





Using Thick Cloth to Sponge and Dampen Goods.

Digartment of Agriculture Sug-Many people have difficulty in pressing woolen garments without making them shiny. The United States Department of Agriculture advises using a thick cloth to sponge and dampen the goods. Plaits or folds may be basted in place, but the stitches should be drawn as soon as the cloth is steamed; otherwise the thread will mark the material. Heavy irons are more satisfactory on materials such as used in men's suits. DAIRY HINTS

Dairyman's Formula for

Milk of Good Quality "Feed, weed and breed" is the dairyman's magic formula for good milk, according to M. H. Keeney, dairy specialist of the New Jersey State Agricultural college, in a statement stressing the present market demand for cheaper milk.

"The market will not pay a big price for milk," writes Mr. Keeney, "so we dairymen must cut our productio costs. The two factors controlling the economical production of milk are the adaptability of the cow for giving milk, judged by her conformation, and by the milk scales and the Babcock test, and the amount and kind of food taken. The feed bill is the largest direct expense, and the dairyman's high road to success lies in producing a unit of clean, wholesome milk for the least possible cost.

"The first essential for good milk is good cows, the other is proper feed and care-it may be summarized briefly in three words, feed, weed and breed. Silage and alfalfa hay are the best for cheap milk, and they are the best and cheapest roughage feeds. Every dairyman should have them and should follow these directions: "Feed all the roughage a cow will

clean up. Part of it should be a legume, such as clover or alfalfa, "Keep a balanced ration.

"Give sufficient feed, such as sllage or roots

"Feed grain in accordance with milk production-for a Hoistein or Ayrshire, approximately one pound of grain for each three pounds of milk. A variety of grains in the mixture is desirable.

"Feed and milk regularly. "Give plenty of fresh water at all times.

"Give access to salt daily. "Buy grain feeds on the basis of their protein and energy, not simply by the hundredweight."

Bred Heifers Are Often

Best Buy for Dairyman

What age of helfer is the best buy is a question frequently asked of the New York state college of agriculture at Ithaca.

The men there who are giving thought to herd improvement explain the advantages and disadvantages in the purchase at all three of the ages, as baby calves, as yearlings, and as bred helfers.

Baby calves are cheaper and more easily shipped. However, they are somewhat less likely to live than older stock; and further, there is more uncertainty as to how they will develop. With yearlings, the chances of liv-

ing are better, and the type is more likely to be fixed, yet a long time still remains before they will be productive. But since yearling helfers may sell at a disadvantage, they may be a good purchase.

size, and the possibilities for mill production can be estimated. Their mortality rate should be low; and the cost of carrying to production is slight. They may even be worth a slight premium where there is a good market for milk, and it is desired to establish a herd promptly.

Timothy Is Not Favored as Feed for Dairy Cows

Timothy hay is all too frequently fed to dairy cows. There is only one occasion when its use for this purpose can be developed-when the cows are to be dried off. Where dairy cattle are being fed and timothy hay is the only dry roughage available, it should be sold and clover or alfalfa purchased. Timothy is generally quoted on the central markets as high or even higher than the legume hays, and the dairyman can well afford to make the exchange even though he has the hauling to pay. The improvement obtained in production will be remarkable, and will generally mean all the difference between paying to keep the cows and allowing the cows to aid in supporting you.

in Production of Milk Cleanliness is the most Important factor in the production of clean wholesome milk. Much of the dirt and filth that gets into milk and produces deterioration, comes from improper methods of handling after being drawn However, brushing off the loose dirt and dust about the flanks and udder and wiping the udder with a dry cloth and wiping the udder with a dry cloth materially assists in lessening the danger of dirt getting into the milk at milking. Cows during the summer sea-son. If stabled at night or confined to a yard, become more or less dirty about their rear quarters and should be well cleaned before being milked.

Calf Needs Much Care

Very young dairy calves demand illful attention in order to grow and three most important rules to observe in hand-feeding are: First, cleanliness: second, regularity second, regularity; and third, proper proportioned ration.







With a heavy tonnage of apples and pears, the 1923 deal of the Western New York Fruit Growers' Co-operative Packing association is now active. Peaches and some early apples have been going to the market for the past four weeks; fall apples are now being harvested and a heavy tonnage of winter varieties are to come later. Last year this Federated member shipped 3,600 cars. The distribution ows the fruit was sold into 211 markets in 26 states and three foreign countries. The member's apples were shipped steadily from October 7 until the first week in May with no greater variance than ten cars per week from an average shipment of 70 cars per week throughout the entire seven months' period. The continued merchandising of the "Cataract" brand of apples for this member has placed the product in an enviable position in the carlot markets of the country.

Co-operative fruit tonnage from Colorado has come into the "limelight" this season with the organization of the United Fruit Growers' association which through its affiliation with the Federated has been placing branded peaches, apples and other fruits upon the carlot markets of the country. The government co-operative pack-ing plant at inwood, W. Va., operating through the Inwood Fruit Growers' club, and putting up a superior pack known as the "Johnny Appleseed" brand, joined the Federated sales service this year.

The strengthening of the local units of the Ohio Fruit Growers' Co-operative association has greatly increased membership and tonnage of the Ohio growers.

FRUIT ASSOCIATIONS UNITE

Michigan Growers Control Tonnage of More Than 4,000 Cars-Push Organization.

The Michigan Fruit Growers, Inc., s making wonderful progress in the organization of Michigan's co-operative fruit marketing industry. Within the past few months it has organized 75 per cent of the co-operative packing house output in the state and today controls a tonnage of more than 4,000 cars of peaches, apples, grapes and pears. It is working forward to a goal of 5,000 cars of fruit to be marketed through the farmer-owned and controlled Michigan Fruit Growers, Inc. The Michigan Fruit Growers, Inc. is affiliated with the Michigan State Farm bureau under the commodity control type of organization. Offices at Benton Harbor have been opened, with Secretary F. L. Bradford in charge.

SELL POTATOES IN LOUISIANA

Farm Bureau Exchange Handled 105 Cars of Tubers at Average Price of \$2.01.

The Louisiana Farm Bureau Irish potato growers' exchange during the past season marketed 105 cars of Triumph potatoes at an average price of \$2.01 per hundred pounds, according to a general report recently prepared by A. G. Hamilton, market specialist of the Louisiana State university extension department and acting sales manager of the exchange.

Utilize New Law. The Rock Island (Illinois) Milk Pro-ducers' company has been organizing under the direction of the Illinois Agrithe Ohio growers. Bartlett pears, Elberta peaches, prunes and apples from a number of newly-formed co-operative associations in Utah, similar tree fruits from the organized growers of Idaho and Ncw Jersey are adding important tonnage that for the most part is the result of the first year's efforts in co-operative marketing. Under the direction of the Illinois Agri-culture association, assisted by the co-operative marketing department of the American Farm Bureau federation. This co-operative is the first one to be organized under the new Illinois co-operative law. It has 200 members, all of whom are signed upon the four-pool standard American Farm Bureau federation contract. MENTHOL
