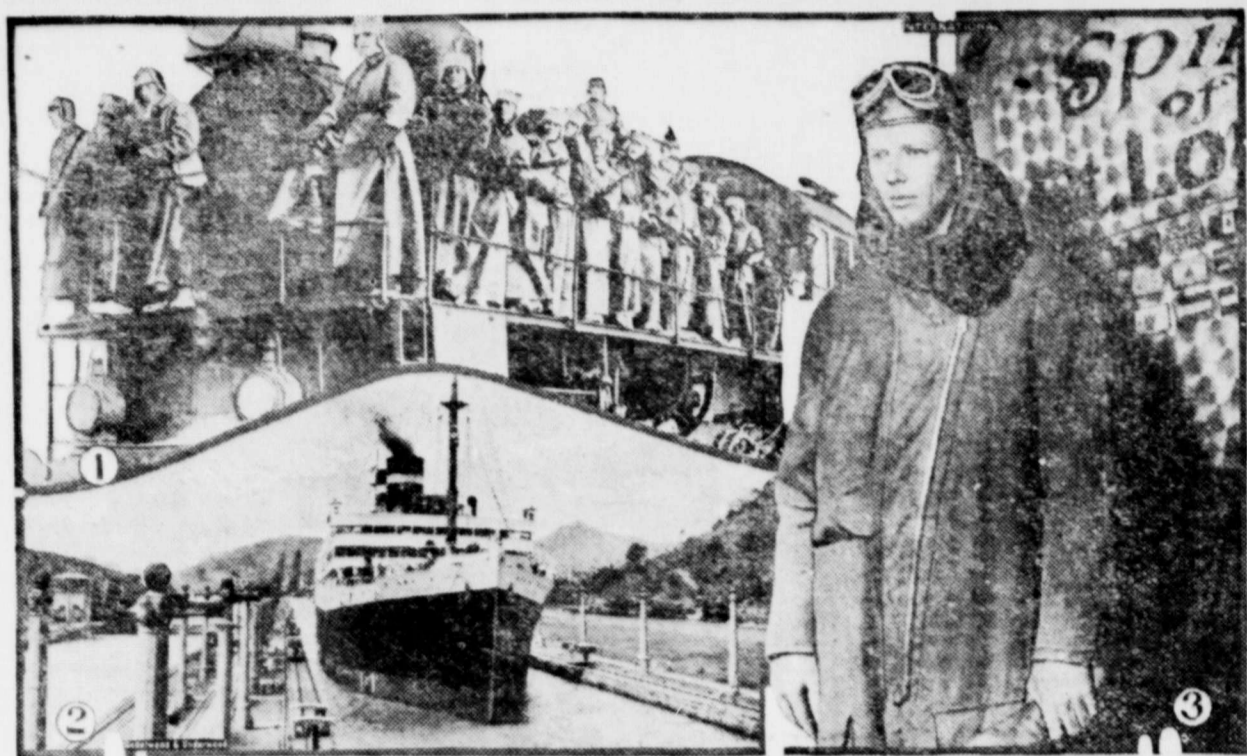

NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

Dissensions in the Pan-American Conference—Political Gossip.

INTERNATIONAL discord was rife in the Pan-American conference at Havana during the week, and it became increasingly evident that plans for the adoption of a convention putting the Pan-American union on a reorganized permanent basis could not be put into effect yet. They were blocked mainly by the attitude of Honorio Pueyrredon of Argentina, who still insisted that the convention must contain a declaration against trade barriers in the form of high tariffs and who declared he would not sign a convention without that feature. His government, however, instructed him to sign the convention with reservations, whereupon he resigned both as head of the Argentine and as ambassador to the United States. The modus vivendi then adopted by the conference for the government of the Pan-American union until the governments shall ratify the new convention provides for continuance of the resolutions in effect with a few modifications.

Then, in a plenary session of the conference, the matter of immigration regulation came up, and three resolutions, all aimed at the policy of the United States, were adopted. To each proposition, as it was adopted, Ambassador Fletcher, a member of the United States delegation, made the reservation that the United States regards immigration a purely domestic question and legislation thereon exclusively the function of the United States congress.

