## WHITTLIN'

Most appropriate nickname we know is for a fellow named Hallenback.

They call him "Round-trip."

Today is the deadline for qualifying yourself to vote in elections during the next 12 months.

The big difference in the qualifying procedure this year, following elimination of the poll tax a couple of years ago, is that citizens over 60 years old have to register, the same as everyone else. In the poll tax days, and even last year, those over that age limit were not required to pay the poll tax or even to register, in counties of less than 10,000 population.

The new law does away with that method, though, and everyone must register to become an eligible voter.

This is something that has needed doing, we think. This will be a big help to election officials from the standpoint of record keeping and of knowing who's eligible to vote in what precinct.

The disadvantage is that some citizens over 60 may not realize until election time that they were supposed to register. It'll be a bad deal if we have some people (or even one person) who fail to qualify themselves because they didn't realize they were required to register.

Nice it is to learn that we have a Democrat in the race for U. S. Representative from the 18th District of Texas.

The Democratic candidate is J. R. "Dick" Brown, 41-year-old Hartley County farmer and businessman.

Brown is Democratic party chairman for the 31st Texas senatorial district and has been active in Panhandle politics. He sought the Democratic nomination for the post two years ago following Walter Rogers' decision not to seek re-election, County chairman of the district selected the Demo candidate, Dee Miller of Amarillo, who lost to Republican Bob Price, who had previously been an opponent of Rogers.

Good news about Brown to people in this area is the fact that Brown operates a farm. His farm is near Hartley. Also, he manages a farm supply and elevator business in Hartley.

This is a wonderful opportunity for us to have a representative in Congress who thinks as people here do.

Brown is, and has been active in a number of Panhandle agribusiness groups. He is on the board of directors of the High Plains Research Foundation, Texas Wheat Growers Association, and Panhandle Grain and Feed Dealers Association, and is active in Grain Sorghum Producers Association work.

People here are especially familiar with the first and last of those four organizations. Brown describes himself, appropriately enough, as "a working farmer and agri-businessman who understands first-hand the needs of the High Plains economy, and of the people whom I would represent in Congress."

That, friends, probably puts him "way ahead of Republican Bob Price."

Brown's announcement as a candidate for the office goes on to point out . . .

"He is a mechanical engineering graduate of Colorado University, a World War II Navy veteran, and is a lieutenant in the U. S. Navy Reserve. He and Mrs. Brown have three children.

"He has been Hartley County Democratic chairman for 13 years, and is active in church and civic affairs. He stated, 'I hope to bring a fresh and positive approach to government, as a farmer and businessman who works every day on a grass roots level in the vital agri-business economy of the Panhandle. I will represent all the people of the district diligently and fairly, and hope to have the opportunity to do so.'"

A nice, critical farmer told us the other day, "That Whittlin' column would be some better

## Mrs. Woltmon Dies Saturday

Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Woltmon, only Bovina resident to live to be 100 years of age, died Saturday night in Parmer County Community Hospital where she had been a patient several weeks.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Monday in the First Baptist Church of Bovina with Rev. Ken Moore, pastor, and Rev. J. B. Fowler, pastor of Bovina Methodist Church, officiating. Burial was in Bovina Cemetery under direction of Claborn Funeral Home of Bovina.

Mary Elizabeth Ball was born March 16, 1867 in Emory, Range County. She was married to the late James Wesley Woltmon in 1890.

The couple came to Floyd County in 1894. Mrs. Woltmon driving a wagon all the way. The pioneers filed on land there and lived in a half-dugout.

In 1916 they came to Bovina where they bought land between Bovina and Texico. Some time later, her home was built in town. Mr. Woldmon died in 1938.

March 16, 1967 Mrs. Woltmon celebrated her 100th birthday. A reception was given by her family in her home on March 19, when many friends visited with her, many of whom she had not seen in several years.

Mrs. Woltmon was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include three sons, A. J. of Tucumcari, C. D. and Jack, both of Bovina; two daughters, Mrs. Bessie Davies of Bovina and Mrs. W. D. Kyle of Eldorado Springs, Mo.; 19 grandchildren, and nine great-grandchildren.

At the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners last week, Bill Moore of Bovina was appointed by the court to serve as veteran's administrator for Parmer County.

Moore will handle veteran's affairs for Parmer County residents. The late judge, Loyde A. Brewer, had served as veteran's administrator for the county prior to his death.

