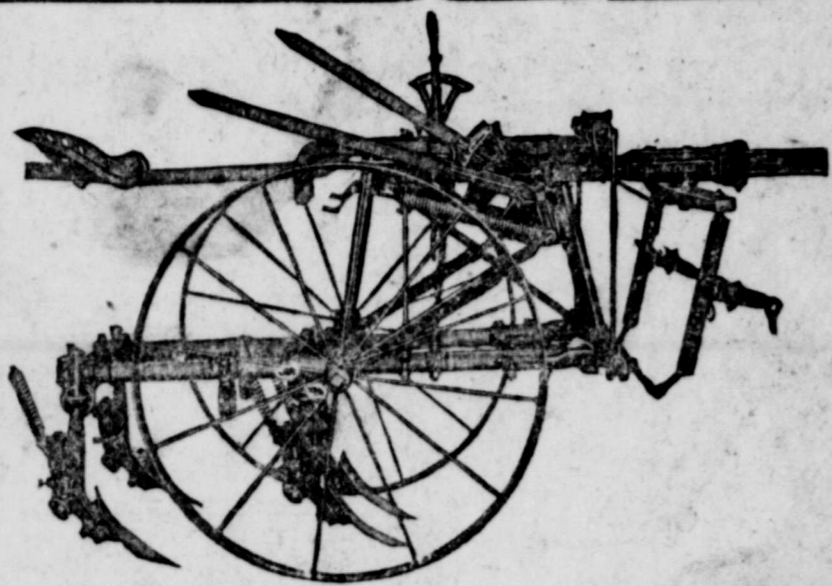

**Among the
NOTABLES**

MARIE BONAPARTE

MARIE PAULINE BONAPARTE, born September 20, 1780, was one of the numerous family of brothers and sisters of the great Napoleon. She was quite the most beautiful of the girls, and the gayest in nature—two qualities that endeared her to her illustrious brother, but that also brought her into more or less trouble.
Like the rest of them, she was born in Ajaccio and shared the rise in the family fortunes. When she was seventeen she married one of Napoleon's staff officers, General Le Clerc and went to live at St. Domingo. He died in 1802, and, as a young widow, a mere girl of twenty-two, she came to enjoy the society in Paris. She was exceedingly popular, had her portrait done as Venus reclining on a couch (after the artistic fashion of the time) and married the Prince Borghese. She went to Rome with him, but tired of it there and came back to her beloved Paris. Various escapades started gossip about her—especially her rather off-hand treatment of Marie Louise, which caused her removal from court.
She loved her a bit, and she accompanied her brother to his first exile to St. Helena, and herself, after his overthrow, to live with him at St. Helena. The only comfort was denied her and she died in her favorite city, Paris, of cholera. She was about forty-five, still going strong and exceedingly beautiful.

HEO SAID

"It was truly said, by a man of great observation, that there are as many miseries beyond riches as there are this side of them."

THERE is a wealth of wisdom in this quaint bit of philosophy by that veteran fisherman, Izaak Walton. It was the contention of this man, whose philosophizings are perhaps as well known as his fame as a fisherman, that the sport of angling was particularly conducive to meditation, and he has left many thoughts in writing that prove his claim.

Izaak Walton, who is popularly called, "The Father of Angling," was born in Stafford, England, August 9, 1593, and died in Winchester, England, December 15, 1683. The greatest pleasure of this man was to take his fishing equipment and a lunch and spend the day beside one of the quiet fishing streams of his native land. Here he—to quote his own words—"meditated," and it is safe to say that if his literary work was not done then, it was at least planned during these fishing excursions.

The literary work on which Izaak Walton's reputation depends, was published by him in the year 1653. It was called "The Compleat Angler" or "The Contemplative Man's Companion." The book had an almost instant sale, and since that time the demand for it has been so great that numerous editions have been made necessary.

Despite the title, Walton's book gives but little actual information on the subject of fishing. It is mainly devoted to the meditations and philosophizings of this remarkable man while engaged in the pursuit of angling. So widely has Walton's book been read and so widespread have become his comments and homilies, that he has earned for himself the title of "the father of angling," and is regarded as the great and shining example of a fisherman, who fished not as a business but as a true sportsman.—Wayne D. McMurray.

Mother's Cook Book

Let us use our treasures when they will give us and those we love pleasure, and when using them will really count.

TRY THESE

TO MAKE the common foods uncommon is the aim of most housewives. The ordinary baked apple may be quite an unusual dish when served in various decorative ways.

Cinnamon Apples.

Select good greenings, wash and core. Fill the centers with the red cinnamon candies. Bake until the apples are well cooked, basting often with the syrup from the pan. Serve with cream and sugar.

Flemish Carrots.

