



MUTTON AND SAUCES

MUTTON is one of our most wholesome meats and would be far more popular with every one if the skin were carefully removed before cooking. The wooly flavor which is so objectionable is found in the skin. One of the important things to remember when serving lamb or mutton is that it should be served piping hot, as the fat hardens so quickly that it leaves an unpleasant taste on the

Broil lamb chops until well cooked. gravy and current jelly, When cool cover with a thick white sauce to which a spoonful of chopped ham has been added, with the proper seasoning; cool, dip into egg and crumbs and fry in deep fat just before serving. Keep hot in the oven. French chops are best served this way.

Casserole of Rice and Mutton.

Line a mold, slightly greased. with steamed rice. Fill the center with two cupfuls of finely-chopped cooked mutton, highly seasoned with salt, pepper, cayenne, celery salt. onion juice and lemon juice; then add one-fourth of a cupful of cracker

Cover the most with the rice. Cover the meat with the rice; cover the rice with a buttered paper to keep out the moisture while steaming. Steam 45 minutes. Serve unmolded on a platter surrounded with tomato sauce.

Roast Saddle of Mutton.

A saddle of mutton is the loin cut off in one piece; it is considered one of the favorite roasting pieces. Sprinkle the meat with salt and pepper, place in a baking pan on a rack and dredge with floor. Bake in a hot oven, basting frequently and allow ten or fifteen minutes to the pound. depending upon how it is to be served. Mutton may be served rare, but lamb never. Serve with a brown


The leg of mutton is roasted in the same way. In making the gravy allow two tablespoonfuls of fat for each cupful of gravy served. Pour off all the fat and measure the desired amount, adding two tablespoonfuls of fat to three of flour, cook until wellbrowned, then add one cupful of water or broth to the portions of flour and fat, Season with salt and pepper and add one glass of current jelly to the gravy bowl.





Highway Material Tests Being Made at College

At the request of the state highway commission, a small temporary wooden barracks has been built behind the Engineering building of the University of Wisconsin to be used as a highway testing laboratory. Tests of various highway materials are now being carried out by the university and the commission.

Samples of road material are tested in the laboratory for straight compression and for cross binding strength. Some of the tests are made on roads under construction in order that the mixture may be of the proper consistency. The sample is put in a frame along the edge of the road and then tested on the roadbeds. The result is later examined in the labora-

Roadbed samples are also tested during regular intervals of varied periods of days or weeks, and some are put away to be tested after a year or

Good Road Notes

Experiments are being conducted by the Illinois state highway department to determine what is the best grass mixture to grow along the shoulders of the state aid roads. Several different mixtures have been worked out, and a number of experimental strips several hundred feet long are being seeded for study and observation.

Seven and one-half million dollars will be spent on roads in national parks during the next three years, Steven Mather, director of national parks for the United States government, told members of the Motor Car Dealers' association of Los Angeles. A comprehensive picture of national park development was drawn by Mather and his assistant, A. E. Demarary, for the automobile men.

The real good that a good roads movement can do will never be realized to the full until China has been persuaded to accept the idea.

Road improvements in 16 states of the South will cost \$40,000,-000 this year. North Carolina is developing one of the finest highways in the country-a hard-surfaced road running from Wilson to Jacksonville a distance of 165 miles. SEPARATOR CARE QUITE IMPORTANT

Separating butterfat from the rest of the milk in a cream separator is a delicate process and lack of attention. to details, which may seem unimportant, often causes considerable fat to a commendable job in making a machine that will skim as accurately as does the modern separator when it is properly handled, and it should be ! given the sort of care that a high-class product deserves, he said.

Feed Tags Are Serious

Menage to Dairy Stock "The cow's death was due to a punctured stomach caused by a piece of wire taken in with the feed."

Altogether, one meets such items in the dairy papers too often. And, too often it is the good cows and the bulls that die in that way. If one has examined the contents of a cow's stomach, he will be surprised that more do not die from the same cause. Nails, wire, pieces of glass, screws and pins are not uncommon.

Every sack of feed that is sold must carry a license tag and in many cases these tags are attached with a bookshaped wire that is economical from the feedman's view and dangerous for

In opening and emptying the sacks, it is sometimes easy for the tags to become detached and they at once fall this was due to the low mineral matinto the feed where they are lost in ter as ash content of such feeds. the mixing. The hook has a sharp point and a round loop. This gives it a shape that is particularly vicious in a cow's stomach and is often fatal. For that reason, it is best to remove the tag and hook before the bag of feed is opened so there is no chance for it to the usual feeding rations. work off in the handling. Under any conditions, it is imperative that one use the utmost care to prevent loss from this cause.

