter was needed.

The principal reason the navy desires sweet cream butter is that it keeps better. As the larger part of the butter supply is made during the summer months, it is necessary to put some of it in cold storage in order to have enough for winter, and in the course of time it develops various more or less undesirable flavors, due to long storage. Butter made from sweet cream does not develop such flavors for a much longer time, if at all. Many months after it has been made it is equal to fresh butter, provided it has been kept under proper

conditions; hence sweet cream butter is especially suitable for shipping to distant countries, and for long voyages.

Sweet cream butter is gradually coming into wider favor in the domestic market, the Department of Agriculture says, because some consumers prefer it. It has not so pronounced a flavor as ordinary butter, but it has a mild creamy flavor.

WASHING AND RINSING CANS

Much of Deterioration of Milk Supply Is Due to Contamination in Big Receptacles.

Much milk that is good when it leaves the stable is poor milk when it reaches the city dairy plant. The deterioration is due to contamination in the cans. In almost all cases the city dairy plants wash and sterilize the cans that they return to the farmers. The farmers, assuming that the cans are clean, fill them and return without further attention. As a matter of fact, the washing is usually well done in a city milk plant. After the sterilizing with live steam, however, the cans are capped almost immediately and almost always there is some moisture left in the can. The bacteria are never all killed and in this moisture they multiply immensely and by the time the cans are used again there are enough bacteria in them to seed the milk to the extent of many thousands of bacteria per cubic centimeter.

PROPER CARE OF YOUNG CALF

May Be Permitted to Graze With Other Cattle on Pasture, but Feed Grain Separately.

The calf may graze with other cattle on pasture, but should be fed grain separately. A bull calf should be separated from the heifers when about three or four months old. He should be kept with other bull calves or older cattle for company except at feeding time. The calf should then have a separate stall or pen.

DEHORNING IS RECOMMENDED

Operation Results in Quieter Cows and More Milk—Best Plan Is to Prevent Them.

Dehorning results in quieter cows and more milk, but horns are better prevented than removed. It is more humane to apply a little caustic to the calf than to dehorn a mature animal.

FAIR STOCK

CAMPAIGN FOR BETTER SIRES

Nearly 400,000 Head of Stock Enrolled—Large Number of Females Shown in Records.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

In the three months' period ending December 31, 1920, more than 30,000 head of live stock and poultry were enrolled by 480 owners in the "Better Sires-Better Stock" campaign now in progress to improve the quality of domestic animals in the United States. This is a large increase over the number enrolled during the previous quarter. Of the stock listed, 5,579 were males and, in accordance with the provisions of the campaign, all these were purebred. The female stock numbered 87,703, and the owners have pledged themselves to breed this stock to purebred sires only.

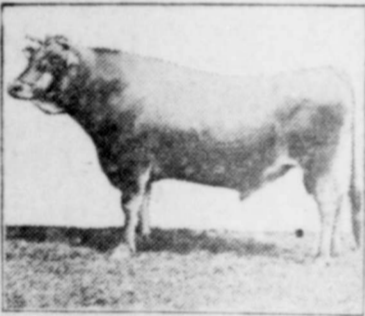
The county showing greatest activity in the campaign for better live stock during the quarterly period was Saline county, Neb. Next in order are Stafford county, Va.; Tippecanoe county, Ind.; Pulaski county, Va.; Fauquier county, Va.; and Platte county, Neb. Craig county, Va., stands out as the principal county, since the beginning of the campaign, in which there appears to be a strong tendency for crossbreeding. During the quarter just ended 17 "Better Sires-Better Stock" emblems were issued to live stock owners in Craig county and all of them owned crossbreds. Crossbred animals were impartially distributed among all classes of stock, including poultry.

The records of the better-sire campaign continue to show that persons using purebred sires for all classes of animals owned have a large number of purebred females as well. In fact, of the 87,703 females recorded during the last quarter 61,504 were purebred. The remainder, arranged according to number, were grades, crossbreds, and scrubs.

Significant figures in the progress of the nation-wide campaign to increase the use of purebred sires are the following:

Up to December 31, 1920, the total number of persons enrolled was 2,243. Of these 1,075 are in Virginia, which is the highest state in number of enrollments, and 446 are in Pulaski county, Va., which retains its place as the foremost county.

The total stock listed is 294,354, of which 238,122 are poultry and 156,832 larger animals. Among the latter cat-

tle lead, with 63,953, followed by sheep and swine in order. Smaller numbers of horses, goats, and asses make up the remainder.

