

"Remember when you could get home from a summer driving trip and in cleaning the car throw away a collection of rumpled road maps, maybe coffee stained and folded every which way? And all of them bearing the name of some gasoline maker--Exxon, Diamond-Shamrock, Gulf, Texaco, etc.?

The freebie road map was a handy item offered in most service stations in racks, with a selection usually covering several states in the area. And service station operators invited you to help yourself.

Not any more. Most service stations do not have road maps, free or otherwise, and those that are available have a price tag of \$1 or more on each one, and maybe have a coin machine that offers a choice of what you may need to get from where you are to places within a couple days driving distance. With most gasoline today sold at self service pumps, the freebie map has gone the way of the windshield wash and the tire-pressure check. The philosophy, and I don't fault it seems to be: A fellow who will save a dollar or two by filling his own tank is handy enough to find his way on down the road without any special directions from the gasoline people. There is a logic to the new policy. In the old days, maybe five or six years back, a road map might be used as a table cloth at a roadside park and might be casually rumpled and ripped, because there was a fresh, free one at the next stop. The thing today is to gather up maps from your home supply before getting on the road for any distance. Our home supply increasingly has new generic maps bearing the name Rand McNally instead of Texaco, Mobil or Conoco. For most of these we paid \$1, but one has price mark of \$1.25 on it. Probably bought it in New Mexico or Colorado, where Texans are fair game."





Although the Bovina Mustangs dropped their fourth game of the season last Friday to Lubbock Cooper, there were a number of bright spots in the game, according to Coach Larry Helton.

"There was some excellent hitting in the game. Danny Silva, Henderson Griggs and Martin Contreras were getting some great licks. Contreras has really come on as a senior. I consider him one of the top linemen in the district," Helton said.

The Mustang coach also had words of praise for sophomore David McKillip, who started at offensive center and did a "great job." This allowed the coach to move Jose Gomez to left tackle and strengthen the entire line.

Another sophomore, Chet Hawkins, started at left guard. Chet had been playing running back on the JV, and did a bang-up job.

Black Scaff, a third soph, started at quarterback, and continues to improve.

"I felt we had an opportunity to win, and when we gain the poise that only experience can bring, we will start to win the close games," Helton said. The team has lost three games this season by a touchdown or less.

Richard Shepherd, who was playing at a running-back position, got Bovina's touchdown on a spectacular 82-yard play last Friday.

Scaff, the quarterback, started out with the ball, and on the option play pitched out to Shepherd, who went the rest of the distance for the touchdown.

Jesse Gonzales scored two points on a PAT pass from Shepherd.







Accident Report Released By DPS

Last year 139 persons were killed in the 17-county Lubbock area, according to Ben Alley, District Engineer, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, of Lubbock.

"Alcohol and speeding continue to be our greatest problems," said Alley. "Here in the Lubbock district, which includes 17 counties surrounding Lubbock, we had 12,071 traffic accidents."

There were 166 recorded traffic accidents in Parmer County alone, two of which were fatal.

The number of accidents and fatalities in this area is cited as the reason the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT) will be working more closely with local traffic officials, police departments, and the schools.

To help combat the DWI problem,

"We also firmly believe in education as a way to relieve future problems," Alley said. The department recently previewed a new alcohol education kit, called "NO Power," which will be made available to schools over the state free of charge, while quantities last. The kit is now being made available to junior high schools in the District Five area. "NO, Power" is designed to help young students resist the peer pressure to drink and to educate them on the dangers of drinking/driving combination.

The department will also be supporting programs to increase the use of safety belts and child safety seats. Workshops and loan programs will be generated throughout the state, according to Alley, with special emphasis on making child safety seats accessible to those who might have difficulty in purchasing them for themselves. "We have the tools to reduce our traffic problem and save lives. If people would obey the speed laws, wear safety belts and eliminate drunk driving, our fatalities would drop by at least 80 per cent," said Alley. 





The U.S. Navy Blue Angels will arrive in Amarillo, October 8-9, for the second professional air show in that city's history. The precision jet pilot team will appear on a bill including the Eagles Aerobatic Flight Team, the world's smallest jet "Silver Bullet" and the U.S. Army Golden Knights Parachute Team.

