FARM BOYS A. & M. SUMMER SESSION

Beginning July 2 and ending July 28 1923, the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas will conduct its Third Annual Course of Instruction for the Farm Boys of Texas.

The object of this course is to offer elementary but practical courses in subjects relating to farm life, to boys from fourteen to eighteen years of age.

A large majority of the farm boys in Texas have not had access to schools of sufficient grade to enable them to enter the more advanced college courses, and it is to meet their needs for practical instruction in Agriculture that the Farm Boys' Division has been added to the work of the summer session.

The County Agent can give you information concerning this summer session, or you can get full information by writing to the Director of the Summer Session, College Station, Texas.

"Mrs. Timmons was 75 years of age and had been a resident of this county for many years. She was a member of the Primitive Baptist church at Median Chapel, and was a devout Christian woman, loved and esteemed by all who knew her.

"Besides her aged mother (Mrs. S. E. Howard, 94 years old) Mrs. Timmons leaves five sons and two daughters, Messrs. Wilborn, John, William, Hope and Hershel Timmons, Mrs. Dollie Freeman and Miss Sallie Timmons. Her husband, Mr. A. A. Timmons, died twelve years ago.

"The funeral was attended by a large crowd, many going from Graham, and the floral offering was most elaborate and beautiful, attesting in no small degree the high esteem in which this good woman was held by the people of the town and surrounding country."

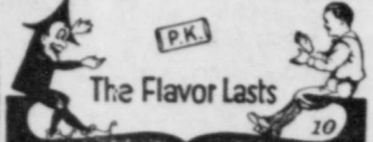

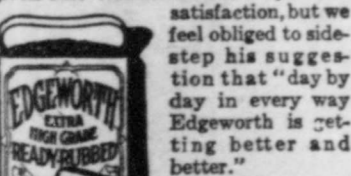

Artistic Treatment Redeems This Design From Commonness.

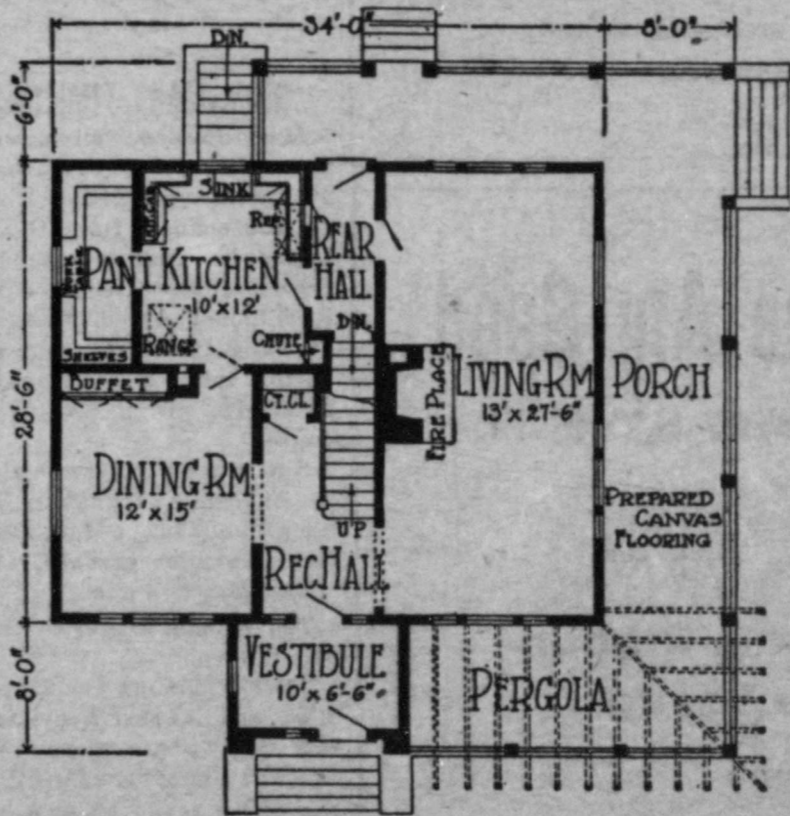
DRESSED UP BY THE PERGOLA

Pleasing Effect of the Exterior is Carried On in the Interior—Makes Dwelling Any Family Would Appreciate.

