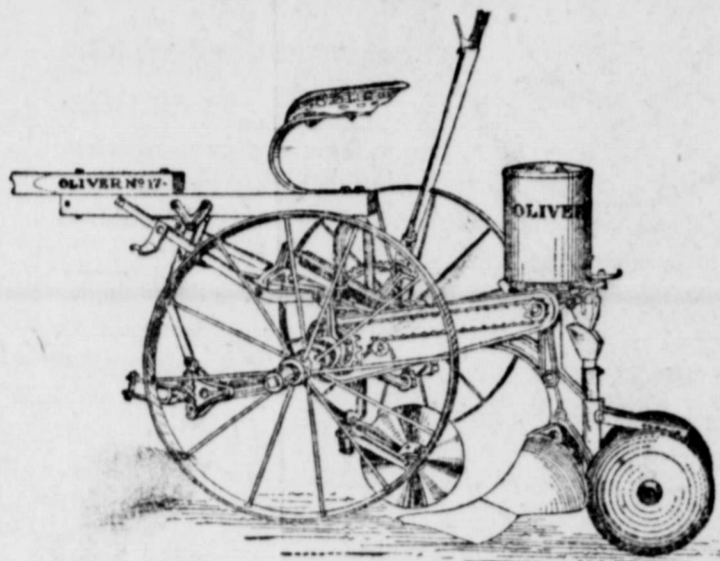

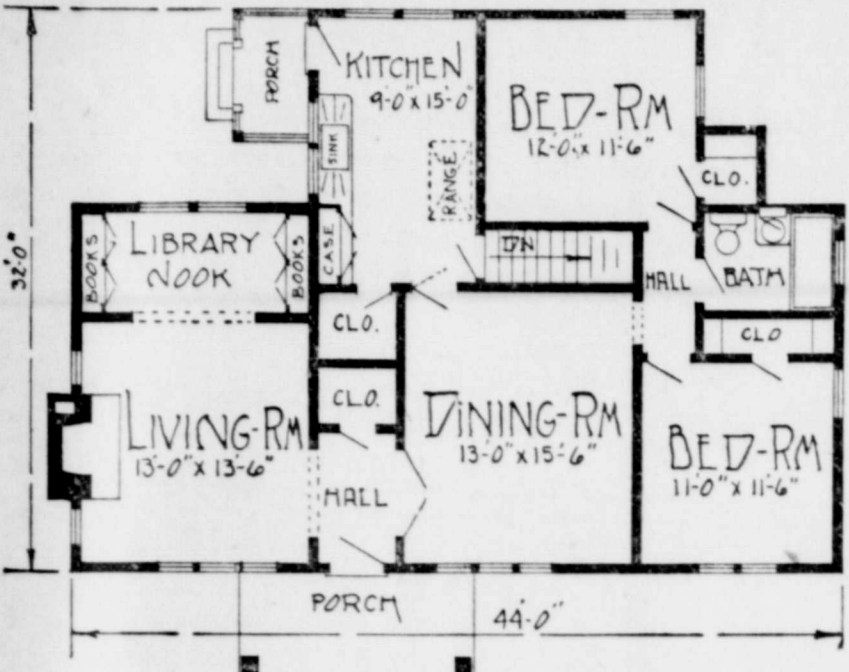
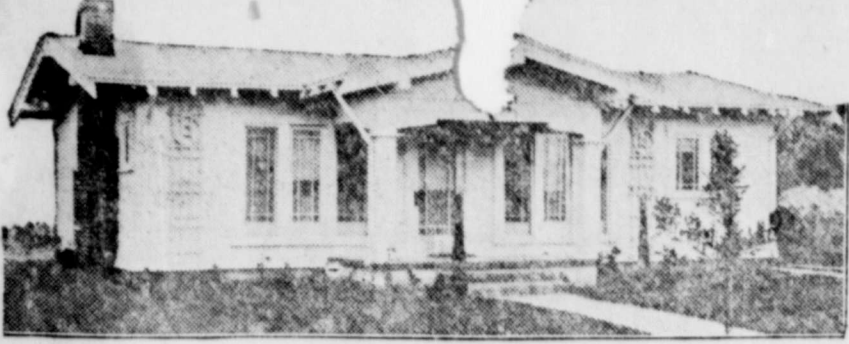

The wide, shallow lot presents a problem in house design which is peculiarly its own. In any home design the front of the house is of the utmost importance, but here the front is of proportionately greater consequence because of its greater expanse and the relatively small side expanse. The eye of the observer is focused almost exclusively on the front of the house.

