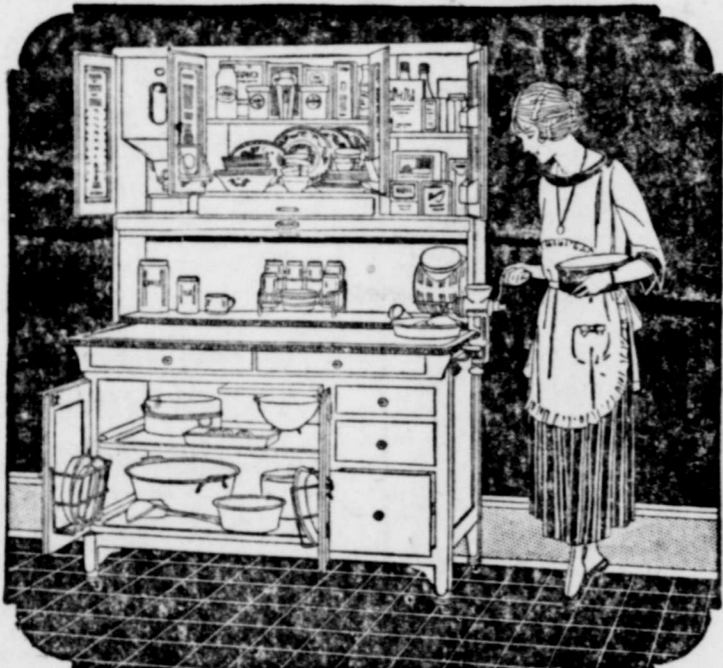

COTTON IS COMING FASTER THIS WEEK

Since our last issue cotton has been coming in at a lively rate. The average for Saturday, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday was 100 bales a day. More than 1100 bales had been weighed at the local cotton yard Wednesday night of this week.

There is still a wide divergence of opinion as to the probable receipts of the season at this place. We have heard estimates made all the way from 4000 bales to about twice that number. You take your choice. The former man places his estimate at 6500—not because he knows anything about it, but because he hopes there will be at least that many.

Last year our cotton yard receipts were above 6700 bales—a record for Hedley. Prior to that time the record receipts for one season were about 5100.

Anyway, we're hoping for an "epidemic" of pretty weather—and cotton bales.

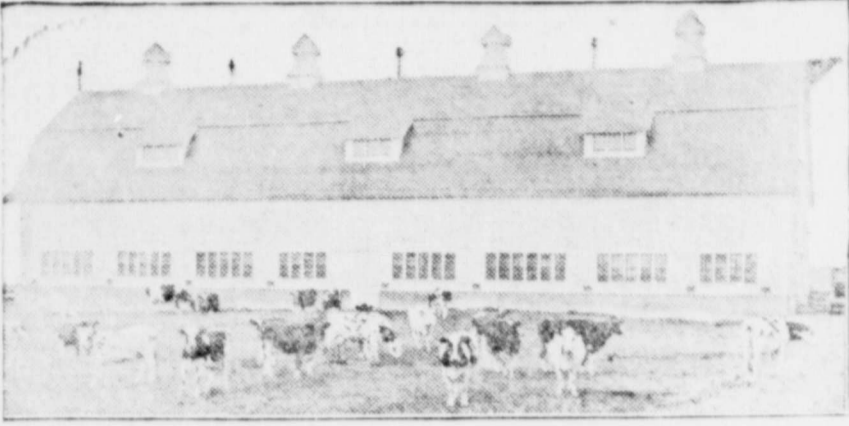

Gambrel Roof Dairy Barn Designed to Accommodate Herd of 75 Cows

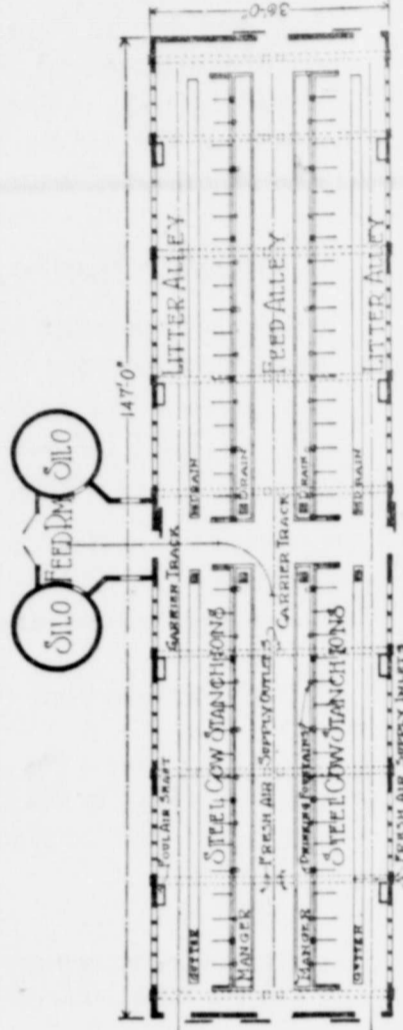

With the increasing emphasis placed on the importance of dairy farming and the growing knowledge that the dairy farmer is escaping many of the woes of the grain raiser in the past few years, has come a renewed interest in dairy buildings.