As regards quality of the female stock, fowls are first, with 70 per cent purebreds, and swine next, with 65 per cent, while 37 per cent of the cows are purebred. Grade female stock ranks highest with horses, sheep, and cattle in the order named. Crossbreeding is much more prevalent with sheep than with any other class of stock. Only 2 per cent of all the female stock recorded as being bred to purebred sires are scrubs and the lowest proportions of these are found in sheep and swine.

PROPER EXERCISE FOR SIRES

Many Valuable Animals Are Injured by Being Kept Continuously Confined to Barn.

Animals used for sires on the farm should be given an opportunity to exercise properly. Many valuable animals are kept continuously in a barn in winter and become injured merely from lack of opportunity to exercise.

FEED SHEEP SOME ROUGHAGE

Animals Are Fond of Silage, Fodder, Hay and Pasture Grass—Need Some Concentrates.

Sheep are well adapted to grazing, as their stomachs will hold much roughage. They have an appetite for such feeds as silage, fodder, hay and pasture grass, but cannot thrive without some concentrates.

TIMELY SUGGESTIONS FROM HEDLEY L. S. & F. ASS'N.

The Hedley Live Stock & Fair Association was planned and designed to foster, better and encourage the agricultural interests in all its branches that are of value to the Hedley community and Donley county.

Some might think that really its only purpose was to stage a fair at Hedley this fall. This however is not true, and as the constitution clearly states that it is devoted to the betterment of the farming industry, those that are in charge of the direction of the Association's affairs, will endeavor to carry on these plans and motives.

It was decided that one means of doing this would be the offering of timely suggestions to farmers who might find them of value, through the columns of this paper. We do not desire in any way to dictate the policy of anyone, but merely to offer what might be helpful suggestions—that's all.

Owing to the greatly depressed price of farm products at this time, the present outlook is not good, but let us be hopeful that better times are in store for us in the near future.

It seems that the near past has taught us that the one crop system is not safe. While the farmer who diversified has not really made a profit the past year, he is as a rule in better condition than the one crop farmer. Diversification and the growing of live stock offer at least a partial solution of the farmers' problems. This, however, is not enough; farmers should practice rigid economy, strive to reduce production costs, and raise as much of his living at home as is practically possible.

Corn planting time is here and no doubt there will be an increased acreage planted this year. It must be remembered that corn is nothing like as sure as the grain sorghums. We believe that kafir corn is the best all around grain crop for this locality. Its certainty to make, its ease in gathering and its forage value are some points in kafir's favor.

Those planting corn should test their seed. A test may be made as follows: Take a box or container similar to the kind used in planting tomato seed indoors, fill with soil, get two pieces of white paper that will nearly cover the soil, mark off inch squares on one and number each set of four squares, remove two inches of the dirt and lay the paper with drawings on the dirt, take four grains from each ear of seed corn and place them in the squares, being careful to note where the grains are placed. Number each ear so as to correspond with those on the test sheet. Place the other sheet of paper over the corn, replace dirt, moisten with warm water, set inside, in the sun if possible, and await results. It is rather late to test seed corn, but this method may be used for other field seeds as well, as this will give a fair germination test. Good seeds go a long way toward making a good crop.

Rats and moles destroy many dollars worth of seed and cause much planting over to be done in the more sandy soils here each year. A reliable farmer tells us that last year he saturated his seed with kresol dip and got a good stand, and made a good yield, where the land was badly infested with these pests. If this is a success it would save many dollars and much time on farms where rats and moles are bothersome. If anyone has a better method we would be pleased to have it.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture says that fertile eggs

cost farmers \$15 000,000 each year. Many dollars are lost in this community because of fertile eggs. This can easily be prevented. Get rid of the roosters. Fertile eggs do not keep well. Talk this over with your neighbor, and let us keep the Hedley egg market the best in this section. It will be some thing like two weeks after the roosters have been removed before the eggs will be infertile. Pen, kill or sell the roosters.

You are interested in the welfare of this community, and should be a member of the Hedley Live Stock and Fair Association. Are you? We need your help and cooperation.

MODERN BARN IS FARM NECESSITY

Type Shown Here Has Advantages That Will Appeal.

LATEST DEVICES INSTALLED

It is of Gambrel Roof Frame Construction With Hollow Tile Foundation and Will Accommodate Horses, Cows and Calves.

When planning a new barn the average farmer has to consider his limitations in the way of cost and utility. On the larger dairy farms the dairy barn is built for the exclusive use of the dairy herd and no provision is made for other animals. On the general-purpose farm, however, where the farmer has a small herd and also a few horses he generally wants a barn that will take care of both. The general type of dairy barn is needed with pens for horses. Such is the barn shown here with floor plans.

