COTTON-Acreage should not be expanded. Holdover fully normal. Prices last year due largely to low acre yield. High yield this year on same acreage will bring low prices.

SWEET POTATOES-Prices at digging time likely low; prices for storage stock dependent on size of storings.

EGGS-Lower prices first half of 1929 than in first half of 1928. Second half of 1929 uncertain.

POULTRY FOR MEAT-Higher prices during first half of 1929 than in first half of 1928. Second half uncertain.

BUTTERFAT-Probably about the same spread between fat prices and feed prices as during 1928, if industrial activity maintains demand for butter.

NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

Engagement of Anne Morrow and Lindbergh-Doings of Congress.

ST as he was landing at Havana on his return flight from the Canal Zone, Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's engagement to Miss Anne Spencer Morrow was announced by the young lady's father, Dwight W. Morrow, ambassador to Mexico. The colonel declined to talk about it to the reporters. It was understood in Mexico City that be would fly there late this month and that, though no plans had been made for the wedding, it might take place this spring. Anne is twenty-two years stipated, pale and old and vivaciously pretty. She is a ouny children. When Colonel Lindbergh was in Mexico City as the guest of Ambassador Morrow he took Anne for several short flights, but her sister Elizabeth also was his passenger, and the gossipy reporters were uncertain then as to which one might become his fiancee

Colonel Lindbergh had no sooner landed at Miami from his Central American trip than he started out again on two rescue flights. The first was over the Florida keys in search of a plane from which two persons were taken by a ferry boat after it was forced down; the second was made to try to find Pilot Harry Rogers, who had gone in search of the A Western mother, Mrs. Neal M. first plane and was himself missing

"There is not a great deal to be done before daily service can be inaugurated between Miami and Panama. Better facilities for communication are being installed and other facilities to aid flying are being put into condition to augment the service." As to passenger traffic between the North and South Americas, Colonel Lindbergh said it was not planned to haul passengers "until the most minute details of transportation and communication have been worked out."

THERE is now no doubt that Hoov-er and Curtis were elected President and Vice President of the United States last November. Congress in foint session last week received and counted the electoral vote and Vice President Dawes announced that the tally sheets showed the Republican nominees had received 444 electoral votes and the Democratic nominees 87. Thereupon he formally declared Hoover and Curtis elected. These proceedings were supposed to be solemn and stately and the Vice President had requested that there be no applause or other manifestation of approval or disapproval, but the senators and representatives soon broke loose and indulged in gales of laughter and vigorous applause, enjoying especially the confusion and mistakes of some of the tellers and declining to be subdued by General Dawes' gavelhammering.

DRESIDENT COOLIDGE feels that the major work of his administration is ended and already is packing up his belongings for return to his home in Northampton, Mass., where be probably will reside for at least a year. He and Mrs. Coolidge expect to leave the White House the afternoon of March 4, immediately after the inaugural ceremonies, and because of the illness of Mrs. Coolidge's mother they will lose no time in starting

On Wednesday the President signed the bill for the building of fifteen cruisers and one airplane carrier and approved the appropriation of funds to begin the construction of these vessels at once.

Naval officials and adequate navy advocates in congress halled the approval of the bill with enthusiasm

sale replacement program which will result in the modernization of the fleet and eventually in an American navy second to none.

Representative Fred A. Britten, chairman of the house naval committee, said his committee will begin new hearings next fall to determine how many more ships should be authorized as replacements for the rapidly ageing battleships, cruisers, destroyers and submarines in the battle and scouting fleets.

DRESIDENT-ELECT HOOVER had been expected to remain in Florida until a day or two before the inauguration, but last Wednesday he announced that he had a lot of work to complete in Washington in preparation for the new administration. and therefore would leave Miami for the national capital on February 18 or 19. The latter part of the week was devoted to a trip of inspection through the flood and reclamation district of central Florida. The Edison birthday party at Fort Myers on Monday was a great success and was much enjoyed by Mr. Hoover; but the weather was too blustery for good fishing on the west coast,

Secretary of Agriculture Jardine removed himself from the Hoover cabinet possibilities by the announcement that he had accepted a position as counsel for the Federated Fruit and Vegetable Growers, with his offices in Washington.

