#### TOMATO MINCEMEAT IS SOMETHING NEW

#### Carpet Yarns Are Stiffer Product Left Over at Canning Season Made Useful.

ed States Department of Agriculture. Slice up a quantity of green tomatoes and sprinkle well with salt. Put ing take equal weights of sugar and tomatoes and cook until the tomatoes are thoroughly done. To 7 pounds of the mixture of tomatoes and sugar add 3 pounds of seedless raisins, with mace and cinnamon to suit the taste. Cook a short time after adding the seasoning and put into jars. This will keep without being sealed and will make delicious pies, which many consider as good as those from ordinary mincemeat.

Another use for green tomatoes is in pickle making, in combination with cabbage, onions and green peppers, which are usually plentiful at the same time in the fall. The recipe below has been found very satisfactory. It may be made without the sugar if pre-

#### PRACTICAL HINTS ON MARKETING TURKEYS

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Turkey time's a-coming! If you

want top prices for your birds, here's a few tips from the United States Department of Agriculture:

Range fattening is more satisfactory than pen fattening, the department says. Begin fattening about three weeks or a month before marketing, and proceed gradually by feeding lightly on corn in the morning and again in the evening, a short time before the turkeys go to roost. Increase the quantity of corn fed gradually until the birds are getting all they will eat. Be careful not to feed new corn too heavily until the turkeys have become accustomed to it, to prevent digestive troubles.

Good-sized, well-matured birds in good condition for fattening can often be marketed to best advantage at Thanksgiving. Small, immature turkeys should be held until Christmas. for further fattening, but if the birds are unthrifty market them at once. Sales outlets to raisers within express shipping distance of good markets are local consumers, local buyers and dealers, more distant buyers or dealers and car-lot shippers, and receivers or commission merchants of live or dressed poultry in large cities. To determine the best available outlet study shipping charges and keep in touch with both local and distant buyers as to price. Distant buyers will mail quotations on request.

Most producers market their turkeys alive. Shipping dressed turkeys to markets is justified only when making local sales or there is an unusually favorable outlet for the dressed product. Shipping coops should be high enough to enable the birds to stand up. A coop 3 feet long, 2 feet wide and 20 Inches high will acommodate five or six turkeys. Overcrowding may result in bruising, which detracts from the market value; overcrowding may also cause death and complete loss. If the birds are on the road only a few hours, do not feed before shipping. If they are on the road a longer time water and feed liberally to prevent shrinkage in weight. Ship in time to place the turkeys on the market a day or two before the holiday. Late arrivals may reach an overstocked market, and arrival after the holiday usu-

ally means lower prices. Killing and dressing birds is simple when properly done. Hang up the turkeys by their legs and, with a single stroke, push the point of a sharp knife up through the roof of the mouth into the brain. When properly done, this operation paralyzes the bird and loosens the feathers so that they come out easily. Then sever the veins in the throat just beyond the skull for bleeding. The turkey should be dry-picked, and plucked clean. Thoroughly cool the carcass after plucking, inasmuch as failure to remove all animal heat promptly will result in early spollage. Cool either by hanging outdoors, if the temperature is between 30 and 45 degrees, or by immersing in cold running spring water or ice water.

When thoroughly chilled, the carcasses are ready for shipment. A barrel is a convenient shipping container. Place a layer of cracked ice in the bottom of the barrel, then a layer of turkeys, followed alternately by layers of ice and turkeys, and topped off with a layer of ice. Tack burlap over

the top of the barrel. If you are building up a permanent turkey business be sure to retain as many of the finest, largest, quickestgrowing young birds needed to rear the next year's flock, and send the rest to market.



Clarendon, Texas, Sept 30, 1924 othe People of Donley County:

In view of the fact that hard! week passes without a collision of motor vehicles on the public roads of Donley county I wish to call the public's attention to be following laws and regulations relating to the driving of motor vehicles:

Provisions Relating to Licens ing of Motor Vehicles

1 Every automobile or other motor vehicle must be licensed vehicles for the current year and each day's operation of an unlicensed motor vehicle is punishable by fine of not less than \$10 00 nor more than \$50 00.

OUNG PORKER WILL MAKE CHEAPER GAIN

When does a pig make its cheapest ins, and when does it sell for the ghest price per pound? This is a estion that often confronts the rmer who is raising pigs for the arket, says Prof. L. V. Starkey, chief the animal husbandry division at emson college, in discussing the arketing of hogs.

Experimental data prove beyond a ubt that the younger the pig the eaper the gains. A review of the market reveals another very inesting fact, namely, that feeder is sell for a higher price per pound in those which are ready for the ck. If we put these two ideas toher it would seem that there is re money in producing feeder pigs n there is in producing fat hogs dy for market. Of course there are ny factors, says Professor Starkey, take into consideration in producfeeder pigs. For example, fairly ge litters must be raised. If the d does not average at least six pigs litter there will be no money in it. rge litters and cheap pigs go toher.

one reason why feeder pigs are so ch in deniand is that there are so ny who do not keep a brood sow I yet they want one or two pigs to ten for pork.

The man who produces feeder pigs on a large scale must have considerable equipment. Several small lots are necessary in order that not more than two brood sows may be in a lot. Usually good results cannot be obtained by keeping several brood sows and litters together.

With the small-lot proposition there also comes the problem of fresh water. Running streams are ideal for the hogs, but hard to keep fenced. If water is piped to the lots, care must be taken so that there will be no mud wallows. Male pigs should be castrated at

from six to ten weeks of age. The younger they are castrated the less will be the shock. The best time to wean feeder pigs is when they are eight weeks of age.

The greatest demand for feeder pigs is in the fall when corn is ready to be used. At this time carlot shipments can be made.