A handsome looking structure, built of frame, with a substantial hollow tile foundation, it has been designed to accommodate nine cows, six horses and several calves. The roof is the familiar gambrel shape with modern

While the initial expense is larger than if he had used old material, the results will soon pay for the difference in cost. The younger generation has become educated to the advantages of modern conveniences and if they cannot get them on the farm they will go to the cities and towns. Undesirable conditions heretofore have been largely responsible for this exodus which threatens the very foundations of our social order. Progressive farmers have learned the lesson of well-built buildings and modern equipment. In time all of the farmers will demand the best buildings and the best equipment.

Brander Matthews' Suggestion of a "Guide Book to the British Isles" is Worth While.

Among the "general hints" prefixed to the English version of Baedeker's "Guide to the United States" there is to be found a cautiously selected glossary, to enable the wandering Briton to translate the unaccustomed Americanisms he is likely to hear into the corresponding Britishisms with which he has always been familiar. And there ought to be a similar glossary in the "Guide Book to the British Isles" for the benefit of the voyaging American, writes Brander Matthews in Scribner's.

We may assume that this Baedeker glossary was prepared by Mr. Multhead, an Englishman long resident in the United States. It catalogues about

KEEP SILVER IN BEST CONDITION

If Cleaned Regularly Little Time or Effort to Keep It Bright and Lustrous.

SULPHIDE CAUSES TARNISH

Glittering Surface May Be Obtained by Use of Friction Cleaners, by Electrolysis or by Boiling in Strong Solution.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

"All the table service was of silver and gold." Winifred was reading aloud from the society columns an account of a dinner, and as she read the last item her voice was full of awe. "Think of it, Nan; plates and everything, solid silver."

"I am thinking of it," said Nan, the practical one; "and I'm thinking also that I'm glad I haven't on my hands the cleaning of all those solid silver plates and everything." The flat silver that was given Jack and me when we were married is more than a plenty for me when cleaning day comes around. I like housework, but I do detest cleaning silver.

Many women feel as Nan did; but if silver is cleaned regularly, little time or effort is required to keep it bright and lustrous. The office of home economics of the United States Department of Agriculture gives the following directions on the care of silver:

Causes of Tarnish.

The tarnish on silver is silver sulphide, and is due to the sulphur compounds in the air where coal and gas are burned, and also in many foods, in wool, in rubber, and in some bleached and dyed materials. This is the reason silversmiths rarely, if ever, use white cotton flannel for their cloths of silver. Dryness prevents tarnish somewhat; so camphor, which absorbs moisture, is sometimes put into the silver drawer. Silver may be cleaned by the use of certain powders, pastes, and cloths, which clean by friction, by boiling it in a strong alkaline solution, or by a process known as electrolysis.

The materials which clean by friction are whiting, jewelers' rouge, and commercial pastes or powders. The noncommercial powders are mixed to a paste with water, ammonia, or alcohol, rubbed on the silver, allowed

INCLUDE VEGETABLES IN THE WINTER DIET

Necessary During Cold Weather as Well as Summer.

Tired Out Feeling Which Many People Have at End of Winter Comes From Lack of Supply of Garden Truck and Fruits.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Vegetables should be freely included in the winter diet as well as in the summer one. Doctors say that tired-out feeling which many people have at the end of winter—"spring fever"—often comes from a lack of fruits and vegetables in the winter diet. Plenty of vegetables keep the children well and make their meats more appetizing. Vegetables mashed and put through a sieve are more easily digested by little children.

Salts of many kinds are needed by the body, or it will not work smoothly. Vegetables and fruit are rich in them and if you eat a variety you are sure to get all the kinds of salt you need.

When the water in which vegetables are cooked is thrown away, valuable salts are often wasted. Sometimes the flavor is not desirable, but if it is good save this water for soup or gravy. An even better process is to cook the vegetables in as little water as possible so there is none left to drain off, or bake or steam it. Canned and dried vegetables often need only skilful seasoning to make them taste as good as the fresh variety.

Canned corn is very good when turned into a baking dish with the addition of milk and seasoning added, heated through in the oven, and allowed to brown on top. Outside stalks of celery, a green pepper, or both, chopped and added before baking, will vary the flavor of the dish.

Spinach Loaf.
A small can of spinach, chard, or beet tops, combined with rice or bread crumbs, will serve seven or eight people if it is made into a loaf. Asparagus or string beans are also good served in this way:

2 cupsful cooked lima beans.
1 can chopped spinach.
2 cupsful boiled rice.
2 cupsful white sauce.
1 red pepper.

