In the autumn of his life he wrote his reminiscences, in which he tells of the evils he encountered, and rightly characterizes them as inesti-





#### BEDBUG IS NOT DISGRACE IF STEPS TAKEN TO DESTROY IT



Various Poisons Useful in Eradication of Pests.

Trunks, wraps and traveling bags may furnish a means of transporting bedbugs into the house. Not infrededbugs into the house. Not infre-quently they gain access to impeccably clean premises in the laundry basket. Sometimes they migrate from one house to another, or from one apartment to another along heating or water pipes. The only odium attaching to the discovery of a bedbug is fall-ure to take immediate steps to eradicate it, with all its possible progeny. Outside of the question of personal discomfort caused by their bites, bed-bugs are possible carriers of disease and therefore are dangerous house-

Bedbugs hide in the daytime in cracks in the wall or wood trim of the room, under wall paper, in joints of the bedstead or spring, in the tufts or binding of the mattress. They come out at night in search of food, which is human blood. The same bedbug, it is believed, bites only once in from six to ten days, retiring to digest its enormous meal in quiet; more bites indi-cate a serious infestation which should in this way. Fumigation is Effective. Fumigation of a badly infested gas is the most efficient remedy, but owing to the deadly poisonous nature of the gas this method must be used life history, habits and means of con-

# **EXCELLENT WAYS TO** USE LEFT-OVER MEAT

Suggestions Offered for Utilizing | Simple Remedy Formulated Many Small Pieces.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Cold roast lamb and mutton sticed is excellent, but the family may be tired of having the remains of the roast served that way, or the pieces may be too small to slice. In either event, these suggestions for utilizing this kind of left-over meat, offered by food specialists in the United States Department of Agriculture, will be appreclated by the one who prepares the family's meals.

### Minced Lamb.

Chop pieces of cold roast lamb fine. A pint of chopped meat will serve a family of five or six. Rub one tablespoonful each of butter and flour to gether; add one-half pint of milk, stir until boiling; add tablespoonful of finely chopped parsiey, one-half tea-spoonful of salt and a dash of cayenne. Add the meat and stand over hot water until served. If served on toast trim the toast and butter and cover with a thick layer of the mince, making a little bollow in the center. Into this hollow (if you have plenty of eggs and want a heartier dish) put a poached egg. Six will be required for this quantity of meat.

Cutlets of Cold Mutton.

From a leg of mutton, cooked rare, cut pieces about the size of an ordinary loin chop. These may be fried in a little fat, or egged, crumbed and fried in deep fat, or they may be brushed over with fat and broiled. The result is more like meat cooked for the first time than the ordinary warmed-over meat. Cutlets so prepared may be served with any of the sauces served with chops.

Grease a mold or a bowl of about 1½ quarts capacity and line with cooked rice. Heat the meat with the other ingredients, using enough stock to make a mixture that is moist, but will hold its shape. Pack the meat in the center of the mold and cover with the remaining rice, grease the cover of the mold (if a bowl is used, a plate will serve for a cover), steam or cook in water enough partly to cover the mold until the contents are thoroughly

## ONION IS EFFECTIVE **CURE FOR PNEUMONIA**

Years Ago Is Unearthed.

The old argument as to whether the onion is an undesirable citizen seems likely to be decided in the negative, now that somebody has discovered that a diabetes cure lurks somewhere alongside the smell. The onion has other good qualities. It is effective in curing or preventing pneumonia, said the health board of Washington, N. J. The formula, as it appeared in the papers of Washington, is as follows:

"Take six to ten onions, according to size, and chop fine, put in a large spider over a hot fire, then add the same quantity of rye meal and vinegar, enough to form a thick paste. In the meanwhile stir it thoroughly, letting it simmer five or ten minutes. Then put in a cotton bag large enough to cover the lungs and apply to chest as hot as patient can bear. In about ten minutes apply another, and thus continue by reheating the poultices, and in a few hours the patient will be out of danger. This simple remedy has never falled to cure this too-often fatal malady. Usually three or four applica-tions will be sufficient, but continue always until the perspiration starts freely from the chest. This remedy was formulated many years ago by one of the best physicians New England has ever known, who never lost a patient by this disease and won his renown by simple remedies."



#### **EUROPE CATCHES UP** IN FOOD PRODUCTION

Farm Economists Find Foreign Demand Weak.

Meeting upon the invitation of Sec retary of Agriculture Henry C. Wallace in Washington, a committee of economists issued an important statement as to the agricultural outlook. H. W. Moorehouse, director of re-search, represented the American Farm Bureau federation in the conference. The statement follows:

From the point of view of American agriculture, foreign demand is practically identical with European demand. European countries constitute the only significant markets for American argricultural products.

It needs to be emphasized at the outset that demand is not measured solely by the volume of exports. Since the year 1920 Europe has purchased very large quantities of American wheat and meat, but this does not mean that the European demand for such commodities has been an intense demand, regardless of price. The truth is that Europe would and could take large quantities of American wheat only provided the price was relatively low. In studying demand we are therefore concerned both with European requirements for food and required at prices satisfactory to given above is in considerable part European ability to purchase the food American producers

Three primary factors will determine European demand: (1) the essential food requirements, which depend in part upon crop conditions in Europe; (2) the competition of other food-producing areas with the United States, and (3) the purchasing power of Europe.

