underneath foors to the loft above. The tackle carries the hay to the loft where it is carried on a track to different parts of the mow.

The cow stalls are arranged so that the animals face a central alley or driveway which extends from double, sliding doors at either end of the building. The stall partitions are of steel, set into the concrete, while the manger is built in when the floor is laid. Metal manger partitions may be installed.

At every other stall head there is shown on the plan an individual drinking cup, which is accessible to two cows. This, of course, is connected to the pressure water system and supplies the animals with a constant supply of fresh water. Drinking cups, tests have shown, increase the milk flow considerably, some cases having been noted where the increase was 25 per cent.

At the rear of the stalls and along the walls are litter alleys, over which is a carrier track. The litter carrier is run along the track and the litter carried to the pile or shed outside. This makes the work of cleaning the stable comparatively easy. The carrier track also runs over the feeding alley and to the feed room between the two silos at the rear of the barn.

The stable is ventilated by the suction method, the foul air chutes being connected with the suction ventilators on the roof. Fresh air intakes admit the pure air. Constant circulation maintains an even temperature and eliminates moisture that accumulates on the celling, especially during cold weather, when a ventilating system is not used.

INVENTION BY BLOOM RETURNS BIG PROFIT

Michigan Bureau Official Shows How to Sell Rhubarb.

Two years ago Frank A. Bloom, manager of the Michigan Farm Bureau Produce exchange, noticed that rhubarb was sold on the Detroit market in bunches tied together with a string and the string bruised the stalks. The bunches were of varying weight. Mr. Bloom thought there could be an improvement. He evolved a cardboard box which would hold just five pounds of rhubarb. Then a carton was made that would hold just ten of these five-pound boxes. The plan worked. The growers found they could get more money for their rhubarb. In boxes it shipped better, there was less discount for spoilage

or freezing. But Mr. Bloom was not content with just improving the pack-

FIGHT TUBERCULOSIS IN STEUBEN COUNTY

New York Community Leads in Eradication of Disease.

According to a report from the United States Department of Agriculture, Steuben county, New York, now leads the country in the eradication of tuberculosis from its dairy herds, having more cattle under supervision than any other county in the United States.

The county farm bureau began the eradication work two years ago with the employment of a single veterinarian whose services were paid for by local dairymen. The dairy farmers of the county became interested in the work and launched a county-wide campaign to rid their herds of the dis-

In approximately 15 days 30 veterinarians supplied by the state and national departments of animal industry tested 45,000 head of cattle. To follow up the work and make it permanent the Steuben county supervisors appropriated funds to employ a full-time veterinarian. Subsequent tests that have been made have materially increased the total of herds under supervision.

It is estimated that as a result of the bovine tuberculosis eradication, variety in them to be interesting and swiss, voile and printed crepes, that a head in the county. "Certified and Grade A milk producers in the environs of large Eastern cities are coming to Steuben county to buy their milkers," says a statement from the farm bureau.

This committee is investigating the accredited herd plan as it is administered in the various counties of New York state with a view to formulating a permanent policy which will be acceptable to the dairymen of the state.

The New York state legislature has been asked to appropriate about \$2,-000,000 to pay indemnities owed dairymen on cattle slaughtered under the accredited herd plan and a sufficient sum in addition to carry on the work efficiently during the coming year.

Approval of plans to develop comodity marketing sections of the farm areaus in township, county and state, has been given by the board of direc-tors of the Ohio Farm Bureau federation.