The tender, canned summer carrots are fine for this dish. If fresh carrots are used, cook them until tender in very little water. For a pint of carrots cut into long narrow strips, add one tablespoonful of butter, four tablespoonfuls of chopped onion and half a teaspoonful of sugar. Cover and let cook very slowly until slightly brown; then add one cupful of beet stock and simmer until the onion is tender; add finely minced parsley just before serving.

Raised Potato Cakes.

Mix one pint of mashed potatoes with a pint of flour, sifted with a half teaspoonful of salt. Add milk enough to make a batter like griddle cakes, then add two tablespoonfuls of melted butter. Blend one-half yeast cake in two tablespoonfuls of water and one-fourth teaspoonful of soda; beat this into a batter. Let rise until light and full of bubbles, then bake in greased muffin rings. Serve with chicken gravy and fricassee chicken.

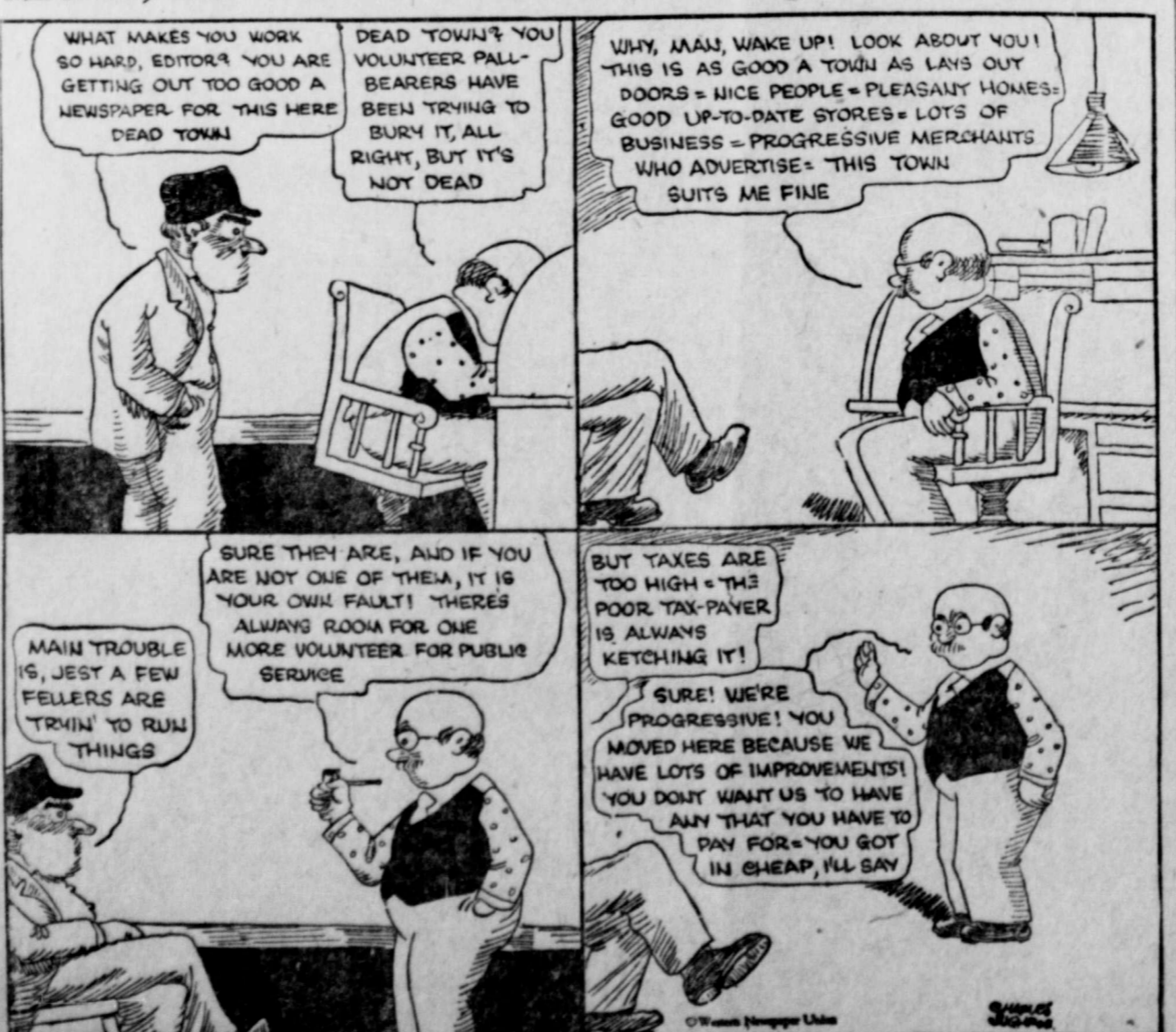

The following address on "The Birth and Peace Time Activities of the U. S. Navy" was delivered in New Orleans on "Navy Day" by Ensign E. E. Mann, of the U. S. S. Cleveland, Special Service Squadron. Everett is a son of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Mann, of this city, and is making a name for himself in the Navy.

