# LIVE STOCK

## Solid Permanent Water Trough for Sheep Flock

Ordinary wood troughs are unsanitary, subject to decay, and when in use are often impractical because they are so easily overturned.

All these objections have been overcome in building the type of trough shown in the illustration. It is made of a rich mixture of concrete, one part of cement being used to one and one-half parts of clean sand to three parts

of well-graded pebbles or broken stone. The inside is troweled smooth so as to facilitate cleaning.

This trough is designed particularly for the watering of sheep and is, therefore, set low and deep in the ground for the convenience of the animals themselves and to reduce the probability of freezing.

## Very Satisfactory Milk Substitute for Calves

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

A very satisfactory milk substitute for feeding calves after the second week has been devised by the United States Department of Agriculture. The mixture consists of 50 parts finely ground corn, 15 parts finely ground meal, 15 parts finely ground rolled oats, 10 parts dried blood flour, 10 parts skim milk powder, and one-half part salt. It is stirred up with warm water at the rate of 1 pound of meal to 9 pounds of water. The feed is increased gradually as the whole milk is decreased, until at the time the calf is 50 days old it is getting only the gruel. At this time 1 1/2 to 2 pounds of meal mixed with water will constitute a day's feed. Whenever there are indications of scours the feed must be reduced.

When calves are vigorous, the following schedule may be adhered to in changing from whole milk to the substitute:

- First week—Whole milk.
- Second week—Three parts whole milk, one part gruel.
- Third week—Three parts whole milk, one part gruel.
- Fourth week—Three parts whole milk, one part gruel.
- Fifth week—Whole milk and gruel, equal parts.
- Sixth week—Whole milk one part, gruel three parts.
- Seventh week—All gruel.

Grain and roughage should be fed with milk substitutes the same as with separated milk. Milk has to be very high in price to justify the use of substitutes during the first two weeks of the calf's life.

## Right Care of Horse in Harvest Quite Important

Horses working in the field should be fed only a limited amount of hay in the morning and the noon feeds, and should be given a liberal amount of grain, preferably oats, with from 10 to 20 per cent of bran added. They should be watered in the morning before being fed and should be allowed water again after feeding. At noon, when coming from the field, they should be given a limited amount of water if they are hot, followed by feed, and again be watered before going to the field. At night they should be given a limited amount when brought from the field, followed by the evening feed, and should then be given all the water they will drink.

It is an excellent practice, also, to water the horses in the middle of each half day's work. A drink at this time is as refreshing to the horse as to the man and will be repaid by better service. Frequent breathing spells should be given in the harvest field to avoid overheating and injury to the wind, which may result in permanent unsoundness.

The shoulders should be washed with cool salt water at night to prevent shoulder galls and sore necks. The collar should also be carefully cleaned when taken off.—J. Montgomery, University Farm, St. Paul.

## Immense Damage Is Done Annually by Ox Warble

An estimated damage of over \$60,000,000 annually is caused by the ox warble, a cattle pest found in all parts of the United States. This pest is well known by the cattleman and the dairyman in the grub or larva form when it produces the little lumps that are found in the cow's back in the spring. The adult warble is very much like the bot flies and also resembles a honey bee.

# DAIRY

## Some Requirements for Right Start of Calves

The dairy calf six to eight months old should be provided with salt. It is best to keep a small box in the calf pen or stall with salt in it at all times. The calf will then take just what is needed.

More than 56 per cent of the calf's body is made up of water; and for digesting the feed, regulating the body temperature, and other body purposes the calf needs 4 to 6 gallons of clean, fresh water every day. So the club boy should see that his calf has all the water it wants and that it is watered during warm days three times.

Sunshine is necessary for normal growth of the calf, but like most good things the calf can get too much; therefore, see that your pasture has plenty of shade to which the calf can go to lie down and chew its cud during the heat of the day.

When the dairy calf is weaned from skim milk, it should be eating grains and hay well. A good legume hay, like alfalfa, peavine, soy bean, or lespedeza, should be fed. This hay is necessary to furnish minerals to build bone, to supply protein for muscle building, and to furnish bulk for developing large feed capacity.

