



BETTER METHODS FOR LAUNDERING

Need for Demonstration Work Shown by Surveys Made in Two Missouri Counties.

MACHINES SAVE MUCH TIME

Comparisons Were Also Made in Ironing, Both With and Without Electricity and Ironing With Mangle-Latter Best.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Results of surveys in Lafayette and Saline countles, Mo., have recently been tabulated by extension workers of the United States Department of Agriculture, to show the need for demon stration work in improved methods of washing and ironing. In Saline county only 2 per cent of the people sent the washing out of the house, 25 per cent still used the washboard, 40 per cent used hand machines, and 33 per cent used power washers. The average time for doing washing with a power machine was two hours, as compared with four and one-half hours with a washboard. In ten families where machines have been purchased since the survey was made, it is estimated that two and

DELICIOUS PUDDINGS FROM HOMINY GRITS

Comparatively Inexpensive and Excellent for Breakfast.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Hominy grits are comparatively inexpensive, and are excellent as a cooked breakfast cereal or as a foundation for other dishes. Here are two recipes for using hominy grits, recom nded by food specialists in the United States Department of Agricul-

Hominy Date Pudding. 1 cupful hominy grits.

cupfuls milk.

1 teaspoonful salt.
¼ cupful of sugar.
1 cupful chopped seeded dates.
1 teaspoonful vanilla.

Add the salt and hominy grits to the milk, and cook in a double boiler one hour. Add sweetening, dates, and vanilla and mix well. Partly cool before serving.

Fruit Scallop. 1% cupfuls cooked hominy grits.
1 cupful stewed and sweetened apricots. % cupful apricot juice. % tablespoonful butter

Into a greased baking dish place, first, a layer of hominy grits which have been mixed with the fruit juice, then a layer of the stewed fruit. Re peat until dish is nearly full. Dot over with the butter, and sprinkle with one tablespoonful of sugar mixed with cinnamon. · Bake until brown. erve hot or cold with sauce or top

Dried or canned fruit can be used.



PROPER FEEDING OF HORSES

Outline of Results Obtained in Expeniments Conducted at Illinois Station.

Experiments in the feeding of farm work horses and mules completed at the Lilinois experiment station indicate that a practical work ration requires approximately a pound of concentrate and a pound of roughage for every hundred pounds of body weight of the animal fed. That amount, in each case, is divided into three feeds. Grain is increased a little when the animal has to work hard and hay is correspondingly decreased. As regards hay, it is best to feed most of it at night and during periods of extra hard work not to allow more than a pound or so of roughage at noon, while the horse is cooling off, before being watered and fed again. The recommendations made by the investigators are to the effect that homegrown feeds should be used and that legume hay, fed along with ear corn or preferably ear corn and oats, should be made an important part of the roughage. While it was found that alfalfa hay and ear corn are sufficient to maintain horses and mules doing a considerable amount of medium hard work, it is believed that part of the alfalfa or clover roughage may be replaced with timothy hay, oat hay, oat straw, prairie hay, or corn stover, and one-third of the corn ration may be replaced with oats to good advantage.

In the experiments referred to in the foregoing grain and hay were fed in quantities readily consumed by the animals. The grain fed in the first three experiments consisted of twothirds corn and one-third oats, and in the fourth experiment of ear corn. In the first experiment clover hay was fed, in the second one-half clover and

one-half timothy hav; in the third alfalfa hay or one-half alfalfa and one-half timothy hay, and in the fourth alfalfa hay. Whether alfalfs hay should be liberally fed or not de pends largely on its quality. Alfalfa that is imperfectly cured generally contains molds or other micro-organisms which irritate the kidneys and also tend to loosen the bowels, making the horse soft and readily fatigued. Such hay is unfit for the feeding of horses.

FARROWING HOUSE FOR SOWS

Construction Need Not Be Elaborate but Sufficient to Give Needed Protection.

Some time before farrowing the gilts should have access to a farrowing house or farrowing pen. The construction need not be elaborate; it may be very cheap and simple. It should, however, afford shelter and protection from winds and the sides should be so constructed as to prevent the sow or gilt from lying on the pigs. Usually the A-shaped house of pen is advisable, since this type has such an angle with the floor that the pigs are protected from the sow's weight when she lies down.

PROVIDE GRAIN FOR HORSES

Object Should Be to Keep Him Growing Well and in Good Flesh -Exercise Needful.

The horse should have enough grain to keep him growing well and in good flesh. Ordinarily, one pound of grain for every hundred pounds of weight is a safe rule, increasing the allowance somewhat when the stallion works and decreasing it when he runs in the pasture. Provide a paddock or strongly-fenced pasture where the stallion may be turned loose for exer

LAUNDRY SOAP

How shall we choose soaps? The problem of finding a really good soap for daily use is of no small importance, when we consider the almost constant need for soap in the home, Brought rest at last to limb and and what a considerable monthly and yearly expense that single item may

> In the first place, it is a good plan to use only soaps put out by reliable firms. It is never an economy to use cheap and poorly made soaps in the laundry. And we must not make the mistake of thinking that one kind of soap will enswer for every purpose.

Soaps are classified into mild, medium and strong, according to the amount of free alkali present. Nearly every home laundry should be equipped This thought has brought me to with at least two of these, and very probably you will need all three. Neu-We both have known Gethsem- tral or mild soaps should be used for woolen materials, delicate colors and all fabrics which even the smallest amount of alkali might injure. A me dium soap is best for durable fabrics. A strong yellow soap is all right for rough work and for washing greasy overalls and men's work clothes.

