Texas got a black eye on national television Tuesday afternoon.

In case you missed it, NBC's 5:30 p.m. news carried a big deal about what some people call over emphasis on football in our schools.

Some game film from Lewisville was used, along with the band, drill team and big crowd.

Then Ross Perot, the industrialist who is heading up a blue ribbon panel on public education in the state, made a statement that really hurt.

He said 600 school districts in the state spend all their local tax money on non-curricular activities.

Let me point out quickly that Perot was only on camera about six or ten seconds. The quote could have been taken out of context.

But if it were in context, I'd like to see his figures. I do not believe it.

Of course, when you get into accounting procedures, you can do a lot of things. I know very little about accounting, but I do know that much.

Perot's statement would imply that all the tax dollars of those 600 districts were total outlay, cash being paid out and nothing coming in. That's like saying a business does nothing but spend money for products, and doesn't have any revenue from sales.

There is no secret that Perot doesn't like extra-curricular activities in the school system. Not much, anyway. Some of it I can go along with, but some I can't.

There is a lot about Perot that I admire. He's shown how the American system works, that one can succeed if he works hard, has some imagination, is willing to take a gamble and depends on private enterprise rather than government handout.

But he was wrong in appearing on the program as it was presented. If nothing else, an outsider, viewing the segment could arrive at the point that football and activities related to football was the only extra-curricular activity in Texas public schools.

Texas schools have an excellent, well-rounded extra-curricular activities program, most of which are covered in the University Interscholastic League activities. Add to those such organizations as the National Honor Society, various service organizations, skill activities, the list goes on and on.

I can only say that Perot was incorrect, misled, quoted out of context, lied or used accounting procedures to make the statement he did.

And Texans lost a degree of pride in our public schools in the eyes of those outside our state.

## Blood Drive Slated Here On Friday

The Coffee Memorial Blood Center's mobile unit will be in Bovina on Friday, October 14, from 1-5 p.m. at the Community Room of First State Bank.

It is vital that local donors take part in the blood drive, according to the local spokesperson.

Anyone who donates more than one time a year may request a personal credit which would be kept on record, and can be used at their discretion anytime during the next 12 months.

A \$10 credit will be forwarded to the hospital for each pint of blood donated in the name of another individual to assist him or her in paying for processing charges during hospitalization.

Processing charges are the accumulated cost of processing the blood from the initial point of contact (donor), including the testing and typing of the blood in the laboratory, to its placement in one of the 23 area hospitals the center serves.

"Coffee Memorial Bloodplans insure against your financial obligations in event of transfusions, but the only way to insure that blood is available when needed is to join your fellow citizens in seeing to it that your community blood bank has ample supplies at all times," said the blood drive spokesman.

"Even our bloodplan can't pay for transfusions which were not received because the blood wasn't there," the spokesman concluded.

## DETAILS GIVEN

### S.S. Money Will Become Taxable Item

January, 1984 will bring a change to the Social Security system--for the first time, Social Security benefits will be subject to income tax under certain conditions. This change is part of the Social Security Amendments of 1983, which are designed to financially strengthen the system.

The taxation of benefits will apply only to those people whose income is more than a certain amount:

--\$25,000 for an individual,  
--\$32,000 for a couple filing jointly, and

--Zero for a couple filing separately.

To compute whether or not your countable income is over the base amount, you will need to add:

--Your adjusted gross income (as shown on your tax return), plus

--Any non-taxable interest income you received in the year, plus

--One-half of your Social Security benefits received during the year.

If the sum of the above exceeds the base amount that applies to you, you will have to include some of your Social Security benefits as taxable income.

The amount of your benefits to be included in taxable income will be the lesser of:

--One-half of your Social Security benefits received for the year, or

--One-half of the excess of your combined income (adjusted gross income plus one-half of benefits) over the base amount.

People who receive Social Security should keep a record of the amount of each month's check. This record will make it much easier for you or your tax-preparer to compute your 1984 taxes.

This provision is estimated to affect about ten per cent of Social Security beneficiaries in 1984. However, taxes will not be withheld from your Social Security benefits during the year unless you are a non-resident alien receiving Social Security.



## COUNTY RIVALS

### Ponies, Steers To Collide Friday

The Mustangs will host the Farwell Steers in their second district game of the season Friday at 7:30 p.m.

The Mustangs will be out to add to their winning experience of the past week, and also will be hoping to avenge last year's frustrating loss to the Steers.

Bovina was leading Farwell, 21-20, last year at Farwell, going into the fourth quarter, but the Steers scored twice to win the game.

"Farwell will be favored in the game, but I think the main factor will be the team which blocks, tackles and runs the ball the best," said Coach Larry Helton.

