HOGS TURN CORN CROP TO PROFIT

Economical Farrowing House Insures Health of Small Pigs.

GOOD DESIGN FOR HOG HOUSE

Essentials of Fresh Air and Sunlight Are Given First Consideration—Type of Construction Is Not Expensive.

Farmers in the corn belt market much of their corn crops through hogs. Many go further—they use the hogs to harvest the crop as well as a market it. The latter turn their crop of spring pigs into the cornfield, and when marketing time comes the pigs are fat and well finished, which means they will bring the top price.

It is now approaching the season when many farmers will prepare to produce the crop of pigs for next season. That means that the sows due to farrow in the late winter or early spring will be provided with a modern house for their families of little pigs. Early spring pigs are profitable, but unless they have the right kind of a house it is a difficult matter to keep them alive and healthy until it is time to turn them out to pasture.

The modern farrowing house, a hog house, provides three essentials to

In drainage when put under the concrete floor. The building is extended east and west so that the low sun of late winter and early spring may be permitted to enter. The windows in the side wall admit sunlight and warmth to the row of pens on the side, while the upper windows perform the same service for the other row of pens.

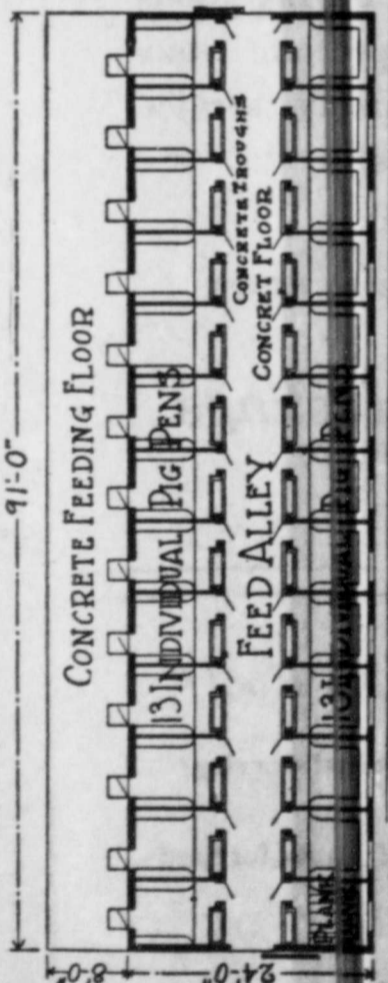
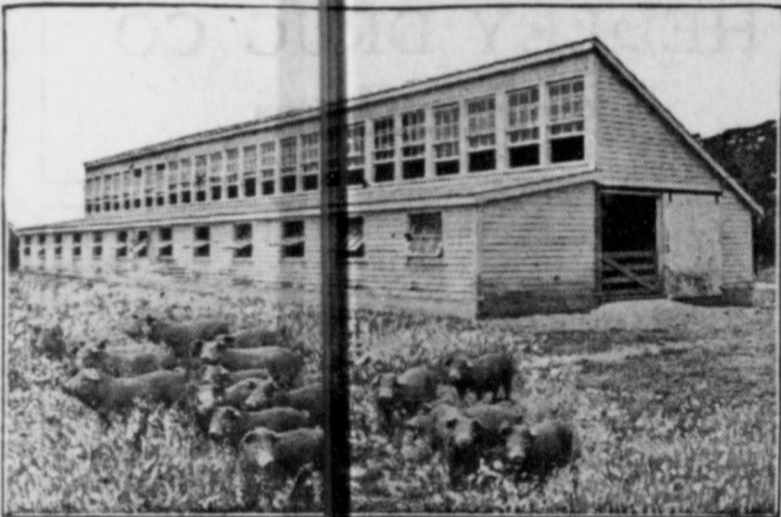
This building is 91 feet long and 24 feet wide. On each side of the feeding alley that extends through the building are 13 farrowing pens. The floors of the pens are partially covered by a platform constructed of planks slightly raised from the concrete. The bedding for the sows and pigs are placed on these raised floors, which prevents the cold and damp from the concrete floor penetrating to the delicate youngsters.

On the floor plan that accompanies the exterior view is shown pig rails in each pen. These rails are raised slightly above the floor and extend around two sides of the pens. They are high enough to offer the small pigs a chance to escape when their clumsy mothers lie down and threaten to crush them. It is such habits and dangers as those enumerated that the modern hog house is designed to overcome. That's what makes them good investments for those who make good profits from that Middle West combination—hogs and corn.

CAMELS ONCE RANGED ALASKA

Bones of the Animal Have Been Found There, as Well as in Parts of Nebraska.

