## THE PANHANDLE BAPTIST ASSEMBLY

TWELVE MILES NORTHEAST OF HAPPY, TEXAS

The fourth annual session of the Assembly will be held this year July 24th to August 1st in the beautiful Ceta Canyon.

Through the wise business management of Rev. B. F. Fronabarger a section of land including a mile of canyon was bought and is being improved. Individuals and Baptist churches all over the Panhandle have bought lease shares and have all the rights and privileges of camping on these grounds at any time. A fee of \$1.50 for individuals or a maximum of \$4.00 for a family, for the period of the Assembly for faculty and speaker expenses, or 25c for one day the maximum of 75c for a family.

# DAIRY BARN HAS UNUSUAL FEATURES

### Attractive Building House 36 Cows and Their Feed

### MANY PREFER GOTHIC ROOF

Barn Is of Frame Construction With Concrete Floor and Foundation—Labor-Saving Equipment Provided for.

Dairymen who erect modern barns to house their herds and the best for the animals also want attractive-looking buildings. Good buildings add to the value of the farm and there is no reason why beauty should not be combined with utility.

Outside of their roof lines and the materials of which they are constructed dairy barns are very much alike. Whatever materials are used in the buildings the two types—gambrel and gothic—are suitable. Some prefer one and some the other. Adherents of the gambrel roof are

underneath floors to the loft above. The tackle carries the hay to the loft where it is carried on a track to different parts of the mow.