CONGRESS was asked by the President to appropriate \$9,210,500 for the construction of new public buildings in 92 cities scattered throughout the country. This is the amount needed to meet building costs during the first year. The projects when completed would represent an outlay of \$46,760,500. Mr. Coolidge also approved budget bureau estimates for the expenditure of \$48,000 to remodel and furnish the weather bureau sta-tion at Mount Weather, Va., as a summer home for Presidents, this plan being in accord with his suggestion made last fall. Mount Weather, near Bluemont, Va., and about 60 miles from Washington, is an 84-acre tract, high in the Blue Ridge mountains, on which the weather bureau, until a few years ago, conducted some of its most important observations.

INTERNATIONAL experts selected to consider the matter of German reparations began on Monday in Paris the conference that is expected to result in a revision of the Dawes plan, the fixing of the total sum Germany must pay and the subsequent evacuation of the Rhineland by the allies, Owen D. Young, one of the unofficial American delegates, was the unanimous choice for chairman, and after the necessary ceremonies he lost no time in setting the commission to work. Germany had its innings first and Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, president of the reichsbank, presented his country's case in a way that seemed to make an excellent effect on all the delegates except the French. He was moderate and made no specific demands but insisted Germany cannot continue to pay the annuities of two and a half billion gold marks provided for by the Dawes plan. He was questioned closely about the tax burdens of Germany, which the allies assert are less than their own. He offered to prove that this was not true. Doctor Schache and his associates continued through several days. Correspondents said it was becoming apparent that the French and German points of view were not so divergent as was feared and that the success of the conference seemed assured.

L EON TROTZKY, with his wife and two children, was taken to Con-stantinople on a Soviet steamship, secretly landed and confined closely in the Russian embassy. It was said the authorities feared he might be attacked by "white" Russian refugees that are numerous there. The campaign against Trotzky sympathizers in Russia continues, the latest incident reported being the closing of the Kronstadt naval academy and the expulsion of its 3,700 students. Twenty of their leaders were arrested as Trotzkyites. A Leningrad paper says the Soviet war commissariat discovered a lack of loyalty among the students, who are openly discussing the possibility of a new Napeleon appearing in Russia to save the country from the hands of the Communists.

R EV. DR. E. S. SHUMAKER, super-intendent of the Indiana Anti-Saloon league, is now milking cows and cleaning their stalls on the state penal farm at Putnamville. He suddenly abandoned his long fight against the sentence of sixty days on the farm for contempt of the Indiana Supreme court, and began serving his term. Shumaker was cited for contempt in 1926 by Arthur L. Gilliom, then attorney general, following his criticism of members of the State Supreme court in the American Issue, the Anti-Saloon league publication. He was found guilty by a Supreme court vote of three to two.

ISS BOBBY TROUT went up in M the air over Los Angeles and regained the laurels taken from her by Miss Elinor Smith of New York. Bobby not only established a new endurance record for women aviators-17 hours 5 minutes 37 seconds-but also captured the women's night flying and distance records. Bobby is twentythree years old and flies a Golden Eagle monoplane.

PRESIDENT PORTES GIL of Mexico narrowly escaped death last week when his train was blown up by dynamite in the state of Guanajuato. The explosive had been placed on the track at a point where it ran over a bridge. The fireman was killed instantly when the engine overturned. and two coaches were derailed. Another bomb, unexploded, was found fixed to the track. The attempt at assassination followed closely on the execution of Jose Toral, who murdered General Obregon, and in official circles in Mexico City it was said to be the work of the League of Religlous Defense. Several members of that organization were arrested near the scene of the explosion, and it was said a number of prominent persons would be taken into custody.