One of the resolutions provided that any American republic may restrict immigration from a non-American continent. Immigration into the United States from the other American republics and from Canada and the West Indies is now unrestricted, but the Coolidge administration favors the extension of our restrictive policy to countries in the western hemisphere and the question is to be considered by congress at this session.

The convention for regulation of commercial aviation among American countries, favored by the United States delegation, was adopted. But the Americans lost a point the day before when the committee on public international law adopted a rule of war that would operate to prevent any American republic from arming merchant ships against submarines. The fight for this resolution was led by Doctor Podesta of Argentina and the vote was 11 to 4. It is not likely that the United States will accept it.

The same committee, on motion of the Mexican delegate, asked that the Pan-American union convene a commission of experts to consider plant quarantines. Mexico especially objects to United States regulations that bar importation of Mexican fruits and plants infected with insect pests. Ambassador Fletcher gave notice that the United States would not consent to arbitration of plant disease quarantines.

Fascist Italy contemplated with satisfaction the dissensions in the Havana conference and looked on the meeting as a virtual failure. The opinion of the Roman press was that the major Latin-American nations, in order to escape from the hegemony of the United States, should seek cooperation with Spain and Italy, "which represent Latin civilization in the world."

HERBERT HOOVER, secretary of commerce, is now formally in the race for the Republican Presidential nomination, for he has consented to the use of his name in the Ohio primaries against Senator Willis. Under the Ohio law a candidate must give consent to the use of his name, and Mr. Hoover went that far, and then stopped for the present. He decided not to take the stump anywhere during the pre-convention campaign and to remain in the cabinet; and he asked that expenditure of money in

his behalf be "strictly limited and rigidly accounted for."

Willis' supporters in Ohio at first affected to be unalarmed by the Hoover move, asserting that it was brought about by a "group of state politicians without prestige" and would be without avail. But their complacency was disturbed when Maurice Maschke, national committeeman from Ohio, deserted the favorite son and announced he would support the secretary of commerce, believing him the strongest man the Republicans could select. Senator Willis was astonished and accused Maschke of having repudiated promises of support. The Hooverites predicted that Hoover would win from 16 to 24 of the state's 51 delegates to the convention. In a letter to Maschke Senator Willis more than intimated that the wets prefer the nomination of Hoover. "The chief newspaper supporters of Mr. Hoover openly state in their editorials and news columns that they are supporting Mr. Hoover for the nomination on the Republican ticket and falling in that, they will give their support to Gov. Al Smith," the letter said. "This makes their purpose and attitude in the matter very clear. I cannot believe that you and your organization sympathize with such a viewpoint."

Managers of the Hoover boom plan to enter nine or ten of the seventeen primary states. Their estimates of the initial Hoover strength in the convention run from 325 to 375, and they profess to be certain that he will be far ahead of Frank O. Lowden, whose vote on the first ballot has been predicted at 230 or more. The convention will have 1,089 delegates and 545 will be necessary for the nomination.

PROSPECTS for a long and bitter fight in the Democratic convention are increased by the news from Albany that Gov. Al Smith will insist that the platform contain a plank calling for modification of the Volstead act. This is his reply to the statement of McAdoo that no wet will or can be the Democratic candidate for the Presidency, and at least it shows he has the courage of his convictions. Recent canvasses have shown, it is said, that at the start of the convention the South will be almost solid against Smith, the exception being perhaps Louisiana. But it has been supposed that a lot of southern delegates would shift to the governor if there were to be no wet plank in the platform.

The dry Democrats at present are apparently concentrating their efforts on an attempt to bring about the nomination of Edwin T. Meredith of Iowa. He is a dry and favors rather radical legislation for farm relief. Though the survey of the South, before alluded to, revealed no especial sentiment here for Senator Reed of Missouri, his managers assert they have received many assurances of support for him in those states as well as in the West. Mr. Reed began his active campaign Saturday when he started for Dallas, Texas, on a speaking tour that will take him to the Pacific coast.

MANY members of congress, both wets and dries, have long sought to avoid going on record on the prohibition question in any form, but the other day they were all forced out into the open. Representative Linthicum of Maryland, leader of the wets in the house, moved to recommit the treasury and post office appropriation bill and add the following section:

"That no money herein appropriated for the enforcement of the national prohibition act shall be used in the preparation or issue of any permit for the removal or use of any industrial alcohol known to be denatured by any deadly, poisonous drug."

