Auto theft is a growth industry, increasing each year by more than hree per cent. A car thief can earn

the long run are the car owners and policy holders, whose premiums will be raised to cover the losses. Auto theft costs insurers $\$ 4$ billion each year. Annual loss from phony claims run around $\$ 600$