M^{OST} notable of the week's deaths was that of Lily Langtry, Lady de Bathe, who was for years the leading beauty of the English stage. She passed away at her home in Monte Carlo. This means that you are net to wait until you are se ill that you cannot stay out of bed any longer. With business te attend to or household duties to perform, it will take will power to close up shop because of a few sniffles and coughs. But in the long run it will pay you to

It may be exceedingly hard for an active person to get out of the race for a few days for such a little (?) thing as a cold. But many people who have neglected to do so have been disqualified for weeks through more serious il'ness and not a few have been finally eliminated. Give this suggestion some thought the next time you contract "only a cold." It may even save your life!

But why get a cold in the first instance? Here are some rules which if followed will make colds weaker adversaries for 700 than they now

1-Avoid direct drafts of any kind, this includes your cleeping room. 2-Keep away as far as possible from others having colds. 3-In the "cold season" avoid crowds and crowded places, even to the point of losing some fun. 4-Keep the feet dry. 5-Avoid sudden chilling. 6-Live up to the general rules of health every day and develop a strong resistance to all



WHAT DID OUR EX-PRESIDENTS DO?



By ELMO SCOTT WATSON. HEN Herbert Hoover of California takes the oath of office as President of the United States on March 4. Calvin Coolidge of Massachusetts will become a member of one of the exclusive organizations in the world. At no time in its history has it had more than five members and that occurred only once, in 1862. Since then there have never been more than two members in this club at any

death on February 3, 1924, it has had only one, William Howard Taft. For this organization, a very important one, even though it is small in membership, is the unofficial "Ex-Presidents of the United States club."

Just what Calvin Coolidge will do when he joins the "Ex-Presidents' club" was unknown at the time this article was written, although it may be announced by the time it appears in print. When that question came up some time ago, he is said to have remarked that he was "just going to whittle," which may have been the New England way of saying that he was going to spend a leisurely vacation before taking up any other occupation. There has been talk of his resuming his law practice in Northampton, Mass.: talk of his joining a New York law firm and also talk of his becoming an important official in various business firms. If eventually he turns to politics there will be plenty of ex-Presidential precedent. Three ex-Presidents occupied important federal positions after they left the White House. John Quincy Adams was elected to the United States louse of representatives. Andrew Johnson was elected to the United States senate. William Howard Taft became and is now chief fustice in the Supreme Court of the United States.

Despite his historic "I do not choose," it is even possible that he may decide sometime to put the so-called tradition against the third term to a test and again run for President. In this he again will have precedent from his predecessors. Martin Van Buren was the first ex-President

to attempt a corre-back. Before the New Yorker all the American Presidents had served their two terms save the two Adamses. Van Buren slipped miserably in his two attempts, failing despite strenuous efforts to get the nomination of 1844, and, in 1848, with the nomination falling to gather a single electoral vote.

After him Fillmore tried with scarcely better success. General Grant was the first man to attempt to fill a third term, running well for the nomination on the first 36 ballots, but finally giving way to James A. Garfield. That was in 1880. Cleveland was the only ex-President to regain

the crown. Several before him tried to turn the trick; Roosevelt exactly twenty years later at-tempted the same thing. All failed where Cleveland succeeded. For defeated in 1888 by Benjamin Harrison, Cleveland waged a campaign that found him on March 4. 1893, riding to the Capitol.

Cleveland was the only man to make this ride more than three times. In 1885, he rode with the outgoing President Arthur; in 1889, he gave over the reins to the incoming President Harrison; in 1893, he took them back from the same man; in 1807, he rode the trail for the last time, carrying with him the ill-fated William McKinley.

Of the careers of the other ex-Presidents William A. Millen, writing in the Washington Star.