The motion was rejected by a vote of 281 to 61. Though outnumbered by more than four to one, the wets seemed pleased as various members representing wet districts were forced to make good on their Anti-Saloon league pledges.

ederal trade commission should be directed to make the investigation and in this form it was adopted. The inquiry is to apply to utility corporations doing an interstate business, and also will affect corporations holding the stocks of two or more public utilities operating in different states. The resolution directs the commission to go into the pertinent facts in connection with the securities of utility corporations, the extent to which holding companies or their stockholders figure in the situation, and whether any legislation should be enacted by congress to correct abuses. The resolution also authorizes the commission to inquire into the extent to which utility corporations or their officers seek by the expenditure of money to control elections of President, vice president, or United States senators, or to influence public opinion.

FARM relief legislation is again before the senate, for its agricultural committee has reported favorably on the revised McNary-Haugen bill. As altered, the measure meets many of the objections of President Coolidge to the original bill, but it still carries the equalization fee provision. An almost identical bill, introduced by Representative Haugen, was still being discussed by the house agricultural committee; but it was hoped by the senate leaders that it would be reported and acted on by the house before it became necessary for the senate to take a vote. The house committee heard last week the new proposition of B. F. Yoakum that the marketing problem be turned over to farm commodity organizations working under federal charters.

INDIANA'S great political scandal of 1924 became virtually a closed incident when Gov. Ed Jackson was acquitted on the charge of having conspired to bribe former Gov. Warren T. McCray. This verdict was directed by Judge C. M. McCabe on motion of the defense because the state had failed to prove that the bribery conspiracy had been concealed, and therefore the statute of limitations ran against the charge. The prosecution had produced a lot of evidence sustaining the bribery charge, but the defendant was saved by the technicality.

COLONEL LINDBERGH wound up his Latin American good-will tour by flying from Havana to St. Louis without stop. From the time he left Washington on December 13 he had flown 9,300 miles in 119.31 flying hours and without mishap. Secretary of War Davis has expressed the hope that the colonel will now give up all stunt and dangerous flying, but the young man indicated that after a rest he would resume his work in that line.

Capt. Joseph F. Donnellan, who started from Chicago to fly to Chile, abandoned his trip at Havana because the fogs made it too perilous for a single-motored plane.

HERBERT HENRY ASQUITH, heart of Oxford and Asquith, greatest leader of the Liberal party since Gladstone, died at his country home on the Thames near Oxford after an illness of two years. He was prime minister during the stormy years from 1908 to 1916, directing the course of the empire in the first two years of the war, after which he resigned to let Lloyd George, a more vigorous man, take the helm. In recent years he and Lloyd George had disagreed seriously and this almost split the Liberal party, but in October, 1923, Asquith retired from the party leadership. Prominent men of all parties paid tribute to the earl's great qualities when his death was announced, and parliament adjourned for a day. Burial was offered in Westminster Abbey but was declined by the family because of the known wishes of Earl Asquith.

Lee O'Neil Browne, a veteran member of the Illinois legislature and widely known lawyer, met tragic death at his home in Ottawa when he fell from an embankment into the Fox river and was drowned.

Eddie Foy, old-time comedian who was known throughout the country died suddenly in Kansas City during what he had said was his farewell tour of stages on which he had appeared during more than half a century. He was seventy-three years old and his real name was Edwina Fitzgerald.

THE KITCHEN CABINET

HERE ARE SOME DESSERTS

A simple dessert easy to prepare and wholesome for children and grownups, is always a welcome addition to any menu.

Date Jelly Sponge.—Add two egg whites, beaten stiff, to a mild lemon jelly, adding one cupful of dates cut into pieces; beat until stiff, pour into molds and serve with a boiled custard.

Apple Souffle.—Make a sauce of two tablespoonfuls of butter, three of flour, one-half cupful of milk and one cupful of baked apple or sifted apple sauce. Remove from the fire, add three beaten yolks, pinch of salt, sweeten to taste, add a little lemon juice, and the stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into pastry-lined gem pans and bake twenty minutes. Serve with whipped cream garnished with cherries.

