LIVE STOCK

CLOVER WINS EDGE IN FEEDING TRIAL

Clover had a slight edge over alfalfa in the beef feeding trials which have just been completed at the Wisconsin College of Agriculture.

In the steer-feeding trials, two lots of ten steers each, weighing practically the same, made an average gain of 378.1 pounds in the case of the clover fed steers and an average gain of 377.5 pounds when fed alfalfa during the trial period of 196 days. The average daily gain was the same for the two lots, 1.93 pounds per animal.

The average ration used in the experiment consisted of 10 pounds of corn, 27 pounds of corn silage, 5.3 pounds of clover hay in one case and 5.3 pounds of alfalfa hay for the other lot, and 1.4 pounds of cottonseed meal for the clever-fed animals as compared to .8 pound for the alfalfa fed steers.

For each 100 pounds gain, the clover-fed steers got 519.9 pounds of corn, 72.1 pounds of cottonseed meal, 274 pounds of clover hay, and 1,399.7 pounds of corn silage. Their competitors made like gains on 520.7 pounds of corn, 41.2 pounds of cottonseed meal, 274.4 pounds of alfalfa hay, and 1,401.08 pounds of corn silage. The former ration cost \$14.79 and the latter 20 cents more, pork profits from hogs following the steers not de-

The net profit per steer in the clover-fed group, not including pork profit, was \$16.18. When the pork profit was added this group returned a net profit over cost of feed of \$23.26 per steer. The alfalfa-fed animals made a profit without the pork profits of \$15.42. With the pork profits added they averaged \$21.58 net return per steer over cost of feed.

In announcing the result of the baby beef-feeding trials, J. G. Fuller of the animal husbandry department, under whose direction the experiments were carried on, said: "Perhaps we had better not get too enthusiastic about baby beef production, but consider seriously all of the costs involved."

In the baby beef-feeding trials two lots of five animals each, weighing 670.9 per animal in each lot, were pitted against each other for 168 days to see whether better gains could be made on cottonseed meal than on linseed oilmeal.

A margain of \$2.81 more profit was made on the baby beeves that got linseed oil meal as a part of their ration over what was made by the cottonseed meal group of baby beeves. The estimated profit per animal in the latter group was \$8.22, while the former paid a profit of \$11.03 per animal.

The average daily ration per animal consisted of 5.6 pounds of cracked corn, 3.0 pounds of crushed oats, 15.9 pounds of corn silage, 4.0 pounds of alfalfa hay, and .98 pounds of cottonseed meal for one lot and .98 pounds of linseed oilmeal for the other lot.

The cottonseed meal group was fed 290.8 pounds of cracked corn, 158.4 pounds of crushed oats, 51.4 pounds of cottonseed meal, 824.5 pounds of corn silage, and 208.9 pounds of alfalfa hay for each 100 pounds of gain. The linseed oilmeal class made 100 pounds of gain on 267.7 pounds of cracked corn, 145.9 pounds of crushed oats, 42.3 pounds of linseed oilmeal, 759.1 pounds of corn silage, and 192.4 pounds of alfalfa hav.

In the cotton seed meal group the average gain per animal was 321.7 pounds and the average gain per animal in the linseed oilmeal class was 349.4 pounds, a margin of 27.7 pounds per animal.

Marl Furnishes Calcium

Essential for All Hogs That marl can be used in place of air-slacked lime or ground limestone in a mineral mixture for hogs is indicated in an experiment recently completed at Minnesota University farm. The marl used in the trial came from near Backus and contained 88 per cent calcium carbonate, the remainder of the analysis showing mostly fine sand and

"A mineral mixture composed of 80 per cent marl and 20 per cent salt was fully as satisfactory for growing fattening pigs as a standard mixture of 40 per cent slaked lime, 40 per cent bonemeal, and 20 per cent salt," says E. F. Ferrin, professor of animal husbandry. "For feeding month after month to breeding stock the marl and sait might not be as satisfactory as a mixture containing bonemeal which supplies phosphorus. It is reasonably certain even with the limited data at hand that marl will supply calcium just as well or possibly better than limestone or slaked lime. The small amount of earthy material in the mari is no particular disadvantage. So little is eaten that no harm can come from this source.'

SMALL-TOP PAIL IS BEST FOR DAIRYING

That the small-top milk pail is a distinct aid in producing clean milk is proved by the large amount of hair and dirt that collects on the cover of such a pail during milking, points out F. C. Button, professor of dairy industry at the college of agriculture at New Brunswick, N. J.


This accumulation will take place on the hood of the pail even when the cow's body, udder and teats are comparatively clean. Without the protection of the hood, this material would fall directly into the milk.

The influence of the small-top pail on the number of bacteria that fall into milk at milking time has been shown by experiment to be as follows: When the cows were dirty and only sterilized utensils used, an open pail gave milk containing \$6,000 bacteria in every 25 drops of milk, while a covered pail under the same conditions gave milk containing only 24,000 bacteria in that quantity of milk. It has been said that the hooded pail can generally be expected to keep out at least 60 per cent of the dirt and bacteria that would otherwise fall into the milk.

