MINERAL MIXTURES FOR STEERS PAY

During the past winter the Iowa experiment station fed a bunch of twoyear-old steers weighing around 950 pounds to see if simple mineral mixtures paid.

One lot of seven steers was fed shelled corn, linseed oilmeal, corn silage and clover hay. Another lot of seven steers received in addition to the above, one ounce per head daily of a mixture containing 49.99 pounds of high calcium limestone; 49.99 pounds of spent boneblack and .02 pound of potassium iodide. Still another lot, in addition to the standard ration, received two ounces per head daily of the famowing : high calcium limestone, 24.99 pounds; spent boneblack, 24.99 pounds; potassium iodide, .01 pound, and powdered sulphur, 50 pounds.

The mineral-fed lots showed a slightly better daily gain, approximately the same daily feed consumption and almost the same cost of 100 pounds of gain as the steers fed the check ration. The estimated selling price was 35 cents a hundred pounds more on the mineral-fed lots, making the margin per steer over feed cost after crediting hog gains at \$6.75, \$5 more than the check lot for the first lot and \$4.33 more than the check for the lot which received sulphur.

Ground soy beans and soy bean oflmeal as substitutes for linseed oilmeal were also tried out. The check ration consisted of shell corn, corn silage, clover hay and linseed oilmeal. In the test one lot received ground soy beans in the place of linseed oilmeal and the other received soy bean oilmeal. After crediting hog gains at \$6.75 a hundred the check lot showed a margin over feed cost per steer of \$3 more than the lot that received ground soy beans and \$4.43 more than the lot fed soy bean oilmeal. In the case of the ground soy beans the rate of daily gain was lower and the cost of 100 pounds of gain higher. The soy bean oilmeal lot showed practically the same daily gain and cost of 100 pounds of gain as the linzeed oilmeal group but the estimated selling price was lower. Linseed oilmeal was valued at \$45, ground soy beans at \$45 and soy bean oilment at \$50 per ton.

Soy bean hay when used to replace red clover hay produced steers that made a margin over feed cost \$4.88 less than the clover fed lot. Clover hay and soy bean hay were both val ued at \$20 a ton.

Unnecessary Expense to Grind Beans for Swine

Fattening hogs will eat whole soy beans more readily than ground soy beans, according to C. M. Vestal of Purdue university. A series of experiments just finished at the agriculture college shows that a lot of pigs fed ground beans made an average daily gain of 1.56 pounds during a 70-55 test. They ate 301 pounds a and 80 pounds of soy beans ch 100 pounds gain. A lot fed on whole soy beans made exactly the same daily gain. They ate 282 pounds of corn and 95 pounds of soy beans for each 100 pounds gain. The feed cost for 100 pounds gain was \$5.77 for the ground soy beans and \$5.82 for the whole soy beans, with corn at 70 cents a bushel, ground soy beans at \$1.50 a bushel and whole sovs at \$1.45 a bushel.

In a check experiment with three lots of hogs, the lot fed on ground soy beans made a daily gain of 1.64 pounds with a feed cost of \$6.05 per hundred pounds gain. The lot 2-d on whole soys made a gain of 1.69 pounds daily with a feed cost of \$6.09 per hundred. A third lot fed on unthreshed soy beans made an average daily gain of 1.44 pounds at s feed cost of \$6.08. These figures show that grinding beans for hogs is an unnecessary expense.







Whey Lemonade Is Quite Refreshing.

(Prepared by the United States Department] Agricultu Just as buttermilk represents what is left from cream in butter making, so whey represents what is left from milk in cheese making. Though less nutritious than buttermilk and skim milk, since it contains less protein. making bread and other cooked foods, and it is also useful in some cases as a mild laxative drink for invalids.

Whey that differs little in composition from regular cheese whey, may be made at home by cooking sweet milk with some acid material, such as vinegar, lemon juice, or cream of tartar, or even with sour milk, according to the United States Department of Agriculture. Fresh curds and whey is an old-fashioned dish still used to some extent, though less common than it was when cheese making was regularly carried on in the home.

