

s possible that the most significant event connected with that year which marks the one hundred and iftieth anniversary of the winning of American independence will not be the Sesquicentennial exposition at Philadelphia nor any of the numerous local, state and national celebrations with their parades, pageants, gatherings of patriotic citizens, speechmaking and unveiling of monuments, but the publication of a set of

books! A strong statement that, perhaps. But look at "The Pageant of America," published in commemoration of the sesquicentennial of Amerlean independence by the Yale University Press, and see if you still think this an overstatement! This article is not a "book review." It is the story of a new kind of explering expedition, of

an adventure in American history. It is a story of a fine piece of patriotic enterprise undertaken by an American university, the story of a brilliant achievement by a group of scholars whose perseverance and devotion to their task matched the bold imagination which conceived the idea of their quest, an achievement of which all Amer-

When the North pole and the South pole were finally reached it seemed that the possibilities for exploring hitherto unvisited spots on the globe were definitely ended. Then man's curiosity turned to the past, to vanished peoples and vanished cultures so that the explorer could return from some distant corner of the earth and exhibit to us stay-at-homes, avid for new thrills, his trophies of an ancient day. During the last few years Egypt, Mongolin, Yucatan and South America have been yielding up their treasures of the distant past, and modern photography and newspaper illustrations have made the objects of use and art of these ancient peoples as familiar to the average American as the articles of his every-day life.

Five years ago the Yale University Press was struck with the idea that ten generations of Americans who have preceded the present one on this continent have left behind them a great mass of interesting objects and pictorial records of scenes with which the American of today is totally unfamiliar. What then could be more interesting to us than to reveal to us our own antiquities?

So the Press set out upon its "exploring expedition" with the sanction and under the supervision of the Yale university council's committee on publications. Ralph Henry Gabriel of the history department of that institution was selected for editor. With him were associated members of the Yale and other faculties. Henry Jones Ford and Harry Morgan Ayres were made associate editors; Oliver McKee, assistant editor; Charles M. Andrews, Herbert E. Bolton, Irving N. Countryman, William E. Dodd, Dixon Ryan Fox, Allen Johnson, William Bennett Munro, Victor H. Paltsits, Arthur M. Schlesinger and Nathanial W. Stephenson, advisory editors, and Davis M. Matteson, indexer. To their aid was summoned a group of brilliant writers and a staff of historical investigators and the work began. The object of the "expedition" was to discover material of all sorts which would enable them to present in pictorial form a historical record which any person, even the immigrant who has not yet learned the tongue of his adopted country, could read and see for himself the onward sweeping march of American progress in every phase of American life.

From the beginning it was realized that American history goes back much farther than that October day in 1492 when Columbus set foot on the soil of the New world, that the discovery of America was but an incident in the discovery of Asia and that to filustrate the background of American history it was necessary to find pictures which would show the influence in Europe as far back as the time of Carpini and Marco Polo. So the earliest dated picture in the Pageant is a page from the Latin manuscript of Adam of Bremen, written in the Eleventh century, in which the first mention of Vinland is made. This manuscript was located in the Staats Bibliothek at Vlenna, Austria.

It is typical of the wide range of research necessary for the success of the undertaking. The libraries of Europe, of Canada and of Mexico were ransacked for forgotten objects and pictures. The quest for material took the research workers. to every possible source in the 48 states of the Union, to private collections, government collections, historical societies, state libraries, museums, art galleries, learned societies, institutes, religious and educational institutions, municipal collections and archives and dealers' collections.

In every case only authentic pictures were accepted and many of these are reproduced for the first time. An example of this is the portrait of Pocahontas, perhaps the most noted Indian woman in history, which is one of the illustrations for his article. The photographic reproduction of

this authentic portrait, made by special arrangement with the present owner, who lives in England, has never been reproduced until it appeared in the Pageant.

POCAHOTTAS (From Original Painting)

When even the most exhaustive research disclosed the fact that no authentic picture, portraying an important point in our national history, existed, an original drawing was prepared either by Harry A. Ogden or C. W. Jeffreys, both distinguished historical artists. Three of the pictures which accompany this article-"The Conestega Wagon," in which the tide of American expansion rolled westward, "Pilgrims Learning to Fertilize With Fish," the earliest example of 'scientific agriculture" and "Threshing Wheat in Colonial Days"-all by Mr. Jeffreys, are examples of this special work. Even more striking is the fact that Mr. Ogden took two and a half years to prepare a series of seventeen pages of illustrations depicting in color approximately 240 examples of the uniforms worn by officers and men in the army and navy through all the wars, as well as the uniforms of their opponents. This alone cost more than \$6,000, but it presents a fund of historical information which has never before been available to historians and writers.