Make a thick white sauce of two cupsful of milk, four tablespoonsful of flour, four tablespoonsful of butter, and one teaspoonful of salt. Melt salt and mix with flour, add to milk and stir over the fire until it thickens. Mix with the rice, chopped spinach and pepper. Form into a loaf and bake 20 or 30 minutes.

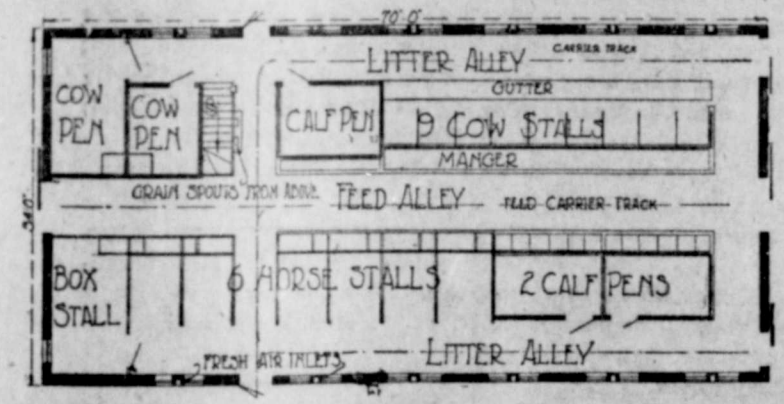
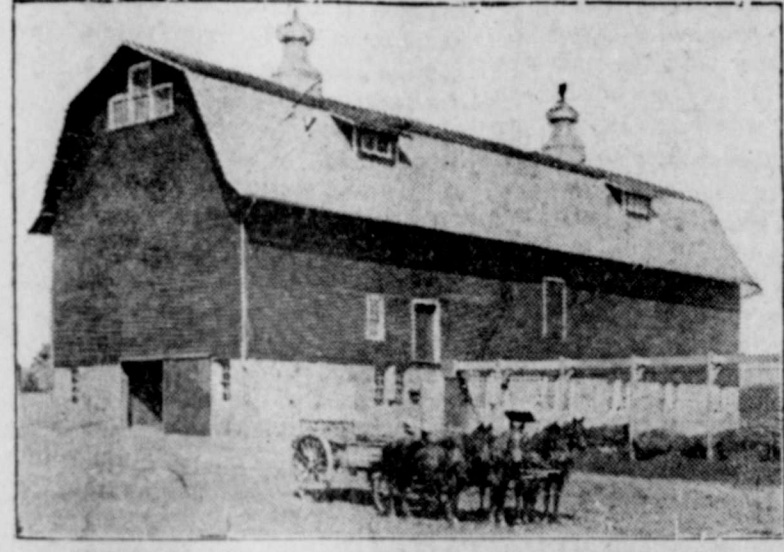

roof ventilators and roof dormers providing excellent ventilation for both lower floor and hay mow. Fresh air intakes located at the proper intervals about the lower barn floor furnish a continual supply of fresh air, while foul air rises carry off the impure air which is so dangerous in buildings where animals are housed. While barns are built more for utility than appearance it is wise to make them appear somewhat attractive. This building is an excellent addition to any farm.

Modern barn construction lays particular emphasis upon interior arrangement and labor-saving equipment. These two points should be kept foremost in mind when designing the buildings. Upon them depends the efficiency of production and the satisfaction of help. That is why carrier tracks for litter and feed alley runs at one end of the building. The carriers are filled from these spouts which tap the grain bins on the floor above. The litter track connects each litter alley with the manure pit on the outside of the barn. These carriers have helped to lift a very heavy burden from the shoulders of the farm help and the farmer's boys who take an active interest. It is less liable that they will seek the alluring positions of the city if modern labor-saving conveniences on the farm make their work more pleasant and give them more time for amusement and pleasure.

All cow stalls, horse stalls, pens, etc., are divided off by modern steel stall equipment. The floor is concrete with sanitary manger troughs and gutters. Stanchions and water cups are an essential part of this barn equipment. At one end of the barn are the cow pens and box stalls. The effect of this sanitary and efficient equipment has been demonstrated in the increased production of the animals. Contented cows will not only produce a high-grade milk, but plenty of it. Drinking cups provide a continual source of fresh clean water.