Discoveries in a quarry near Agate Springs, Sioux county, Nebraska, of five skeletons of an extinct genus of camel which inhabited North America at the beginning of the Miocene epoch of the age of mammals, indicating that the camel probably originated on the American continent, give significant point to a report which has just been made by Rev. John Chapman, an Episcopal missionary at Anvik, Alaska, that the bones of camels were dug up



profitable hog raising. The first is protection of the young pigs and their mothers from the cold, damp weather that prevails in the early spring. The second is that the pigs have an abundance of pure, dry air; the third is that the labor of caring for a number of sows and their pigs is cut to a minimum.

A good type of farrowing pen that is the least expensive to build is shown in the accompanying illustration. It is of the half-monitor or saw-tooth roof design, the windows facing the south and the length extending east and west. The building is of good light frame construction set on a concrete foundation, with a concrete floor. A concrete floor is an important feature of the house, as it provides a sanitary surface that is easily cleaned. By laying the floor before frost sets in the construction of the upper part of the house may be delayed until late in the fall or even until winter.

The best site for a hog house is on a slightly elevated piece of ground so as to insure good drainage. A layer of cinders 2 or 3 inches thick helps

not long ago along the banks of the Yukon river.

Mr. Chapman has been engaged in missionary work in Alaska since 1887, and in addition to his church work among the natives, has found time also to pursue investigations along scientific lines.

The camel bones which were found in Nebraska have been mounted and placed on exhibition in the American Museum of Natural History in New York. It is known that in prehistoric times the camel ranged all over North and South America, but, so far as is known, until the discovery along the banks of the Yukon in Alaska of similar skeletons, it was not known that they had ranged that far north. The fact of their exhumation in Alaska would now seem to indicate that the camel wandered northward into the Alaskan country in a prehistoric time, and during the period when the American and the Asiatic continents were united at that point where the Behring sea now separates them, crossed over into Asia, where in later times they became for long ages and still remain the chief beast of burden among the Asiatics.

Age of the Ocean.

The ocean is not, of course, as old as the earth, since it could not be formed until the surface of the globe had cooled sufficiently to retain water on it. It may, therefore, seem chimerical to try to measure the age of the sea, but the task has been undertaken. The estimate has been based upon the ratio of sodium the sea contains to that annually contributed by the washings from the continents. The conclusion has thus been reached that the ocean has been in existence between 80,000,000 and 170,000,000 years. This does not seem to be a very definite determination, but, in geology, estimates of time in years are extremely difficult because of the uncertainty of the elements of calculation.

Radio in Thunderstorm.

The weather bureau, although without facilities of its own for conducting investigations in this field, has cooperated in various ways with other agencies also interested in conditions affecting wireless telephony, says the Scientific American. As a result of work done by Nebraska Wesleyan university based on thunderstorms reports furnished by the weather bureau the investigators reached the conclusion that there is no relation between barometric pressure and audibility at a distant receiving station. High static frequency, high static audibility and a nearby thunderstorm area, however, tend to reduce the audibility at the receiving station.

Community Building

BELIEF IN ZONING GROWING

Figures Show That More Than Fifteen Million Americans Now Live in Such Communities.

More than 15,000,000 Americans live in zoned cities, towns and villages, according to figures compiled by the division of housing and building of the Department of Commerce. This is about 27 per cent of the urban population of the nation, and indicates the growth of the movement for the "city beautiful" throughout the United States. The department reports that on January 1, 1923, there were 109 zoned communities in the United States as compared with 55 on January 1, 1922.

The largest zoned city in the country is, of course, New York, while the smallest zoned village has only 131 inhabitants. New York city has been zoned since 1916, and at present 81 per cent of the population of New York state lives in zoned communities. Second to New York comes the state of California with 71 per cent. Minnesota is third with 53 per cent, New Jersey is fourth with 57 per cent, and Utah is fifth with 55 per cent. In the number of communities zoned, New Jersey leads the country with 31; New York state is second with 17, California is third with 14, and Illinois is fourth with 10. Twenty-two of the fifty largest cities are now zoned.

As a rule, the zoning regulations provide that the city, town or village be divided into districts and that certain districts be set apart for residential purposes and others for manufacturing. The laws cover the height of the buildings and the percentage of the land they are to cover. This keeps the garage and the factory out of the residential districts, making for cleanliness and more sanitary as well as more pleasant surroundings.

HAVE DESIGN IN PLANTING

And It Is Well to Have Trees and Shrubs in Place Before the House Foundations.

Never plant without a plan. It will cost you less in the long run. Your home will be more beautiful, your planting permanent, your house and lot more valuable. Don't make the mistake of waiting until after your home is built before planning and planting. It is important not only to locate your house properly on the lot—you should plan the walks, garden, borders, etc., before the house foundations are in and immovable.

Don't forget to observe nature's way of arranging shrubs, trees and flowers. In the woods you seldom find trees growing in straight lines, stiff and formal. Study the margins and outlines of woods and thickets. You will notice indentations, bays and openings which give you beautiful pictures and vistas.