The gambrel roof dairy barn shown here was designed for a dairyman with a herd which numbered nearly seventy-five cows. It is a fine example of modern dairy barn construction.

On the first floor there are separate stalls for seventy-four cows, the stanchions being divided into four sections. Twin silos at the rear of the barn connect with the alley in the center and overhead is a carrier track which connects the barn proper with the feed room, which is between the silos.

Drinking cups are placed at each stall head and a suction ventilation system provides the animals with fresh air. In the large space in the mow is plenty of space for the storage of roughage for the number of animals the barn is designed to accommodate. The building is of frame construction with a concrete floor.



Woodwork Plays Part in Harmonious Appearance

A room is just as beautiful as its woodwork. Many a color scheme is upset by cheap, homely woodwork painted or stained a weird shade that never harmonized with anything in the house. In such instances, the housewife usually tries to cover the offending wood with wide curtains, to hide as much of its ugliness as possible, but it still insists on peering out at some vital spot and spoiling the whole setting.

For a long time, it was believed that a housewife had to keep the woodwork which a wise or otherwise builder had seen fit to bestow upon it. But the housewife of today is inclined to follow nobody's taste but her own in decorating her home, but the woodwork comes in for a renovation just as the walls do.

The housewife who can choose the woodwork for a new home without regard to cost, will, of course, choose hardwood with a waxed finish to bring out its beautiful grain. If it proves too expensive, soft wood, with the stipulation that it must be well finished.

Soft wood, when new, may be given a natural finish, which shows the grain of the wood to show through a coat of wax, or the flat varnish, which has taken the place of the old-time highly-glossed varnish. If this treatment is to be given to oak, chestnut or other open-grained woods, a coat of paste wood filler should be applied on the bare wood to fill the grain and pores and form a smooth hard surface for the finish. Close-grained woods, such as pine, cypress and birch, do not require a filler and the wax or varnish may be applied directly to the bare wood.

Good Construction Will Pay When Building House

In these days when building costs so much more than formerly it is doubly important to get one's money's worth in good substantial material that will last. It is far better to build a small house of good material and add to it later than to build a larger house of flimsy construction for the same money with cheap trimmings and material that will not last. The life of a cheaply built house is seldom more than thirty-five years; by that time the amount of repairs it has required to keep it standing is almost equal to the cost of rebuilding it. There are many houses of masonry in this country which are more than 100 years old and in Europe there are many more than 500 years. Most of these houses are giving good service today.

Good construction does not deteriorate or depreciate. Get a good concrete foundation and a good cellar wall of concrete or concrete block. When you get up to the ground level it costs very little more to carry the same construction to the roof line. A more beautiful type of house construction than good concrete block walls covered with portland cement stucco or special concrete cement faced units cannot be obtained. A wall of stucco or concrete facing does not require frequent mending and repairing.

Linoleum Will Harmonize With Plan of Decoration

Interior decorators are of late recommending linoleum as an additional means of lending harmony to the general plan of decoration.

The many hundreds of beautiful patterns and designs manufactured in this material are such that almost any general plan of decoration can be made to harmonize with the floor through the skillful handling of the many beautiful tones and shades now perfected in this material.

Linoleum, when properly laid, if of a sufficiently high grade, will last almost indefinitely and requires little or no expense for upkeep, taking about the same finish as would a finished hardwood floor. Waxing is considered the best method of treatment for linoleum, filling up the pores and bringing out the brightness of the design as well as removing the necessity for washing.

Sleeping porches, halls and kitchens have long found linoleum almost a necessity, but its entrance into other portions of the home has been of late occurrence. Today it is nothing uncommon to find in some of the most beautiful residences living rooms and dining rooms in which the floors are covered with this material.

Linoleum should never be laid except by a specialist thoroughly understanding the characteristics of the material. The additional expense required will be more than offset by the life of the material, which is greatly aided by proper and careful handling. The best method of laying is by cementing to the floor, a method which holds the linoleum in place and permits of no loosening or warping which will in time result in the cracking of the material.