The yellow or dark brown, color of soaps is generally due to the presence of rosin. It is hard to say just when rosin added to a soap ceases to be an advantage and becomes objectionable. In small quantities it is believed to help whiten the clothes, but too much will yellow the clothes, and forms a sticky scum in the wash-boiler, which settles into the clothes and may cause trouble in froning. You can generally tell whether rosin has been added in excessive quantities or not, by the peculiar resinous odor, and by the sticky feel of the bar when handled.

The presence of too much free alkali is also serious, even in a strong soap. It is hard on the clothing and hard on the hands. There are several good tests for excess alkali. Soap salesmen try for it by holding a bit of the soap on the end of the tongue. Alkali is very caustic and will bite. Many housekeepers learn to recognize its presence by the shriveled, drawn and dried-up feeling of the hands after using. A safer plan, as well as cheaper, is to buy a good mild soap, and then add the washing soda yourself to the water, if more alkali seems desirable.

CHILDREN'S CLOTHES

"I wonder what was the matter with Mary's last dress? It simply didn't wear at afl." How often we hear mothers making statements like that.

Clothes for children, when you consider the hard wear to which they are ubjected, and the frequency with which they must be replaced, are just as significant an item of expense as our own, and a few suggostions about their choice and care may help you to buy wisely.

Material for children's dresses should be chosen for endurance and fast color. A child's dress needs frequent washing, and for that reason most mothers prefer cotton to many other materials. As a general rule, materials that are yarn-dyed, such as gingham, chambray, and some cotton crepes, will be less likely to fade than "print" goods, unless they are especially well woven

and printed in very fast colors. Little children are apt to get spots on their clothing, and so a fabric that can be easily and quickly sponged off with soap and water is much better than one where the whole garment has to go into the laundry each time. In making or buying a child's dress you should always consider the amount of time it will require in the tub. Lightweight goods are easier to wash than heavy ones, and loosely-woven materials than those solid and tightly woven; fancy trimmings and cheap lace take time and soon wear out. In general, wool does not wash so easily as cotton, but all-wool serges of firm weave wash well. To cut down the laundry, mothers are using to an increasing extent the attractively simple and crinkly seersuckers and crepes, which do not require froning after

A child's clothing should never be too good to play in, but this does not nean that the frocks should be ngly Children are very sensitive to gay colors and pretty clothes, and if dressed in ugly, drab garments are sure to grow timid and sullen in company with their bright, prettily dressed playmates. As little folks outgrow their garments quickly, only a few at a time, to be worn frequently, is the best plan. Dresses for little girls should have bloomers of matching material to allow her the same freedom as her brother.

Until a few years ago, any ready-made clothing for children was too elaborate and flimsy for every-day wear, but now you can find on the market garments of the best material, that are both simply and well made, and you can even rely on ready-made clothes if you are otherwise employed and haven't time to sew.

DAIRY HINTS

DELICATE TASTE OF BUTTER

Good Flavors Find Their Way Into Product in Same Way as Those Objectionable.

Good flavors find their way into milk and butter in somewhat the same way as do undesirable flavors. dalryman whose farm-made butter is in high demand because of its exceptional flavor, holds that prompt cool ing of the milk, clean water for his cows, and sweet feeds, are the factors chiefly responsible. If milk needs to be pasteurized in order to overcome a disagreeable flavor, or if cream has to be neutralized before it is placed in the churn, the resulting product will be lacking in that delicate taste which is characteristic of the best quality of butter. Furthermore, it will soon grow strong once it is removed from storage. Every dairyman knows that strong feed will result in undesirable flavors, both in milk and butter. The rapidity with which stable odors are taken up by milk also is understood The fact that the prompt removal of animal heat from freshly drawn milk affects its flavor is less fully appreciated. Yet the proper cooling of milk is one of the details of dairy practice which is easy of accomplishment on most dairy farms. A bit of thoughtfulness at this point will work wonders in dairy products.

DEHORN CATTLE WHEN YOUNG

Treatment of Calves by the Use of Caustic Potash Is Simple and Recommended.

Dehorning calves by the use of caustic potash is a simple process, strongly recommended by the dairy department of the New Jersey State Agricul-

tural college. At birth the calves have no horns, but before long buttonlike structures develop on the skin loose from the skull, and later become attached to the skull proper. These are the beginnings of horns and while in this early stage should be killed with

away carefully around the spot to be treated, then with a stick of caustic potash moistened in water, rub the skin over the small horn until the skin is broken. Sticks of this knd can be procured at any drug store.

Care should be taken not to use too much water as it may run down the side of the face and cause sores. De horning with caustic should take place when the calf is from three to ten days old.

PUREBRED BULL IS FAVORED

Farmers and Dairymen Cannot Afford to Continue Use of Scrub or Grade Animals.

Farmers and dairymen cannot con tinue to use scrub or grade bulls, says A. C. Baer, professor of Dairy Husbandry at the A, and M, college, Profitable dairying depends on, (1) good breeding; (2) weeding out poor

cows; (3) good feeding. A purebred bull will improve all dairy herds which are not now headed by a purebred male, Mr. Baer says Farmers or dairymen can very often club together and buy a bull which costs more than an ordinary purebred male. Whenever possible, a herd bull should be from a tested dam with a good record.

TO AVOID CURD IN BUTTER

Trouble Is Generally Due to Excessive Souring of Cream, Which Can Be Prevented.

Curd in butter is generally due to excessive souring of the cream. When this occurs, the casein in the cream curdles, and it may appear in the butter. To avoid this, churn cream before it has soured to an excessive de-