Coconut Snowballs.—Mix beaten yolks with two tablespoonfuls of water, one tablespoonful of orange juice and one teaspoonful of lemon juice. Beat well and add two-thirds of a cupful of flour sifted three times with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder and one-fourth teaspoonful of salt. Fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs. Pour into small molds and steam one-half hour. Turn out on a plate of coconut and powdered sugar, roll with two forks until well covered. Serve with fruit juice lightly thickened for sauce.

Pineapple Toast.—Boil for five minutes the liquor from a can of pineapples with one teaspoonful each of orange and lemon juice; thicken with a teaspoonful of cornstarch and pour over well-buttered triangles of toast. Serve garnished with pieces of pineapple, hot or cold.

When it seems impossible to think of anything easy for dessert, try canned apricots, pears or peaches. Serve in sherbet glasses with a dab of whipped cream, a teaspoonful of lemon juice and a sprinkling of nuts. With a small cake or a cookie this makes a nice dessert.

Emergency Lunches.

The housewife who keeps a few cans of soup, string beans, peas and spinach on her emergency shelf may have a very wholesome lunch even in a short time. A good combination from a dietetic standpoint is the following: Serve the soup of tomato or celery as first course, then some spinach, sliced sweet potatoes baked in sugar, a well-baked apple with bread and butter and you have a good substantial luncheon.

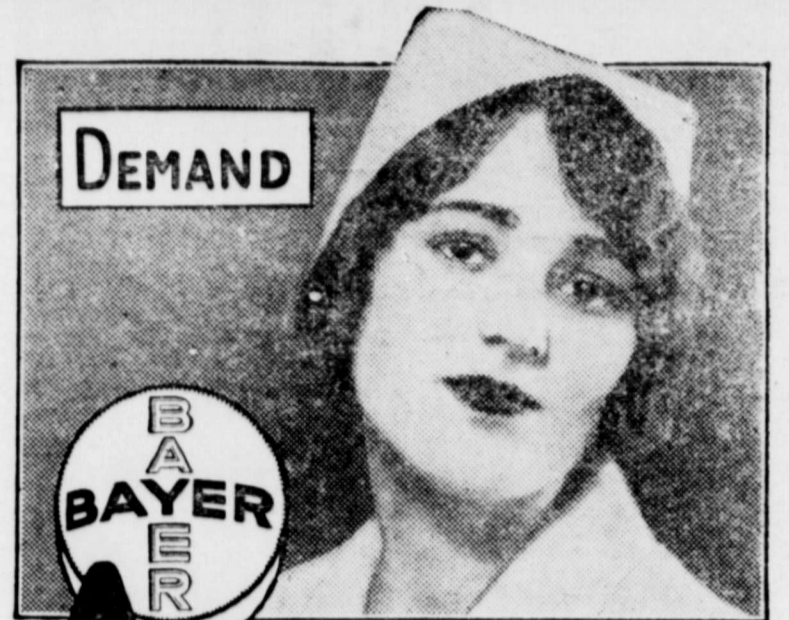
Lamb in Ramekins.—Mix one-half cupful of condensed milk with one-fourth cupful of water, add two cups of minced lamb, one teaspoonful of salt, one-fourth teaspoonful of pepper and one tablespoonful of green pepper chopped and one tablespoonful of chopped onion. Melt two tablespoonfuls of butter, add two tablespoonfuls of bread crumbs sprinkled over the ramekins after they are filled with the meat mixture. Bake in a moderate oven over 350 degrees for about twenty minutes or until well browned.

Sweet Croquettes.—Mix together one cupful of cake crumbs, one-fourth cupful of blanched almonds, one grated coconut, the grated rind of half a lemon and one-half tablespoonful of lemon juice; add one-half cupful of orange juice and let stand for ten minutes. Beat to the boiling point, remove, add one egg yolk lightly beaten and cool. Shape as croquettes, dip into egg white diluted with one tablespoonful of water and roll in dry bread crumbs. Fry in deep fat and serve sprinkled with powdered sugar and chocolate sauce.

