



The fire started when sparks from the pit where burrs were being burned were blown by a 65-mile-per-hour wind onto the cotton that was waiting to be ginned.

Do Something

Bovina property owners are standing in the way of progress.

Down through the years the alleys in Bovina have had little use aside from being used as a route by which trash could be hauled away. However, the time is fast approaching when they will be put to a more productive use.

The long-awaited sewer system is coming!

Because of that lack of use, many residents have let some of the alleys become conjested with barns, chicken houses, fences, and other things that have no business being in an alley in the first place.

City officials, we understand, have talked to various property owners about these obstacles in the alleys and the owners agreed that the stuff should be moved. But, they seem to think in some cases the city should be out the expense of moving it.

City officials feel that since the city was not responsible for the things setting in the alley in the first place that it shouldn't have to be responsible for getting it out. And they are right.

We have to make a way for the sewer system that is going to get started not later than 60 days from now. There will probably be better feelings on the subject all the way around if the individuals will take care of their own alleys.

Because if the city has to do the moving, and is is hoped that it won't, it is very probable that not as much care will be taken by whoever the city employees to do as would be done by the individual to whom the nearby property belongs.

Enough hard work was done by the city officials in getting the sewer system idea over. Let's don't let it ball up over blocked alleys.

Land Board To Accept **Application Requests**

Earl Rudder, Commissioner of the General Land Office, announceed from Austin that the Veterans' Land Board would accept requests for application forms to purchase land through the veteran's land program beginning October 31, 1955. Rudder stressed that all requests must be by mail. Requests received before October 31, 1955, will not be honored, and will be returned.

Rudder continued that the requests received the five-day period of the first week, beginning Monday, October 31, will be placed in a locked box, and then be drawn and numbered. A limited number will be mailed application forms immediately. The remainder will be notified of their relative position. After that first week, requests for application forms will be numbered consecutively as received.

Rudder cautioned veterans on the following matters:

(1) Old application forms will not be honored since entirely new forms have been written under the amended Veterans Land Act. These application forms can be obtained by written request to the Veterans' Land Board ONLY.

(2) The veteran should not send checks or cash with the request for application forms.

(3) The veteran's request must clearly set out his mailing address. (4) The veteran should have the tract selected which he wishes to purchase before requesting application forms a's veterans will have only 30 days from the date the forms are mailed from the Veterans' Land Board to complete and return them.

Rudder concluded his announcement saying, "This system which we will use is designed to eliminate accumulation of paper work, enable the veteran and seller to conduct their business promptly, and to secure efficient utilization of the Veterans' Land Board personnel."





More Modern Than Mistletoe



The Christmas turkey is growing plumper every day, and there's a new crispness in the air that fairly shouts the holidays are on their way. Sleigh bells will soon be jingling on the roof tops, and already Mother is scurrying around making gay Christmas decorations to dress up the house for Santa's annual visit.

dress up the house for Santa's annual visit. She may take her cue from the magic of snow by using sparkling white foam plastic in all its varied shapes. This versatile decorative material can be easily made into eye-catching centerpieces, door-pieces, tree ornaments and many other things that reflect all the gaiety and joyousness of the holiday season. Perhaps she'll make a Kissing Ball like the one shown. It's so easy to do, and fun besides. Just take a plain snowball of plastic foam, about 6 inches in diameter, and cover it very lightly with glue. Use one of the special plastic foam glues available in all variety stores. To add sparkle, sprinkle with glitter in green or silver and allow to dry for a few minutes. Then tap the ball sharply to remove excess glitter. Cut two pieces of red satin ribbon. ½ inch wide, each long

glitter. Cut two pieces of red satin ribbon, ½ inch wide, each long enough to go completely around the ball; fasten in place with straight pins so that the ball is quartered.

Pin star sequins in place at random over the ball. Gummed paper stars may be used if sequins are not available. At the bottom of the ball fasten a few sprigs of prepared princess pine or mistletoe.

Finally, insert a bit of pipe cleaner bent to form a loop at center top of the ball, and attach to this a length of ribbon for a hanger. Make a separate bow of the ribbon and attach at top of ball to cover pipe cleaner and add the finishing touch. Hang the finished King Ball from a ceiling light fixture or in a doorway or archway to spark the Christmas fun.