Whey Lemonade and Punch.

1 quart whey. Slices of lemon 6 tablespoonfuls or a little gratsugar. Juice of 1 lemons. rind. nutmeg or cinnamon.

Mix, chill and serve as a beverage. Variations .-- Double the quantity of lemon juice and of sugar and add other fruit juices and a little fruit cut in small pieces. This transforms whey lemonade into whey punch. Set the punch away to chill and ripen; whey may be substituted for them in serve with crushed ice if desired. Rhubarb, pineapple, grape, currant and cherry juices lend themselves well to whey punch. A sprig of freshly crushed mint is sometimes added. Nutmeg or cinnamon will overcome any characteristic whey flavor. Whey

Mix whey and sugar and boll the mixture till it is of the consistency of strained honey. This sirup will keep indefinitely if properly bottled and is delicious for spreading on waffles or pancakes. SUDAN GRASS MAKES VALUABLE COW FEED


That sudan grass makes an acceptable substitute for alfalfa when the latter cannot be had is shown by the results of a recent feeding test with dairy cows at the Fort Hayes branch of the Kansas experiment station. Two lots of four Hoistein cows each were fed through three twenty-day periods with ten-day transition periods between each of the experimental periods. During the first twenty-day period one lot was fed alfalfa hay and the other sudan grass hay. The hays were reversed for the two lots during the second twenty-day period and again during the third period. In addition the cows received thirty pounds of kafir sllage daily and a grain mixture in proportion to their production.

When the cows were fed alfalfa hay they produced 2.8 pounds or about 13 per cent more milk than when they were fed the sudan hay. The weights of the cows showed no significant changes as a result of the change in rations. The cows seemed to prefer alfalfa to sudan as there was less waste of the alfalfa hay. Their production, however, did not fall a great deal when sudan hay was substituted for alfalfa.

Sudan grass is used a great deal as hay and pasture crop in Kansas and the southwest. It withstands a dry summer much better than most forage crops. It is a very useful emergency hay crop in the corn belt. Under Iowa conditions fifteen to twenty pounds of seed per acre are used and the crop is seeded in early June. Farmers who have no hay ground this year can make very good use of sudan grass. Yields are from one to two tons per acre.

Flies in Summer Cause

Considerable Annovance Flies cause considerable annoyance to dairy cows during the summer and not only does the irritation caused by these flies tend to lower milk production, but the restlessness of the animals is a frequent cause of inefficient milking. A good fly spray can be made from 41/2 quarts of coal tar dip, 41/2 quarts fish oil, 3 quarts coal oil, 3 quarts whale oil and 11/2 quarts oil of tar. Dissolve 3 pounds laundry soap in water, add ingredients of the spray and bring the whole up to 30 gallons with lukewarm soft water. This spray is guaranteed to keep off the flies and prevent the coats of the animals from becoming

With a portable cart, made from a half barrel with wheels attached, and a spray pump and nozzle, two men can spray 40 cows in five minutes. Thirty gallons of this mixture will spray 40 cows twice a day for ten days at a cost of one cent a cow a day.

Watch Cream Separator

to Save All Butterfat Cream separators that have not been tested for some time may be cheating their owners out of considerable butterfat every time they are used, warns C. A. Iverson, of the dairy department at Iowa State college. This is an avoidable loss which can be prevented by testing the skim milk and then regulating the separator to skim more closely.

Farmers who have the apparatus for the Babcock test can test the skim milk at home. A double-necked test bottle should be used and 20 cubic centimeters of skim milk used in stead of 17.5 cubic centimeters as in the case of whole milk. Farmers who cannot do their own testing can have it done by their local creamery or can send a four-ounce sample to the dairy section at Iowa State college. A charge of 10 cents for the resting is made by the college.