Chicken Tetrazzini.—Take one and one-half cupfuls of shredded chicken, three-fourths of a cupful of shredded ham, three-fourths of a cupful of spaghetti cooked. Simmer one small green pepper slowly with two chopped mushrooms and three tablespoonfuls of butter for three minutes, then add the spaghetti, one-half of a red pepper finely minced, two cupfuls of cream and one teaspoonful of salt; cook four minutes. Mix the yolks of three eggs with two tablespoonfuls of cream and stir into the mixture. Serve at once.

Apple Souffle.—Take one pint of steamed apples, one tablespoonful of melted butter, one-half cupful of sugar, the whites of six eggs, the yolks of three, a slight grating of nutmeg. Stir the butter, sugar and egg yolks well beaten into the hot apples. Beat the whites of the eggs until stiff and fold into the mixture. Butter a baking dish and turn in the souffle. Bake thirty minutes in a hot oven. Serve at once with any desired sauce.

Declarer's Play of a No-Trump (Continued.)

North deals and bids one club. East passes because his five-card spade suit might take only two tricks, and he has not sufficient compensation in outside quick tricks. South bids one no-trump, which is very proper after his partner's club bid; and all pass. West leads the seven of hearts, dummy is spread and declarer stops to make a survey. He wants to finesse diamonds and spades towards West and clubs toward East and cannot plan the play in any further detail. The deal is played as follows:

Declarer makes a small slam.

In the diamonds, the double finesse is taken because declarer has less than nine cards in the suit in both hands, and of course when it wins, the lead must be thrown back to dummy and another low diamond led from there. In leading towards the King, Queen and ten of clubs, declarer is following the double finesse idea; and since he holds the nine, he leads that and passes it through. As East has to play the Ace, declarer knows that West has the Jack of clubs, and so is sure of the second finesse at trick nine.

At trick four East returns his partner's suit, as he is sure of taking out declarer's last high one—the Ace—and he hopes that West may get the lead later. Declarer's diamonds and clubs are now so thoroughly established that he easily takes all of the remaining tricks.

Entry Cards

This is a subject which many players need to study more carefully. Who has not bewailed the lack of an entry card? One often hears a player say, "Well, I have three perfectly good cards in dummy but I cannot get to them"—and the pity of it is that in the majority of such cases it might have been helped if the player had given entry cards more consideration. Often one may play so as to make certain cards take tricks which would not ordinarily do so. When declarer has four cards of any suit in each hand it usually is possible to play them in such a manner as to make an extra entry card in dummy. Suppose that declarer holds Ace, Queen, ten and five, and that dummy has King, nine, eight and six. The ordinary way to play this suit would be to lead the five and win with the King which places the lead in dummy once and makes it impossible to get it there a second time in this suit. If, however, the ten is led and taken with the King, the six led back to the Ace and the Queen then played, it usually will draw the last of the adversaries' cards and declarer will have created a second entry card in dummy—the nine, to which he can lead the five.

Another situation where many beginners become confused and lose a trick or two, is where declarer holds all of the high cards of a suit in his two hands, but where his own hand holds only three with five in dummy, who has no re-entry card in any other suit. If he plays so as to take the third trick in his own hand, the two remaining cards in dummy are worthless because he cannot get to them; thus he loses two tricks. In such a case it should be easy to remember to play the high cards from the short hand first.

Lying About Height

Common to All Men
Most men, consciously or otherwise, lie about their height. This was found to be true in a survey of the 24,000 men whose names appear in "Who's Who in America," the results of which are published in an article in Liberty.
"One of the first things discovered," the writer of the article points out, "was that men lie about their height, because the primitive nature of the male is that of a big, husky brute, and no amount of culture can educate out of a man the wish to appear likewise."
"The man who stands from 5 feet 10.5 inches to over 5 feet 11 inches is prone to announce himself as 'about six feet' and to endeavor to be just that. He will go to great lengths to achieve it—even, in extreme cases, to wearing high heels. Heights to 6 feet 2 inches are satisfactory, but beyond that a man will lie just as firmly to come down. Few exceptionally tall men stand erect, while the abnormally short men strut."

How the Useful Plants Came to Mankind

The Radish

THE radish has been cultivated from the very earliest historic times and centuries ago it attained so wide a distribution that it has been necessary to search through the world for the spots where it grows wild to determine whence it came and how it found its way into the notable company of the plant servants of mankind. Its ancient cultivation in China, Japan and in Europe from the earliest days has been established with entire authenticity. Furthermore, the radish is such a willing grower that it spreads from the garden plots where man intends it to grow, and makes its way into near by fields, especially if the region is particularly friendly to its existence. This might give the impression that it grew wild in many places where it was by no means an original inhabitant.