Because of this fact the front should be especially attractive and well balanced, a failure to maintain balance will spoil the entire effect. This does not mean, however, that the entrance must be placed exactly in the center and that both sides of the center must be identical. Balance has been obtained in the house illustrated here without doing either of these things, and thereby it has avoided any effect of stiffness or formality.

The entrance, with its porch, has been placed somewhat to the left of center. It is flanked on either side by a group of three French windows which, in turn, are flanked by ornamental trellises. At the right there are, beyond the trellis, two small windows. At the left there is no room for these but the chimney, projecting from this end of the house, maintains the balance.

This house is low in effect, the roof having little pitch and the side walls being carried down almost to the grade line. It is finished in clapboard, and the ornamentation is simple, being limited to the trellises already

mentioned, the exposed rafter ends, French windows and a simple well-designed entrance. The porch is of the low open style, approached by three steps, and from it one enters into a small reception hall, at the end of which, facing the entrance, is a coat closet.

To the left, the entire space is occupied by the living room with its library nook. This is in reality one large room with one end partially partitioned, but with a great arched doorway almost its entire width. At each end of this nook there are built-in bookcases and it forms a retreat where one may partially withdraw from whatever may be going on in the living room, to read or work, undisturbed. The remainder of the living room is nearly square and has a large fireplace at one side.

To the right of the reception hall is the dining room. This is somewhat smaller than the living room, but sufficiently large for any demand which may be placed upon it. From it there are two other doors, one opening into the kitchen, at the rear, the other into a small hallway still farther to the right.

The kitchen is small, compact and carefully arranged to lighten the necessary housework. It has a large closet which may be used as a pantry, is equipped with built-in cupboards and accessories and opens onto a service porch at the rear. From it there is a stairway leading to the basement.

Off of the interior hall there are two bedrooms and the bathroom. These two bedrooms, placed in the corners of the house, are of about equal size and are well lighted and ventilated by windows on two sides. Each has a large closet and each is convenient to the bathroom which is placed between them.

An Artistic Feature
That Is Easily Added

There is little that makes a house more pretentious or increases its size in appearance than connecting pergolas and lattice work.

Since old-fashioned porches have been tabooed the present buildings have the inclination to appear cramped and lacking in freedom which the old rambling porches created. The old effect can be restored and enhanced by a pergola. This may be taken care of in the original plan, but always is easily added to any home without the least disturbance to the building.

The one principle to be acknowledged is its connection with the house, so it should harmonize both in structure and color of the house in most instances.

Here, too, the suggestion for single pergolas cannot be too strongly emphasized.

For too many years have gone by in which home owners have not realized that it was possible to build a single post pergola and have it as striking and effective as any double pergola, and the cost is little more than half.

The top work of the single pergola can be made as wide as six or seven feet, with benches between the posts, which give the same seating possibilities as the double pergolas. Also little garden entrances are generally considered as being necessarily double, but instead these can be a very small, artistic arrangement of two posts with a light top over them.

Paint Masonry

A masonry house with a stone or brick exterior needs no painting on its wall surfaces and the painting which is one of the heaviest items in a home-keeper's upkeep expense, is greatly reduced because only the wood trim on the exterior has to be painted, and that frequently.

Cheerfulness and Good
Lighting Go Together

Lighting fixtures of good character and design are as important to the home apartment as fine furniture or draperies.

Beautifully decorated walls, furniture or furnishings cannot show up to their proper advantage with poor illumination. Poor illumination means nothing else but lighting fixtures totally inadequate to the needs of the room.

Modern, artistic, efficient, lighting fixtures improve the appearance of the living room and dining room and add to the joys of the home, as well as providing comfort for the eyes.

The architect and builder will find the proper atmosphere in his rooms when the correct lighting fixtures are installed. In order to obtain this result, the lighting fixtures must harmonize with the general appearance of the respective rooms, and be finished accordingly.

The selection of lighting fixtures must be planned well in advance, so as to give the manufacturer sufficient time in which to obtain the proper materials which are co-ordinated with fine taste, careful work and attention to the smallest detail.

Box Gutter on Cornice

Apt to Leak at Nails

Leakage from nail holes is almost invariably encountered when a box gutter is built over the cornice. The width of the gutter lining may be ample to extend up the roof a distance that will force the water over the cornice cap before it can enter the building. However, there is no fascia board there to start the shingles with a front elevation, hence the use of plastering lath, which are generally secured in a lineup, by a nail at each end and one in the center driven through the lath on down through the metal into the sheathing.

