



**RECIPE FOR MAKING DILL PICKLES** 



#### Preparing the Brine for Dill Pickles.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Dill pickles are made from fresh or salted cucumbers (the former are choicer, says the United States Department of Agriculture, but the latter have better keeping qualities). Employ pickled dill seed or herb and "dill spice," composed of allspice, black pepper, coriander seed and bay leaves, in addition to the brine.

Soak 100 cucumbers in a 30-degree brine (about 15 ounces of salt to 6 quarts of water) until the brine will give an acid test, I. e., turns red when tested with litmus paper (which may be bought at a drug store). Drain and arrange in layers in a crock, putting in a layer of cherry or grape leaves first, then the cucumbers, then a few cloves, the dill, a few small pleces of red opper and then the leaves. Continue until the crock is full. Cover with the brine which was drained off and to which has been added one-half cupful of mustard seed, one-half cupful of horseradish and one-half cupful of salt. Cover with a light weight and seal airtight with parafin for winter use.

**SOY BEAN OIL MEAL** FAVORED FOR HOGS

With the enormous increase in acreage of soy beans planted each year is certain to come a demand for information on the value of soy-bean oilmeal for growing and fattening pigs. Already the beans are finding their way to oil-expressing plants. When the oil is removed, the residue, soy-bean oilmeal, remains.

In anticipation of the demand for information the lowa experiment station recently closed a series of tests with this new feed. Previous experiments have shown that soy-bean oilmeal is lacking in mineral matter. It runs about 43 per cent protein and ranks with linseed oilmeal or cottonseed meal as a balancer. The deficiency of minerals was supplied by a mixture composed of common salt, 20 pounds; spent boneblack, 40 pounds; or ground bonemeal, steamed bonemeal, rock phosphate or acid phosphate; and finely ground, high-calcium limestone, 40 pounds; or air-slaked lime, wood ashes or fine-ground clam or oyster shell. One-half ounce of potassium iodide was added to each 100 pounds of the mixture, which was kept before the pigs at all times in a self-feeder.


There were six lots of ten pigs each, averaging about 70 pounds at the start, that we are interested in. One lot received shelled corn, 60 per cent tankage and minerals, all self-fed on rape pasture. A second lot was fed shelled corn, soy-bean olimeal and minerals on rape pasture while the third lot, also on rape pasture, received shelled corn, minerals and a protein mixture composed of tankage, 25 per cent, and soy-bean oilmeal, 75 per cent. Three other lots were fed the same as the three preceding ones but were kept in dry lots.

The best gains on rape were made by the lot self-fed shelled corn, soybean olimeal and meat-meal tankage. It also showed a lower feed requirement for 100 pounds gi in.

In the dry lot groups the best gain was made on a ration of shelled corn and tankage and the pigs required less feed for 100 pounds of gain.

"From the results of this experiment It appears that soy-bean oilmeal may have economic advantage when used to replace a part or all of the meat meal tankage." says John M. Evvard. the man in charge of the work, "relative price determining the procedure of course."

Jellies of excellent texture can be made from the juice of strawberries, black or red raspberries, ripe grapes sweet non-acid plums, ripe quinces, rhubarb, and other fruits, by combining this pectin sirup in the proportion of four tablespoonfuls to one cupful of the fruit juice. The practice of selling ram lambs, and lambs that have not been docked. would seem to be one of those customs that are common in other lines of business-they are the results of ignorance or carelessness. It belongs to the same custom of putting good feed into scrub animals; in wasting manure; in burning straw stacks; in leaving high-priced farm machinery out in the weather; etc., etc.

From all the evidence we can gather, the practice of trimming and docking lambs seems to be pretty well established as a money-making proposition, says the Farmer and Breeder. Prices of sheep and lambs averaged 75 per cent higher in 1923 than in 1913. Active consumer demand exists for choice quality lamb. The problem of supplying this quality will be solved if buck lambs are made into wethers and all lambs are docked, properly finished and marketed at the right ages and weights. These operations should be performed when lambs are eight to fifteen days old. There is abundant proof that they are profitable for the individual sheep producer. Trimmed lambs command higher prices and return larger profits. Conclusive evidence of this is furnished by the extension division of the college of agriculture of the University of Kentucky, which obtained records of 31,000 lambs marketed last year. This data shows that wether lambs returned more than \$2 per hundred above the price paid for buck lambs.

### Lightning Safe Fences

If fence posts are of wood or cement, to safeguard stock from lightning, either put in a steel fence post every few rods or staple heavy fence wire the entire length of post in contact with the fence wires so as to ground them. Then, if lightning strikes the fence, or a tree near the fence, the death-dealing bolt will not follow far along the fence and kill stock that may have pushed against it in a storm. Of course, if the posts are of steel they ground the wires perfectly. Wire fences fastened to buildings should be grounded at the last post or two and at buildings.

### **Different Cholera Effects**

Hog cholera affects hogs in different ways. Hogs may get cholers and die in a few hours-this is acute cholera. Hogs may get cholera and be sick for several weeks before they die; some may get well-this 's chronic cholera. When hogs get cholera they are apt to appear stiff and droopy; they will lie in the straw or weeds and not follow the rest of the herd. When forced to move they stagger and cough and have a weak, sickly squeal.