Don't overlook the soft edges, strong, yet harmonious contrasts which nature provides so abundantly. Don't permit your planting to obstruct the sunlight and ventilation of your home.

Don't needlessly cut and prune trees. A good tree on your building site may be the key to a successful planting plan. A good tree, ten years old, is worth many dollars. Keep it and care for it.

Time to Plan is Now.

There is scarcely anything in the smaller places that may not be changed, the city planner finds. For example, in the smaller cities, railroad approaches may be set right; grade crossings eliminated; water fronts redeeded for commerce or recreation, or both (Chicago is doing fine work in that direction); open spaces may be acquired even in partly built-up sections; a satisfactory street plan can be carried out and adequate main thoroughfares established; public buildings can be grouped; a park system can be composed for gradual and systematic development. "All of these elements of a city plan," says Mr. Nolan, expert city planner, "are indispensable sooner or later. They may be had in the small city with relative ease and slight cost."—Cullier's Weekly.

Homes Reflect Community.

If we continue to be a home-loving people we shall have the strength that comes only from a virile family life. This means that our homes must be attractive, comfortable, convenient, wholesome; they must keep pace with the progress made outside the house. As is the home, so is the community and the nation.

LIVE STOCK FACTS

Deficiencies of White Corn for Feeding Pigs

In an experiment conducted at the Illinois experiment station four sows fed white corn and tankage produced and raised pigs in two consecutive litters as well as did four other sows fed yellow corn and tankage. Two of these sows fed white corn were continued on a ration of white corn and tankage for a third gestation period. One sow farrowed a normal litter, but had inflammation of the udder, followed by pneumonia which resulted in her death. The other sow farrowed a dead litter at the end of a gestation period of 124 days. The pigs had less hair than normal pigs. They were examined for gorter, but nothing was found. This sow was bred for a fourth litter and fed the same ration, with potassium iodide added. The litter came dead at the end of a gestation period of 118 days. For her fifth gestation period, 1 per cent of cod liver oil was added to the ration of white corn and tankage. This litter came normal at the end of a gestation period of 118 days.

The pigs from the first litters of the white-corn sows, when continued on the ration of their dams, failed to attain a weight of 75 pounds. These pigs, farrowed in March and April, began dying six weeks after weaning time, and all were dead by December 17. For several weeks preceding death, a number of the pigs had a nervous trouble manifested by a general inco-ordination of parts, accompanied by convulsions every few days. It was also evident that the ration of white corn and tankage was less palatable than yellow corn and tankage, after the first month. Some pigs died within five or six weeks, while others continued on a low plane of nutrition for months. Autopsy, after the death of those pigs which had been on this ration for some time, showed lung congestion or pneumonia in some cases; a few pigs had stones in the kidneys; in two cases, soreness of the eyes was found; and other pigs showed no complications.

White corn and tankage do not, therefore, make a complete ration for pigs immediately after weaning. For growing and fattening older pigs, the deficiency is less marked. Pigs started on this ration at 50 to 75 pounds may or may not show indications of a ration deficiency before a marketable weight is attained. The exact nature of the deficiency in the ration of white corn and tankage is not definitely known, but considerable evidence has been put forth to show that a growth-promoting substance known as vitamin A is lacking in this ration. The deficiencies of this ration can be overcome by feeding the pigs forage or legume hay. The various grains and protein supplements have not been thoroughly tested, but some experimental work would indicate that a number of the more common grains and protein supplements are also low in this growth-producing vitamin.

Pastures or legume hays correct the deficiencies of white corn. The deficiencies of white corn are noted only after continued feeding in the dry lot.—John B. Rice, H. H. Mitchell and R. J. Laible, Illinois Experiment Station, Urbana.

Pays to Know How Many Animals Farm Will Feed

The man who consistently follows a well-established live-stock system on his farm is more prosperous than the man who tries to be in when conditions look good and out when they look bad, said H. M. Garlock of the Missouri College of Agriculture at Farmers' week. Usually the man who follows the in-and-out system is out when he should be in and in when he should be out.

Consistent live-stock farming offers several opportunities to the farmer. By consistent live-stock farming is meant a system where a definite number of live stock is included as a part of the farm operation. The number of live stock kept should vary with the size of farm and crop rotation. Meat animals will furnish a market for crops and crop residue, distribute labor throughout the year and produce additional values in barnyard manure to maintain the soil fertility.

There is no set rule for balancing our crops and live stock that will fit all farms because of the difference in their location, size, topography, fertility and proximity to markets, but there should be some relationship between the crop rotation and the number of meat animals kept. The United States produces annually between two and three billion bushels of corn, and according to the best information, about 80 per cent of this is fed to live stock while only about 8 per cent is used for human food. These figures would indicate that the men producing corn are dependent upon live stock for a market for their product.

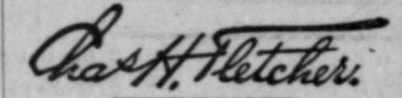
