VENTILATION IS OF PRIME IMPORTANCE

"Ventilation in the dairy barn is of prime importance both from the standpoint of the health of the herd and for the production of clean, untainted milk," is the statement of S. W. Mead, dairy specialist at the New Jersey state experiment station.

"Fresh air is the greatest enemy of tuberculosis. Furthermore, an abund ent supply of fresh air drives out all unpleasant odors and thereby prevents them from tainting the milk. an abundant supply of fresh air is just as important for economical milk production as is proper feed.

"Various ventilating systems are on the market, all of which work on the principle of expansion and contraclighter than an equal volume of cold contracted air. The warm air, therefore, rises and the cold air descends,

"A proper ventilating system must provide for the entrance of fresh air and the exit of foul air in such a way that the warmil of the burn is pre-served and the air kept pure and about as warm at the feet as at the heads of the animals. A cow weighing a thousand pounds inhales 224 pounds of air in 24 hours nearly twice the weight of her food and drink. This is at the rate of 3,542

Haphazard ventilation may result air to supply their requirements or getting it in a way which chilfs them. thus making them susceptible to dis-ease and reducing their milk flow.