During the "fly season" a liberal use of the curry comb and brush will help keep the hair silky and the skin oily, both of which will tend to keep off flies.

Teach the calf to lead by the halter this summer. The best way to do this is to lead the calf to pasture each morning and back to the barn at night.

## Tuberculosis Introduced Into Healthy Dairy Herd

Tuberculosis may be introduced into a healthy herd by any of the following means:

By the addition of an animal that is affected with the disease; therefore animals should be purchased only from herds known to be free from tuberculosis, or from herds under supervision for the eradication of the disease.

By feeding calves with milk or other dairy products from tuberculous cows; this frequently occurs where the owner purchases mixed skim milk from the creamery, and feeds it to his calves without first making it safe by boiling or pasteurization.

By showing cattle at fairs and exhibitions; reports have indicated that numerous herds have become infected through mingling with infected cattle at shows or by occupying infected premises.

The shipment of animals in cars which have recently carried diseased cattle and which have not been disinfected properly.

Community pastures; pastures in which tuberculous cattle are allowed to graze are a source of danger. In most cases the outward appearance of the animal bears no relation to the degree of infection. The disease frequently develops so slowly that in some cases it may be months or even longer before any symptoms are shown; therefore be on the safe side and have your herd tested.

## Cows Require Material for Production of Milk

To keep the summer milk checks up to normal, the cows require a little special attention at this time of the year. In spite of good pastures, grass is apt to be tough and not nearly so appetizing as it was in May or June. Hence the cows are going to stand around in the shade instead of putting away material for milk production.

This all means that the cows need a little grain at milking time during the late summer months and a little silage, too, if you have it. Green oats and peas or green corn are very good, as well as many other forage crops, cut green and fed during milking time. Here's a good grain mixture to be used while the cows are on pasture:

- 200 lbs. cornmeal
- 150 lbs. cottonseed meal
- 150 lbs. ground oats
- 150 lbs. gluten feed

Feed the grain mixture according to the way the cow responds. If a cow will not respond to grain feeding in the summer, she isn't worth keeping.

At the New Jersey agricultural experiment station the cows are being sprayed night and morning with a reliable spray that kills the flies. As a result, the cows stand better for milking and since they are not bothered with the flies they have time to eat their grain. Furthermore, when the milk is swatting flies and the cow is switching her tail around in his face he isn't apt to take much interest in how much milk the cow gives.

A good fly spray is a good investment.