The more dirt there is on a cow the more important it is to use a smalltop pail. In selecting such a pail one should consider the ease of cleaning. the ease of use and the smallness of the opening. All seams in the pail should be soldered flush to make cleaning easy. The interior should be free from angles and inaccessible crevices which harbor bacteria and render cleaning difficult. Some-dairymen object to milking into a small-top pail. claiming it is too difficult. With a little practice, however, one can readfly become accustomed to its use. The benefit to be derived from this modern pail is well worth the effort.

Keep Milk Pails Clean by Using False Bottom

After trying in vain to keep the bottom of the milkpail free from the mire of the barnyard, a false bottom was devised as shown in the drawing. A round piece, 1/2-inch larger in diameter than the bottom of the pail, was cut

from an apple-box side (any similar lumber would do, of course). To this were nailed three lath cleats, across the grain. The middle cleat was allowed to extend 11/2 inches beyond either edge of the board, and to these extensions were nailed two 11/2-inch blocks cut from one inch lumber. To one of these blocks was fastened a spring trouser-guard such as is used in riding a bicycle. The spring was held solidly in place with a lath wedge. Two small lath uprights nailed to the sides completed the job. The spring bolds the false bottom firmly in place. -Popular Science Monthly.

Skim Milk Fed Calf Must

Have Supply of Water Calves need water even though they are being raised on skim milk. Because milk is largely made up of water is no reason for not giving a calf an opportunity to drink.

It is not a good practice to water a calf immediately after it has had its feed of skim milk and is pretty well filled up. The middle of the day is a better time.

After a calf is two weeks old, it should get a little water each day. On very hot summer days large amounts of water in the middle of the day may be followed by bad results. On these days it is better to water them during the forenoon and afternoon when they are out in the hot sun during the day. Then it is not advisable to let them overdrink. A small amount, a half bucketful or so at a time, and often, is far better than giving all at one

If the calves have access to fresh water at all times, time and work is saved. However, it is a poor policy to let the calves drink from a stagnant pool. This water supply has caused intestinal trouble and frequently poisoning.

Feed for Young Calf

Milk should be fed until the calf is six months old. By this time, It should be eating all the feed it will clean up nicely. It is important that the feeding be continued while the milk is being graduelly tapered off and, when the calf is wesned, it should never be allowed to stop growing.

Care in tapering off the milk and a little more feed will do the trick. If it is summer, the calf should run out in a good pasture where fresh water and sait are accessible at all times.





Best Way to Prepare

Floor for New Finish Given a common floor to refinish under ordinary conditions, scrub thoroughly with warm water to which household ammonia has been added, about one part ammonia to every eight parts water. Grease spots and stains may require special scrubbing with a stronger solution of ammonia water. Where this fails, washing with alcohol or benzine should be tried. Paint spots may be removed by washing with turpentine and sandpapering. Washing powders should never be used. and their presence is harmful to the varnish which follows. Waxed or oiled floors do not require such cleaning, but the wax (if ordinary soft wax) or oil must be thoroughly removed by washing with alcohol or benzine.







For example, pasteurization of milk raises the temperature for a certain time to a point that destroys undesirable bacteria, but does not give the bolled-milk flavor. Most inicroorganisms are sensitive to cold also, at least to the extent that growth is more or less checked by a temperature of 40 degrees to 50 degrees F. Drying is another way to prevent the growth of micro-organisms in foods. Dried fruits and vegetables, for in-

stance, may keep for months in a cool, dry place, but as soon as water is added to them they will spoil as quickly as fresh kinds. Direct sunlight de strovs many micro-organisms, but the dim light of the cellar is just right for

some molds. Bacteria of various sorts must be dealt with in the care of food. Lacticacid bacteria, for example, cause milk to sour but do not necessarily make it unwholesome, and are an aid in making butter and cheese. Other kinds, however, make foods putrefy and decay, and still others develop dangerous poisons. In addition, foods are sometimes contaminated in various ways with the bacteria of such diseases as typhoid fever and paratybe diluted with water, or if it is very phoid, tuberculosis, diphtheria, and sour a little sugar may be added, dysentery. To Have Trees Grow

When planting trees the soil should be carefully worked around the roots with a pointed stick. No air spaces should be left, and it is as well to soak the soil around the roots so that the tree will stand firmly. Most trees should be planted two or three inches lower than they were in the nursery or the woodlot.

There can be no fixed rules for spacing trees. Along streets they will range from 30 to 80 feet apart, depending upon the variety used.

If the tree planter has not pruned his tree before he put it in the ground, it should be done immediately afterwards. Frequently there is too little rather than too much pruning at the top. The tree top should balance the root systems. Many tree planters find It best to remove all the side branches of the deciduous tree, leaving enty the leader or main shoot,