With more than 10,000 authenticated pictures as the basis, publication of "The Pageant of America" was then begun in fifteen volumes, each with approximately 650 illustrations and 60,000 words of text. Although the Pageant is a pictorial history, it is not a history in pictures alone. Each volume begins with an essay or outline in which the historical development to be pictured is swiftly and graphically described. Each chapter deals with a group of pictures in sequence with short introductions and short captions under the picture which tie together the pictures in the presentation of the main topic-an illustrated "running story," as it were.

In keeping with the dignity and importance of the subject matter is the craftsmanship which went into making these books: Special paper, printing the pictures from half-tones instead of from electrotypes made from half-tones and running the presses at half speed in order to insure an evenness of impression-all contribute to marking an epoch in the art of bookmaking.

The fact that history is more than a record of war and politics was never more strikingly illustrated than it is in "The Pageant of America." Every phase of American activity is represented. Agriculture, commerce, industry, religion, education, the fine arts, literature, architecture, the drama and sports-all are included in the scope

of the work and all contribute to a faithful presentation of the origin, struggles and achievements of a great people woven into a rich tapestry of great deeds.

The titles of the volumes indicate the comprehensive nature of the series and the names of the men and women responsible for the individual volumes is sufficient evidence that here is an authentic interpretation of America. Volume one, "Adventurers in the Wilderness," is by Clark Wissler, curator of the division of anthropology of the American Museum of Natural History and a noted writer on the subject of the American Indlan; Constance Lindsay Skinner, historian, novelist and playwright, and William Wood, author and military and naval historian. It deals with the native American before the coming of the white man, the colonization of America by different European countries down to the time of the inevitable conflict for mastery in the New world.

Volume two, "The Lure of the Frontier," by Ralph Henry Gabriel, associate professor of history at Yale, tells of the westward push of our pioneers until the wilderness had been conquered. Professor Gabriel is also the author of Volume three, "Tollers of Land and Sea" which is the epic of the farmer, the plow following the march of the pioneer. The fisherles industry is subordinated to agriculture in this book but, it presents an adequate record of the harvesters of the sea. To Malcolm Keir, professor of economics at Dartmouth college and a noted author on economic subjects, fell the responsibility for volumes four and five, "The March of Commerce" and "The Epic of Industry." The names are self-explanatory and these two volumes no less than the others present a marvelous parorama of Amer-

Volume six, "The Winning of Freedom," by William Wood, has a special interest at this time because it is the record of the forces which brought on the struggle for independence and of that struggle itself, the sesquicentennial of which we are celebrating this year. Included in this volume also is the pictorial record of the War of 1812 and the Mexican war and in volume seven. "In Defense of Liberty," Mr. Wood takes up the theme of our military history at the opening of the conflict between the states and carries it down through the World war.

In volume eight, "Builders of the Republic," the Pageant turns from war's alarms to political history, which Frederic Austin Ogg, professor of political science at the University of Wisconsin, surveys from colonial days to the opening of the Civil war. John Spencer Bassett, professor of history at Smith college, then takes up the theme in volume nine, "Makers of a New Nation," and carries it down to the present time. In volume ten Luther Allen Weigle, Sterling professor of religious education at Yale, tells an illustrated story of "American Idealism," embracing American religious life, education and the rise of humanitarian movements.

The titles of the remaining volumes of the series speak for themselves. "The American Spirit in Letters," by Stanley Thomas Williams, assistant professor of English at Yale; "The American Spirit in Art," by Frank Jewett Mather, Jr., Marquand professor of art and archeology at Princeton university; Charles Rufus Morey of the same institution, and William James Henderson, music critic and author; "The American Spirit in Architecture," by Talbot Faulkner Hamlin, architect, author and lecturer; "The American Stage," by Montrose Jonas Moses, editor and dramatic critic, and "Annals of American Sport," by Charles Pike Sawyer, newspaper man, critic and author-all complete the picture of American life as it has been through the centuries and as it is today.

NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

Madden Shows Mr. Coolidge How Federal Taxes Can Be Cut in 1928.

By EDWARD W. PICKARD

CONGRESSMAN MARTIN B. MAD-DEN of Chicago, chairman of the house appropriations committee, gathered a portfolio full of facts and figures and spent an evening with President Coolidge last week. The result may bring joy to the American taxpayer, for Mr. Madden laid before the President a plan whereby federal taxes in 1928 can be further reduced. This would suit Mr. Coolidge nicely and he has taken the proposition under consideration. Objection to it may come from Secretary of the Treasury Mellon.

Mr. Madden called the attention of the President to an item of income on one of his sheets of figures, "payment of interest by foreign nations on war debts," amounting to \$150,000,000 a year at this time. This interest payment, which is steadily augmenting, is being devoted by Secretary Mellon to the retirement of Liberty bonds. Mr. Mellon is doing this arbitrarily, without the express direction of statute. The law merely prescribes that the payments on principal of the war debts shall be devoted to retirement of our debt. The payments on principal now aggregate about \$50,000,000 a

Mr. Madden pointed out that the \$150,000,000 of war debt interest could be used under the law to pay current expenses of the government instead of to retire Liberty bonds. If so used the government would not need to raise that amount of revenue and could reduce taxes to that extent.