Pastor McCauley is a man with a very liberal education and general information. He can make his sermons intensely interesting to his hearers. 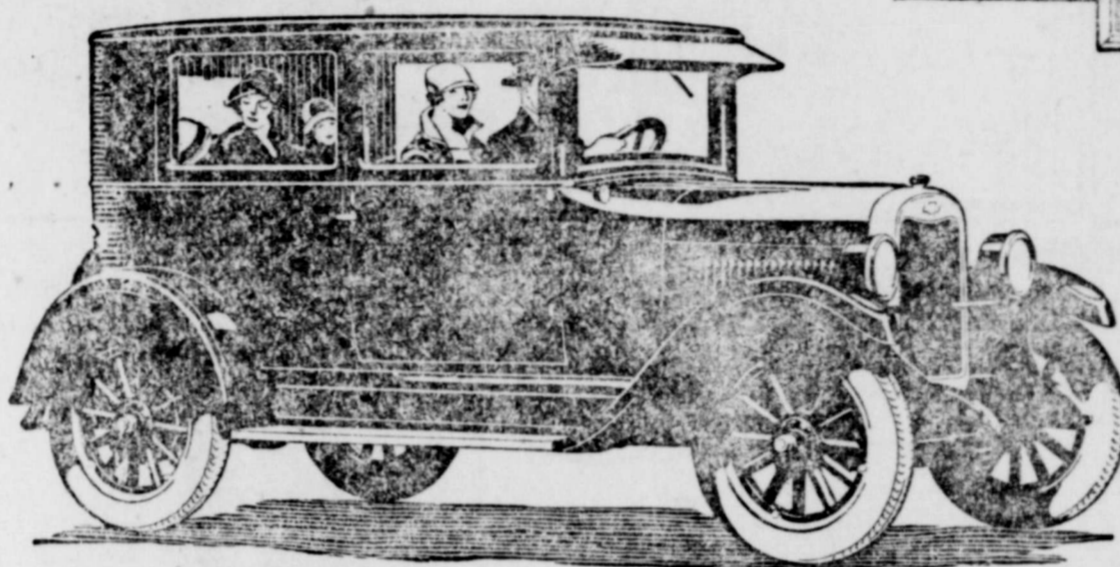