Herodotus tells of radishes eaten by the builders of the pyramid of Cheops and there are two drawings on the temples of Karnak of which one at least is undoubtedly a radish. From varying bits of evidence, says the scientist, De Candolle, "we gather, first, that the species spreads easily from cultivation in the west of Asia and the south of Europe, while it does not appear with certainty in the flora of eastern Asia; and secondly, that in the regions south of the Caucasus it is found without any sign of culture, so that we are led to suppose that the plant is wild there. For these two reasons it appears to have come from western Asia between Palestine, Anatolia and the Caucasus, perhaps also from Greece, its cultivation spreading eastward and westward from a very early period."

The fact remains that the radish has been under cultivation in scores of regions for so long a period that widely differing names are in use for it.

The evidence of the radish's origin is not unlike that of the bean's. It has been in use for untold centuries and has spread throughout the world, a useful and treasured plant friend. That it grows most naturally in the region from which the modern white man is said to have come, and that in his migrations he would naturally have carried it with him and given its seeds to other races the Chinese, Japanese and Indians, in trade, seems wholly logical. The radish may be added to the colony of ancient and honorable pioneers of civilization.

Cabbage

AFTER examining a long series of plants that originated in warm climates, in Asia, or the ancient countries of the Mesopotamian region, it is refreshing to come to one that is a native of northwestern Europe. And cabbage seems properly enough to be a native of the shores of the North sea, near to the regions with which sauerkraut and the general use of cabbage as a food plant seems to be most naturally associated. Cabbage has been found wild on the island of Hezeland, in Denmark, the islands of the English channel, and in southern England and Ireland. With the possible exception of the onion, which may have been wild there in remote prehistoric times, cabbage is the first food plant native to this district that has been considered in the present series.

Botanical investigations that are accepted as authentic place this plant also along the shores of the Mediterranean as an indigenous species, especially near Nice and Genoa. In the wild state it haunts the seacoast, just as we found the potato to do in Chile and Peru. No trace of cabbage growing wild has come out of the East where so many food plants originated. It is much grown in all civilized parts of the globe suitable to its culture, but has been introduced except in the places already described.

Use of cabbage as a food is extremely ancient. Science deduces from the various names given it that it was in use as a food in western Europe prior to the invasion of the Aryans, supposed progenitors of most of the present white race. It probably was a Stone age food in Europe, either as a cultivated vegetable or as found in the wild state and gathered. Just as we today gather many wild foods, berries and nuts particularly.

Another indication that cabbage is distinctly European lies in the fact that it is in Europe where most of the new varieties of this plant have been developed. Three varieties were mentioned by the Greek writer, Theophrastus; twice that number by Pliny while in the middle of the last century, De Candolle enumerated thirty well-established kinds of cabbage in Europe.

Investigators who have tried to trace the origin of plants by studying their names have brought to light the fact that in the ancient Indo-Germanic tongue the word "karambula" meant cabbage. Spelled differently a word of similar pronunciation, "carumba" is a Spanish expression of disgust. It may have meant "old cabbage head" in an ancient tongue, a meaning which had disappeared from the vocabulary as it is used today.