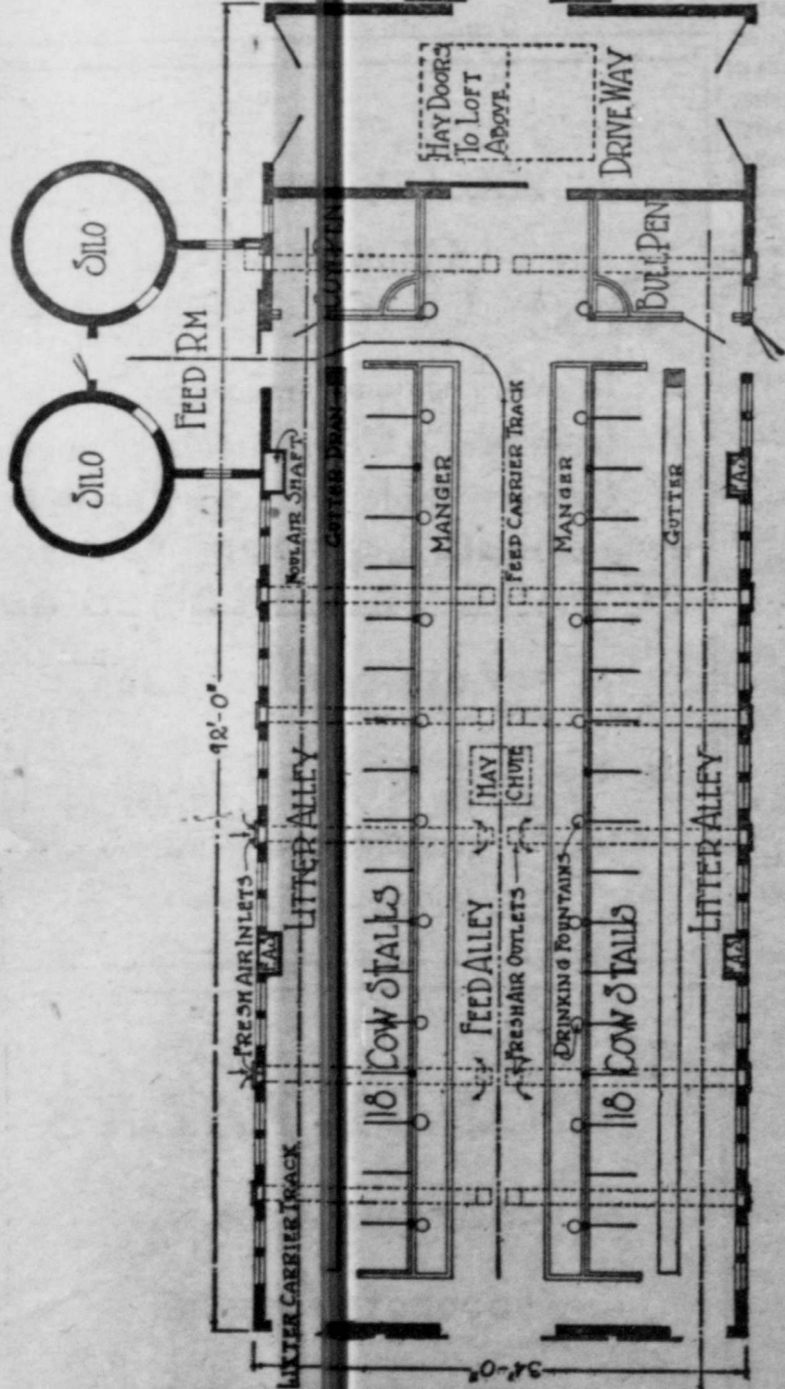
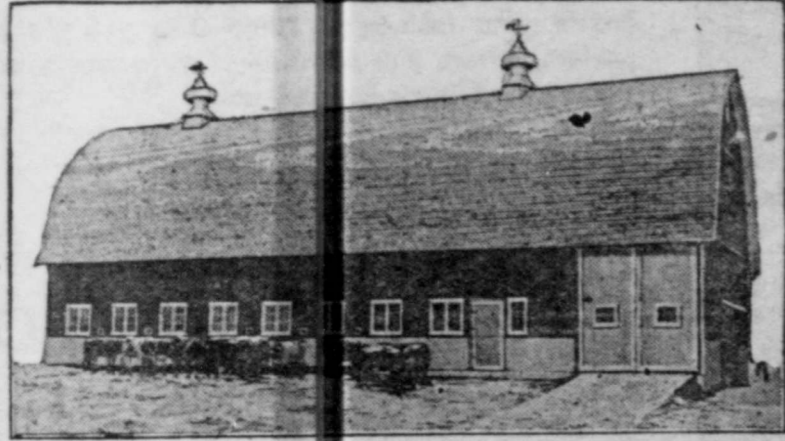
The cow stalls are arranged so that the animals face a central alley or driveway which extends from double, sliding doors at either end of the building. The stall partitions are of steel, set into the concrete, while the manger is built in when the floor is laid. Metal manger partitions may be installed.

At every other stall head there is shown on the plan an individual drinking cup, which is accessible to two cows. This, of course, is connected to the pressure water system and supplies the animals with constant supply of fresh water. Drinking cups, tests have shown, increase the milk flow considerably, some cases having been noted where the increase was 25 per cent.

At the rear of the stalls and along the walls are litter alleys, over which is a carrier track. The litter carrier is run along the track and the litter carried to the pile or shed outside. This makes the work of cleaning the stable comparatively easy. The carrier track also runs over the feeding alley and to the feed room between the two silos at the rear of the barn.

The stable is ventilated by the suction method, the foul air chutes being connected with the suction ventilators on the roof. Fresh air intakes admit the pure air. Constant circulation maintains an even temperature and eliminates moisture that accumulates on the ceiling, especially during cold weather, when a ventilating system is not used.

The building is well constructed and is weather and practically air tight. It is so designed that it will keep the



that there is more room in the hay mow—others hold the contrary, as a matter of fact there is no material difference in the capacities of either.

Shown in the illustration is a good example of the gothic roof barn. The graceful roof lines of the gothic are what make it popular and as few of them are erected than of the other type, it is more unusual, and consequently more attention arresting.

