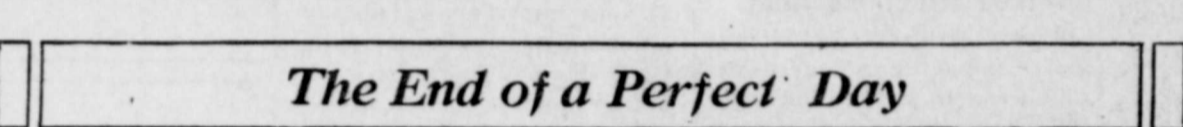
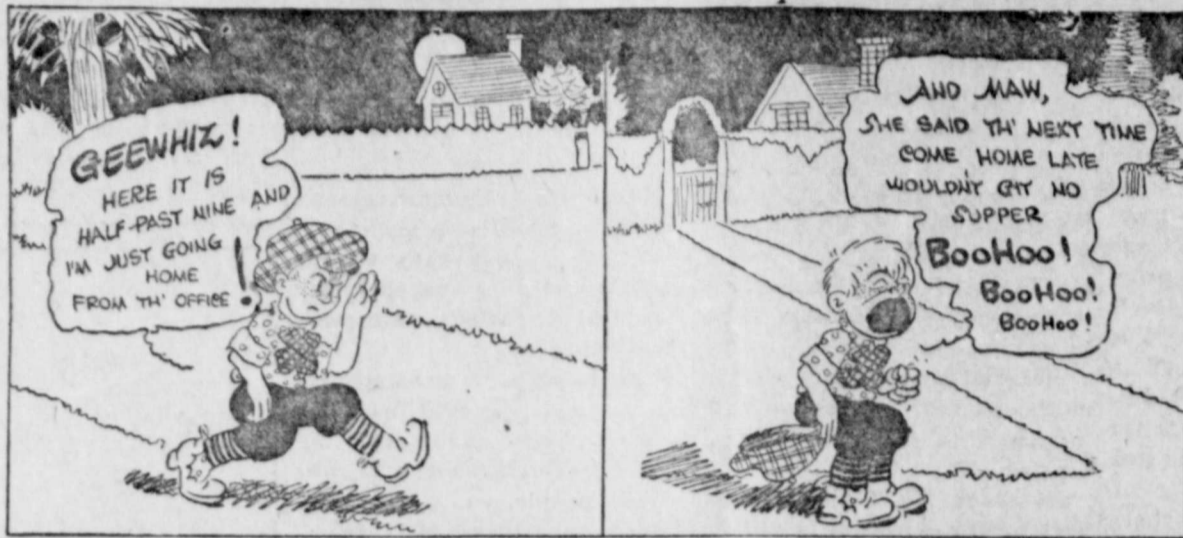

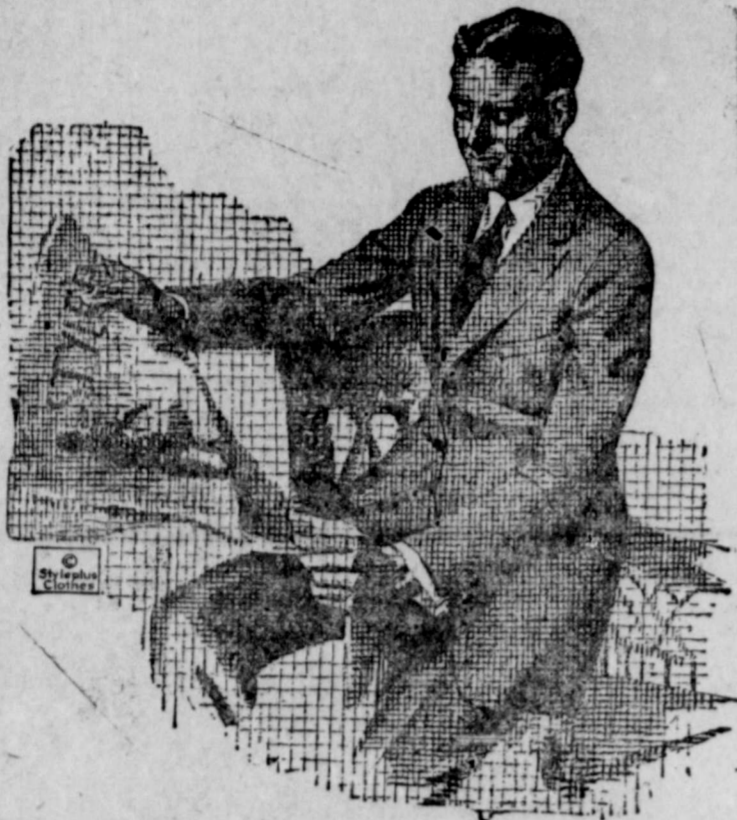

HON. H. B. HILL ANNOUNCES FOR REPRESENTATIVE

H. B. Hill of Shamrock, who is now making this district a most excellent Representative in the Texas Legislature, is a candidate to succeed himself. He was in Hedley Wednesday, and authorized us to place his name in our announcement column.