Take five pounds of ripe tomatoes, two pounds of sugar, three lemons cut into dice and one cupful of citron finely shaved. Cook until thick and seal in glasses or jars as usual.

The automobile, rapid transportation systems of various kinds, the ease of keeping in touch with the heart of the city while living in a suburb, have removed many of the disadvantages which were formerly associated with the smaller outlying communities. Large metropolitan stores now maintain delivery service for residents of the suburbs. One may have the feeling of greater freedom which comes from being not quite so crowded, and at the same time be in close touch with the city. Modern science and invention, too, have given many home conveniences which make living much more comfortable for the suburban dweller than it was some years ago. A modern development which has done much to aid in improvement around the house is the advance in the use of concrete. This building material, which is plastic and can be molded and at the same time is as enduring as stone

home improvement much easier. The suburban resident who has a plot of ground large enough to permit him to lay out garden and flower beds also finds innumerable uses for concrete. Flower boxes of this material permit him to take his flowers inside when the weather becomes too cold, but while the weather is warm he can have these plants outside in the garden. A hotbed, which is easily constructed, will give him green vegetables at an early season, when this green stuff would be very expensive in the markets. It permits him to get the maximum length of the growing season.

In connection with gardens, there are many uses of concrete which fall more or less under the decorative classification. If the garden is large enough one may want to build a garden seat, and for this purpose concrete is a superior material, for it adapts itself to many methods of treatment. By using aggregates of varying colors and casting these seats in more elaborate molds or "forms" one may obtain almost any color and effect he desires to harmonize with bis grounds.

Concrete statuary is being used A concrete bird bath helps to beautify any garden if it is made artistically; and it makes the garden a much more enjoyable place by attracting a large number of birds. Concrete posts make excellent supports for vine trellises.

Concrete garages, which are fireproof and weatherproof, afford added protection to the automobile, and they require no repairs-the first cost is the last cost. After a concrete garage is built the material takes care of itself.

Culverts of concrete insure proper drainage of a residence site at all times.

These are only a few of the uses of concrete around the home-with a little thought the average householder can find a score of other uses easily to conform with his individual needs.

### Cement Mortar Preferred for Hollow Tile Work

Hollow building tile should be set with cement mortar, composed by measure of one part portland cement to not more than three parts clean sharp sand, to which there may be added hydrated lime not exceeding 15 per cent by volume of the cement. The percentage of lime added is always figured on the quantity of the cement used; therefore, 15 per cent is equal to about one-sixth part by measure of the cement.

The lime specified is not needed to make the mortar stronger, but to make it more plastic and easier to handle. Mortar containing lime will adhere better to the tile, makes a neater job and results in a saving in labor. Too much lime must not be used, as it weakens the mortar. A straight lime mortar, however rich the mixture, is not suitable for setting hollow tile.

A sand containing a quantity of loam must not be used for cement, plastering or stucco.

Sand containing a little clay may be used if the grains are not coated.

### Special Taxes

It is advisable in purchasing property to carefully investigate the special assessment taxes and ascertain whether or not any of these have become delinquent and the property sold for taxes. and Trimmed Are Best The practice of selling ram lambs,

and lambs that have not been docked, would seem to be one of those customs that are common in other lines of business-they are the results of ignorance or carelessness. It belongs to the same custom of putting good feed into scrub animals; in wasting manure; in burning straw stacks; in leaving high-priced farm machinery

From all the evidence we can gather, the practice of trimming and docking lambs seems to be pretty well established as a money-making proposition, says the Farmer and Breeder. Prices of sheep and lambs averaged 75 per cent higher in 1923 than in 1913. Active consumer demand exists for choice quality lamb. The problem of supplying this quality will be solved if buck lambs are made into wethers and all lambs are docked. properly finished and marketed at the right ages and weights. These operations should be performed when lambs are eight to fifteen days old. There is abundant proof that they are profitable for the individual sheep producer. Trimmed lambs command higher prices and return larger profits. Conclusive evidence of this is furnished by the extension division of the college of agriculture of the University of Kentucky, which obtained records of 31,000 lambs marketed last year. This data shows that wether lambs returned more than \$2 per hundred above the price paid for buck

### Lightning Safe Fences

lambs.

If fence posts are of wood or cement, to safeguard stock from lightning, either put in a steel fence post every few rods or staple heavy fence wire the entire length of post in contact with the fence wires so as to ground them. Then, if lightning strikes the fence, or a tree near the fence, the death-dealing bolt will not follow far along the fence and kill stock that may have pushed against it in a storm. Of course, if the posts are of steel they ground the wires perfectly. Wire fences fastened to buildings should be grounded at the last post or two and at buildings.

### Different Cholera Effects

Hog cholera affects hogs in differ ent ways. Hogs may get cholera and die in a few hours-this is acute cholera. Hogs may get cholera and be sick for several weeks before they die; some may get well-this is chronic cholera. When hogs get cholera they are apt to appear stiff and droopy; they will lie in the straw or weeds and not follow the rest of the herd. When forced to move they stagger and cough and have a weak sickly squeal.