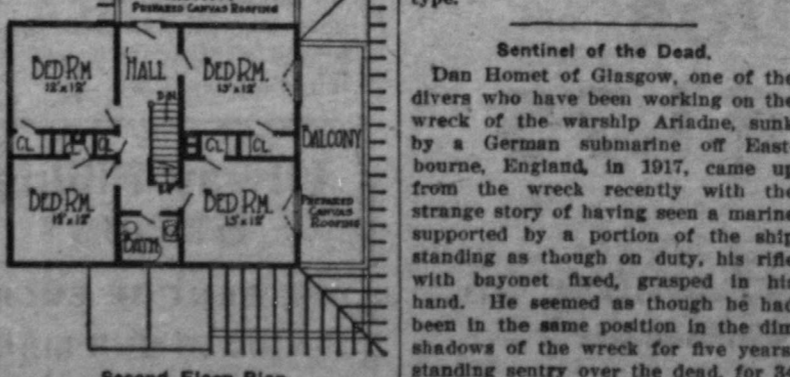
Attractive indeed is the effect created by the pergola at the side of this handsome home. It "dresses up" the front and side of the house, and one can easily visualize how unprepossessing the design would appear without it.

The pleasing effect of the exterior is carried on by the interior. An entrance vestibule leads into the recep-

tion hall, so arranged with relation to the staircase as to give the latter the full benefit of any ornamental treatment the householder may care to bestow on it.

You will observe that ample closet space has been provided in this house. Each bedroom has one clothes closet. Then there is an extra closet off the upper hall and downstairs a clothes closet off the reception hall keeps wraps and such out of sight, but always easily accessible.

A feature is the use of canvas for the covering of that portion of the veranda which is topped by an upstairs porch—both at the side and at the rear. Properly laid and painted, such use of good-quality canvas gives a permanent, weather-proof covering.

There is room for a spacious attic, useful for storing this and that. It is large enough to be turned into a billiard room or serve as a playroom for the children on a rainy day—or at any other time, for that matter.

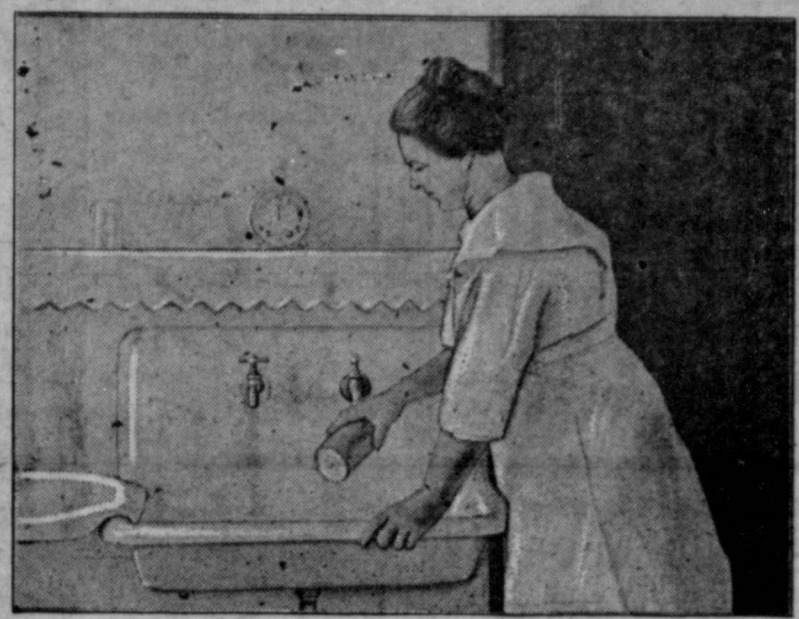

USE FINE SCOURING POWDER TO GIVE KITCHEN SINK RIGHT CARE



Kitchen Sink Sometimes Needs Strong Cleanser.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Stoppage in pipes is often due to hardened grease or to an accumulation of hair and lint. The waste pipes should be flushed thoroughly after using, so that the waste is carried out of the house pipes and the trap left full of clean water. A trap in a waste pipe is a curved section so arranged that water remains in it and prevents the passage of sewer gas into the house. If the water left in the trap is not clean, decomposition may take place and odors and gases may come from the impurities in the water itself. Precautions should be taken to prevent all and grease from going down the waste pipe from the kitchen sink, because being lighter than water they tend to remain floating on the surface of the water in the trap.

Use of Cleansing Mixtures.

Occasionally more than cold, or even hot, water is necessary to clear out the accumulated grease, lint, miscellaneous dirt, and bits of refuse. Washing soda is ordinarily strong enough for bathroom pipes, and may be used in the proportion of 1 part "liquid" soda (made by boiling 1 pound of washing soda and 1 quart of water in an old kettle) to 12 parts hot water, or 1 pound of dry soda thoroughly dissolved in 3 gallons of

boiling water. The drain pipe from the kitchen sink may sometimes need a stronger cleanser, even if it is thoroughly cleaned and flushed after each dishwashing, and for this purpose caustic potash is efficacious, but must be used carefully—the hands must be protected and the potash must not be allowed to touch porcelain or porcelain-lined sinks, because it may destroy the glaze. One pound of crystals dissolved in 2 quarts of water should be poured down the drain. About half an hour later the pipe should be flushed with clear water. Caustic soda, although sometimes recommended, is not desirable because it is likely to unite with the grease and form a hard soap, that is difficult to remove from the pipes. Fine scourers may be used on all fixtures, says the United States Department of Agriculture. For porcelain and enameled-iron fixtures kerosene and whiting are especially good; the kerosene cuts the grease and the whiting supplies the abrasion. Some of the commercial cleaning preparations used for enameled and porcelain fixtures contain scourers so gritty that they scratch the surface, and thus make the work of cleaning gradually harder. Nothing coarser than whiting should be allowed,