It will be recalled that Mr. Hill was the author of the Redistricting Bill, the first real measure of that kind passed during the past thirty years by the Texas Legislature. He was joint author also of the West Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College bill, passed and later vetoed by Governor Neff. This bill, it will be recalled, was for a full college of like degree and grade of that at College Station, and not a branch of that institution or secondary to it.

Another measure of prominence, one of great worth to the people of Texas, was the first one ever framed and passed under the direction of Mr. Hill—that providing for paying owners of cattle condemned and destroyed legally in the campaign to stamp out infectious and communicable diseases.

During the years Mr. Hill has been a member of the State Legislature, it has been a well recognized fact that he is first of all the representative of the Northwestern portion of Texas. His four years have been busy and helpful ones in the interest of the people, according to the statement of those who have followed his work in the State Legislative body.

Incidentally, Mr. Hill has been urged by many members to become a candidate for Speaker of the House, and stands a splendid chance of being selected as such in case he consents. How-

ever, he declares that he has to be elected by the people before he will have the privilege to become a candidate for Speaker, and until the people have indicated their choice he will make no announcement.

But today, Ah! It is quite different. The subject of homes, rents, building costs and labor troubles are

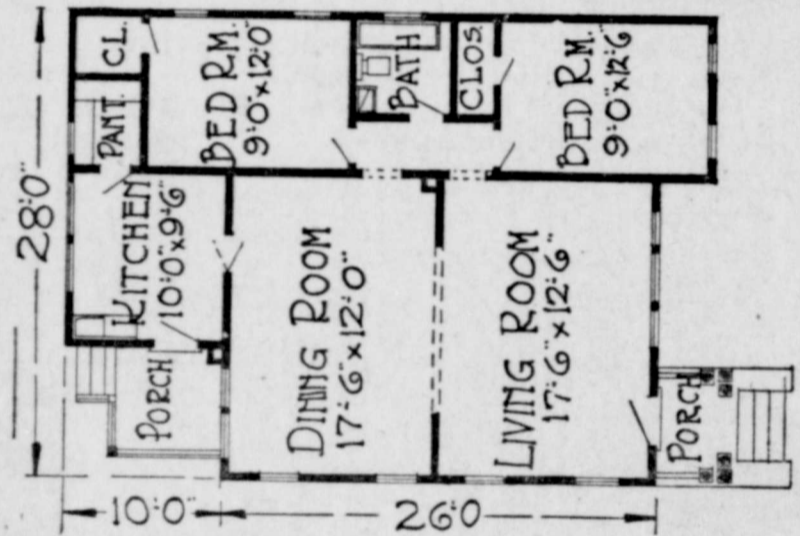
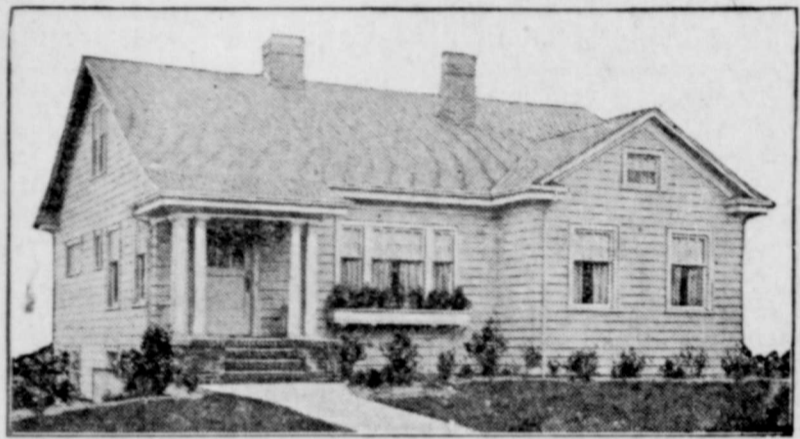
makes dancing in the home a common practice and the large living room is an important accessory after the fact.

MAKE PREPARATION FOR CANNING BEFORE FRUITS BEGIN TO RIPEN



Be Sure Your Rubber Rings Are Good.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Many a family that is fond of strawberry preserves or raspberry short-cake during the winter months finds itself in the fall without any of these delicious small fruits on its canned fruit shelves.

Season is Short. The season of any of the small fruits is very short, and full preparation for the canning should be made before even the first of the fruits begins to ripen.

If you are going to get a new canner this year—and one certainly simplifies the work—the time to get it is now.