Sleeping Porch Should Be Open on Three Sides

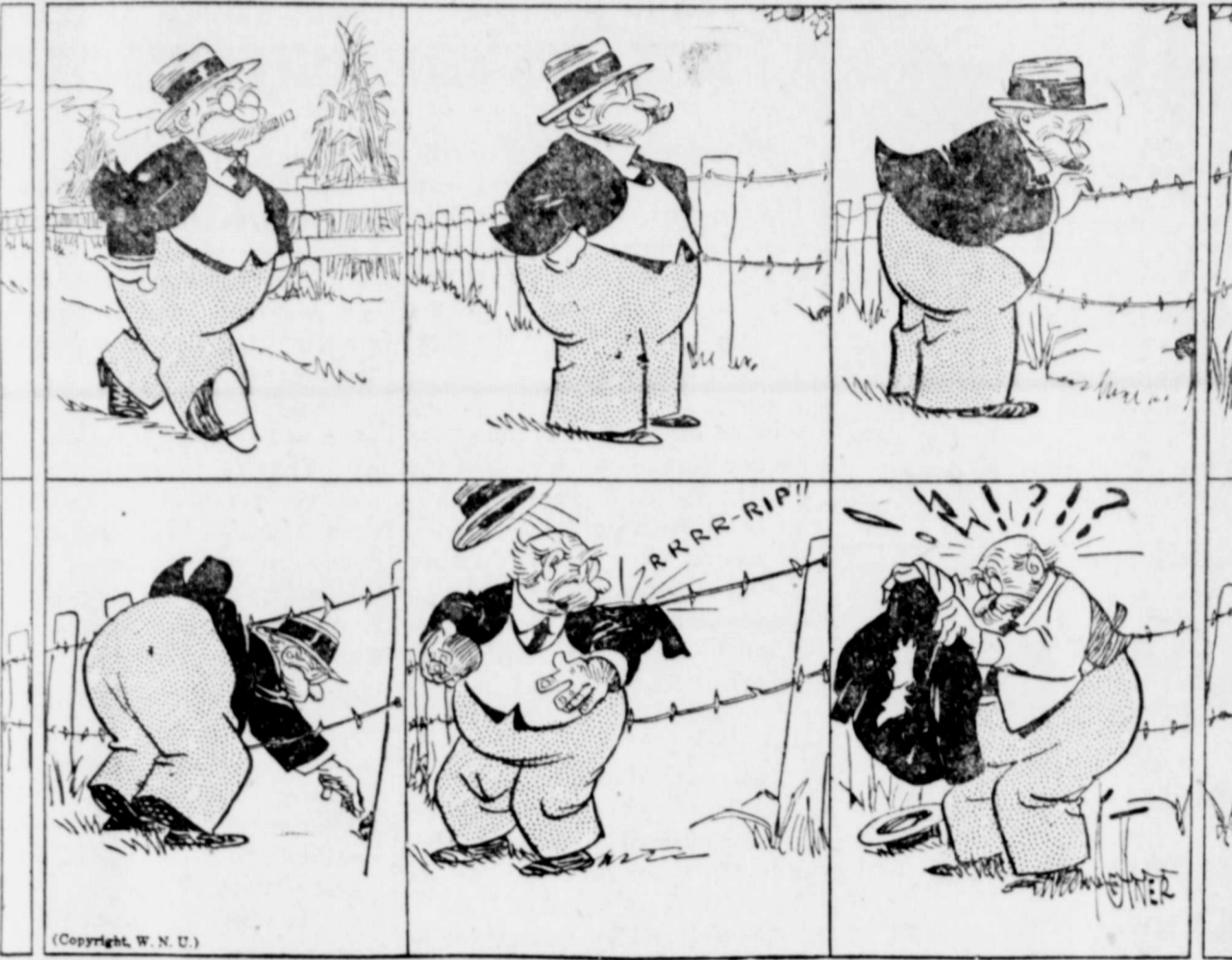
Growing interest is being manifested in the sleeping porch, that curious modification of caveman's standards, writes Estelle H. Reis in the "American Builder." Human perversity is such that if we had to be exposed to the wind and the cold and the rain we would be more than likely to rebel. But the plan has so many advantages in hardness and the sense of wellbeing that comes with out-of-doors sleeping that it has widely commended itself. Especially when all the dangers have been eliminated, as in our modern sleeping porches, is this reversion to an ancient practice worthy of continuance.

