If you live in a small town you
get a great deal out of life that is
denied the city dweller. On the
other hand, all city folks enjoy a
blessing which most inhabitants
of small towns miss.

That is WATER—pure and
abundant. Many towns with
electric lights and the best of
paving still struggle along with
wells and pumps, or with a cen-
tral water supply that trickles
into failure just when it is need-
ed most.

The only reasons are inertia
and lack of information.

Any town of 500 inhabitants or
more—and some with less—can
have a thoroughly up to date
water supply and pay for it to a
considerable extent out of sav-
ings in the cost of fire insurance.

Aside from the luxury of clean
water, and plenty of it, it is the
one defense against fire. If your
water comes from a well, if it
comes from a pumping plant too
small for the demand, or if the
mains are inadequate you are
just as much in peril as a man
who smokes in a gasoline re-
fractory.

Incidentally, the brakes are
set on the growth of your town.

NOTICE OF ELECTION

Whereas, the City Council of the City of Hedley deems it advisable to issue bonds of the said city for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

Therefore, Be It Ordered by the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas, that an election be held on the 14th day of November, 1924, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

Shall the City Council of the City of Hedley, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of the City of Hedley, Texas, in the sum of Thirty Five Thousand and No 100 (\$35,000 00) Dollars, payable forty (40) years from the date thereof, with the option of redemption at any time after ten (10) years from their date, bearing interest at the rate of Six (6)

per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of erecting and equipping a public water works, in the City of Hedley, as authorized by Chapter 9, of the Laws of the 37th Legislature of the State of Texas and the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas "

The said election shall be held at City Hall, in the City of Hedley, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to wit: J. W. Bond, J. P. Alexander, L. A. Stroud, E. L. Bond and K. F. Keller.

The said election to be held under the provisions of Chapter 9 of the Laws of the 37th Legislature of the State of Texas and the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said city, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"For the Issuance of Bonds."

And those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"Against the Issuance of Bonds."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the mayor of the City of Hedley, attested by the city secretary of the said city, shall serve as a proper notice of said election.

The mayor is authorized and directed to cause said notice of the election to be posted up at the city hall, and at one public place in each of the voting places of the City of Hedley for at least thirty full days prior to the date of said election.

The mayor is further authorized and directed to have said notice of election published in some newspaper of general cir-

ulation published in said city, and which notice shall be published once each week for four (4) weeks, the date of first publication being not less than thirty full days prior to the date of the election.