Birth and Peace Time Activities of the U. S. Navy

When most people think of the Navy they think of ships sailing the seas, guns belching forth smoke and pouring shot into an enemy, or of a man of war anchored lazily in a harbor with her officers and men going ashore to see the city. Very few ever give thought to the Navy's serious enough peace time duties. In order to give you future citizens and future rulers of our prosperous Nation an insight into the inner workings of the Navy I am going to vary briefly sketch its development, its present status, policy and peace time activities. Each of these topics is worthy of more time than I have to speak to you, but if when I have finished all of you feel that you know a little more about the Navy, I will feel fully repaid for my short time with you.

When the Colonies were threatened with the loss of their liberty, the Rhode Island Assembly met and agreed that the building and equipping of a Navy was essential to the preservation of that liberty. Consequently on Nov. 2, 1775, Congress appropriated \$100,000 for a Navy. A short time later President Washington signed the commission for the cruiser, "Lee," the first vessel of our Navy to set sail under central authority.

On December 13, 1775, the second committee of Congress met and authorized the construction of five thirty gun ships, five twenty gun ships, and three twenty four gun ships. With these ships and a squadron loaned by the French to John Paul Jones we planted the seed for our present great American Navy.

At the end of the Revolutionary war we had only one ship left, the Alliance. She was soon sold as a revulsion to the war, and we were left open to the hordes of African pirates which preyed upon our merchantmen and held us at their mercy. In 1794 we built six frigates to suppress the pirates, but before they were completed we paid a ransom of \$90,276,825 for our right to carry on commerce and for the return of prisoners. These ships were finally completed and others authorized until in 1798 after subduing the French privateers and African pirates, we had a Navy of three frigates and twelve converted merchantmen and were also free to trade without fear of our goods being seized.

Once more in the Napoleonic wars our Navy was practically abolished by Mr. Jefferson as President of the United States. We were again prey to the vultures of the sea. Not long after ward the war of 1812 caught us wholly unprepared for war. We dropped everything and began raising funds for a Navy and

With the odds heavily against us we won many glorious sea battles. The greatest of these was perhaps the victory of the Constitution over the Guerriere which saved and permanently established the Navy.

The 1818 Congress authorized the building of our first steam battleship, called "Fulton the First." She had a single paddle wheel and was capable of about five knots. Sixteen years later she was destroyed by an explosion of her magazines.

From this time on our Navy has gradually developed in ship design, guns and armor. Our ships were next seen in action in 1898, with Spain, which gave the Navy a great impetus and placed it in one of the foremost positions of the world. This was our last actual naval battle, although many of our ships had running battles with submarines during the recent war. Our greatest work in this war was convoy duty and the mining of the North Sea.

We have today in our Navy eighteen battleships, seven light cruisers, 274 destroyers of which only 110 are in full commission, 97 submarines of which seven are of a very new type, and two aircraft carriers. We also have the converted collier Jupiter, which is now the Langley and the mooring ship, Patoka, for the use of our lighter than air craft.

From these facts, and without considering the Navy from any but a warlike point of view, we can see how foolhardy it is to speak of shearing the Navy of its strength. It would be like burning your house because you were going visiting.

Now for the policy of our Navy. Briefly it is "To furnish a national insurance to our commerce and interests abroad, to promote friendly relations with foreign countries, for the aid of civilization and humanity, to aid in scientific research and development, and to protect the honor of the citizens of the United States."

Our peace time activities, coupled with the things I have said concerning our development since Revolutionary days, will clearly bring out how we try to and do fulfil this policy.

To best show you what we do in peace times I will quote a few of our recent activities. Before going into them, though, I wish to quote a paragraph from the Journal of National Association of Manufacturers, under an article by the editor entitled "American Industries." "Progressive participation in almost every line of development has been the history of the U. S. Navy. Just now we are undergoing one of the periodical revisions against armament that seized us after the war. In our feverish desire to scrap the Navy we are prone to overlook the fact that this organization has peace time functions far more continuous and serviceable to the Nation than its war activities; that is, it has set the pace in research initiative and development in some of the greatest industries of this great industrial country. The story of the influence of the Navy upon the development of our industrial world, as well as upon our applied sciences that have contributed so largely to the growth of modern industry, is most convincingly presented in a booklet entitled "The U. S. Navy as an Industrial Asset." It has been claimed that every dollar spent on the Navy has been returned to the people several times over in direct stimulus given to reasonable industrial development. The reader of the above named booklet will be bound to agree that the Navy has fairly well justified the claim."

