



Bitter Orange Jelly.

Bitter orange jelly is made by preparing the juice as directed for bitter orange marmalade. After the peel has been removed, weigh the fruit and cut it into small pieces. Place it in a kettle and for each pound of orange add two pounds of water; boll until it thoroughly disintegrates. Pour the mass into a flannel jelly bag and press until no more juice can be extracted. Drain this juice again through a clean flannel jelly bag without pressing. No peel is used in the jelly. For each pound of fruit taken one pound of sugar is added. This is



Many excellent combinations can be made among them. They vary in their composition

The department suggests that every diabetic or other invalid dependent on vegetables who can do so should derelop a garden, both for the sake of

variety in the diet and because of the new interest and hobby it furnishes. Even city patients may find it possible to have small gardens on near-by vacant lots. Most of the uncommon vegetables in the foregoing list can be easily grown. Information concerning them may usually be had from the extension agent, whose headquarters are at the State Agricultural college, or from the United States Department of Agriculture.

Much to Be Said in Favor of Practice Provided Contents De Not Become Stale.

There is much to be said in favor of keeping a soup pot on the stove all the time, says the United States Department of Agriculture, provided great care is taken not to allow the contents to grow stale. Into this pot can go also clean foods left from the table, such as weat, wilk, mashed potatoes,

or other vegetables, crusts, cold cereal mushes, and even fruits. Soups made from such materials may not have great nutritive value, but, like those made out of materials bought for the purpose, they encourage the use of a large amount of bread, particularly if carefully seasoned.

One Plan Favored is to Draw Cloth Through Vapor Coming From Teakettle Spout

Most velvets may be freshened by steaming from the wrong side, suggests the United States Department of Agriculture, in connection with its home economics work for women. One way is to draw the velvet through the steam from a teakettle. Care must be taken that the teakethe contains only a little water, or the water may splatter out and spot the velvet. As a special precaution several thicknesses of cheesecloth may be tied over the spout. A cone of heavy paper placed around the spout will direct the steam and make it possible to hold the velvet farther from the heat.

The best breeders have come to the conclusion that it is highly desirable to provide every new-born calf with a separate stall for at least a period of four or five weeks. Men who have been studying the young calf declare that at the time of its birth ft is likely to be infected with a variety of germs which are apt to cause trouble.

By investigating the contents of the calfs stomach, in order to determine the kinds of bacteria it contains, a number of disease-producing bacteria have been found. If several youngsters are kept in a stall together at this early period, the chances are, if one is infected with a certain disease, that all will have the same trouble. The separate calf stall makes it easy to prevent the spread of these various calf diseases and by keeping calves in separate stalls for four or five weeks, the usual time of infection, many of the common ills will be eliminated.

CHURNING TROUBLE CAUSES

Ordinarily Weather is Determining Factor, Being Either Too Cold or Else Too Warm.

Churning troubles are due occasionally to the feed or to the fact that it has been some months since the cows were fresh. Ordinarily the trouble is caused by the weather; the cream is either too cold or it has been made too warm. Cold weather holds back the riponing of the cream, also, and unripe cream makes trouble in the churn. The best plan is to keep the cream in a warm enough place so it will ripen as it does in summer, and then to churn with the cream at a temperature of 60 to 62 degrees. Cream sometimes makes trouble if the cows de not have plenty of salt.

Put Cows on Record. Get acquainted with your cows: they might be cheating you. The way to do it is to enroll in the Cow Testing association and put them or record.

Combination of Which Charcoal Is Chief Ingredient.


Experience has taught the stockman that a mineral mixture is a good thing to keep before the hogs in the winter time.

G. Bohstedt of the animal husbandry department has just made a mixture to feed to the hogs in the Wisconsin Agricultural college herd. It consists of: Two hundred pounds of powdered charcoal: 100 pounds of wood ashes; 100 pounds of air-slaked lime; 100 pounds of ground rock phosphate; 50 pounds of salt; 10 pounds of sulphur and 5 pounds of copperas.

A mineral mixture such as this is not considered necessary in the summer time.

SOWS NEED SOME ATTENTION


Gilts About to Farrow Should Be Watched Closely and Kept in Good Condition.