PROTEIN IN EGGS OF PARTICULAR BENEFIT

Can Be Served in Many Forms and With Other Foods; No Need to Tire of Them.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

When the price of eggs drops during the spring months housekeepers generally feel that the time has come to abandon eggless muffins, one-egg cakes and other dishes in which eggs were sparingly used, and to give the family a good deal of the needed protein in the form of eggs. For the protein of eggs, like that of meat, milk and cheese, is of such kind that the body can use it to particular advantage. Moreover, egg yolks are a rich source of iron and vitamin A.

Eggs can be served in so many forms and with so many other foods that no one need tire of them. In addition to the common ways of boiling, codding, frying and poaching, eggs can be used in a great variety of custards and sauces, both sweet and sour. There are also many kinds of omelets to put in them. Peppers, cheese, tomatoes, minced ham, chopped chicken, jelly and parsley are all good additions to omelets.

The uses for hard-boiled eggs are innumerable. They may be cut up and combined with cream sauce, or the yolks may be put through a ricer and sprinkled over the mixture of chopped whites and sauce, to make "goldenrod eggs." They may be made into deviled eggs for picnics or supper by mixing the yolks with salad dressing and seasonings, and refilling the whites. Deviled-egg salad on a bed of lettuce is appetizing, or a plain egg salad may be made by slicing up the hard-boiled eggs and serving them with other salad ingredients. A hard-boiled egg is particularly good with spinach, and is often used as a garnish for that vegetable. Egg sandwiches are usually satisfactory and least dry if the yolks are first mixed with salad dressing and are then mixed with the chopped whites.

Many dishes calling for a number of eggs, such as souffles, fondues, timbales, and combinations of meat and eggs or cheese and eggs, may be served when they are plentiful. Farmers' Bulletin 487, "Cheese and Its Economical Uses in the Home," which may be obtained free from the United States Department of Agriculture, gives the following recipes, all of which require several eggs: Cheese fondue, rice fondue, corn and cheese souffle, creamed cheese and eggs, baked eggs with cheese, scrambled eggs with cheese, Swiss eggs, cheese souffle, omelets and cheese croquettes.

Eggs may be put into various types of rolls or loaves, containing meat and bread crumbs, or meat and potatoes, improving both their texture and their food value. An entire chapter in a cookbook could be written on cake-making, when the number of eggs called for may be disregarded. As the great problem ordinarily for the housekeeper is to discover recipes for de-

serts that are economical in respect to eggs, she has no difficulty at the season of plenty in choosing puddings and desserts which require eggs.

Flavored egg-and-milk drinks should not be forgotten. Occasionally it is a good thing to get children to take raw egg in the form of a vanilla, chocolate or orange "egg-nog," while such drinks are usually refreshing and acceptable to those on a light diet or needing nourishment in easily digested form.

GOOD SUBSTITUTE FOR SOAP

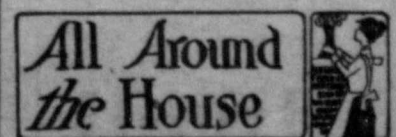
Seabark, Starch or Bran Water May Be Used Without Fear of Injury to Delicate Color.

When the action of soap is likely to injure a delicate color, one may use, instead, soapbark, starch water or bran water, suggests the United States Department of Agriculture.

Soapbark, although not a soap, when heated in water will form suds. To prepare it for use, boil for ten minutes a cupful of the bark with one quart of water, and cool and strain the liquid. The "soapy" water may be used full strength for sponging or diluted washing; half of this amount is enough for one-half tubful of water. Since the liquid is brownish, it should be used only on dark-colored goods.

Starch water is especially good for cleaning delicate cotton fabrics. This is usually made by adding thin starch paste to the wash water. Water in which rice has been boiled, if it is not discolored, may be used instead. If it is not desirable to have the material starched slightly, it must be rinsed in salt water.

Bran water, made in the same way as soapbark solution, is useful with colors that are likely to fade. It does not give suds, but cleans like starch water.



Eggs may be poached and served on rice.

Most life-stains on linen can be removed by rubbing with a slice of juicy tomato.

A teaspoonful of salt put in starch when cooking prevents it from sticking when ironing.