Amarillo Air Show '83 will be held Saturday and Sunday, October 8-9, at the city's International Airport on I-40 East. It's sponsored by the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce Aviation Committee. Free parking is available on the southeast side of the airport. Gates will open at 10 a.m., to allow visitors time to tour the ground displays.

Heating Oven Wastes Energy

Most recipes for oven-cooked foods traditionally call for a preheated oven, but recent studies have shown that preheating is not essential for food quality and may even waste energy.

Researchers at the United States Department of Agriculture's consumer nutrition laboratory compared a variety of foods prepared in preheated and non-preheated ovens and found few significant differences in the quality or size of the items, reports home economist Bonnie Piernot. The non-preheated ovens required five minutes or less extra baking time than the preheated ovens, says Piernot, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The Blue Angels demonstration consists of six A-4F Skyhawk II's performing a prescribed sequence of maneuvers. The aircraft are seen in three components: a diamond formation of four aircraft; two solo aircraft that oppose each other along the line of flight; and, finally, all six aircraft in a delta formation.

In combat, the tactics that the Blue Angels demonstrate might be flown from treetop level to 60,000 feet.

zero airspeed, maintaining a continual rolling maneuver all the way to the top of a vertical line and back down. The plane seems to hang on its propeller while rolling in a direction opposite the propeller's rotation. In 1972, the Eagles took the world aerobatic championships in France and Hillard took the world individual championship.

The World's Smallest Jet -- The Coors Light Silver Bullet, was built by Bob Bishop and his wife, Mary Ellen, along with the help of many friends, during the winter and spring of 1976. Even though the jet is tiny, it is capable of amazing aerobatic maneuvers and of obtaining speeds nearing 300 mph. Built largely of light guage aluminum, the Coors Light Silver Bullet is the world's smallest and lightest man-carrying jet aircraft. It weighs 432 pounds and its total length is 12 feet.

Born in Lubbock, Texas, Bishop narrates his own performance from the cockpit of the Silver Bullet via a radio. He climaxes the show with a fall backwards, tail first, towards the earth in the Silver Bullet. For a time the craft is lost in its own smoke. After a long slide and a violent looking tumble the nose points earthward until Bishop pulls the Bullet out of the dive.

The Golden Knights are the Army's official parachute demonstration team. These specially selected airborne soldiers compete in national and international parachute competitions, help develop new parachuting techniques and equipment and, each year, demonstrate their skills before millions of spectators. Four events mark a Golden Knight performance: the baton pass, the cutaway, the diamond track, and the formation. Two jumpers are involved in the baton pass which requires them to free-fall for 60 seconds holding hands and passing the baton. The cutaway features one jumper. He free-falls for 3,500 feet, then deploys the first main chute. He causes that chute to collapse, free falls for another 2,000 feet, then opens his main chute to land. The Diamond Track involves two jumpers who freefall until they are as far apart as time will permit, they return together while free-falling and open their chutes at 2,000 feet. Four jumpers exit the craft in the formation event. After ten seconds they come together and freefall for 60 seconds in the shape of a diamond. At 3,000 feet, the jumpers "bomb burst" separating into a free-fall, and the main parachutes are opened at 2,000 feet.





"Overall," Piernot says, "the findings confirm that preheating the oven is not essential for good quality baking, so it's an unnecessary use of energy."

The foods used in the research study included pies, cakes, casseroles, souffles and meat loaves. The dishes were prepared in preheated and nonpreheated standard gas, continuouscleaning gas, standard electric and self-cleaning electric ovens.

The variability in baking times reported between preheated and nonpreheated ovens was often less than that reported among the different types of ovens, adds the specialist.




However, for the aerospace enthusiasts who come to watch the Amarillo Air Show, the Blues bring all maneuvers down to eye level. Bringing it down involves performing at low altitudes, using skills taught to student pilots at high altitudes.

None of the maneuvers are stunts or "daring feats," for all are part of the stock-in-trade of any fighter or attack pilot in tactical maneuvers. They are done in extremely close formation rather than individually and are done at a lower altitude than is normally the case.

