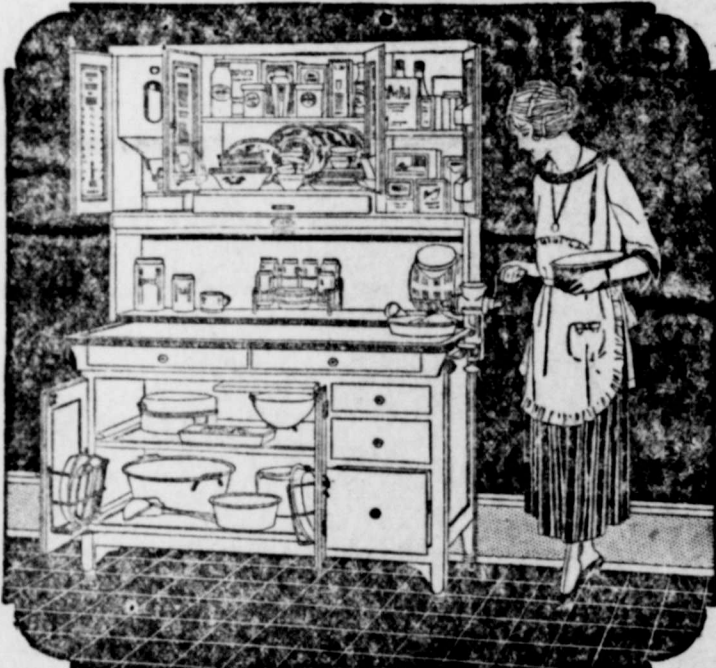

HESS HOTEL BURNS TUESDAY AFTERNOON

Quite a lot of excitement was caused Tuesday afternoon when cries of "Fire" were heard and it was learned that the Hess Hotel was in flames.

The building, which was one of the landmarks here, situated on the Highway, three doors west of the postoffice, was almost completely enveloped by the time a crowd had gathered. Some furniture was carried out, but the greater part of it went up in smoke.

The Square Deal Garage, next door on the east, was quickly emptied of cars and portable equipment, but its strong walls and a favorable wind saved it—and perhaps saved the entire business section of town.

The R. H. Jones residence, on the next corner west of the hotel, had a close call. The wind was blowing toward it, and only by hard work on the part of several men and boys was it kept sufficiently soaked to prevent catching fire.

The hotel was owned by W. C. Hess, and the furniture and fixtures belonged to J. W. Swinney. Both carried some insurance, but of course are heavy losers in the fire.

We have not learned the cause of the blaze, nor do we know what plans, if any, are being made toward rebuilding.

WINSOME CLOTHES FOR GIRLS; SMALL BUT BRILLIANT HATS

HOW GREAT MEN MAKE LOVE

AS REVEALED BY THEIR LOVE LETTERS

AARON BURR AND THEODOSIA PREVOST

AARON BURR, who achieved political fame, was vice president of the United States, and later became an execrated name in American history through his slaying of Alexander Hamilton in a duel he forced upon him, was a devoted lover and fond father. The woman he married was a widow with two children, not beautiful and ten years his senior. Why he married her is still a puzzle, for he was a rising man and could have had his pick of eligible society beauties. Theodosia Prevost, widow of a British officer, was, however, a very cultured woman, and this probably fascinated Burr, who was himself a keen lover of the arts.

The following very prosy letter Burr sent his fiancée a short time before they were married:

"... I confess I have still some transient distrusts that you set too little value on your own life and comfort. Remember it is not yours alone, but your letters shall convince me. I waive the subject. I am not certain I shall be regularly punctual in writing to you in this manner every day when I get at business, but I shall, if possible, devote a quarter of an hour a day to you. In return I demand one-half an hour of each day from you; more I forbid, unless on special occasions. This half hour is to be mine, and to be invariably at the same time and for that purpose fixed at the hour least liable to interruption and as you shall find most convenient. . . the children shall have their sheet and at the given hour write, if but a single word. Burr, at this hour, is to be a kind of watchword."

That Theodosia did not live up to these instructions, is evident from another letter after their marriage:

"I have lived three days upon the letters I expected this evening, and behold, the stage has arrived without a line from you. I have been through the rain and dark and mud, hunting up every passenger to catechize them for letters and I can scarce yet believe I am so totally forgotten."

