LIGHTER WEIGHT DANGEROUS DRUG LAMBS DEMANDED

Number of Heavy Animals During **Recent Months Has Been in** Excess of Requirements.

NOT FAVORED BY HOUSEWIFE

Additional Amounts of Fat Found on Large Cute is Also Responsible for Prejudice Against This Class of Meat.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture) The number of heavy, fed lambs weighing from 45 to 50 pounds dressed weight marketed during recent months has been considerably in excess of the demand. An investigation recently made by the bureau of agricultural economics, United States Department of Agriculture, to determine the reasons for the discrimination against heavy lambs developed the fact that hotels, restaurants, railroad dining car systems and steamship lines are able to utilize heavy lamb cuts to advantage, but that the average housewife with a small family considers lighter weight cuts more economical for family use. hardly perceptible, and the china will

flocks in general have increased some what in average weight, Producers complain that they are unable properly to finish lambs for the market under 90 to 100 pounds, which means a dressed carcass weighing from 45 to 50 pounds. On the other hand, consumers' preference has turned toward lighter cuts of all classes of meat and for this reason heavy lamb has been at a disadvantage. The additional amounts of fat found on heavy lamb cuts is also responsible for some of the prejudice against this class of meat, as lamb fat is not relished by most meat consumers.

Forequarters, which are used for stews, roasts and shoulder chops, can easily be divided into cuts of any desired weight, and for this reason fittle distinction is made in prices between light and heavy ratiles, unless the latter are excessively fat. Further-more, little difficulty is experienced in disposing of the racks when cut into rib chops. However, the housewife who plans to purchase a certain number of chops for a certain number of people dislikes to buy an extra pound or more of meat at present prices to provide the requisite number of chops. This has had the effect of reducing mewhat the sale of heavy chops, although not to the extent of causing a material difference in price, as chops are in fairly good demand most of the time. Not Confined to Lambs.

The tendency toward lighter cuts of eats is not confined to lamb. As a esult of the demand from consumers for lighter cuts, the average weight of beef cattle marketed has been tending lower for the past several years. Beef producers have recognized this and have changed their methods of marketing accordingly.

Apparently the problem for the lamb producer is to determine whether he will realize the greatest net return by marketing his lambs at an earlier age and at lighter weights thereby obtaining a higher price, or by producing heavler lambs and trusting to the increased weight to compensate for the lower price per pound which he will have to accept.

RAPID REPRODUCTION GREAT CROP FACTOR

Big Value of Finding Single Superior Plant.

Department of Agriculture Explorers Searching Various Parts of World for New Varieties Adapted to This Country.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

The rapidity with which a single seed or head of grain reproduces its kind and becomes established as a variety has made possible the great improvement in many of our crops with in a comparatively short time. The story of the development of Albion oats (Iowa No. 103) from a single head selected in 1906 emphasizes the enormous value that can be attached to the finding of a single superior plant that has desired characteristics. The original selection of a single head in the experimental plats at the Iowa agricultural experiment station in 1906

wong Numerous Enrollments From Vermont Was That of Morgan Horse Farm.

The bureau of animal industry of the Enited States Department of Agricul-ture recently received in one day en-rollment blanks from 136 Vermont ties on account of the difficulty of dis-posing of the legs. The greatest de-mand is for legs of lamb weighing from 5½ to 6 pounds. These are ob-tained from lambs weighing from 33 to 35 pounds dressed weight, whereas a 45 to 50 pound lamb produces a leg weighing 8 pounds or more. 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

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


Kitchen Sink Sometimes Needs Strong Cleanser.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Stoppage in pipes is often due to hardened grease or to an accumulation of hair and lint. The waste pipes should be flushed thoroughly after using, so that the waste is carried out of the house pipes and the trap left full of clean water. A trap in a waste pipe is a curved section so arranged that water remains in it and prevents the passage of sewer gas into the house. If the water left in the trap is not clean, decomposition may take place and odors and gases may come from the impurities in the water itself. Precautions should be taken to prevent ell and grease from going down the waste pipe from the kitchen sink, because being lighter than water they tend to remain floating on the surface of the water in the trap.

Use of Cleansing Mixtures. Occasionally more than cold, or even hot, water is necessary to clear out the accumulated grease, lint, miscellaneous dirt, and bits of refuse. Washing soda is ordinarily strong enough for bathroom pipes, and may be used in the proportion of 1 part "liquid" soda (made by boiling 1 hot water, or 1 pound of dry soda coarser than whiting should be al-thoroughly dissolved in 3 gallons of lowed.