Care at Calving Time The cow that has just calved should receive no feed for the first 24 hours -unless it be a bran mash. Many successful dairymen offer only a bucket of slightly warmed water during the first day. Feeding should be gradually increased over a week's time, and if the cow is a heavy pro ducer, she should not be on a full ration for two or three weeks. Better underfeed than overfeed at this time, Light laxative feeds will also tend to prevent swollen udders and loss of appetite. Wheat pasture or wet beet pulp are valuable feeds for that purpose. Silage containing much grain should not be fed at calving time.

Keep Out Bacteria

The udder and teats become contaminated when cows lie down. The movements of the udder during the milking process cause the particles of dirt to become loosened and fall into the milk. By keeping the udder and flanks well brushed, much of the loose hair and dirt are removed. In one trial the average number of bacteria in milk before the udder and flank were wiped with a damp cloth, was 7,058 bacteria per cubic centimeter. After being wiped the number was reduced to 716 or a decrease due to wiping of 6,342.

Professor Curtis suggests that one pound of cottonseed meal be used with five pounds of hulls or more to start with. Gradually increase this amount of cottonseed meal during a 30-day period until each animal is getting one pound of the meal to each 100 pounds of live weight. This can easily be figured out and the increase made gradually about two or three times each week until the full amount is being fed. Steers should be fed twice each day and the troughs kept clean and sweet.

Science of Animal Feed

Promises Some Changes

In addition to the question of vitamins, there is still another recent discovery in the science of animal feeding which promises to bring about just as radical changes in our feed practices. It has been known for many years that the feeding of cereal grains and other substances low in mineral matter or ash was not only uneconomical but in many cases was dangerous. Very little thought was given to this question, but of late years the conclusion has been reached by the leading nutrition experts that Practically all grains and carbonhydrate feeds are low in mineral matter or ash, while the protein feeds are unusually rich in them. This accounts for the fact that protein feeds have met with such universal success in

Corn Meal Found to Be

Satisfactory for Calf Corn meal has been found to be a satisfactory grain to use in raising skim-milk calves. 

More Texas Cotton Mills.



Unless all indications are wrong, Texas will build a number of cotton mills in 1926. Texas cotton mills have steadily been making money. There is more capital in the state with which to

build than ever before. There is less farm indebtedness. Money is seeking profitable investment, and farm loans can not absorb all the idle capital It will almost be forced to go into manufacturing. A good start for 1926 was made on January 7, when a number of capitalists met at Center Point to study the feasibility of erecting a cotton mill there. Center Point is a place in Kerr County of less than 1,000 population, but it is on the Guadalupe River and has plenty of water power to operate the \$1,000,000 mill that is contemplated. Texas should invest at least \$10,000,000 in cotton mills in 1926 and in all probability it will do so.

Texas Wool Enriches the East.

Texas produces more wool and mohair than any other state in the union, but all of it is sent east to be manufactured. The state once had two woolen mills-one at New Braunfels and one at Waco-but for some reason their operation was discontinued. That was many years ago, when Texans had an idea that factories could not be made profitable in Texas. The woolen mills in the state quit business more because there was no one interested enough and enthusiastic enough to keep them running than because they did not pay. The principal owner of the Waco mills often talked to this writer about the 20 and 25 per cent profits that were being made, but he was temperamental and nervous and when he became tired of the work there was no one interested enough to take his Men with money reasoned that banks could make as large dividends as mills and without so much effort, so why worry with factories? "Let the East have ther and sell us our goods." But times are changing, and Texas should be manufacturing Texas wool.

Texas Grapefruit Best.

If you eat grapefruit and have tried that grown in the Rio Grande Valley of Texas in comparison with the California and Florida fruit, you know that the Texas grapefruit is by far the best. Grocers all know this and yet they buy and sell about as much California and Florida grapefruit as ers appear to give any special preference to the Texas product-they buy whatever is offered them and more with regard to the looks than the Every Texas grapefruit should have "Texas" stamped on it. and consumers should insist on getting the home products. If we are going to build up Texas we should use Texas products, especially when they are as good as those grown elsewhere. . . .

Oil Fields Spreading.

There was some oil development around Corsicana, but not enough to interest many people. Where is "the" oil field of Texas now? It can't be definitely located in any part of the state, for it seems to be just any where in Texas that capital decides to go down in search of oil. The development of gas is going right along with oil. Gas is being produced faster than capital can be found to confine and pipe it for use of fuel. Geologists say that Texas has hardly started on the production of oil and gas and that there are riches beneath the surface of the soil hardly yet dream-