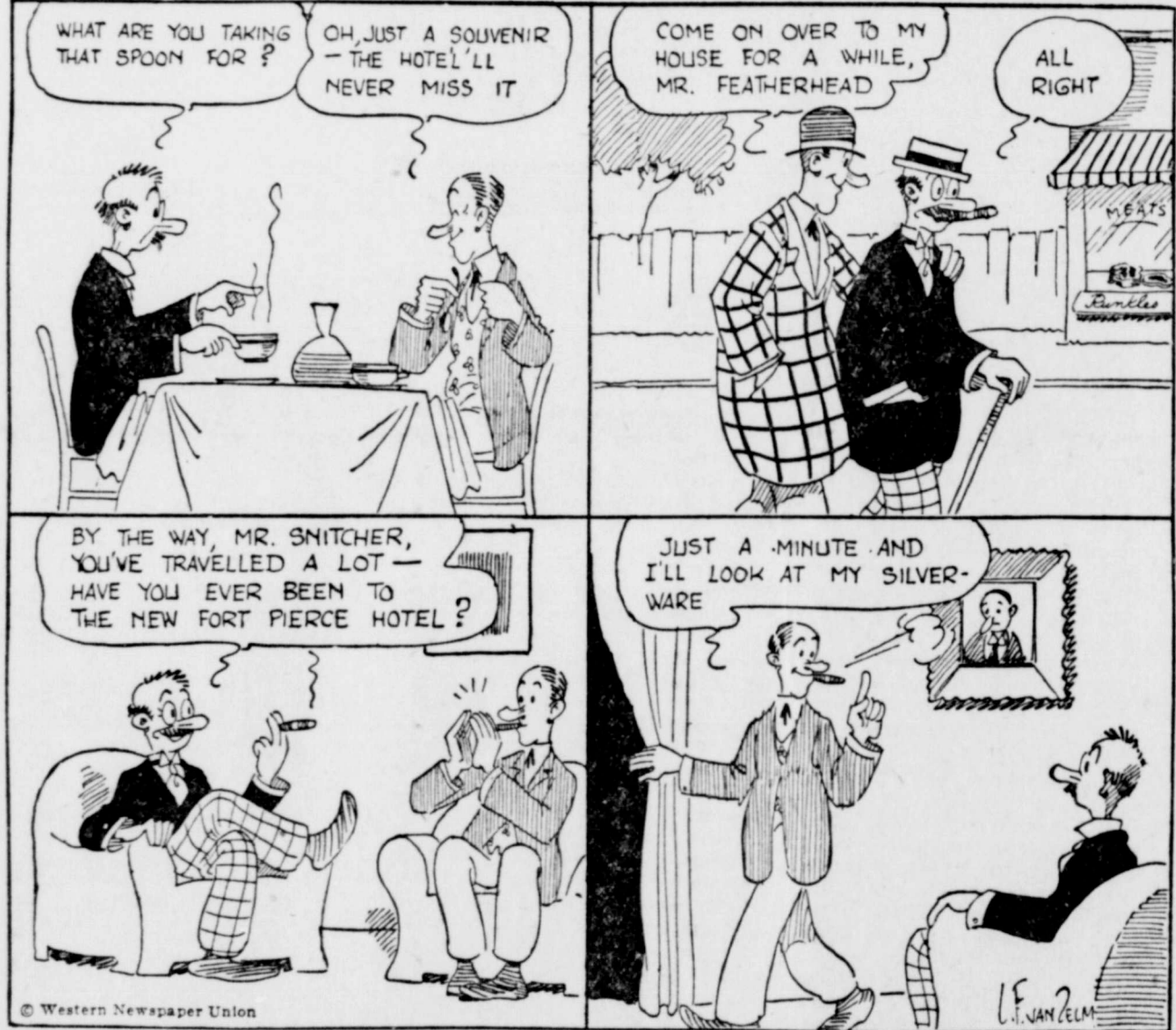

**STOCK LAW ELECTION
 NOTICE**

State of Texas,

 Whereas, by virtue of the authority vested in me by Chapter 6 Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925 as County Judge of Donley County, Texas, the following Election Notice is given:

1. Whereas, on the 14th day of December, 1925 A. P. Brown and fifty (50) others filed a petition with the County Clerk of Donley County, Texas, as provided by the above mentioned law, and the same was received by the County Commissioners Court in its regular January 1926 term and continued until the regular February term, and, whereas, at the regular February term the Commissioners Court of Donley County, Texas, ordered an election to be held on the 3rd day of April, 1926, in accordance with the law specified and relating to such elections.

2. The class of animals to be restricted from running at large by the above mentioned petition and election are as follows, to-wit: Jacks, jennies, horses, mules, cows, hogs, sheep, and goats.

3. The territorial limits to be affected are as follows, to-wit: Beginning at the southeast corner of Section twenty six (26) Block C 3, thence north with the east line of said section twenty six Block C 3 to the Gray county line; thence west with said Gray and Donley county line to the northwest corner of Section twenty one (21) Block C 2, thence south with the west line of section twenty one Block C 2 to the southwest corner of Section sixty one (61) Block C 3; thence east with the south line of Section sixty one (61) Block C 3 to the place of beginning, all in Donley County, Texas, and the same being coextensive with the boundaries of the Common School District No. 9.

4. The day of Election shall be the 3rd day of April, 1926.

5. The place at which the polls are to be opened is the School House of Common School District No. 9, the same being commonly known as Jericho Common School District.

6. A. P. Brown and Ernest Lamb are named and appointed managers of said election and they shall appoint their own clerks.

Voters at said election desiring to prevent the animals designated in the order from running at large shall place upon their ballots the words, "For the Stock Law," and those in favor of allowing animals to run at large shall place upon their ballots the words, "Against the Stock Law."

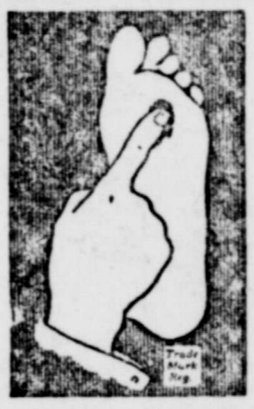

Among the NOTABLES

MAXIMILIAN II

MAXIMILIAN II, Roman emperor, was born in Vienna on August 1—some authorities claim it is the 31st of July, however—1527. The two facts that stand out rather clearly after reading a history of his life, are that he very nearly upset all traditions by starting to turn Lutheran instead of keeping in the faith of the Catholic church; and that he had nine sons and six daughters by his wife Maria!