Our production in almost all of our important articles of com-

merce greatly exceeds the demands at home. This excess must be marketed to keep us upon a stable basis. Therefore our commerce must continue, and in order to continue it must be protected. This protection is one of the most important peace time duties of the Navy.

In the Army's recent around the world flight the Navy cruised over over 87,000 miles in order to make it a success. This cruise was done in order to patrol the course across both the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

Naval aviators in 1923 set some very high records at both Cowes, England, and St. Louis. At Cowes in the international races we won both first and second places in the seaplane races. At St. Louis we took first, second, third and fourth places.

The Los Angeles was built by Germany at the instigation of the Navy and her success is almost sure to bring about a new era in commercial transportation.

In recent years the Navy has developed a sonic depth finder the use of which will greatly facilitate the making of maritime charts which will give an accurate great deal more safety. We now have three naval surveying vessels working with this invention and it will be only a matter of time before charts are available for all of the oceans. Recently this depth finder was used to survey a route for the Army cable to Alaska.

There has been repeated trouble in Honduras, and Naval vessels have been present on both the Atlantic and Pacific sides for the purpose of protecting American life and property. Naval officers have arranged conferences on board men of war for purposes of arbitration to prevent war. Treaties have been signed and wars averted by this method.

At present one of our men of war is in Chili upon the completion of a similar mission.

The Whippoorwill, a U. S. mine sweeper, has just returned from islands in the Pacific where she has had a party engaged in scientific research.

Another example of aid to science was the recent photographing of the eclipse of the sun. The Navy made some very important observations during this, and besides aiding civilian scientists, succeeded in taking the first moving pictures of an eclipse.

As for relief work, a good example is the earthquake in Japan. Our Navy rendered every aid possible and was the first to be there after the quake. The details of this work might interest you. Destroyers were sent to Yokohama and Tokio, and Americans and other foreigners taken on board and cared for until they could be taken to Kobe. Medical assistance was given to the burned and maimed. Food, water and clothing were supplied and a hospital set up on shore. Thousands of unburied people lined the streets and aid was given to properly bury them. In fact everything was done that could be done until the Red Cross arrived to take up the work. The following is a dispatch from Ambassador Woods: "I have been informed by Foreign Office that food emergency has been met. It will gratify American people to know that prompt action by Admiral Anderson has had much to do with this. American Navy assistance, thoroughly appreciated by the man in the street as well as by Japanese government, I wish to emphasize that in this critical emergency the first assistance from the outside world since the catastrophe was brought by the American Navy."

Another peace time duty of the Navy is to promote good will in all parts of the world. This

not only assists our State Department, but also promotes trade with American concerns.

In this connection I was upon the North Dakota when we were sent to Gothenburg, Sweden, on the occasion of the 800th anniversary of that city during what was known as Swedish American week. We were royally entertained and the report on the trip showed that we had done a great deal for our commerce by merely being there to be entertained. The American prestige was enhanced as was shown by the following two months' shipping into that port from America.

In Brazil we are aiding in reorganizing their Navy. In China we are protecting trade with our Asiatic fleet. In Turkey the American High Commissioner is Admiral Bristol. In Haiti and Santa Domingo we are preparing the people for native control. The Navy has done more and is doing more for the development of Radio than any other organization in the world. There are other things, but I think I have given you enough to show you that the Navy is a necessity in peace as well as in war.

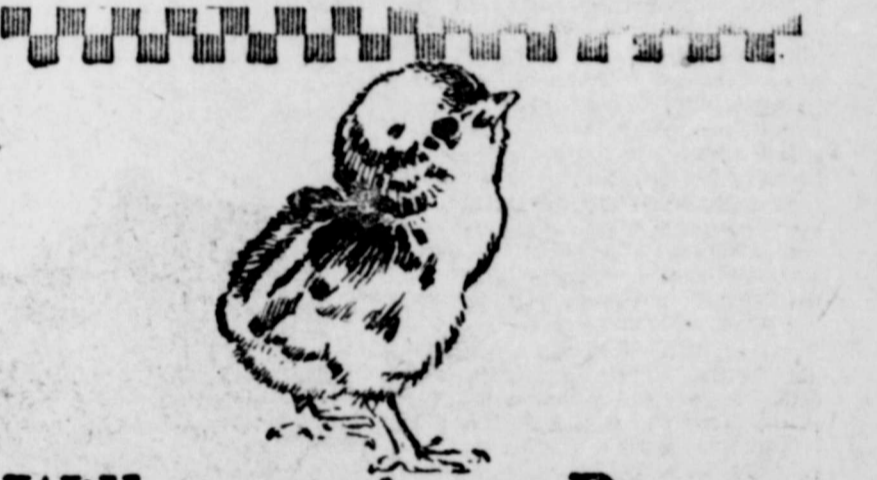