## Unprofitable Cows Kept Simply for Amusement

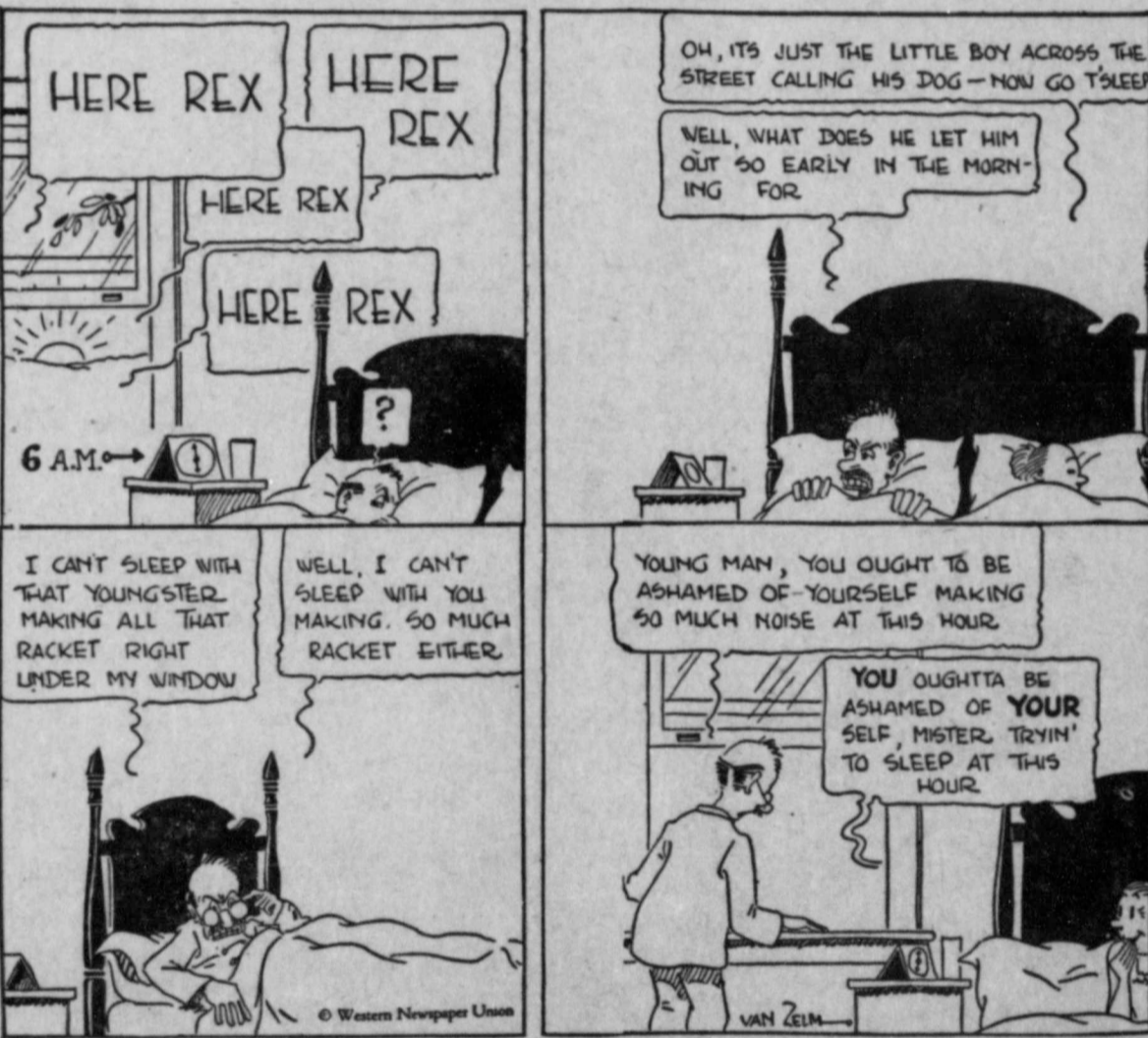

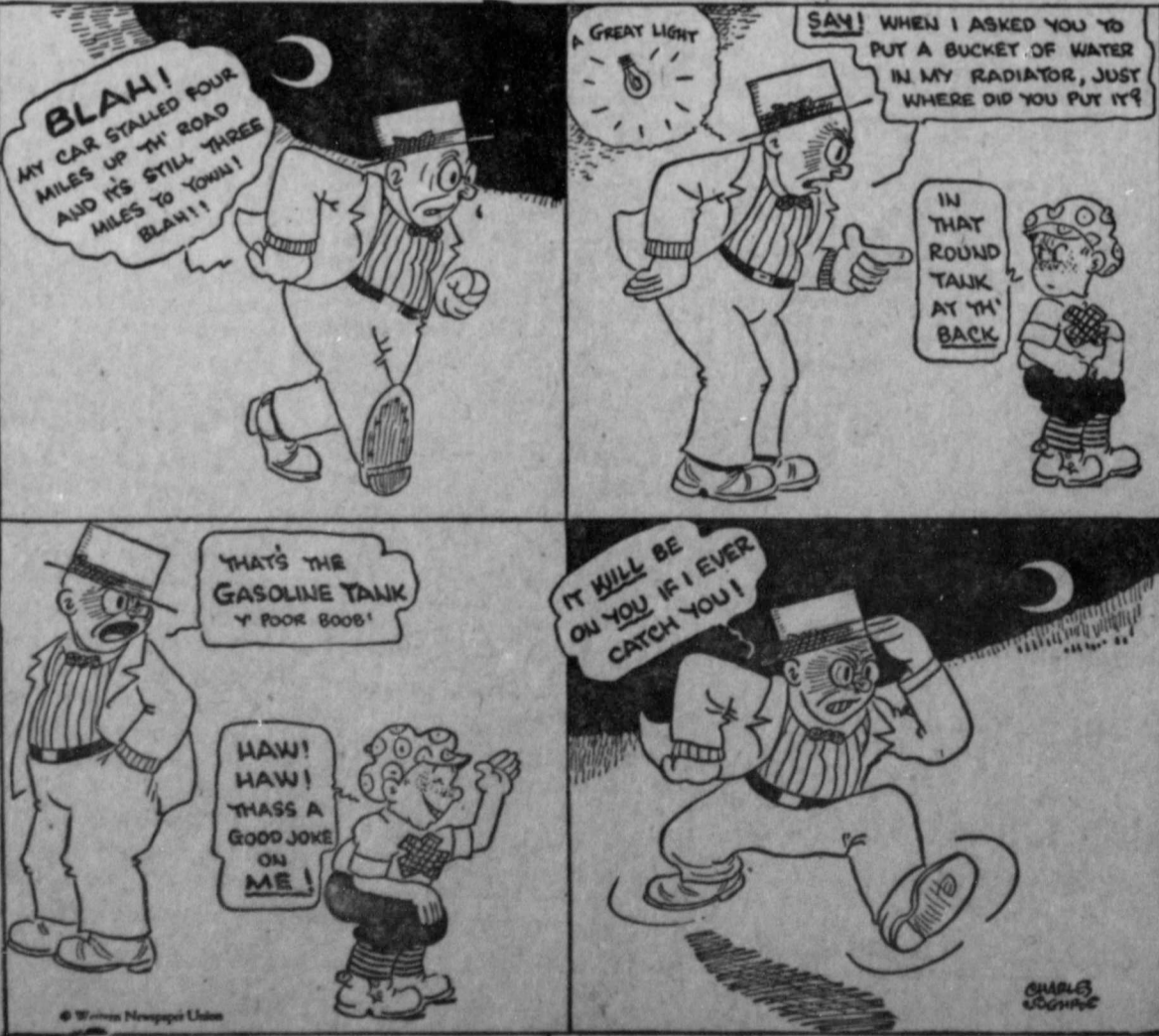

## GOOD DESIGN FOR TWO-STORY HOUSE

Not a Single Superfluous Line to Be Found in This Home.

ENTIRE ABSENCE OF FRILLS

Has Points Which Put Many More Expensive Homes at a Disadvantage—Is Commodious Home of Eight Rooms.

In this home there is not a single superfluous line. There is an entire absence of frills. Yet it gives a more pleasing impression than many a home costing twice as much and making