Helton was high in his praise of Steer quarterback Alan Eubank, who directs the Farwell offense. He also praised the running of Bobby Ford

and Paul Fulcher in Farwell's win over Springlake-Earth in the district opener.

The Mustang coach said that Johnny Anzaldua and Johnny Daniels were impressive in the Farwell line.

"Such players as Mark Clayton, Martin Contreras and Terry Glasscock will have to contain them," Helton said.

The Mustangs were expecting to have the services of Terry Moore for the first time since the Morton game. Moore sustained a concussion. Bovina is still hurting because two-way starters Doug Johnson and Tommy Hutto are out of action.

But after last week's win over Hart, the young Mustang players are pumped up, and anxious to square off against Farwell.

## Mustangs Topple Hart Longhorns

The Bovina Mustangs broke a three-game losing streak, and got their district schedule off to a good start, with a 35-14 win over the Hart Longhorns last Friday night. The game was also the Homecoming Game for the Mustangs and their fans.

Coach Larry Helton was all smiles following the win, especially because of the adversity the team has suffered this season due to injuries and illness.

"We were especially happy with Blake Scaff's execution of the offense. We had planned to run the 'I' formation more but the veer was working well, so we just let him continue to run it," Helton said.

Scaff, a sophomore signal-caller, scored one Bovina touchdown on a 40-yard run, and got another from five yards out.

Jessie Gonzales scored a touchdown on a five-yard run. Gonzales was the team's leading rusher with 130 yards gained.

Other scores were by Michael Shepherd, who caught a touchdown pass, and a two-point conversion pass from Richard Shepherd.

Freshman fullback Homer Renteria scored the other touchdown on a dive play. Renteria has been playing on the junior varsity until recently, when the Mustangs' depth

became such a problem that Helton has had to cancel JV games and add those players to the varsity.

Bovina's defense also played a good game last Friday. Linebacker Jose Gomez was a standout, as was Jessie Gonzales, Danny Silva and Johnny Villarreal.

In addition, Richard Shepherd recovered a fumble and intercepted a pass, and cousin Michael Shepherd had a pass interception.

Hart was able to score their two touchdowns only after Bovina fumbled twice inside their own 20-yard line. They were able to make some yardage against the Mustangs, but not a sustained drive.

"We bent some, but we never broke," Helton explained.

Every player suited up for the game was able to see game action.

The Bovina Booster Club paid the difference between a black and white game film and a color film so the game could be filmed in color. "We really appreciate the Booster Club for doing that. It was nice to have the game filmed in color," Helton said.

The team suffered one injury in the game, Matlock Howell, who had a rib injury. Howell was held out of contact on Monday, and may miss the Farwell game this week.





## PCA Directors Attend Annual Conference

Directors of the Plainview  
Production Credit Association (PCA)  
joined approximately 160 other Farm  
Credit officials attending the 1983  
PCA Directors Conference held  
recently in San Antonio.

Directors representing the  
association were H.L. Porter of  
Petersburg, chairman; A.W.  
Anthony of Friona, Ray Robertson  
of Dimmitt and Harley Wells of  
Plainview.

Bill Black, president, also was  
present.

The purpose of the conference,  
held annually, is to update members  
of Production Credit Association  
board of directors on matters  
concerning farm credit.

Featured speaker for the occasion  
was Peter J. Carney, president of the  
Federal Farm Credit Banks Funding  
Corporation. Carney explained how  
the Farm Credit System obtains the  
funds eventually passed along to the  
nation's agriculture industry.

A highlight of the conference was  
presentation by J.A. Rogers,  
president of the Federal Intermediate  
Credit Bank of Texas, of a  
commemorative plaque honoring the  
Production Credit Association's 50th  
anniversary. The association was  
chartered in January of 1934.

Plainview PCA is one of 30  
member-owned Production Credit  
Associations in Texas. Collectively  
they serve more than 16,000 of the  
state's agricultural producers. Last  
year more than \$2 billion was loaned  
through Texas PCAs.

At mid-year the Plainview  
Production Credit Association had  
approximately \$58 million loaned to  
886 member-borrowers in Bailey,  
Briscoe, Castro, Floyd, Hale, Lamb,  
Parmer and Swisher counties.

PCAs have been a source of  
agricultural loans since the first  
association was chartered on  
September 11, 1933 in Champaign,  
Illinois. On October 10, the first PCA  
loan was made to Milton W. Warren  
at Mansfield, Illinois. The loan was  
for \$830.50 and was used to purchase  
30 head of 850 pound cattle.

Today, there are 422 PCAs with  
more than \$22 billion in loan volume.  
Nationally they serve the credit needs  
of more than 380,000 farmers and  
ranchers.