The sleeping porch should be open on three sides, but screened in summer with rustproof screens and provided with sliding windows for winter. If it is located on the second floor of the house it will have greater privacy and less possible annoyance from insects and traffic.

People who like sleeping porches have found it convenient to build one over a first story veranda. This is called a double-deck arrangement and is convenient and inexpensive to construct. Such an arrangement, extending at the side of the house in the form of a wing, may be covered by the main roof of the house and increase its apparent size.

NATHAN HALE AND ALICIA ADAMS

NATHAN HALE died just as he came of age but the fates recompensed him to some extent by allowing him to enjoy six years of love.

When Hale was a youth of fifteen, he met Alicia Adams of his own age, beautiful and clever. Nathan's brother, Enoch, also met Alicia and he, too, found her beautiful and clever.

Then something happened which threw a boulder in the path of the youthful lovers. Mamma Adams and sister Adams objected to Nathan and the long wait for his maturity and success in life...

With Ripley's death, Nathan and Alicia were again drawn towards each other. They became reunited in love and their engagement was formally announced.

The following is a rhymed letter Hale sent to Alicia when the ardor of his love found mere prose inadequate to the expression of his feelings.

"Alicia, born with striking charm, with the gift to ravish and the heart to warm! Fair is thy form, still fairer in mind, with beauty, wisdom and sweetness joined.

"Oh, friend sincere, of soul divinely great; sheddest thou for me, a wretch, the sorrowed tear—what thanks can I in this unhappy state return to you but gratitude sincere!

"Far from the seat of pleasure now I roam; the pleasing landscape now no more I see. Yet absence never shall take my thoughts from home, nor time efface my regard for thee."

DAVID LIVINGSTONE AND MARY MOFFAT

A BEAUTIFUL example of pure love was given to the world by the great explorer and missionary, David Livingstone. He married the daughter of another missionary, Mary Moffat, and the happiness of these two was ideal.

"... And now, my dearest, farewell. May God bless you. Let your affection be toward Him much more than toward me; and kept by His power and grace I hope I shall never give you cause to regret that you gave me a part.

"After eight years of married life, Livingstone could still feel inspired to send his wife this letter:

"Cape Town, May 5th, 1862.

WHAT TO EAT

AS "AN apple a day keeps the doctor away," why not vary the serving of this wholesome and abundant fruit?

Baked Apple Salad.

There are those who are not able to enjoy a fresh apple; to those this salad will appeal: Choose fine, large, juicy apples; core, quarter and peel them. Skewer them together with tooth picks. For six apples blend one tablespoonful of butter with six tablespoonfuls of sugar, and a dusting of cinnamon. In each cavity place a lit-

tle of this mixture. Place the apples in a baking dish with a cupful of water and cook them until tender, but not broken. Cool and chill. Serve the quarters on a bed of lettuce or cress, sprinkle with chopped nuts, and serve with mayonnaise to which a generous amount of whipped cream has been added.

New York Conserve. Take one pound of raisins, two pounds of tart cherries, three oranges—juice and rind—and four pounds of sugar. Chop the fruit, add the sugar and boil twenty minutes, or until thick and jelly-like. Seal in small airtight jars. The little half-pint glass jars are so convenient for a small family, as the amount they hold may be used quickly and is always fresh.

