





Texas Schools in Politics.

Now that Dean L. H. Hubbard has been elected to the presidency of the College of Industrial Arts, it is hoped by all who are interested in the success of the College that he may be allowed to form plans and work them

out. The College of Industrial Arts, like most other Texas schools. has been used in the past too much to serve the political purposes of the politicians. No man can really succeed at the head of a great school and feel forced to play politics to secure the funds with which to maintain it or to retain his position. No teacher can do good work unless he is measurably independent of politics. There are those who contend that any teacher with enough personality to attract at-tention to himself in Texas is always in danger of becoming a political target, and that tenure of position is safe only for the unknown or those who lack individuality enough to attract attention to themselves, that political automatons, and not men of real brain force are desired in the schools. Of course that statement is rather too broad, but the fact that it is repeatedly heard makes one think there may be some truth in it.

Universities Should Be Self-Governing. There is no reason why a state university or college should be, in fact, lominated by boards of regents, boards of control, legislative committees and others with the power at any time to cripple its activities. As a rule those who compose political official families know very little about school matters and controlling boards know but little more about such things. They may be ever so com; etent in other things, good business men, anxious to promote the interests of the institutions they serve, but in the nature of things they can't go closely into a study of edu-cational needs and so they become mere figure-heads as board members. School faculties are composed of persons who devote their lives to a study of school problems, whereas boards are composed of business men who de-

vote only a few days a year for a brief number of years to such studies. Legislative committees know even less about school requirements in a great state like Texas, and governros with the power of veto can give little time to the thousands of diversified school problems. Whatever educational probems need board supervision should have the control of boards of the fac-ulty, and the president of an institution alone should be authorized to veto the action of the faculty, to which







In the house shown here the entrance is a distinct asset. The exterior as a whole is plain, though not too plain, and it is the effective entrance which gives it its greatest charm. This is well set off by the walls of wide shingles, the plain brick chimney and the good proportions of the building as a whole.

This entrance admits us to an interior which is typical of the modern colonial home. There is a central reception and stair hall with a passage leading back to a rear hall which gives access to the basement stairs, the kitchen, a first-floor lavatory and the rear entrance.

From the reception hall, doors at either side open into the living room and dining room. The former is large. 15 feet by 231/2 feet, and occupies the entire end of the house. It is lighted by windows in three walls and at the side is the broad fireplace which is indicated by the chimney on the outside.

Wind Brings Cold Into House; Close Cracks

Wind velocity, experimenters have found, has as great an effect on house heating as does temperature, and that, roughly speaking, one mile of additional wind velocity an hour has the same effect as one degree lower temperature. To combat this builders suggest that weather strips on windows and doors prevent losses due to the necessary cracks around these openings. Improvement at small cost of eaves and in attic spaces to prevent wind losses is also recommended. Smaller fuel bills, it is pointed out, and smaller heating plants pay for the slight additional cost of construction.

for Unsound Teeth Return to food conditions much more primitive than those at present in vogue will be necessary if the ravages of dental diseases are to be checked. This is the lesson derived by Dr. T. D. Campbell of Adelaide university, Australia, from an exhaustive examination of teeth and jaws of Australian aborigines which he finds are strikingly large, well formed and healthy.

"There is in every respect," Doctor Campbell says, "a very marked difference between the well-formed Australian dentition, and the ill-formed, disease-stricken masticatory outfit with which modern civilized peoples are burdened."

The marked immunity from dental disease among the aboriginal children and grown-ups, he attributed to the coarse, tough food which formed their diet and the crude methods of preparation and cooking.







Unknown to History

The first case of a human ruminant reported in a scientific journal was that of Robert Gill, a cobbler of Dorsetshire, whose death was reported in the British Annual Register under date of October 1, 1767.

In ancient times and in the Middle ages men who chewed the cud were apparently very far from rare, but modern science would be prone to dismiss such tales were they not supported by evidence of more recent time. Roger Gill died after suffering "great tortures" due to the loss of his strange faculty.

Gill usually began his second chewing a quarter or half an bour, sometimes later, after dinner, when every morsel came up successively sweeter and sweeter to the taste. The chewing continued about an hour or more, and sometimes would leave him for a little while, "in which case he would be sick at his stomach." Historic London Church

The Church of St. Michael, one of Wren's churches, which has just been reopened after extensive renovations, is one of the most historic churches in London. It is built on the site of that erected by Dick Whittington, and in which he was buried, but the original was so entirely wiped out in the great fire that no trace of Sir Richard Whittington's grave now remains. The renovation scheme included the painting of the walls and ceiling, and the moving of the heavy altar railing forward to form a choir screen. The representations of Moses and Aaron found in all Wren's churches are in this case exquisite statues which formerly stood on pedestals beside the altar. They have now been accommodated in niches in the walls some few feet above their original location.