A pinch of salt put into the whites of eggs will lessen the time for whipping.

A good salad is made of canned peaches, chopped nuts, cottage cheese and mayonnaise.

Greens are improved if a piece of dripping is added to the water when they are almost boiling.

To keep peeled apples from turning brown while standing, cover them with salt water.

When silverware becomes tarnished, place it in potato water and you will find afterwards that it looks like new.

DAIRY HINTS

GOOD FEED FOR DAIRY COWS

Abundance of Pasture Grass is Best Where Available—Some Grain Often Needed.

A dairy cow will respond to good feeding and good treatment, perhaps better than any other farm animal. Each individual dairy cow should be a unit by herself. Unlike other farm animals, dairy cows cannot be efficiently fed in a feed lot, as the requirements for each cow may be different.

The best feed for dairy cows is an abundance of pasture grass when that is available. A good pasture provides a balanced ration. Some high-producing cows will require a little grain as a supplement to pasture.

During the time of the year when a good pasture is not available, a cow can be fed efficiently by providing: 1, An abundance of palatable feed; 2, a balanced ration; 3, succulent feed; 4, a moderate temperature in barn; 5, comfortable surroundings.

A dairy cow is fed for the following purposes: 1, For maintaining the body; 2, to supply material for milk; 3, for development of fetus; 4, for growth of animal, if immature; 5, at times to produce gain in weight.

Three general classes of good material are required for feeding cows: 1, Protein or nitrogenous material; 2, carbohydrates and fat to supply heat and energy; 3, ash or mineral matter.

A well-balanced dairy ration will contain the above food material in the proper proportions. In making up a feed for dairy cows, it is usually most convenient to balance the roughage and concentrates separately and then feed all the roughage each cow will eat and adjust the grain mixture to the amount of milk or butterfat produced by the cow.

A good general rule to use as a guide in feeding is to feed from one-fourth to one-half as much of a balanced grain mixture per day as the cow gives milk per day. Cows giving rich milk usually give less per day, but need a little more grain in proportion to the milk.—A. C. Baer, Professor of Dairying, Oklahoma A. and M. College.

SIMPLE METHOD TO DEHORN

Easiest Way to Avoid Trouble With Wild Bunch is to Perform Task While Young.

The easiest way to avoid the expense and trouble of dehorning a bunch of wild and more or less unmanageable young cattle every spring is to do the job while they are baby calves and easily handled.

When the calf is three to ten days old, small buttons can be felt under the skin where the horns are to be. With a pair of shears trim away the hair around these buttons and then rub them with a stick of moistened caustic potash. Continue rubbing until there is a raw spot the size of a bean at the horn tip. Be careful not to get so much water on the caustic that it will run down the side of the face and produce burns. To protect the fingers, wrap the stick in paper or insert in a rubber tube. Some men protect the calf from unnecessary burns by smearing grease around the horn outside of where the caustic is to be.

Caustic (potassium hydroxide) may be obtained at any drug store and ten cents' worth is enough to dehorn a dozen calves.

TREATING FOR CALF SCOURS

Whenever Indications of Ailment Appear Milk Supply Should Be Reduced One-Half.

When a calf shows signs of the scours, the milk supply should be reduced one-half and the amount gradually increased as the calf shows signs of improvement. This usually will cure them, but if it does not, feed about a tablespoonful of soluble dried blood, and stir in well with the milk. Dried blood not only acts as a tonic, but it has some food value, and is often fed, even when calves do not have the scours.

DO NOT RAISE DAIRY CALVES

Many Dairymen Prefer to Market Milk on Account of Good Demand—Feed Cost High.

Many dairymen do not raise their heifer calves because their market for milk is so good that they feel they cannot spare any for the calf, and do not care to fuss with substitutes. Others believe that the cost of feed and help is so high that it costs more to raise a dairy heifer than her equivalent can be bought for on the open market in another community, where feed and help are lower.

FEED SILAGE AFTER MILKING

Odor Carried Through Cow Into Milk Very Readily—Gives Butter Undesirable Taste.

Feed silage or other succulent feed after, not shortly before or while milking. The odor is carried through the body of the cow into the milk very readily and later develops in the manufactured butter as a fruity and undesirable flavor.

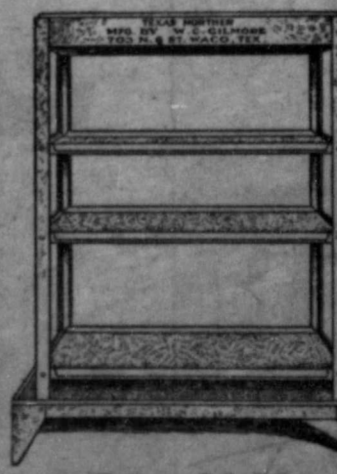