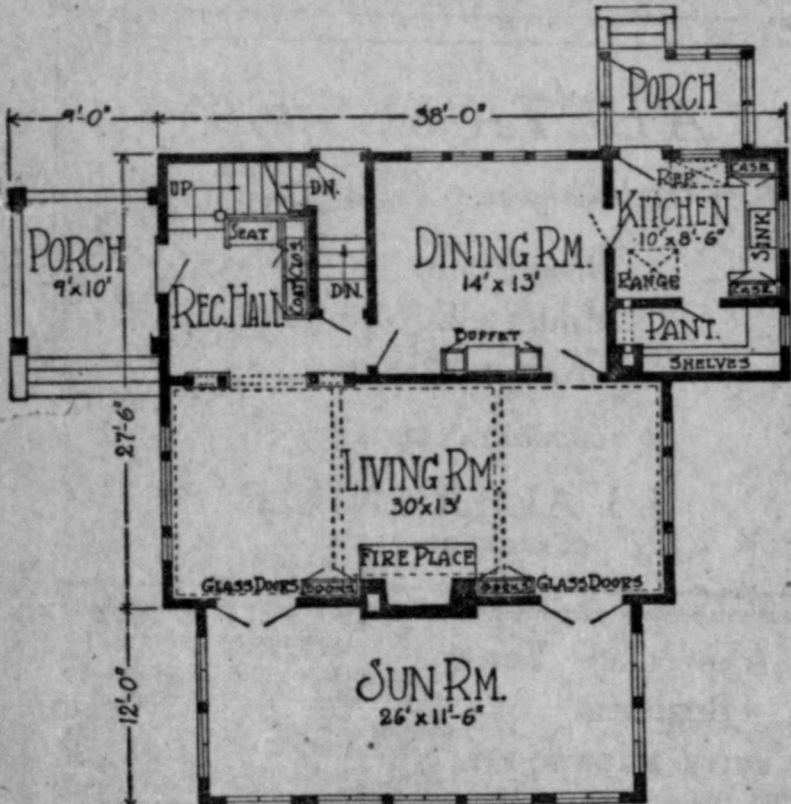
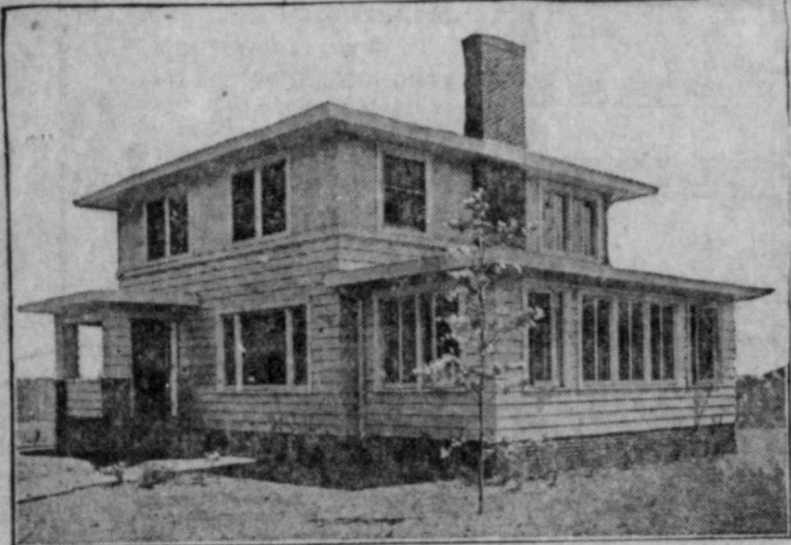
without them in some of our more severe northern winters.

The dining room is immediately off the reception hall and is also accessible from the living room. It is a very well lighted room and adjoins a compact and conveniently arranged kitchen equipped with window-lit sink, outside-lit refrigerator and windowed pantry.

Our stairway to the second story is compactly arranged and yet has decorative possibilities. In its relation to the reception hall it calls for fairly severe handling if it is to be made the most of, but a simple newel post, with white enameled spindles and a mahogany stair rail would serve to give it distinction.

Upstairs we have three bedrooms and a sewing room which could be made to serve as an extra bedroom. All these upstairs rooms have fine closet space and are on a hall which leads conveniently to the bathroom. If one wished, two of the bedrooms could be furnished with outside doors to open on the sun porch roof, and by having this roof flat and covered with an awning there would be fine outdoor sleeping accommodations.

Naturally one would expect the outer woodwork of this attractive home to be finished in white. The white siding below the white stucco would give a neat and presentable appearance always, and with proper landscaping the lot upon which it was built

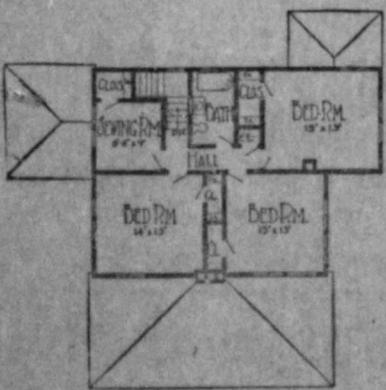


First Floor Plan.

more claims to pretentiousness. What is the secret?

Observe that the lines are pleasing. There are patterned windows, upstairs and down, which carry the eye along in easy verticals and horizontals, and the handling of the cornices and the wide siding used give other lines that structurally and artistically are all that can be desired. The use of stucco for the upper story exterior is a happy thought, and it breaks up whatever monotony might have come from too severe handling of the exterior. The overhanging cornice formed by the extension of the fairly flat mansard roof helps out the silhouette of the house.