In those days, kings divided up countries as though they were privately owned estates—especially German and Austrian kings. So it was, that, on his deathbed, Ferdinand I divided among his three sons the inheritance of the German Hapsburgs.

Maximilian II was given Austria. But, at that time, Austria was in a very humiliating position as a tributary to Turkey, and much of the reign was taken up trying to get free of this. On the whole, Maximilian II seems to have been rather a good sort. His policy was not brilliant, but was rather liberal. He had decided leanings toward Lutheranism, of which he had learned something when a very young man in Spain, and granted a good deal of freedom to Protestant princes. But when it came to an issue as to whether he should announce himself a good Catholic or give up his right to the throne of Austria—with Hungary and Bohemia included—he cheerfully took the oath to support the church. Still, when he was dying in 1576, he refused the last sacraments from the priests.

WHO SAID

"Woman already controls by not seeming to do so." Talk no more of her rights!

THESE words, which sound as though they were from the pen of a woman-hater, are, instead, from the pen of one of the criticized sex. The author of the quoted phrase, which might well be credited to some burning opponent of votes for women, was Louise de la Ramee.

She was a French-English writer, who is best known to the world by her pen-name, "Ouida." Her father was a Frenchman and her mother an Englishwoman. The name under which she elected to give her writings to the world, was one by which she called herself when a child and her tiny lips could not form the name Louise.

Louise Ramee was born in England, at Bury St. Edmunds, January 1, 1839. Twenty years later she moved to London and there made her debut as a writer with a short story, "Dashwood's Drag," which was published in Harrison Ainsworth's New Monthly Magazine. Her first novel, "Held in Bondage," appeared in the same magazine in the year 1863.

The things Ouida delighted to write about were the tinsel and pomp of military society, although she knew little about these things.

She spent her later years in Italy, and with her intimate knowledge of the Italian peasant, she was able to write in a more accurate vein and in one that reflected more credit upon her ability. Ouida was passionately fond of animals, especially dogs and she wrote about them in a sympathetic way that has made some of her dog stories immortal. She was an ardent anti-vivisectionist and brought all her literary powers to bear in her campaign against this cruelty to animals.

Ouida was also an anti-suffragist. She did not believe in women having the right to vote—her quoted statement shows her attitude on the subject. She died in poverty at Vlareggio, January 25, 1908. Her popularity had declined and her inability to keep money brought her to desiccate surroundings.

Mother's Cook Book

I'm just a little ditty and not the least bit witty. But listen, I've a secret up my sleeve If you're forever sighing. And all the world decrying. Your friends will all excuse themselves and leave.

COMMON GOOD THINGS

IT IS the everyday foods which we like served differently and with variety.

Vegetable Chowder.

Take thin slices of fat salt pork, cut into dice and fry out. Cover half a dozen sliced potatoes with boiling water and cook until nearly done, salting well, then add the pork and one can of corn, the water in which the potatoes were cooked and enough milk to make the desired consistency. Serve hot with crackers.

Carrot Marmalade.

Scrape and slice thin one pound of carrots, cook until tender, drain well and run them through the meat chopper. Set in a cool place over night. To three cupfuls of carrots add the juice and grated rind of two lemons, four cupfuls of sugar, two dozen blanched almonds cut into shreds. Let stand until the sugar is dissolved. Stir well and simmer slowly until the mixture is smooth and thick. Add as little water as possible. Before putting into glasses, add a few drops of almond flavoring. A mixture of orange and lemon may be used, adding a different flavor to the marmalade.

Ginger Cream.

Make a custard of the yolks of four eggs and the whites of two, four tablespoonfuls of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of preserved ginger slrup, and one pint of milk. Just before the custard is done, add a teaspoonful of gelatin and let it completely dissolve. Turn into molds, sprinkle each mold with preserved ginger. Serve with cream.

Oysters a la Newburgh.

Take three dozen oysters and liquor (about one and one-half cupfuls), put into a saucepan, add one and one-half teaspoonfuls of salt and one-half cupful of water, and simmer for five minutes. Place in the top of a double boiler and add a speck of cayenne, one tablespoonful of orange juice and cook five minutes. Now add one-half cupful of cream, one-fourth cupful of milk, and cook five minutes longer. Meanwhile beat the yolks of two eggs with one tablespoonful of cream and one tablespoonful of lemon juice. Add to the oyster mixture, stirring constantly. Serve hot on buttered toast.