BUY BAKING POWDER IN SMALL QUANTITY

Estimate Time One-Pound Can Will Last in Cooking.

Many Pantry Supplies May Be Replenished Before Stock Is Exhausted—Making Estimates With Other Foods.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Baking powder often runs short at a crucial moment when one has a cake half-baked, thinking there is plenty of it on hand.

A pound can of baking powder can be bought at regular intervals if one knows approximately how many teaspoonsful it contains and how many teaspoonsful are needed for the cooking during any given period.

In a home where hot biscuits are made every morning, possibly four teaspoonsful of baking powder would be the average amount daily to leave a pint of flour.

Similar estimates with other foods can be made by the individual housewife. The rule that three teaspoonsful make one tablespoonful is sufficiently accurate for practical purposes.

Chocolate Almonds.

Blanch Jordan almonds, dry them between towels, then strew over a baking sheet and place in a medium hot oven until delicately browned.

Cleaning Mint.

Use one-half cupful of kerosene oil in a pailful of water to wash your window sashes and sills.

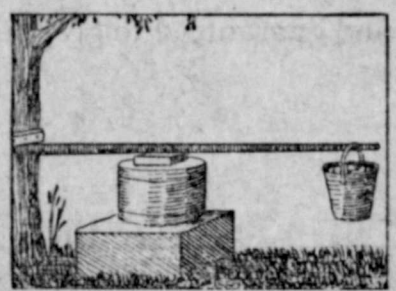
Wash Cans Thoroughly. All cans and their tops should be washed carefully as they are emptied and before they are stored.

For those who make their own cheese following is described a simple method of pressing the curd. The lever stick should be about twelve feet long, while the weight may consist of a pail containing rocks or earth.

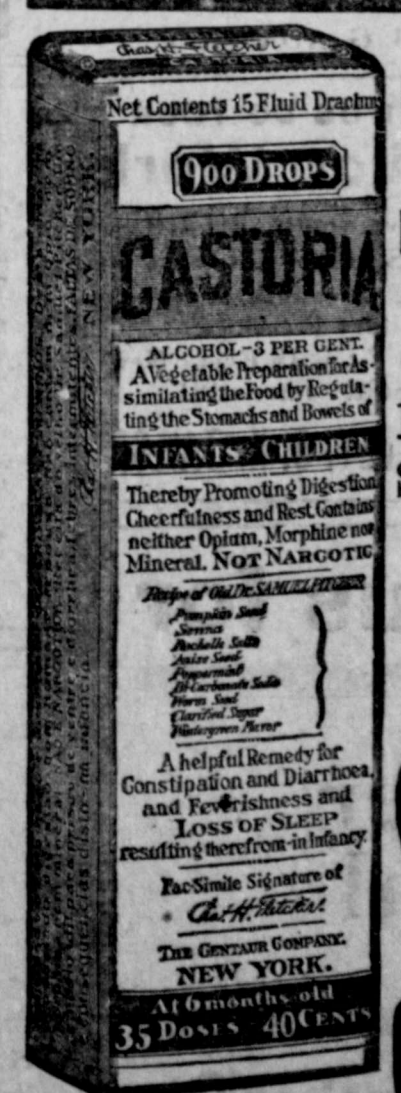

THE RETAIL MERCHANT

If there is any class of people who have been hard hit by the recent change in conditions, it is the retail merchants. We hear much of the farmer, and the strain the bankers have been laboring under is of knowledge to all. But have you heard of any general movement to assist the retail merchant in these times of stress? Yet no line of business has been hit harder than the retail merchant—the man who meets every day and the one who supplies your daily needs.

When the slump in prices came it was the retail dealers who carried the load. The manufacturers and jobbers were hit hard, it is true, but they were in many cases short on supplies, and their loss, while heavy, was not in proportion to the small retail dealers. In spite of this well known fact, the retail merchant has not only not come in for any special consideration, but has been heaped with a lot of unmerited abuse.

How many times one has run across such statements as: "Wholesale prices have come down, but the retail dealers do not seem to have found it out." It has appeared so often that many have accepted it as true. Yet if any purchasers of family supplies will compare the prices paid today and those paid two years ago, they will know that it is far from the truth.

During the past year the invoice price of goods on the retail merchant's shelves has been reduced from 20 to 40 per cent. On a \$20,000 stock this means a loss of from \$4000 to \$8000. It means that the merchant has taken a loss of that much on his goods. Is it any wonder that many merchants have been forced to the wall?

What is more, the overhead cost of doing business is greater than it was before the war. Wages of help have not fallen to that of the pre-war period. Rents in many cases are higher, and fuel and lights are higher. All these things combine to make the retail merchant's path any thing but a rose-strewn high-