European Production of Foodstuffs. The European nations are gradually approaching their prewar level in agricultural production, especially importing nations which are endeavoring to make themselves independent of outside food supplies. Twenty-one countries that in 1909 to 1913 har-Very cautiously Tommy swung him- vested an average of 67,000,000 acres of wheat decreased to 58,000,000 acres in 1920, and then rose again to 60,000,-000 in 1922. Eleven countries that harvested 48,000,000 acres in 1920 and 51,449,000 acres in 1922 have reported 52,180,000 acres for 1923. Moreover, crop conditions are much more favorable this year. Revival of production in Europe is much more manifest in agriculture than in manufacture,

During the World war agricultural production in Europe was reduced while the output in several other countries was increased. For example, the total wheat area in the United States, Canada, India, Australia and Argentina was 116,000,000 acres in 1913 as against 137,000,000 in 1923

Increased production in these regions has more than offset the decline of production in Russia. There is no evidence to show that the competition of these areas will be less this year than last,

In estimating the probable demand for American foodstuffs, it is important to bear in mind that adverse e nomic conditions may seriously reduce the consumption even of essential foodstuffs. For example, German consumption of important foodstuffs in the present area of Germany, in 1913 and 1922, compared as follows:

Europe's purchasing power will depend upon the volume of her exports; the amount of her earnings on investments abroad, on shipping and other services and upon credits extended to her export and import account. The United States continues to have a favorable balance with Europe, i. e., we export more goods to Europe than we receive from her. Our unfavorable balance of trade in recent months has grown out of an excess of imports from countries other than Europe. The balance against Europe, however, has diminished moderately. Imports from France, Germany, Italy, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom were \$325,700,000 in the first four months of 1923 against \$212,700,000 in the first four months of 1922. The first four months of 1922, however, were months of great duliness in business while the first four months of 1923 were months of very intense business activity. A comparison of the first four months of 1923 with the last four months of 1922 shows a gain in imports from Europe of only \$33,-

In view of the probability that the current recession in business in the United States will diminish imports from Europe somewhat, and in view of the acute Ruhr situation, it is not probable that the rest of the year 1923 will show any gain for Europe in goods shipped to the United States. The increase manifest in the figures creased quantities. The difficulty appears to be quite as much in the shortage in European production of manufactured goods as it is in our own reluctance, manifested in our tariff laws, to receive European im-

When other means of making payments for American foodstuffs are considered, the situation looks even less promising. We received less gold in the first five months of 1923 than in the first five months of 1922. The balance on shipping moved moderately in Europe's favor. Passports issued to tourists in the first six months of 1922 were 94,494, but only 80,787 were issued in the corresponding months of 1923. There is no evidence that immigrants' remittances have in-creased in 1923. Various other minor items show no gain for Europe. More over, the total of foreign loans placed in the American market in 1923 to date is very decidedly less than the total for the corresponding period in 1922 and this item is of such great importance as to more than offset any gains Europe might have elsewhere.

An additional factor adverse to European buying power is of course the necessity which the British government is under of making large remittances to meet interest and amortize the principal of her debt to the United States government-a factor which did not exist during the calendar year 1922.

Unless the Ruhr situation is very speedily cleared up and a definite turn for the better takes place in Europe, it appears highly probable that Eu-rope will have less buying power in our markets during the next crop year than she had during the last. Committee:







#### New World's Record for **Butterfat Production**

A new world's record for production of butterfat in one year over all breeds has been established by a Heistein cow owned by Baymondale farm at Vaudrouil, Quebec. DeKol Plus Segis Dixie freshening at the age of nine years and three months, and weighing 1,650 pounds, produced 33,464.7 pounds of milk containing 1,349.35 pounds of butterfat in 365 consecutive days. This amount of butterfat is equal to 1,686.69 pounds of butter. This production surpasses the former world record held by another Canadian Holstein cow by 5 pounds of

Because of her previous high rec-ords of production, "Dixie" was placed on strictly official test, supervised by

both the Holstein-Friesian Association of America and the Dominion department of agriculture of Canada, which supervises record of performance tests for all breeds of dairy cattle in Can-

The new champion was fed a grain ration consisting of equal parts of bran, hominy, dried distillers' grains, gluten meal, oil cake and cracked oats. To 100 pounds of this mixture was added one pound of salt, one pound of charcoal and one-fourth-pound of bone-meal. She was fed at the rate of one pound of grain mixture to each four pounds of milk produced. Her roughage consisted mainly of mixed hay and some corn silage and beets. All of last summer she was let out to pasture two hours a day.

#### Production of Fat Is

Affected by Age of Cow Fat production by the average dairy cow increases till she has passed her seventh year, reaches its peak before the end of her eighth year and then gradually declines. This fundamental truth in farming science was discovered recently by C. W. Turner, a teacher in the dairy department of the Missouri College of Agriculture.

This conclusion was reached only after Turner had worked out the relation between the age and the yearly pilation of this sort has been carried

The value of this information lies in knowing what production may be expected of a cow at a certain age. For example, if a farmer knows the present production of a two-year-oldscow and wishes to estimate what she will be worth to him in five years, he will have an authoritative table which he may consult.

A yearling produces 64.6 per cent compared to a cow at maturity; a twoyear-old, 73.6 per cent; a three-yearold, 84 per cent; a four-year-old, 90 per cent; a five-year-old, 95 per cent, and a six-year-old, 29 per cent. After seven years the decline in production

### Increase of Butterfat

Is Not Made by Feeding According to experimental work that has been done, the percentage of fat in milk cannot be increased by feed-ing. The milk of each individual cow seems to have a fixed composition that is natural to her. True, the richness of the milk may be increased or de-creased for a short time if the cow's digestive system is disturbed by sickness or improper feeding, but will return to the normal test in a short time. The quantity of milk may easily vary with feeding, consequently the total pounds of butterfat would be increased without a variation in the test. By having a cow in high flesh at the time of freshening, the test may be raised for a time, the supposition being that the body fat is drawn upon but it only lasts for a short time, when the test returns to the point peculiar to the individual.