With the foreign interest payments and the increased revenue from income taxes being produced by expanding business it might be possible to decrease federal taxation in 1928 to the extent of \$300,000,000 or \$400,-

Another cheerful caller at the White Pine camp was Representative Will R. Wood of Indiana, chairman of the Republican congressional campaign committee. He told the President that the Republicans would maintain majorities in both the senate and the house, though they are likely to be reduced somewhat by loss of senate seats gained in Democratic states in the Harding landslide and of house seats similarly gained in the Coolidge landslide. In the next house he looks for a Republican majority of 25, compared with the present majority of 35, exclusive of the Republican insurgents. He classes about 50 districts now represented by Republicans as doubtful, and lists 25 Democratic districts which the Republicans have a chance of winning. Mr. Wood says the contest this year is between the Democratic party and prosperity, and adds: "You can't beat pros-

perity.' Naturally, the Democrats do not agree with these statements and forecasts. In this campaign their major count against the Coolidge administration is subserviency to Wall street and big business, and they charge the administration has lain down on enforcement of the Sherman anti-trust act. They will take what advantage they can from the primary campaign expenditure revelations, the dissatisfaction of the Middle West farmers, alleged governmental extravagance, and the prohibition issue, and they believe this advantage will be great.

CERTAIN aspects of the agricul-tural situation were reported to M. Coolidge by L. J. Taber, master of the National Grange, who had just completed a tour of all but five states. He said the farmers of the country are stronger for prohibition than ever, and that while they had their cider and grape juice, these were usually nonintoxicating, and the agriculturists "are quitting intoxicating liquor, like most other folks."

It was a sixtyfive-mile ride for the party. Sixteen hundred citizen-soldiers paraded before the Chief Executive, after which he was entertained at luncheon by Col. J. P. Hughes, commander of the camp, and started back to White Pine

OPE for an early settlement of H the religious controversy in Mexico waned again. The episcopate found little encouragement in the attitude of President Calles, and voted in favor of carrying on the struggle on the lines already laid out. In this it has the support of the Vatican. The pope made a statement to the press reiterating the policy of the holy see, which, in effect, is that no agreement with the Mexican government is possible until the laws of Mexico, which are regarded at Rome as aiming at the destruction of the Catholic church, are revoked. The communication said the Vatican "has no confidence in President Calles' declarations and has no hope that President Calles will ever make a sincere, peaceful and just proposition to the church." Later the holy see announced that the news it had received indirectly from Mexico the negotiations between Calles and the episcopacy.'

Ambassador Sheffield had a long conference in Washington with Secretary of State Kellogg and soon afterward started for the Adirondacks to report to President Coolidge. The only official statement concerning the meeting with Mr. Kellogg was the positive declaration that Mr. Sheffield would not resign but would return to his post on expiration of his leave of absence, and the announcement by Mr. Kellogg that there would be no immediate change in the administration's Mexican policy. The State department was still waiting for the Mexican government's reply to the latest American note concerning the oil and land laws.

Myron T. Herrick, American ambassador to France, also conferred with Secretary Kellogg, and he accompanied Mr. Sheffield to White Pine

C HINA'S continuous civil war, conducted by rivals for political power and recently marked by several bloody battles, is getting on the nerves of other nations; and when the existing government at Peking proposed to issue \$25,000,000 in domestic bonds for "domestic purposes," which meant for war expenses, the United States sent a note of protest. It objects to these military expenditures while American obligations, entitled to automatic priority, remain in arrears. A list of the principal creditors was appended to the protest, including the Hukang railway, Continental and Commercial bank, Pacific Development, Riggs National, Munsey Trust, and a long list of American corporations supplying railway equipment, etc.

BERLIN correspondents report that the difficulties in the way of Germany's entry into the League of Nations and a final recognition of the peace pacts of Locarno are removed through a compromise; that Spain and Poland have indicated a willingness to accept semi-permanent seats in the league's council for three or perhaps five years. Berlin is now so certain of membership in the league and a permanent seat in the council that the government has selected its representatives on the different commit-

tees of the league. The other part of Spain's price for yielding her claim to a permanent seat-possession of Tangier-is still unsettled. Last week Madrid sent to France a note expressing the desire that the international district of Tangier be added to the Spanish zone in Morocco, and saying that if this were

GREECE has changed dictators again. In a bloodless coup d'etat General Pangalos was overthrown by the Liberals and the power taken over, at least temporarily, by their leader, Gen. George Condylis. He promises general elections late in October or early in November. Pangalos and various members of his government were arrested and will be tried on charges of maladministration. For the time being Admiral Condouriotis is again acting as president of Greece, with General Condylis as



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