This barn is of frame construction with a concrete floor and foundation, the walls of the latter extending up about four feet. The building is 92 feet long and 34 feet wide. It contains stall room for 36 cows, a cow pen and a bull pen. How the interior of the stable is arranged and the equipment it should contain are shown on the floor plan.

An unusual feature of this barn is the driveway through one end. Double doors on either side admit the wagon with the load of hay, which is driven

animals warm in winter so that the feed will go into milk rather than into body heat.

The barn is designed so that it will be a modern milk factory. It is of a size that eliminates waste space, and the owner gets full value for his money. The equipment mentioned makes the work of caring for the animals more efficient.

**Little Sunshine in England.**

The records at Greenwich showed that London and adjacent territory had only six minutes of sunshine in seven consecutive days last November, says Scientific American. The terrible results of this loss of sunshine through fog and smoke are clearly reflected in the rise of the London death rate during the period to 133 per 1,000. One day of dense fog cost Londoners nearly \$5,000,000 in extra lighting, loss of wages, cost of delay, extra transportation and extra laundering.

# American Farm Bureau



Through an arrangement made with New England county farm bureaus, the North Dakota Farm Bureau federation sold 1,082 North Dakota horses direct to Eastern buyers.

The horses were sold at public auction, the sale being conducted by the county farm bureau.

The North Dakota farm bureau conducted the insurance and every horse injured and two lost in shipment from pneumonia were paid for from the insurance fund.

Horses were shipped direct through to the East and kept out of infected horse stables en route. The horses were thus delivered to the users free from disease.

The Eastern county farm bureaus appoint a committee to inspect and hitch every horse before the sale at the farm bureau auctions. This committee reports to the buyers exactly what they find when the horse or team is led into the ring. This method of handling through the farm bureau inspires greater confidence in the horses on the part of the buyers and thus brings greater net returns to the North Dakota shippers. Men in charge of this work in the East say this method of handling horses would be impossible without the farm bureau in North Dakota and the farm bureau in New England working in co-operation.

## INVENTION BY BLOOM RETURNS BIG PROFIT

### Michigan Bureau Official Shows How to Sell Rhubarb.

Two years ago Frank A. Bloom, manager of the Michigan Farm Bureau Produce exchange, noticed that rhubarb was sold on the Detroit market in bunches tied together with a string and the string bruised the stalks. The bunches were of varying weight. Mr. Bloom thought there could be an improvement. He evolved a cardboard box which would hold just five pounds of rhubarb. Then a cartan was made that would hold just ten of these five-pound boxes. The plan worked. The growers found they could get more money for their rhubarb. In boxes it shipped better, there was less discount for spoilage or freezing. But Mr. Bloom was not content with just improving the pack-

age. Three grades, choice, fancy and extra fancy, were adopted. Strict grading methods were adhered to. A brand label was adopted for the extra fancy grade and there has been a greater demand for this grade than could be supplied.

Did it pay? A comparison of results under the string tied bunch method and 50-pound cartan method is shown in the following table:

Mr. Bloom says little about the accomplishment. "Just another demonstration," he says, "that it pays to cooperate, standardize, advertise and be honest."

These are the principles on which the Michigan Farm Bureau Produce exchange is founded. The exchange does a monthly business around \$90,000 in fruit, vegetables, poultry, eggs, dressed veal and pork.

**Appointed on Loan Board.**

E. E. Jones of Hartford, Pa., treasurer of the Federal Land bank at Baltimore, has been appointed to fill the position on the federal farm loan board formerly held by Capt. W. S. A. Smith. Mr. Jones is a trustee of the Pennsylvania Agricultural college and was formerly a member of the house and senate of Pennsylvania.

## FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS IN STEUBEN COUNTY

### New York Community Leads in Eradication of Disease.

According to a report from the United States Department of Agriculture, Steuben county, New York, now leads the country in the eradication of tuberculosis from its dairy herds, having more cattle under supervision than any other county in the United States.