George Washington retired to the quiet of his loved Mount Vermon after he surrendered the suidency on March 6, 1727, Dut lived only a uple of years to enjoy his well-earned rest. True, was recalled to Philadelphia in 1798, whom war

seemed about to break with France, the old ally of the United States, and spent some time reorganizing the army, which he had led so well in the strenuous years of the nation's birth. A cold contracted while riding about his broad acres caused his death, following a brief illness, on December 14, 1799. He was sixty-seven years old. John Adams, a signer of the Declaration of Independence and veteran of the Continental congress, retired from the Presidency on March 4, 1881. He died July 4, 1826, at his native Quincy, Mass., at the ripe old age of ninety years, having lived to see his eldest son become the sixth President of the United States.

lived to see his eldest son dent of the United States,
Thomas Jefferson surrendered the Presidency
March 4, 1809, and, curiously enough, died on the passing away on the birthday of Calvin Coolidge, July 4. He retired to private life at his residence, Monticello, in Virginia. In 1819 he took a leading part in the founding of the University of Virginia at Charlottesville, and was rector of that institu-tion until his death in 1826, at the age of eighty-

James Madison left the Chief Executiveship on March 4, 1817. He retired to his estate at Mont-peller, Orange county, Va., to enjoy private life, He was a delegate to the Virginia Constitutional e vention of 1829, and was rector of the University of Virginia. He died June 28, 1836, age eighty-three. James Monroe laid down the duties of the Presidency on March 4, 1825, and died July 4, 1831, at the age of seventy-three years. He retired to his farm at Loudoun county, Virginia, and in the Vir-ginia Constitutional convention of 1829, in which Madison likewise served, he was chosen president of that group. He moved to New York city in 1831 and died there.

John Quincy Adams left the White House March

John Currey Adams left the white House March 4. 1829, a coincidence in that Coolidge another man from Massachusetts, stepped out of the Presi-dency in 1929. Adams was defeated as candidate for governor of Massachusetts in 1834, but the Bay

governor of Massachusetts in 1834, but the Bay state elected him to the house of representatives as a Whig to the Twenty-second and the eight succeeding congresses, serving from March 4, 1831, until his death at the Capitol on February 25, 1848, of a paralytic stroke, at the age of eighty years.

Andrew Jackson closed yet another chapter in his colorful career when he left the Presidency on March 4, 1837. Then he retired to the Hermitage, his home near Nashville, Tenn., and died there June 8, 1845, of tuberculosis, at the age of seventy-eight years.

Martin Van Buren bade farewell to the White House officially on March 4, 1841. Defeated for re-election as the Democratic candidate in 1840, eight years later he was the antislavery candidate for President. He died in his native Kinderhook, N. Y. July 24, 1862, during the Civil war, aged seventy-

nine years.

John Tyler surrendered the reins of office on March 4. 1845. He was delegate to the peace convention in 1861, which tried to avert the Civil war, and served as its president. He had lived quietly on his estate up to that time. With the approach of the conflict he plunged into politics again and after the proposals of the peace convention had failed, he threw in his lot with his native Virginia and voted for secession. He was elected to the Confederate congress, out died before it assembled in Richmond, Va., expiring January 18, 1862, in the Old Dominion capital, at the age of seventy-one years.

James Knox Polk lived but a short while after he was freed from the duties of the Presidency on March 4, 1849. Death came to him on June 15, 1849, in Nashville, Tenn, at the age of fifty-three

Millard Fillmore laid down the onerous duties of the Presidential office on March 4, 1853, after having been defeated for renomination, as the Whig candidate by Gen. Winfield Scott. He resumed his law practice in Buffalo, N. Y. and was chosen as the National American candidate for the Presidency in 1856. He was president of the Buffalo Historical acciety, and during the Civil war he commanded a corps of home guards. He died March 8, 1874, at Buffalo at the age of seventy-four years. Franklin Pierce turned over the affairs of state to his successor in the Presidency on March 4, 1857. He spent the latter years of his life in traveling extensively in Europe and died Optober 8, 1869, at Concord, N. H., at the age of sixty-four years.