All other business of the court was routine, with bills for the past month approved for payment, according to County Judge Archie Tarter.

This is an increase of about 600 over 1967, when 2700 persons in Parmer County registered to vote for the first time without paying a poll tax.

## Sugar Beet Growers Receive Top Awards

Two Bovina sugar beet producers, and one former Bovina farmer are among the top eight growers who have made the largest amount of sugar per acre in 1967, according to James W. Witherspoon, executive secretary of Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association, Inc.


Grady Sorley of Bovina produced 10,942 pounds of sugar per acre and ranked second in the entire association. In third place were Garners Brothers, who farm northwest of Bovina and delivered to the Friona station, with 10,819 pounds per acre. Seventh on the list was Lynn Isham of Etter, formerly of Bovina, with 8,400 pounds per acre.

Top producer was G. E. Bailey of Clovis with 11,063 pounds.

The eight sugar beet growers received awards from the Association at the annual banquet held Saturday night at Hereford.

About 550 growers and businessmen from Clovis, Bovina, Friona, Dimmitt, Dumas, Willadoro, Hereford and surrounding areas attended the event.

if you'd get off that city sales tax business."  
He was against it from that standpoint that rural people will pay just as much of the tax as will those who live in town, but the former won't have a voice in how the tax is spent.

# Great Britain, Ireland Toured By McMillans

(Editor's Note: The following is an account of Capt. and Mrs. J. M. McMillan's trip to Great Britain and Ireland in July, 1967, as sent to her parents here, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Woelfel. The McMillans are stationed in Germany and have expectations of returning to the United States this summer.)

Monday, 10 July 1967  
We arose at 2:15 this morning to start our trip to Great Britain and Ireland. We had the car packed and were on our way by 3:20. Our route took us north almost to Frankfurt, then west to Köln (Cologne), Aachen, across a corner of Holland, to Antwerp, Belgium, and on to the Atlantic coast.

Then we drove down the coastline into France through Dunkirk, immortalized in World War II, to the port in Calais. At Calais we had just a few minutes to wait before boarding the car ferry to Dover, England.

The two-hour ferry ride was quite smooth and we arrived in Dover at 4 p.m. On the way into the harbor, we had a magnificent view of the White Cliffs of Dover. Once off the boat, we went through customs, then started a leisurely, 85-mile drive to London. We stopped off in Canterbury to visit the famous Canterbury Cathedral. Next we spent a few minutes in Chatham, a quaint and pretty little town.

After a three-hour drive through the lovely English countryside, we reached London. Although we had gotten hotel reservations in advance, it took us over an hour and a half to drive across London and locate our hotel. When we were settled in our hotel (about 9:30), we walked a few blocks to the "Go-Go Grill" for dinner. Joe had calf liver and I had a hamburger steak -- both with "chips" (French - fried potatoes). Soon after dinner we made plans for tomorrow and now off to bed.

Tuesday, 11 July 1967

Our day began at 7 this morning and we had a good breakfast in our hotel. We had ham and eggs, toast and orange marmalade (which neither of us like) and tea. First thing after breakfast we bought a city map then drove around a bit to "scope out" the situation and take a few pictures including Parliament from across the Thames River.

The bit item on our agenda this morning was to see the changing of the guard at Buckingham Palace, the residence of the Queen. We went about 9:30 so Joe could get all set up on the front row for tape recording and photographing the ceremony at 11. While he took pictures and recorded from the front row, I "played the backfield" with my camera and took pictures of the bands and regiment of the Brigade of Guards as they approached the palace. The ceremony is quite a colorful display of military pageantry with the Guards wearing scarlet uniforms and tall, fuzzy black hats.

After the changing of the guard we returned to our car to find a ten-shilling (\$1.40) ticket for over-parking. We expected to have one, though, because we could not get back

within the two-hour parking limit during the ceremony.

Next we drove to see the Gipsy Moth IV, the yacht on which Sir Francis Chichester recently sailed around the world. For lunch, we found a shady spot in a dingy part of town near the docks along the Thames. Although the scenery was poor, the shade felt good on such a warm day, and the food was welcome.