The Eagles Aerobatic Flight Team is comprised of Charlie R. Hillard, Tom Poberezny and Gene Soucy. Flying the Eagle I sport biplanes, the team is returning to Amarillo to share the bill with the Angels. The Eagles opened the first world class air show in Amarillo in May of 1982.

The Eagles are known for the opposing knife-edge "Switchblade" maneuver that they introduced in 1980. Team leader, Charlie Hillard, is often identified with a spectacular maneuver he introduced known as the "Torque Roll." Hillard holds the airplane in a vertical climb through



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Specialist To Discuss M.S. On Friday

A physician specialist who recognizes the importance of patient confidence as well as medical technology will address multiple sclerosis patients and health professionals in Amarillo Friday about the value of the "old ways" of a physician with his patient.

Dr. Robert J. Slater of New York, medical director of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, will be in Amarillo October 6-8 and will address "public school educators, health professionals, and MSers and their families and friends," said Virginia Light, executive director of the Panhandle Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society.

Dr. Slater, who is no stranger to physicians and patients in the Amarillo area, will speak on "Living With MS" at 7 p.m. Friday, October 7 at Howard Johnson's Restaurant at 3205 I-40 East. Mrs. Light said the subject should interest "physicians, MSers and their families and friends, and the general public." Admission is free.

The Canadian-born physician spoke at a meeting of the local Multiple Sclerosis Society three years ago and told his listeners that a patient's confidence in his doctor is an important tool in the patient's progress.

"Hope is an important part of therapy," he said. "There is a spiritual element to healing."

He said patients sometimes are "kind of turned off on doctors. Largely this is because we have become so scientific we don't have enough heart. Now we are starting to realize that 'heart' has a great deal to do with how we function." physician will address public educators and librarians on the MS READaTHON and the dollars it generates for research. The READaTHON enlists school children to obtain sponsors who will give 25 cents or more for each book read for MS research. The program provides several million dollars each year for research and patient and community services.

Dr. Slater's three-day schedule begins with a 7 p.m. buffet dinner Thursday at Howard Johnson's when the national MS leader will discuss research and treatment of the disease. A special invitation has been given to medical professionals, but the public is welcome, said Mrs. Light.

Children Must Be Taught Self-Care Skills

Thousands of Texas school children are home alone each day after school.

The increasing number of employed mothers and lack of supervised after-school programs means that more and more children will be involved in self-care, says home economist Diane Welch.

"After school self-care beginning at age nine or ten is not necessarily a bad thing, if children are adequately prepared and ready to function on their own," says Welch, a family life education specialist with Texas A&M University's Agricultural Extension Service.

Many working parents feel guilty about having a "latch-key" child, yet fail to realize that all children need to learn coping skills at some point. Even the children of full-time homemakers must sometimes stay by themselves while their mothers keep appointments, do errands, or attend adults-only activities, she notes.

Both employed parents and fulltime homemakers, should teach coping skills to their children before allowing them to stay by themselves, says the specialist.

Welch suggests that parents preparing a child for self-care do the following:

*Teach the child basic safety skills including how to use emergency phone numbers, perform first aid for minor home accidents, escape the house or apartment in case of fire, and handle incoming phone calls or strangers coming to the door.

*Have your child practice emergency situations and test him or her periodically to make sure basic skills have not been forgotten.

*Set clear-cut rules that will guide the child toward responsible behavior. Children need to know what they can or cannot do when it comes to cooking, using appliances, playing outside or having friends over to play.


*Help your child fight boredom and avoid excessive television watching by encouraging hobbies and providing plenty of alternative afterschool activities, such as reading, a pet, or arts and crafts projects.

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
*Set expectations about homework, chores or music practice to help your child learn to manage time and develop self-discipline.

*If possible, arrange for the "indirect supervision" of a relative or neighbor who is willing to take phone calls or help your child with a problem.

*Stay in contact with your child by making a regular phone call every day and occasional unscheduled phone calls, if at all possible. Make sure the child knows the number where you can be reached.

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
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
