Beach, T. R. Moreman, president, Van Boone, secretary, C. O. Cooper, J. W. Forbis and Frank Kendall. The first three are holdovers, the terms of the four last named expiring with the coming election.

We hear it expressed on every hand that, in view of the excellent record made and the splendid work done in inaugurating and putting over our bond issue campaign, the entire board be requested to serve again. It is no doubt a fact that they, having so well started this big job, are the logical men to finish it.

SCHOOL BOND ISSUE WINS BY BIG MARGIN

The bond election held here last Saturday resulted in an overwhelming endorsement of the movement for Better Schools in Hedley. The count of the ballots showed that 191 voters favored the bond issue, while only 23 opposed it.

This marks a distinct forward step for Hedley's people. The money to be secured from the issuance of these bonds will be used to completely overhaul the present building, construct a large addition, and buy all the equipment necessary to a high school of the first class. It will give us just twice as much room as at present, provide us with twelve large class rooms, a big auditorium for school and community gatherings, and a spacious basement for the heating plant, storage purposes, etc.

It is the purpose of the Board to start the work in ample time to have the building completed for the opening of the new term in September. Then Hedley will rank in schools with such towns as Clarendon and Memphis. Which is as it should be.

But the evergreen trees were still dressed and they cried "Shame!" to the tall bare trees as they shivered in the winter winds.

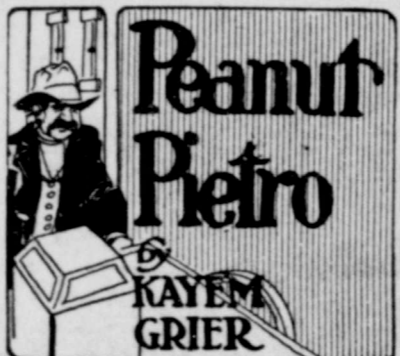

IN MEMORIAM

R. N. Condron, ex Confederate soldier and Texas pioneer, died at his home on Bush Knob early Saturday morning. He grew sick about ten days ago with a severe attack of stomach trouble but had practically recovered, when on last Tuesday evening, February 28th, he was stricken with paralysis. The stroke affected his entire body, rendering him unconscious. He lingered until the early hours of Saturday morning, when his brave spirit took its flight.

R. N. Condron was one of the honored and respected citizens of this county. His life was a long and strenuous one. In early manhood he enlisted in Co. "K" of Terry's Texas Rangers. Thru the war he served in the ranks of this noted command, fighting under such soldiers as Gens. A. S. Johnson, Nathan B. Forrest and Fighting Joe Wheeler. There are those living to day who testify to the daring bravery and fearless courage of Riley Condron, as he was called by his own comrades. In no small measure, by exploits of valor and heroism, he helped to make the history of that famous regiment one of the brilliant chapters in the life of the "Storm cradled nation that fell." Upon the close of the Civil War he returned home with his horses and guns, having never surrendered. Following the war he lived for many years in Washington county. He afterwards moved to Comanche county and resided there until he came to Throckmorton in the late nineties. He first married in 1865, and again in 1885. He is survived by his wife, eight children: Harold Condron, Albert Condron, Roy Condron, Mrs. Pearl Hollows, Mrs. Daisy Hicks, Ewel D. Condron, B. C. Condron, Miss Emma Condron, and two sisters, Mrs. Mary Parr and Joe Pettit John Condron.

Mr. Condron will be missed by his large circle of friends. He was a friend whose sincerity could not be doubted. He was frank and open with all men. His opinions were never camouflaged and on any issue he took his position without excuse or apology. He was a Christian. It was his greatest delight to discuss the great problems of human life from a Biblical standpoint. Shortly before his death he stated to the writer that he knew that ere many days he would make his departure, and that he was studying closely the railway guide from Heaven which directs men from this storm swept shore to that fair haven in eternity. The future had no terrors for him. He went to sleep secure in the belief of his final victory.

He has joined those armies across the river. Long had he tarried on this out post of time while his old comrades gathered around eternity's camp fires where battle flags are forever furled. He has heard the bugle sounding reveille beyond the skies. Like the brave soldier he is he obeyed the summons. He has answered "Here" to the roll call over there. Peace to his ashes.—From the Throckmorton Herald, March 10.

TICK ERADICATION IN SOUTH

Work Has Progressed Satisfactorily in Georgia Where There Has Been Co-Operation.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Tick eradication has progressed so satisfactorily in Georgia that probably fifteen or more counties will soon be released from federal quarantine, according to a report just issued by the United States Department of Agriculture. During June, 814,565 dippings of cattle were officially supervised in the state, and in the counties expected to be released from quarantine only 300 tick-infested herds were found.

With the exception of one county, Taylor, there has been hearty co-operation in carrying on the tick-eradication work. The commissioners' court of Taylor county declined to co-operate with the state for the enforcement of dipping and quarantine regulations, and has refused to complete the work of tick eradication in herds, on premises and in localities held under local quarantine at the time the federal quarantine was revoked in December, 1920.



Tick-infested Cattle.

There is in effect in Georgia a state regulation which provides that all cattle going through the dipping vat shall be marked with paint at each dipping. This regulation has been of great assistance in facilitating tick-eradication work. Range riders, whose duty it is to pick up any cattle not marked with paint, are employed in each county. Undipped cattle are taken to the dipping vat and dipped at the expense of the owner, or if the owner cannot be found, they are treated as strays and sold for the expenses incurred in their gathering and dipping. To this system, the Department of Agriculture attributes the satisfactory results in ridding the state of ticks. In fact, it is said there are fewer undipped cattle in Georgia, in counties in which tick eradication is being carried on, than in any other state.

The importance of freeing the South of ticks is emphasized by the increase in the number of markets which are being closed to ticky cattle. Following a resolution recently passed by the Maryland state board of agriculture, prohibiting the shipment of ticky cattle into the state for any purpose, the Department of Agriculture has issued a notice to bureau of animal industry inspectors to the effect that shipments of cattle from quarantined areas cannot be received at the Union stock yards, Baltimore, Md.; the J. A. Whitefield stock yard, Frederick, Md.; the Benning Union stock yards, District of Columbia, and the Carolina Packing Co., Wilmington, N. C.
