Hemp is being grown in the United States in larger quantities than ever before, according to a report on the hemp industry by the Department of Agriculture. Production will reach about 2,600 tons this year. About 1,000 tons of hemp was grown in the United States in 1924 and the 1923 crop approximated only 500 tons. About 90 per cent of all American hemp is grown in Wisconsin. However, our industries use approximately 10,00 tons of hemp annually. Most of this hemp is imported from Italy.

#### SHEEP KILL WEEDS AND MAKE PROFIT

Sheep are first-class weed killers. They sat over eighty known species of weeds, and although not as good brush eaters as goats, can clean up light brush land in a very few years. Sheep can use profitably a lot of waste feed around the farm, They pick over stubble fields, make good use of beet tops and are often used to keep down grass and weeds on irrigation ditches and around fences or in orchards. Lambs make an ideal source of meat supply for summer use for people who live some distance from market and do not have a supply of fresh meat. Families that could not well dispose of even a small carcass of veal in warm weather can easily dispose of a small lamb carcass. #### Alfalta Gaining Favor Among Horse Breeders


Should Be Given Grain Pigs at weating time should be getting all the grain they will eat. The ration should include tankage or skim milk. With a good pasture to run on the pigs should be coming right along and getting a good start for market weight. Pigs that are do-Ing well should make a pound a day


gain in weight. Self-feeders are a convenient means for feeding corn and tankage, and the use of self-feeders results in as good and often better gains than the hand-feeding method. Look the self-feeders over before you need to start using them to be sure they are in good working order. A self-feeder should keep the feed dry, insure that feed is before the pigs at all times, and prevent waste by leakage or too free running of feed.

#### Crowd the Fall Pigs

Wall pigs will make as satisfactory growth and development as spring pigs if farrowed early, started right and fed a properly balanced ration. They should be farrowed in worm-free quarters and have access to pasture as late as possible in the winter. They should be vaccinated at eight weeks old, and wenned when ten weeks old. They should be crowded as rapidly as possible from the time they begin to eat. After weaning they should have one third pound of tankage daily.

inds of houses as there are different kinds of people. Everyone has his own idea of just how his house should look and how the rooms should be arranged. But when it comes to making the actual plans expert knowledge is required and a good way to handle nearly fulfills your idea and then have whatever small alterations are needed to perfect it made by an expert.

Among small houses the bungalow appears to enjoy a perennial popularity and bungalow floor plans seem to follow less conventional lines than the danger from overeating alfalfa. those of the average two-story smal A second precaution now taken by house. In the latter the room arin many houses, but in the bungalow the rooms are most freely shifted around. This fits right in with the plans of the person who has decidedly individual ideas and by referring to the plan of the house pictured here carried out.

This is a frame bungalow with the wide siding which is so popular in present-day homes. . Across the entire front is a terrace type of porch with a covered portion just in front of the entrance. The house sits low on its foundation with the side walls carried down to the grade line. The front roof expanse is broken by two small ornamental ventilating windows. Flanking the front door are French doors opening into the living room and library, the extensive expanse of glass making the front unusually light and, when opened up in summer, airy,

The front door opens into the living room which is unusually large for a small house, 21 feet by 17 feet. At one end of this room is a large fireplace with built-in bookcases at one side of it. At the other side, and over the bookcases, are windows. At the rear of the room a wide, open doorway connects with the dining room. A smaller door opens into the central hall and at the end opposite the fireplace there is another wide doorway which can be closed when occasion

Not many small homes can boast of a separate library, but it is a library to which the last mentioned door gives access. This is a room 15 feet by 14 feet. There are French doors it the front and at the side two broad windows beneath which a window seat has been provided. At either side of the windows are built-in bookcases and these can easily be extended on the other walls of the room if re-

#### Keep Dairy Cows Clean

and Watch Milk Supply The use of milk as a food has increased from 42 gallons per capita ir 1918 to more than 54 gallons in 1924. This is due very largely to public appreciation of the food value of dairy products and a growing conviction that they are produced and kept under sanitary conditions. The greater the demand, the better will be the price. A clean milk supply is essential if the demand for dairy products is to be increased.

During the winter when cows are stabled part or all of the time, additional attention is required to produce clean milk. Most of the dirt that gets into milk comes from the cow's body. Manure or chaff on the hind quarters or on the udders of cows falls into highway engineer. the milk pail during milking. The strainer will remove the coarser porincrease the bacterial count, and injure the keeping quality.

Plenty of clean bedding will help greatly to keep the cows clean and will add still more to the ease of keeping the cows and their milk clean. The clipped regions can be wiped with damp cloth just before milking.

Careful attention given to these factors which contribute to cleaner and better milk will be reflected in greater demand and continued good or better prices. The farmer as well as the dairyman should be concerned about

#### Dairymen Giving Little Feed Get Small Returns

#### Effect of Highways on Cost of Driving Motors

When you drive a motor vehicle down the roadway it may be costing you all the way from seven cents to seventy cents a mile, depending on the size, load, make and condition of the machine, the kind of tire used and the road over which you drive. Data on the actual cost of motor transportation is given fully in a bulletin of the Iowa engineering experiment station as worked out by T. R. Agg.

The most valuable results contained in the bulletin are those for tions only. The manure and dirt motor trucks, since a wide variety of which go into solution taint the milk. these were available and accurate cost records were kept. Several passenger cars were also studied. A composite car cost exactly 8.49 cents per mile to operate over all kinds of Iowa clipping the hair on flanks and udders roads. Professor Agg says that there is a growing tendency to place the cost of highway construction upon the motorist, and this will make a considerable increase in actual transportation This is largely offset, however, by the fact that it costs a great deal more to drive over a dirt road. poorly surfaced and graded, than it does over a smooth paved highway. There is from one to three cents a mile difference between dirt roads and good pavement for ordinary passenger

#### Limestone Dust Road Is

#### Under Test in Missouri

A road a mile long made of limestone dust in Clay county, Missouri, fs a new departure in roadmaking and is being watched with more than usual interest. The state did not build a road through Nashua, seven miles northwest of Liberty, but turned west just before reaching Nashua, in going north. However, the state and Clay county have made a road through the town of limestone screenings which is put down to a thickness of six inches and made smooth and solid at the time it is placed on the road. Twentytwo carloads of screenings from Nebo Hill quarry, south of Liberty, were shipped to Nashua and the Clay county engineer, with his road crew, leveled and packed the screenings so the road is hard now. The test of material is being watched carefully as the cost is lower and the road seems durable. The expense was 17 cents per square yard, while other material, full ration of skim milk until they are according to the county engineer, costs around \$1.50 per square yard. Heavy trucks are being driven over this road every day and, although purely an experiment, it is holding up in good shape.

#### Rubber Roads Are Good That rubber roads are entirely prac-