"Ain't" Still is Snubbed.
The use of the word "ain't" has never yet been admitted to correct English, although numerous attempts have been made to have this done. The principal objection, probably, is that it is used with such a variety of meanings and impartially in all persons. Originally, it probably was an abbreviation for Am Not, the need of one for which is often felt. But we say, "I ain't, you ain't, he ain't," which means, "I am not, you are not, he is not." And good grammarians will not allow its use in correct English no matter how prevalent its use may be.

to dry, and then polished off with a soft cloth, cambric, or a brush. The result is bright, lustrous silver. Prepared cloths, sold under various trade names, also clean by friction. They are usually cotton flannel treated with a cleaning mixture, and are convenient but sometimes relatively expensive.

The alkaline solution for cleaning silver is made by dissolving four teaspoons borax, three teaspoons washing soda, or two teaspoons lye (caustic soda) in one quart water. The silver is placed in an old kettle or pan, covered with this solution, boiled for 10 minutes, and cooled in the water.

The Electrolytic Method.

One method of removing the tarnish from silver by electrolysis is the following:

Fill an enameled or agateware kettle partly full of water in which has been dissolved one teaspoon of either washing soda or baking soda and one teaspoon salt to each quart of water. Heat this solution to the boiling point, put in strips of aluminum or bright zinc, add the tarnished silver, and boil it. The silver must be covered completely by the water, and each piece must be in contact with the aluminum or the zinc, either directly or through other silver. When the tarnish has disappeared the silver should be removed from the kettle, washed, and dried with a clean, soft cloth. An aluminum kettle may be used, but it soon corrodes and must be cleaned, as only a clean, bright kettle serves the purpose. The zinc also grows dull and then is less active. It may be cleaned, however, in water containing a little hydrochloric (muriatic) acid, which is very poisonous and must be handled with extreme care.

Silver cleaned either in an alkaline solution or by electrolysis lacks luster, which cleaning by friction gives. It may be made bright, however, by a little rubbing with a soft cloth or chamois.

PRICES ARE REDUCED

In view of the reduction in steel prices made public April 13th, the International Harvester Company of America announces a straight 10 per cent reduction on its products in which steel is the principal raw material used. This reduction applies chiefly to the harvesting machine lines, covering grain and rice binders, shockers, reapers and push machines, mowers, hay rakes, side delivery rakes and tedders, combination side delivery rakes and tedders, corn binders and pickers, huskers and silo fillers.

On March 7th the Harvester Company announced price reductions of from 10 to 15 percent on the machines principally composed of wood and iron. The price changes announced today complete the reductions on the entire line of machines manufactured by the Harvester Company.

The International Harvester Company of America states that the reduction in the price of steel comes at a time when their year's product has been provided for, and will have no bearing on the cost of machines they sell this year. Corn planting time is here and doubt there will be an increase in acreage planted this year. It must be remembered that corn is nothing like as sure as the rain sorghums. We believe that affir corn is the best all around rain crop for this locality. Its certainty to make, its ease in sowing and its forage value are some points in kaffir's favor.

Those planting corn should test their seed. A test may be made as follows: Take a box or container similar to the kind used in planting tomato seed in doors, fill with soil, get two pieces of white paper that will nearly cover the soil, mark off inch squares on one and number each set of four squares, remove two inches of the dirt and lay the paper with drawings on the dirt, take four grains from each ear of seed corn and place them in the squares, being careful to note where the grains are placed. Number each ear so as to correspond with those on the test sheet. Place the other sheet of paper over the corn, replace dirt, moisten with warm water, set inside, in the sun if possible, and await results. It is rather late to test seed corn, but this method may be used for other field seeds as well, as this will give a fair germination test. Good seeds go a long way toward making a good season.

ASTRONOMY

Were you to spend the night on one of these little planets or worlds, you would be privileged to see more than a hundred and twenty moons all at the same time—some of them seem to be larger than our moon, some of them smaller—some new moons, some full moons, some half moons, and they would be seen in all parts of the ethereal blue, moving in different directions, changing their shining rapidly, crossing each other's pathway, eclipsing each other, and variously moving about from place to place. This would be glorious scenery, wouldn't it? It would be indescribably glorious! Yet, after all, a world that has nothing but the quality and quantity of its moonshine to recommend it would not be a very good place to live. It would be fine for those shallow-brained declaimers of the Ingersoll type who prefer shadow to substance, and who revel continually in the sublimated moonshine of agnosticism and materialism, but for ordinary people the world is a

If you were to carry to one of these little worlds a ponderous specimen of the genus homo, he would be surprised to find that, instead of weighing 300 pounds as he does here, he would weigh about a pound there.