Inside, we find a very commodious home of eight rooms, including sun room. The latter leads out from the living room, and together these two are quite as attractive a combina-



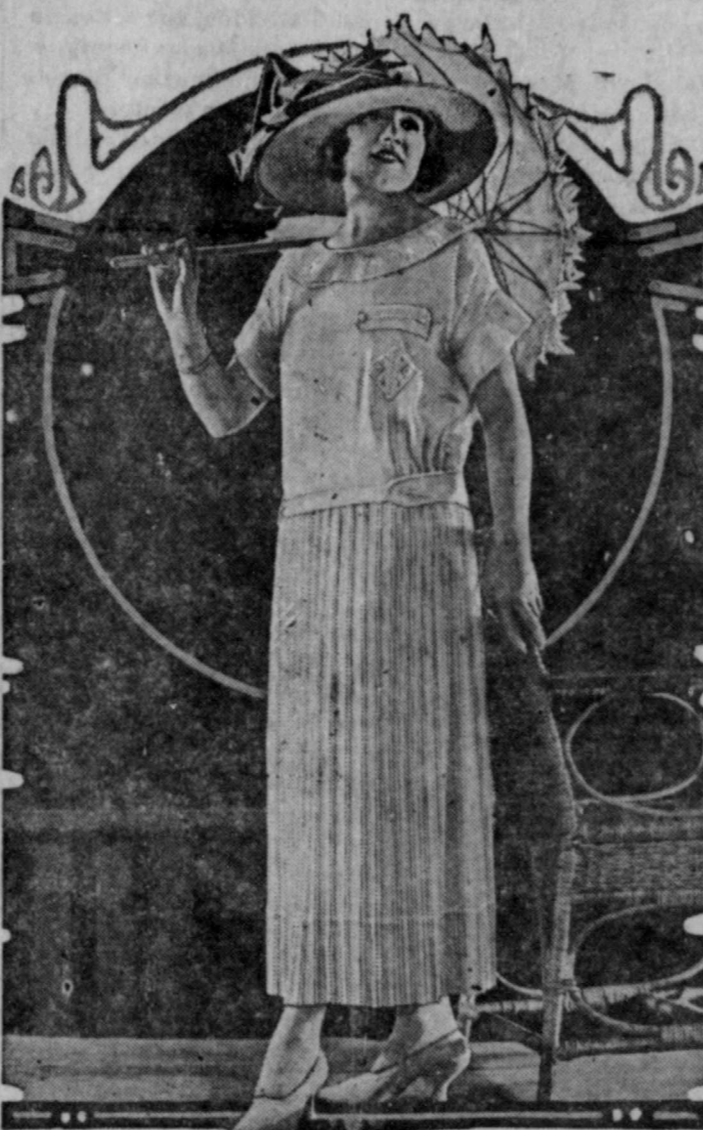
Second Floor Plan.

tion of the two most used rooms as you could wish to find in a house. The sun room could have a fireplace also, by taking care to have the one fire serve both it and the living room. The glass doors which open from the living room into the sun room ought to be included in the plan, rather than portieres, for this reason, that in such a case the living room would be apt to be drafty and uncomfortable

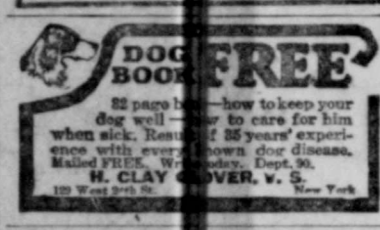

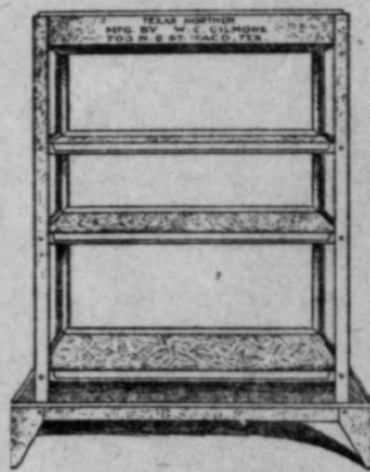