At the age of twenty, when Burr was aide to General Putnam and garrisoned in New York, he had his first love affair. The lady was Margaret Moncrieffe, aged fifteen, developed beyond her years, beautiful, passionate and a vamp in the modern sense. Margaret was the daughter of Major Moncrieffe, stationed with the English troops at Staten Island. Fearing for the safety of his daughter, who was with him, the major sent a soldier with a flag of truce to General Putnam, begging him to take care of Margaret. Putnam was Moncrieffe's enemy officially, but to Moncrieffe the father he was a friend and he gladly consented to act as Margaret's guardian. Margaret was sent to Putnam forthwith and the general placed her with his family, who showed her every kindness.

While with the Putnams, Burr fell in love with Margaret and she presumably with him. But one day Burr discovered the English girl painting a bouquet of flowers. This was an occupation usually with girls of culture, but Burr, coupling this with the fact that Margaret seemed very fond of watching the maneuvers of ships in the bay with a telescope, got the idea that she was painting a message to the enemy in the language of flowers.

Burr was a lover but he was also a prudent man. He told of his suspicions to Washington, who had the girl removed to a place where she could do no damage and held her virtually a prisoner of war. That was the end of Aaron Burr's first love.

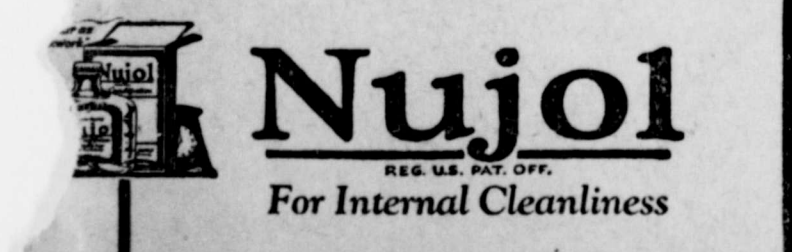

OBITUARY

Bro. J. W. Quisenberry was born Jan. 15, 1851, at Cobb, Kentucky; departed this life Nov. 27, 1924, at Hedley, Texas.

He was converted at the age of fifteen, and united with the Missionary Baptist Church, and lived a consecrated Christian life until the day of his death.

Bro. Quisenberry was afflicted for the last two or three years of his life, being confined to his bed and room most of that time, until just a few weeks before his death he submitted to two operations, which caused him to remain in the Baptist Sanitarium at Dallas for several days. On returning home, he realized the end was near and quietly talked matters over with his devoted wife and family, telling them of his assurance of a future life where he would be free from pain and suffering.

The remarkable thing about this noble Christian character was the noticeable fact that while he was nearing the end, and being fully conscious of this fact, he did not dwell on his severe afflictions, but delighted in reading good religious books, and more especially the Bible, which was the Book of all books with him.

Bro. Quisenberry was married at Brownwood, Texas, to Mrs. Florence Burleson on Dec. 23, 1891. To this union there were born seven children, six of whom survive, three girls and three boys, one little son having died in infancy.

The funeral services were con-

ducted in the First Baptist Church, of which Bro. Quisenberry was for several years a devoted member.

He leaves to mourn his death a devoted wife, six loyal children and a host of friends.