SPANISH VOGUE IN SHAWLS; WEARABLE TYPES IN COATS

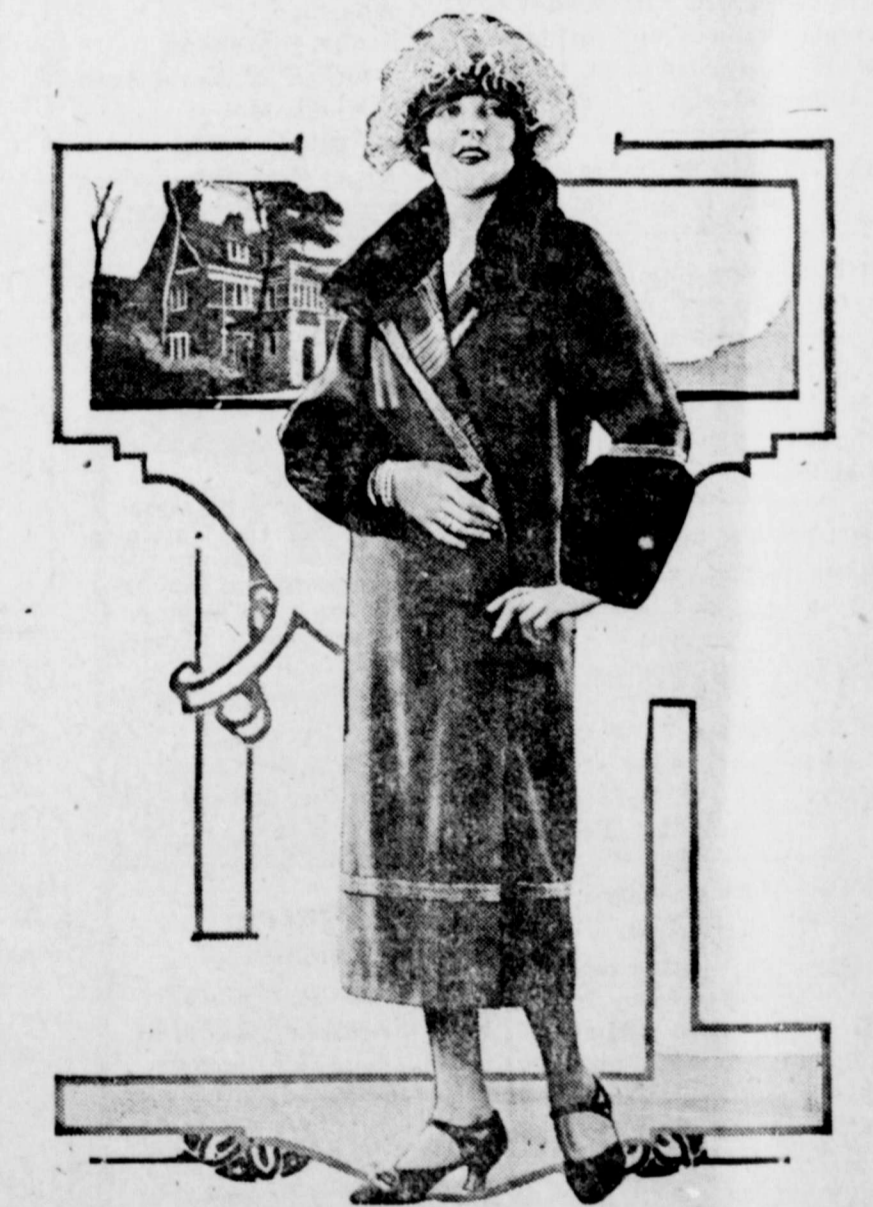

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OUR SCHOOL NEWS

"A COTTON TALE"

(From the Third Grade)

The cotton plant does not grow
in the North. The weather is
too cold. It likes the sun and
heat. In the sunny South it is
warm, and we find great fields
of cotton.

In the Spring the cotton seeds
are planted in long rows. The
warm sunshine and April rain
soon make the seeds grow.

The cotton plant grows about
four feet high. The leaves are
shaped like a maple leaf. They
are dark green in color.

A cotton field in bloom looks
like a great rose garden. Each
flower looks like a single holly-
hock. The first day the blossoms
are a light yellow; on the second
day they turn pink or red; on
the third day they fall off.

Now a little seed pod is formed
in place of the blossom. It is
called a cotton boll. There are
many cotton bolls on one stalk.
Cotton bolls are three, four and
five sided. The bolls are green
all Summer. Day by day they
grow larger and in Autumn the
bolls turn brown and burst open.
Let us peep into the opening
bolls. They are filled with fluffy
white cotton. It looks like snow.
Now the field does not look like a
rose garden. It is a great field
of snowball bushes, all coming in
bloom.

As the cotton pickers pick the
fluffy white cotton out of the hard
brown shells, they put it into
bags. When the bags are full
they empty it into baskets, and
wagons carry it to the gins.

Let us look at a handful of cot-
ton. See, there are little hard
lumps in it! What can they be?
Let us try to pull the cotton
apart and find out what the
bumps are. How hard it is to
pull it apart! Oh, those hard
bumps are cotton seeds! Mother
Nature has been careful to wrap
up the seeds to keep them safe
and warm. These seeds are
grayish brown in color; they are
about the size of a small bean.

People do not take the seeds
out of cotton by hand, as they
used to do. The cotton is taken
from the fields to the gins. The
machine here quickly separates
the cotton from the seeds.

The cotton is pressed into
bales, then the bales are wrapped
into coarse cloth and fastened
with iron bands.

After the bales reach the fac-
tory, they are undone and the
cotton is pulled out and made
loose and fluffy. And then it is
twisted into small ropes and
spun into thread. The threads
are woven into cloth.