The county farm bureau began the eradication work two years ago with the employment of a single veterinarian whose services were paid for by local dairymen. The dairy farmers of the county became interested in the work and launched a county-wide campaign to rid their herds of the disease.

In approximately 15 days 30 veterinarians supplied by the state and national departments of animal industry tested 45,000 head of cattle. To follow up the work and make it permanent the Steuben county supervisors appropriated funds to employ a full-time veterinarian. Subsequent tests that have been made have materially increased the total of herds under supervision.

It is estimated that as a result of the bovine tuberculosis eradication, cattle values have increased about \$5 a head in the county. The county farm bureau reports that since the campaign a large number of cattle shipments have been made outside the county. "Certified and Grade A milk producers in the environs of large Eastern cities are coming to Steuben county to buy their milkers," says a statement from the farm bureau.

Recently the state federation appointed a tuberculosis committee composed of H. E. Babcock, member of the legislative committee of the National Live Stock association; L. A. Tom, president of the State Guernsey Breeders' club; E. R. Zimmer, secretary of the State Holstein-Friesian association; M. E. Buckley of the Lincoln School of Agriculture, Westchester county, New York, and Jay Coryell, state leader of farm bureaus. This committee is investigating the accredited herd plan as it is administered in the various counties of New York state with a view to formulating a permanent policy which will be acceptable to the dairymen of the state.

The New York state legislature has been asked to appropriate about \$2,000,000 to pay indemnities owed dairymen on cattle slaughtered under the accredited herd plan and a sufficient sum in addition to carry on the work efficiently during the coming year.

## PLAN COMMODITY MARKETING

### Approval Has Been Given by Board of Directors of Ohio Farm Bureau Federation.

Approval of plans to develop commodity marketing sections of the farm bureaus in township, county and state, has been given by the board of directors of the Ohio Farm Bureau federation. Under this plan county commodity associations of wool growers, live-stock producers, and others will become a section of the farm bureau organization. This system, according to the board, will prevent duplication of organizations. It will allow the financing of single agencies for the maintaining of services necessary to co-operative marketing associations to serve various organizations for handling specific products. The Ohio board has also appointed a special committee to work on plans for commodity associations who wish to come under the new co-operative law which will soon become operative in that state.

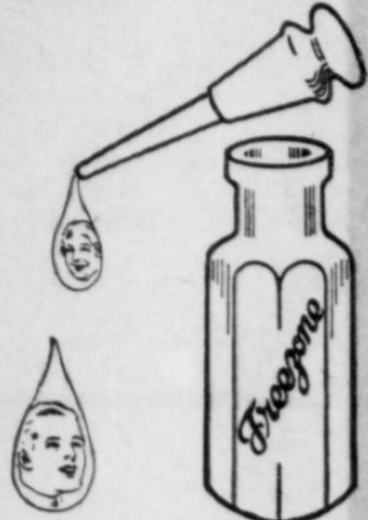

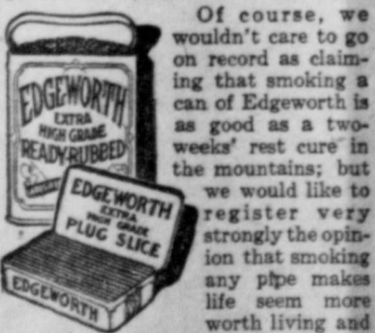

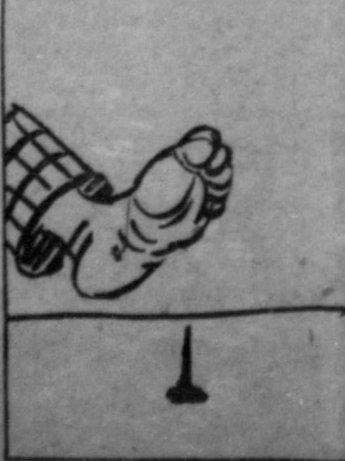
## SEASONABLE DISHES