James Buchanan, left the White House on March 4, 1861, and died June 1, 1868, at the age of seventy-sevel years. He had retired to his home in Wheatland, near Lancaster, Pa.

He first retired to his home in Tennessee and was defeated as a candidate for the senate before the legislature in 1870. He was the senate before the legislature in 1870. He was defeated as an independent candidate for the Fortythird congress, but having been a senator before his election to the Presidency, he was re-elected to the senate and served from March 4, 1875, until his death, July 31, 1875, at the home of his daughter in Carters Station, Carter county, Tenn., at the age of sixty-six years.

Ulysses Simpson Grant, intrepid soldier, laid down the task of the Presidency on March 4, 1877.

With his wife and youngest son he made a tour of the world, returning in 1879. He was boomed for a third term in 1880, but popular sentiment Against this course proved too strong. In New York city, to which he moved, he became presi-dent of the Mexican Southern railway and a special partner of the firm of Grant & Ward, but in 1884 this firm failed, the former general suffering an acute financial loss. In 1885 congress restored him to the rank of general, giving him full pay on the retired list. To recoup his fortunes he began to write his memoirs, but a cancerous growth in the throat placed a painful handicap upon him and he led July 23, 1885, at the age of sixty-three years.

Rutherford Birchard Hayes, who also had been a general in the Civil war, stepped out of the Presi-dential office on March 4, 1881. Until his death on January 17, 1893, his days were given over to education and philanthropy. At the end he was seventy years old.

chester Alan Arthur left the White House on March 4, 1885, and retired to New York, where death overtook him on November 18, 1886, a little more than a year after he had left the Chief Executiveship, at the age of fifty-six years.

Grover Cleveland stepped down from his high office as leader of the nation for the second time on March 4, 1897. He had first served from March 4, 1897. He had first served from March 4, 1899, but during the intervening four years this lone American, who is the only one in all history who was able to come back to the White House after he had left it, retired to New York to engage in the practice of law. He was called away from his briefs, however, by reselection to the Presidency in 1892. Accordingly, he served the second time for four years, beginning election to the Presidency in 1892. Accordingly, he served the second time for four years, beginning March 4, 1893. When his second term had been completed, Cleveland settled down in Princeton, N. J. At Princeton university he delivered an annual course of lectures on public affairs and wrote numerous articles. He died June 24, 1908, at the age of seventy-one years.

Benjamin Harrison bade an official forewell to 1898 Panasylvania avenue on March 4, 1892. This

Benjamin Harrison bade an official farewell to 1600 Pennsylvania avenue on March 4, 1892. This grandson of President William Henry Harrison then returned to the practice of law and delivered a course of lectures at Leland Stanford university on constitutional law. He served as counsel for Venezuela in the Anglo-Venezuelan Boundary Arbitration commission. He represented the United States in 1899 as a member of the Peace conference and became one of the International Board of Arbitration. In 1897 he had written "This Country of Ours." He died March 13, 1901, at Indianapolia, Ind., at the age of sixty-seven years.

Theodore Roosevelt left the White House on March 4, 1909, to plunge into another phase of his spectacular career. Following the outdoor life of which he was such an ardent advocate, he hunted and explored over a wide stretch of territory in Africa and South America. Disagreeing with his successor, Taft, he lost his fight to be chosen as the Republican standard-bearer in 1912 and formed his fame as Bull Moose party, making a strenuous campaign and being rewarded for it by the voters in running ahead of the regular Republican candidate. His offer to raise a division to aid America in the World war was rejected, but he was active in its cause with the pen. He died of heart trouble at Oyster Bay, N. T., on January 6, 1919, at the age of sixty-one years.

William Howard Taft surrendered his Presidential toga on March 4, 1812, and is now the only former President living. He taught law at Yale until 1921, the year Harding appointed him Chief Justice of the Supreme court, the post he now holds.