Our first visit after lunch was to Westminster Abbey. Since the Coronation of William the Conqueror in 1066, the Kings and Queens of England have been crowned in Westminster Abbey. It contains the oak Coronation Chair made for Edward the First, in which every English Monarch has since been crowned. Beneath the chair is the Stone of Scone, a sandstone block used as the coronation seat of the Kings of Scotland from about the year 850. Here are located the Royal Chapel and also the famous "Poets' Corner" where many of Britain's great poets such as Browning, Chaucer, Kipling and Dickens are buried. It was almost impossible to walk around without stepping on their names and inscriptions, as most of them are buried under the floor.

We drove back to the hotel across the street from our own and got tickets for two plays, "Hello Dolly" and "The Mousetrap" for tonight and tomorrow night. Something cold to drink was the next thing on our agenda, so we walked to a "Wimpy's" near here and had a coke and a hamburger. Then we walked to the train station to look for a spoon for my collection.

We returned to the hotel about 6 p.m., dressed for the play and took a taxi to the Drury Lane Theatre to see "Hello Dolly". The interior of the theatre was quite lovely with plush velvet seats. We thoroughly enjoyed the play, a musical-comedy about a matchmaker named Dolly. About 10:30 we taxied back to the hotel and we'll soon be in bed.

Wednesday, 12 July, 1967

After breakfast this morning we drove to the Thames River for another look at Parliament from across the river. Then we drove down the river to the Tower Bridge, a very picturesque drawbridge with towers which links south and east London. The upper span of the bridge is over 150 feet high.

The traffic was very heavy and it took us such a long time to get around, that we decided to leave our car in a parking garage and take the underground subway for the rest of the day. We went to No. 10 Downing Street, the most famous house in London and the official residence of Britain's Prime Minister. At the Royal Palace of Whitehall we saw the Changing of the Royal Horse Guards. This was a shorter ceremony than the one at Buckingham Palace, but was impressive because the guards were on horseback. They also wear a much different uniform than the foot guards. One group wore scarlet tunics with white plumed helmets and the other group wore blue tunics with red plumed helmets. We also took a leisurely stroll through St. James' Park with

its lovely flowers and watched some baby ducks swimming in the pond.

For lunch we had a Wimpy hamburger then we took the underground to the Tower of London, the oldest building in London. The Tower is actually an old castle and for many years it was a royal residence and also a State prison where many famous and infamous personages were imprisoned and then executed. We toured the tower, which is largely a museum now, with an excellent collection of armor and artillery from the days of knights. Although the castle was built almost a thousand years ago, it is still well preserved. The Crown Jewels and Royal Regalia are kept and displayed there in the Wakefield Tower.

From the Tower we took the subway to Piccadilly Circus, the center of modern London, especially London at play. This is London's theatreland and at night it is ablaze with electric lights of all kinds, shapes and colors. Joe took a few pictures in the area, including the "micro-skirts" (very, very short skirts). Then we went to the British Rail Travel Center to make reservations for taking our car across the Irish Sea next week. We were disappointed to learn that all car ferries were completely booked up through September. The travel agent advised us to check with another ferry line for reservations.

So we walked to the British-Irish Steamship Company, and they too said it would be impossible for us to get a reservation. We went to the Irish Tourist Agency to see if there was any way for us to take our car across. They said that it was impossible and suggested that we rent a car when we get to Ireland. We got the details on renting a car, etc. and decided to remodel our plans tonight. We had hoped to spend a day on the Isle of Man, but when inquiring at the British European Airways, we found that it is too expensive to fly there for just one day.

From Piccadilly we went back to Westminster and picked up our car and drove to the hotel to freshen up for dinner and another play. For dinner we went back to the Go-Go Grill because they have delicious fried calf liver, and that's Joe's delight.

Later we took a taxi to the Ambassador Theatre to see "The Mousetrap". This play, written by Agatha Christie, has been playing in London for 15 years. We had good seats on the second row in the balcony and enjoyed the play. It was a "Who-dun-it?" mystery and quite a contrast to "Hello Dolly", the musical we saw last night.

Thursday, 13 July 1967

After breakfast this morning the first thing we did was take the subway to Thread Needle Street, London's Wall Street. Here we saw the Bank of England and the Royal Stock Ex-

**Street Lighting Nearly Complete**

Southwestern Public Service Company is in its final stage of converting street lights in Bovina from incandescent lighting to mercury vapor, according to Otis Huggins, manager. The final change-over involves 25 street lights, Huggins said, from the schools west toward Ridgelea Addition.

The program was started here in 1965. During 1966 no changes were made, but 27 new mercury vapor street lights were installed in the town. Huggins says the mercury

vapor lights provide more lighting for the town.