Fine scour-ers may be used on all fixtures, says the United States Department of Agriculture. For porcelain and enamelediron fixtures kerosene and whiting are especially good; the kerosene cuts the grease and the whiting supplies the abrasion. GOOD FEED FOR DAIRY COWS Abundance of Pasture Grass is Best Where Available-Some Grain Often Noeded.

DAIRY HINTS

A dairy cow will respond to good feeding and good treatment, perhaps better than any other farm animal. Each individual dairy cow should be a unit by herself. Unlike other farm animals, dairy cows cannot be effi-ciently fed in a feed lot, as the requirements for each cow may be different.

The best feed for dairy cows is an abundance of pasture grass when that is available. A good pasture pro-vides a balanced ration. Some highvices a bainfield ration. Some inga-producing cows will require a little grain as a supplement to pasture. During the time of the year when a good pasture is not gwallable, a cow can be fed efficiently by providing: 1, An abundance of palatable feed: a balanced ration; S, succulent

feed; 4, a moderate temperature in barn; 5, comfortable surroundings.

A dairy cow is fed for the follo Ing purposes: 1. For maintaining the body: 2, to supply material for milk. 3. for development of fetus: 4, for growth of animal, if immature: 5, at times to produce gain in weight.

Three general classes of good ma-terial are required for feeding cows: 1, Protein or nitrogenous material; 2, carbohydrates and fat to supply heat and energy; 3, ash or mineral matter.

A well-balanced dairy ration will contain the above food material in the proper proportions. In making up a feed for dairy cows, it is usually most convenient to balance the roughage and concentrates separately and then feed all the roughage each cow will eat and adjust the grain mixture to the amount of milk or butterfat produced by the cow.

A good general rule to use as a guide in feeding is to feed from one fourth to one-half as much of a balanced grain mixture per day as the cow gives milk per day. Cows giving rich milk usually give less per day. but need a little more grain in proportion to the milk .- A. C. Baer, Proessor of Dairying, Oklahoma A. and M. College.

SIMPLE METHOD TO DEHORN

Easiest Way to Avoid Trouble With Wild Bunch is to Perform Task While Young.

The ensiest way to avoid the ex-pense and trouble of dehorning a sunch of wild and more or less unmanageable young cattle every spring is to do the job while they are baby calves and easily handled.

When the calf is three to ten days old, small buttons can be felt under the skin where the horns are to be. With a pair of shears trim away the hair around these buttons and then rub them with a stick of moistened caustle potash. Continue rubbing until there

sparingly used, and to give the family a good deal of the needed protein in the form of eggs. For the protein of eggs, like that of meat, milk and cheese, is of such kind that the body can use it to particular advantage. Moreover, egg yolks are a rich source of iron and vitamin A.

Eggs can be served in so many forms and with so many other foods that no one need tire of them. In addition to the common ways of boiling, coddling, frying and poaching, eggs can be used in a great variety of custards and sauces, both sweet and sour. There are also as many kinds of omelets as there are tasty ingredients to put in them. Peppers, cheese, tomatoes, minced ham, chopped chicken, jelly and parsley are all good additions to

omelets. The uses for hard-bolled eggs are innumerable. They may be cut up and combined with cream sauce, or the yolks may be put through a ricer and sprinkled over the mixture of chopped whites and sauce, to make "goldenrod eggs." They may be made into deviled eggs for picnics or supper by mixing the yolks with salad dressing and seaings, and refilling the whites. Devlied-egg salad on a bed of lettuce is appetizing, or a plain egg salad may be made by slicing up the hard-bolled eggs and serving them with other salad ingredients. A hard-boiled egg seems to taste particularly good with spinach, and is often used as a garnish for that vegetable. Egg sandwiches are usually satisfactory and least dry if the yolks are first mixed with salad dressing and are then mixed with the

Reduced One-Half.

When a calf shows signs of the scours, the milk supply should be reduced one-half and the amount gradually increased as the calf shows signs of improvement. This usually will cure them, but if it does not, feed about a tablespoon of soluble dried blood, and stir in well with the milk. Dried blood not only acts as a tonic, but it has me food value, and is often fed, even when calves do not have the scours.



Many Dairymen Prefer to Market Milk on Account of Good Demand-Feed Cost High.

Many dairymen do not raise their heifer calves because their market for milk is so good that they feel they cannot spare any for the calf, and do not care to fuss with substitutes. Others believe that the cost of feed and help is so high that it costs more to raise a dairy heifer than her equivalent can be bought for on the open market in another community, where feed and help are lower.

FEED SILAGE AFTER MILKING