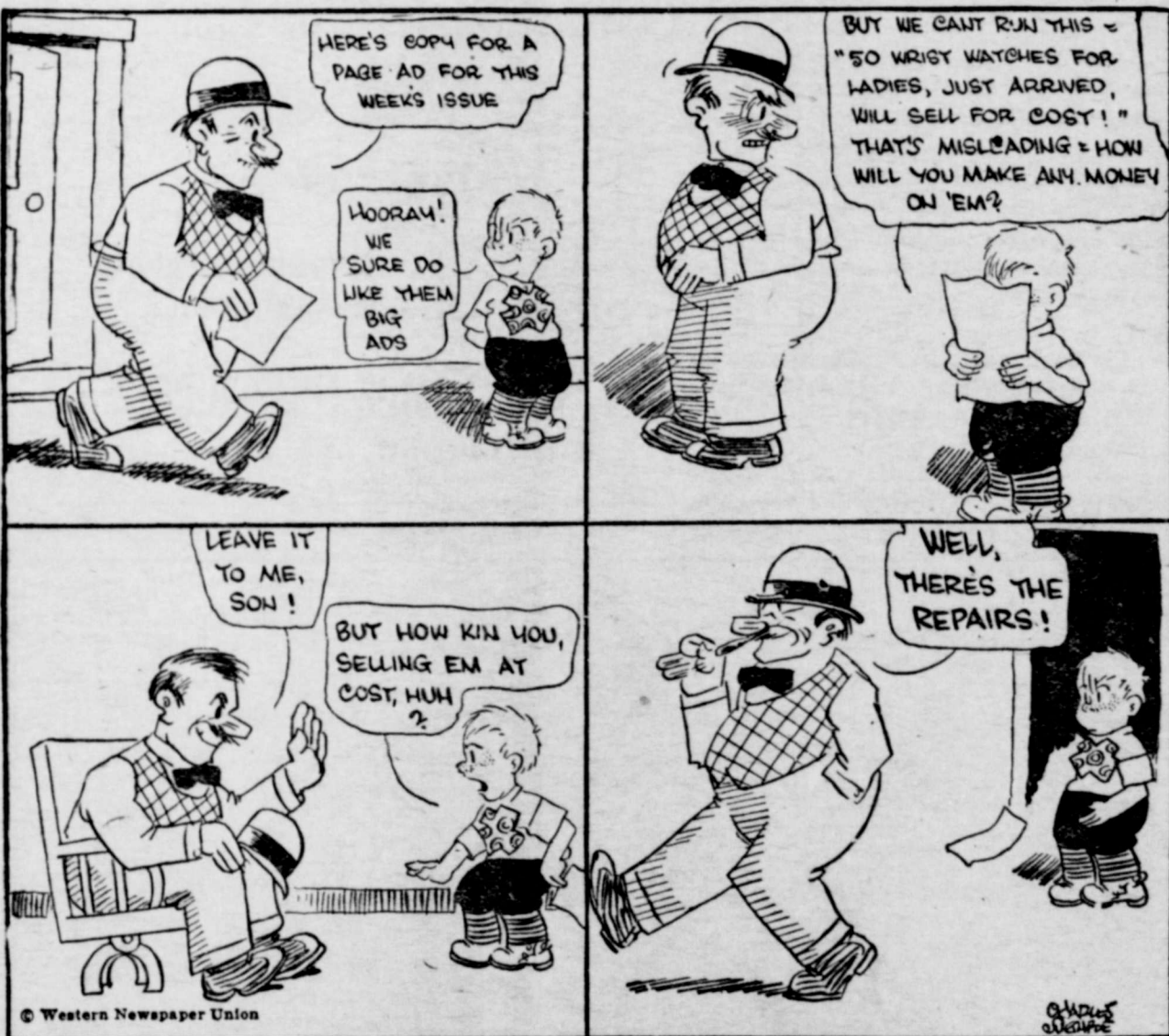

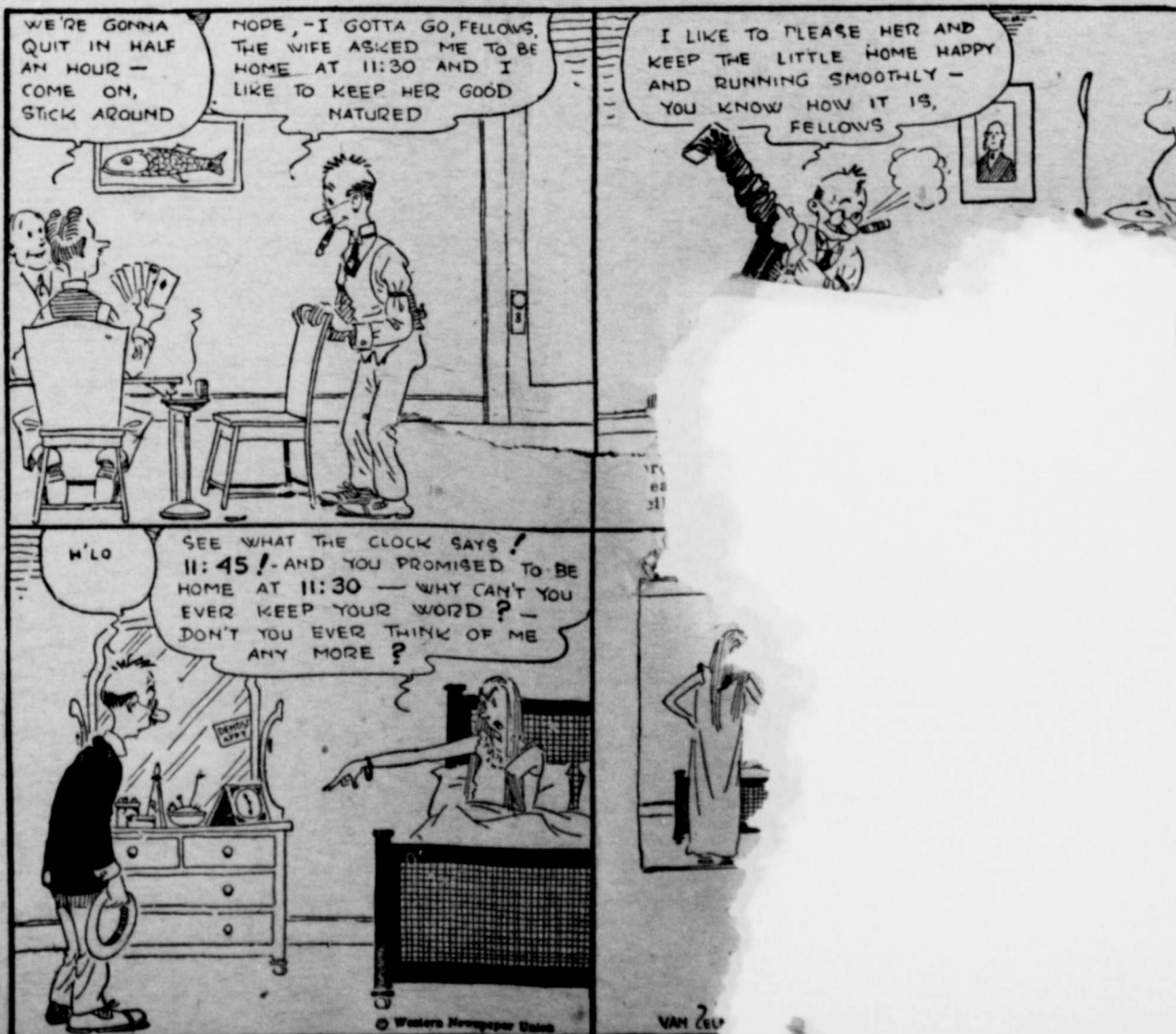

Among the various villages the youngsters can be seen hanging up in their cradles in the trees. They get no attention until "lunch" time. They seldom cry, for they have learned that tears are of no avail. However, when they are taken from their cradle after the first year they are allowed to shed one or two on account of "homesickness."

A Hint for Housewives

Rich Preserves

Before the invention of self-sealing glass jars there was no way of keeping fruits so they were made by the "pound for pound" rule given below. Many of these preserves were very delicious though too rich to take the place of fresh fruits in the daily diet. They are particularly nice to serve with hot muffins or biscuits.

Weigh the fruit carefully and allow an equal weight of Diamond Star Sugar. Dissolve the sugar in water, allowing one cup of water to four of sugar. Bring this syrup to a boil and drop the fruit in gradually. Cook gently until the fruit is soft and the syrup thick and rich. Berries should be cooked whole, but peaches, quinces and the larger fruits should be sliced. Cook very gently so that the fruit will not go to pieces. These rich preserves do not require sealed jars but may be kept in stone jars, cups or jelly glasses. Any kind of fruit may be put up in this way.

"A special form of cookery is the making of preserves, jams, jellies, etc., and in these sugar in thick, heavy solution not only adds to the palatability and character of the flavor, but it also acts as a preservative. On the contrary, thin solutions of sugar alone or with fruit juices, etc., are very readily subject to decomposition by micro-organisms. Hence, in order that it may act as a preservative, a solution of sugar must be concentrated."

This is another evidence of the fact that good health is nothing but common sense. Keep your surroundings clean and neat and you will lead a healthier and a happier life than you will if you live in the midst of dirt and confusion.