In comparing the incandescent lights to mercury vapor, Huggins says that a 292 watt incandescent light provides 4,000 lumens while a 175 watt mercury vapor gives 7,000 lumens.

Also in an effort to up-grade the system here, several old lines in downtown Bovina were removed last year clearing North Street of unsightly poles and excess lines.

taurants on several floors. This Corner House in Piccadilly has the reputation of being the largest restaurant in all of Europe. Joe had a small steak and I had fried chicken. After lunch I shopped a little while Joe took pictures of the "mini-micro" skirts and "hippies" (wired characters) who walk the streets of Piccadilly.

We took the subway from Piccadilly to Madame Tussaud's wax museum. This museum is full of figures of famous personages, past and present, ranging from queens to sports stars to murderers. Some American figures there are Presidents Johnson, Kennedy, Eisenhower and Roosevelt; Astronaut John Glenn; Cassius Clay; and Lee Harvey Oswald. The figures are grouped in interesting, and many times actual, situations.

After seeing the museum we took the subway to our hotel, freshened up a bit, ate a snack and went "to meet the Queen". Yesterday while visiting the Tower of London, we were talking with one of the Yeomen (wardens who maintain the security of the castle and wear very colorful uniforms). 



**Agent Gives Sewing Tips**

Good-looking garments made at home from durable press fabrics begin with a careful choice of patterns and adjustments in certain construction techniques, according to Parmer County Home Demonstration Agent, Cricket B. Taylor.

Observe these pointers when sewing with durable press fabrics:

Use a pattern with straight lines, a minimum number of seams, and few details. Avoid fullness in sleeves and other shaped areas because it cannot be steamed or pressed out. Mercerized cotton, nylon, polyester or "polyester core" thread may be used. Zippers, and interfacings should be pre-shrunk. Tape, interfacings and linings should have similar qualities as the garment fabric.

Avoid seam puckering by relaxing stitch tension on both spool and bobbin feed to minimize puckering.

**Cool Season Grasses Recommended By SCS**

Cool season grasses are becoming popular in Parmer County, according to the Soil Conservation Service. W. R. Broadhurst, five miles south and four miles east of Hub, planted 29 acres Tall Fescue K-31 in the fall of 1966 on Olton loam soil at the edge of a Playa lake.

Broadhurst said it is out-doing Midland Bermuda two to one and making twice the money of farming crops on this type of land. He is now in the process of preparing seedbed for 37 more acres of Tall Fescue.

A cool season grass is one that will become green and stay green during the cold months of the year. Grazing should begin about the middle of September and continue until the first of June. During the other months the grasses should not be grazed.

Cool season grasses are Western Wheat, Tall Fescue, and Smooth Brome. These grasses should be planted around September 1 or March 15. They should not be grazed for one

full growing season so the grass will become well established. They may be planted by either drilling or broadcast.

Western Wheat grass should reach a height of at least eight inches and should be grazed until it is about four inches.

Tall Fescue grass should reach a height of at least eight inches and should be grazed until it is about five inches.

Smooth Brome grass should reach a height of at least eight inches and should be grazed until it is about five inches.

Weed control can be performed by shredding or mowing. This can be done by shredding or mowing one inch above average height of growing grasses.

Chemicals such as 2,4-D can be used on weeds such as ragweed, bitterweed, sneezeweed, pigweed, dandelion and curled dock. 2,4-5-T may be used for woody plants such as wild gastic, wild onion and curled dock.

Apply 2,4-D at one-half to one pound per acre of amine or ester in late spring on grass pasture.

This should be applied when the wind velocity is less than eight mph for aerial application and less than 15 mph for ground application. Spray at moderate humidity if possible and at temperature from 70 to 80 degrees F. Dairy animals being milked should not graze sprayed foliage. They can graze re-growth.

Fertilizer may be determined by soil analysis.

Resins in some garments can cause itching. When chemicals are added to the mill to make fabrics wrinkle-resistant, excess chemicals are sometimes not properly cured and not washed out before the fabric goes to the garment manufacturer.

This excess chemical, which is a formaldehyde, causes the itching. The resin itself, if properly cured and applied, causes no problems.

Drycleaners advise washing the garment or have your dry-cleaner wet clean it if it's wet cleanable. When shopping, sniff the garment to check for tell tale formaldehyde odor.