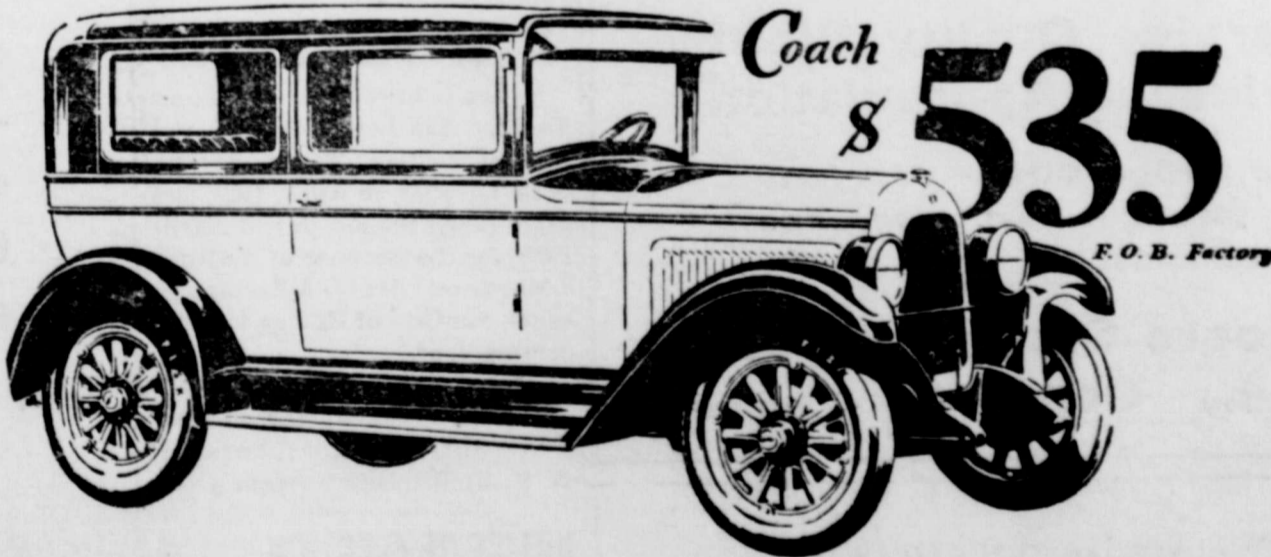

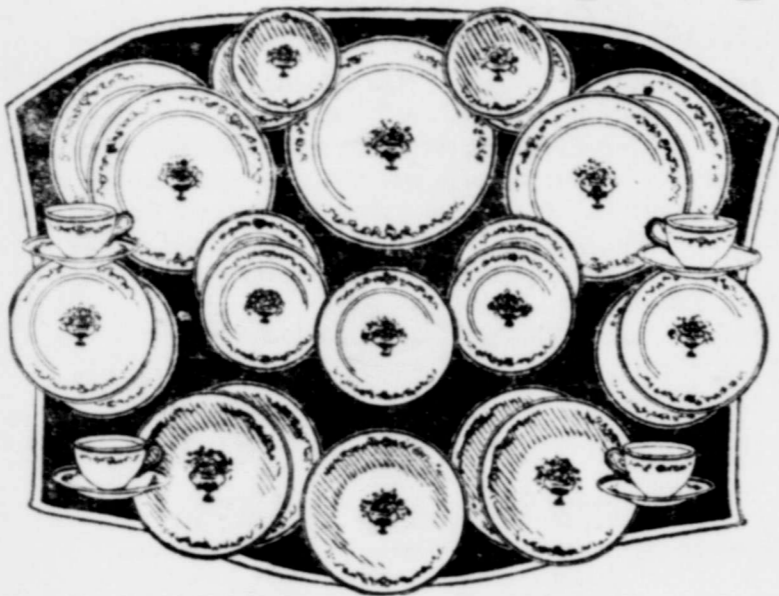

An organized fight against poultry thieves is being made in Hall county, where the Hall County Anti Theft Association has been organized, with I. W. Thomason president and E. M. Ewen secretary. An active campaign for members is on.

Each member will have protection from thieves by tattooing his flock. Chickens when stolen may be identified by the tattoo.

A reward of \$50 also has been posted for the arrest and conviction of anyone stealing poultry from an association member.

The plan has been proven, and will actually work. All that is necessary is co-operation on the part of producers and dealers.

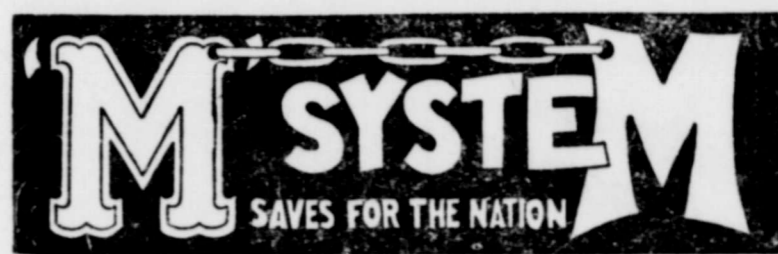
