#### AARON BURR AND THEO. DOSIA PREVOST

A ARON BURR, who achieved politi-cal fame, was vice president of the United States, and later became an execrated name in American history through his slaying of Alexander Hamilton in a duel he forced upon him, was a devoted lover and fond father. The woman he married was a widow with two children, not beautiful and ten years his senior. Why he married ner is still a puzzle, for he was a rising man and could have had his pick of eligible society beauties. Theodosia Prevost, widow of a British officer, was, however, a very cultured woman, and this probably fascinated Burr, who was himself a keen lover of the arts. The following very prosey letter Burr sent his fiancee a short time before they were married:

. . I confess I have still some transient distrusts that you set too little value on your own life and comfort. Remember it is not yours alone, but your letters shall convince me. I waive the subject. I am not certain I shall be regularly punctual in writing to you in this manner every day when I get at business, but I shall, if possible, devote a quarter of an hour a day to you. In return I demand onehalf an hour of each day from you; more I forbid, unless on special occasions. This half hour is to be mine, to be invariably at the same time and for that purpose fixed at the hour least liable to interruption and as you shall find most convenient . . . the children shall have their sheet and at the given hour write, if but a single word. Burr, at this hour, is to be a kind of watchword."

That Theodosia did not live up to these instructions, is evident from another letter after their marriage:

"I have lived three days upon the letters I expected this evening, and behold, the stage has arrived without a line from you. I have been through the rain and dark and mud, hunting up every passenger to catechize them for letters and I can scarce yet believe



### BLIVE STOCKE

#### SEPARATED MILK IS VALUABLE FOR PIGS

The Michigan experiment station has recently reported an interesting experiment in growing pigs on corn and water as compared to corn and separated milk. Two pigs that got milk gained 221 pounds each in five months. Those on corn and water gained only 9.5.

At the end of five months the milkfed pigs were marketed and the two stunted pigs put in separate pens. Pig No. 4 got shelled corn, water and a good mineral mixture. Pig No. 3 got corn and separated milk and though he only weighed 43 pounds at seven months old he weighed 350 pounds at a year old; a gain of 307 pounds. Number 4 gained only 28 pounds, weighing 76 pounds at one year. Then No. 3 was marketed and No. 4 got separated milk and corn for five months. At the end of this time he had gained 274 pounds, weighing 350 pounds, showing that separated milk can bring out even a stunted pig to make good gains. The gains with separated milk cost 6.7 cents per pound, with skim milk at 35 cents per 100 pounds. Gains without milk cost 19.7 to 39 cents per pound.

Although separated milk contains valuable mineral matter this was evidently not what was lacking in the corn. The main deficiency was in protein and in the growth-promoting vitamines, both of which were supplied\_ abundantly by the separated milk. Many people try to feed pigs on corn alone, while others who have dairy cows separate the milk and throw the skimmed milk away. Both are making a serious mistake. If separated mfik is not avallable one should use alfalfa pasture, tankage or some other protein supplement along with corn.

Some will say that they get better results on corn alone than were obtained by the Michigan station. This is probably true where pigs are getting some grass or weeds to supply them with mineral matter and vitamines and with some of the supplementary proteins. The main thing to remember is that corn is not a complete feed for growing animals.

Separated milk should be considered as a supplementary feed, not as a complete feed in itself. Where fed in moderate quantities, two or three pounds of separated milk may take the place of one pound of corn. In large amounts count eight or ten pounds of milk equal to one pound of corn. A good rule is to count 100 pounds of separated milk worth half the price of corn per bushel.-Charles I. Bray, Colorado Agricultural College

#### Worm-Free Pigs Bring Top Prices on Market

Hog raisers of Clay county, Nebraska, have built more than 1,000 movable hog houses during the past two years, according to reports to the United States Department of Agriculture, in order to keep their herds on clean ground and prevent roundworm infestation. Farmers of the county became interested in hog-lot sanitation in 1922, when the county agricultural agent arranged with two hog raisers to carry on demonstrations of the method and the results obtained by following the system. The litters which were farrowed and kept on clean pastures were in both cases much more thrifty than those kept in old, infested quarters. In one case, where 35 litters were farrowed in clean quarters and kept on clean pasture, 228 pigs were weaned without a runt. These pigs topped the market in six months, when they averaged 185 pounds each. Litters on the same farm which were kept in old hog lats soon developed runts. A farmers' automobile tour was organized to visit the demonstrations and a number of individual visits were also made by farmers from all parts of the county. The economic advantage of hog-lot sanitation was so evident that farmers throughout the county are successfully following the practice or are building movable hog houses and completing other arrangements to adopt the sys-





#### DAIRY BULL NEEDS EXTRA GOOD CARE

A little special care should be used in the feeding and general management of the dairy herd sire. In order to maintain his stamina and potency to the fullest degree. In the case of the mature bull this necessitates keeping him in tirst-class condition as to flesh, but not overfat. Either fatness or thinness in flesh works against the maintenance of his best breeding condition and one is to be avoided as much as the other.

There should be an abundance of roughage in the dairy bull's ration. Clover hay and alfalfa are especially good; he may safely have all of either of these forages that he will consume. Corn stover and oats straw also are good feeds for the bull, though lower in nutritive values than the leguminous havs.

One of the main special requirements of the grain ration is that it be not too abundant; it is better to depend upon the forages for maintaining the animal's weight as much as possible. Many good dairymen give the herd sire the same grain ration as the cows receive, except less of it. The bull's grain needs will vary a great deal according to his size and physical condition, of course, though if he is getting plenty of good hay in addition, especially if it is clover or alfalfa, he will not need more than from four to eight pounds of grain daily. Shorts, bran and oats are particularly good concentrates to use in the grain portion of the bull's ration.

Here is a ration for mature bulls which has the sanction of usage on many farms: Three parts each of cornmeal, ground oats and wheat bran, and one part linseed meal. If desired, hominy may be substituted for the cornmeal.

Until he reaches serviceable age there is no better feed for the young bull than grass, and he should be allowed to make as much of his growth on it as possible. On this feed he will build up the right kind of flesh, and along with it will develop vigor protein to supply the rapidly growing body.

While careful attention needs to be given the bull's ration, proper feeding alone will not maintain the most desirable physical condition. Regular exercise is quite as important in preserving his vigor and potency.

### **Encouraging Favorable**

Market for Veal Calves

Here is something dairymen should encourage as a means of making a more favorable market for their veal calves: Meat experts of the federal government say that the practice of shipping veal without removing the hide or skin has many advantages, They explain that yeal which does not have the skin removed until it reaches the retailer, which may be from five to ten days or longer after slaughter, still retains its "bloom" and the light pink color most desired by customers. The protective covering supplied by nature keeps the flesh from turning dark. Packers in New York and Chicago are now generally following the practice of selling veal with the skin on. This could be practiced to advantage locally where veal calves are killed for meat on the farm or in
