

BUNGALOW MAKES HOSPITABLE HOME

Simple Structural Design Gives It an Appeal All Its Own.

SUITABLE FOR FARM OR TOWN

It would make an ideal small farm residence, and not because of looks alone, but hecause it is of fairly simple structural lesign which could be developed satisfactorily even where there was a lack of skilled building labor.



Orange Juice Is Excellent for the Kiddies.

Orange juice supplies vitamins and

valuable mineral matter necessary for proper growth and physical well being. Physicians now recommend it even for babies because it provides vitamin C, the vitamin in which milk is most likely to be lacking and without which scurvy and other disorders often occur. Oranges are equally valuable for older children and grownups, and the United States Department of Agriculture recommends their use at any meal. At breakfast it is usually convenient to serve either the whole fruit or the plain juice, but there are other simple ways of using them that give variety to the meals and do not involve long cooking such as might lessen the value of vita-

APPROPRIATE DRESS FOR ALL OCCASIONS

All Outer Clothing Should Be Selected From Standpoint of Their Suitability.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

All outer-clothing, men's and boys' suits and overcoats, women's and girls' dishes. It contains all the lime, too sults and topcoats, should be selected of the milk. from the standpoint of good materials and workmanship, their suitability to the wearer's needs and becomingness of line and color. If one cannot afford both a heavy and a light-weight topcoat, it may be better to buy one of flum weight and depend upon an underjacket or a piece of fur for extra warmth. For general wear some women prefer a topcoat and one-piece dress to a sult. Suits, however, have a legitimate place in the woman's wardrobe, especially when combined with a waist of the same color. A good plan is to alternate the buying of the more expensive garments; for Instance, not to buy a topcoat and a suit during the

same season. Blouses and separate waists for women are best made of washable materials, such as voile, batiste, handkerchief linen, crepe de chine, crepe georgette and washable silks, or madras and gingham for hard wear. The cotton materials require more frequent laundering than the crepes. Volle can be worn much longer without pressing than can any of the other cottons. Handkerchief linen is not very satisfactory because it crushes easily. For general wear, the tailored waists made of batiste, crepe de chine, wash silk or broadcloth are especially suitable; simple blouses of sheer materials are also suitable when careful attention is given to detachable linings or to un-

LETTUCE SCUP IS EXCELLENT

Three Foods That Are Sometimes Wasted Can Be Made Into Most Nourishing Dish.

Skim milk, stale bread and the outer leaves of lettuce-three foods that are sometimes wasted-can be made into a nourishing soup. The skim milk is a little richer even than whole milk in protein and, if used undfluted or practically so, as it is in the following recipe, it makes valuable protein

Lettuce Soup.

1 head lettuce, or 1 large slice stale the equivalent in bread the outer leaves Butter or other fat of lettuce 1 small siice onion Salt and pepper 2 quarts skim milk

Put the lettuce and onlon through the meat chopper with the bread to save the juice. Put into a double boiler with the skim milk and cook until the lettuce is soft. To avoid overcooking the milk soften the letand cook the remainder only enough smooth. Add fat, if desired, and the salt and pepper.

Dish for Sunday Supper or Lunch That Is Satisfying and Is Quite Easily Prepared.

Peanut-Butter Omelet. 4 tablespoons milk 1 teaspoon salt 6 tablespoons pea-nut butter 4 eggs

Mix the peanut butter with the milk, add the well-beaten yolks of the eggs, and fold in the stiffly beaten whites Cook the omelet in the usual way, and serve it folded on a hot platter with a cream or tomato sauce.

DAIRY POINTS

IMPROVE CAPACITY OF COWS

Testing Associations Aid Dairyman in Culling Out Undesirable Animals in Herd.

The chief agencies for improving the capacity of dairy cows are the cow testing association and testing for advanced registration, according to state dairy extension specialists. The former aids the farmer-dairyman to size up his herd, cull out the undesirable animals and get his dairy upon a business basis. The testing of purebred cows for advanced registry sorts out the most desirable cows and bulls for the improvement of the breed, and furnishes large numbers of bulls that are available to farmer-dairymen for mating with cows selected through the

use of the cow testing association. In the Holstein-Friesian Register, the largest of all the breeds, 99,000 cows and 6,600 bulls have been admitted. Among these animals are found cows which have produced over 1,000 pounds butterfat in one year. The highest yearly record for butter is held by May Walker Ollie Homestead who produced 1,523.2 pounds. The cow holding the world's milk record is Segis Pietertje Prospect, which in one year produced 4,672 gallons, or an average of over 51 quarts a day.

SEE DAIRY PROFITS IN 1923

Good Year Is Seen Ahead by Iowa Expert, but Much Depends on Individual Farmer.

From all indications, farmers who milk cows in 1923 have a good year ahead, says C. B. Finley, an Iowa dairy expert. However, profits will depend much upon the individual farmer.

The extent to which it will be possible to cash in on the good year ahead will depend largely upon ten things, which are as follows:

1. Get a field of alfalfa or clover large enough to supply the herd. 2. Have ample silage,

3. Feed rations suited to the cows

4. Weed out the unprofitable cows 5. Weigh the milk each day.

6. Feed according to production. 7. Make your barn more sanitary

and comfortable. 8. Supply the best quality of product to the consumer and the creamery

9. Put your herd on a business basis by being in a cow testing association. 10. Buy a sire from good producing purebred ancestry.

Don't Walt in Meadows for Cow to Back Up to Be Milked-Waste Converted Into Milk,

There is no way to convert the corn, the hay, the clover, the straw, and the abundance of other forage into a marketable form so quickly and so economically as by feeding to the dairy cow. She works day and night, summer and winter, week days and Sundays, in flood and drought, to convert the unmarketable waste of the farm into a finished and valuable product of human food. Distributes Marketing Throughout Year and Gives Employment in the Dull Months.

The dairy herd returns a constant income to the owner, distributes the marketing period throughout the year, gives employment for the winter months which would otherwise be largely wasted from a productive standpoint, and reduces the crops to their most compact form. If dairying continues to be managed by men of industry and foresight it cannot fall.

ADVANTAGE IN KNOWING COW

Small Breeder Is in Better Position to Increase Milk Yield Than Large Owner.

In the matter of knowing the individuality of the cows the small breeder has an advantage over the man with a large herd. The man with 100 or more cannot know his animals so well nor hope to get so much out of them. The old saying, "Know thyself," is no more excellent than is the one, "Know thy cows,"


