NEWS REVIEW OF CURRENT EVENTS

Tremendous Fall in Prices of Stocks Checked by Buying by Bankers.

By EDWARD W. PICKARD

UTTER collapse of prices regardless of intrinsic values made the first three days of the week the wildest the stock exchanges of the country ever had experienced. Paper profits of many billions were wiped out and many thousands of amateur speculators who had been reveling in "easy money" for months were eliminated completely. The professional bears grimly hammered away and the hysterical public dumped their securities in such a flood that on Tuesday the total of shares sold on the New York Exchange was more than twenty-six

By Wednesday prices had reached so low a level that the big bankers, insurance companies and individual capitalists began buying heavily, and the immediate result was a recovery and steadying of the market. This buying was given the appearance of benevolence, to a certain extent, but the fact remains that the market did not receive such support until stocks had become a profitable investment.

President Hoover, and after him Julius B. Klein, assistant secretary of commerce, gave out statements insisting that the prosperity and the industries of the country were unaffected by the stock collapse and still absolutely sound. Business men generally did not bemoan the great readjustment in the stock markets. For a long time they have been suffering because so many citizens have been using their money in speculation instead of in the purchase of commodities.

The working staffs of the exchange and brokers' offices were so exhausted that a short session of the exchanges was held Thursday and they were closed up on Friday and Saturday to give the traders and clerks a chance to recuperate. The securities markets abroad adopted the same measure. It was generally felt that the crisis was over and that the confidence of the public was restored, and those who ad any money left began picking out pargains in stocks.

W IEAT prices having fallen too low, according to Chairman Legge of the federal farm board, who said this was due to the fact that a large part of the year's supply was being marketed too rapidly; the poard came o the rescue with a statement that \$100,000,000 were immediately avail able to farmers to stabilize prices. The board set the minimum prices on which loans will be carried until the end of the marketing season. The money will be lent to wheat co-operatives qualified as borrowers under the Capper-Volstead act. Under the plan announced, the farmer can get more than 50 per cent of the value of his wheat without selling it. Much of the money available already has been

The Farmers' National Grain corporation, organized under the auspices of the farm board, came into legal existence with the filing of its papers of incorporation in Wilmington, Del. it started functioning at once, with headquarters in Chicago. The launching of this corporation, which is exthe Central states, is considered the most important step yet taken by the farm board in carrying out President Hoover's farm relief policies as set forth in the agricultural marketing act The concern is expected to give the farmers control of their marketing and also to stabilize grain prices at a high level.

He undertook to justify in every way his efforts to keep the tariff high, was apparently frank and open in his statements, and quite unconcerned whether or not the committee classed him as a lobbyist. More than that, he delighted his unofficial hearers by his spirited attacks on what he classed as the "backward" states and their representatives in congress, asserting that they should "talk pretty darn small" on policies affecting the states that "form the tax reservoir of the country"-Pennsylvania, for in-

Pressed to name the "backward" states, Grundy declared to Senator W. E. Borah that the latter's presence in the senate is proof enough for Grundy of Idaho's backwardness. Similarly, he bluntly told Senator T. H. Caraway that any state which, like Arkansas, showed such little interest in a senatorial election that only 30,000 votes

were cast must be backward. Grundy listed as "backward" states Arizona, South Dakota, Mississippi, Arkansas, Idaho, Montana and Georgla, and he didn't think much of Wisconsin and North Dakota. The senators from all of these states, he "How would you silence Senator Borah and myself?" asked Senator Walsh.

"I should think your intelligence would suggest silence on such matters," retorted Grundy to the delight of the hearing room crowd, which roared with laughter.

Senator Bingham of Connecticut, whose employment of C. L. Eyanson to aid him in tariff bill work was severely criticized by the lobby committee, started a bitter debate in the senate by declaring the committee was packed against the administration and that its members were playing poll-

SENATOR BLEASE of South Carolina, some ministers of Washington and various other persons have been loudly blaming President Hoover for the liquor and vice conditions prevalent in the national capital and demanding that he clean up that city. The Washington Times has been publishing articles exposing the liquor traffic there and its city editor, being called before the grand jury, gave a list of sixty speakeasies and bootleg gers. Three Times reporters who were supposed to have purchased liquor at these places in the course of their investigations were summoned by the grand jury and refused to give that body the names and addresses of those from whom they had bought the drinks, declaring this would make them dry snoopers and cause them to lost their positions. Judge Peyton Gordon thereupon sentenced the re-porters to jail for forty-five days for contempt of court.

> EIGHTY-SIX American officers and soldiers who were members of the expeditionary force at Archangel in 1918 and 1919 and perished there are on their way back to Michigan, their home state. The bodies, retrieved by the graves commission, were conveyed on board the Soviet steamer Lieutenant Schmidt to Havre, France, whence they were to be brought to the United States by an American battleship. Sixty-two of the dead have been identified. All were members of the Detroit Three Hundred and Thirty-ninth infantry.

> TALIAN Fascism celebrated its seventh anniversary with much eclat, and needless to say Premier Mussolini was the central figure of the affair. In an address to 60,000 Black Shirts in Rome the Duce reviewed the progress Italy had made under his rule and gave it his full approval. > TRAGEDIES on Lake Michigan cost A number of lives. The liner Wisconsin from Chicago foundered in a storm off Racine and fifteen persons, atnong them Capt, Douglas H. Morrison, drowned despite the heroic efforts of life guard crews. Sixty others were saved. Later in the week the steamship Senator and the ore boat Marquette collided north of Milwaukee, the former going down with a dozen persons, and the Marquette barely reaching port.

> FOREMOST in the week's death list is the name of Theodore E. Burton, United States senator from Ohio, who passed away in Washington after a month's illness at the age of seventy-seven years. He had served a total of forty-four years in congress. After many terms in the house he was sent to the senate. Later he returned to the house, and finally went back to the senate. He was one of the leaders of the Republican party. Funeral services for Senator Burton were held in the senate chamber in the presence of President Hoover and other high officials and ten senators accompanied the body to Cleveland.

Unnatural History Notes



COLORADO

There's a lot of things you never learn at school, There's a lot of things that's never taught by rule; There's an awful lot of knowledge

THE TOTE ROAD SHAGAMAW, MICH

That you never get at college;
There's a lot of things you never learn at school.

THE grade schools the children re taking nature study. In high school they learn zoology and botany. In college they broaden their knowledge of all living things by studying blology. But there is one branch of science which the textbook writers and the teachers have neglected. It is the somewhatless-than-exact science of unnatural history-the best exemplifi-

cation of the sentiment expressed in the old song quoted above.

For unnatural bistory is one of the things "you never learn at school." To become acquainted with its fascinating facts you must go-not to books but to the source of all true knowledge, to peopie. And there is one class of men who are better fitted than any other to give these facts. They are the simple men who lived close to the soil and whose brief snatches of leisure between long hours of hard work were usually given over to spinning yarns for the amusement of themselves and their fellows. In telling their tall tales they invented mythical characters of heroic proportions who performed prodigious feats and whose every activity was carried out on a vast scale.

Such were the old-time lumberjack and the oldtime cowboy, who have given to us Paul Bunyan, the super-lumberjack, and Pecos Bill, the supercowboy, whom the students of folklore characterize as the best and almost only examples of native American myth heroes. More than that, in telling of the deeds of these legendary heroes, these saga-singers peopled their world with strange creatures, bizarre in appearance and fan tastic in habits

Not only did they invent their yarns for their own pleasure but they often repeated and embroidered them for the express purpose of "stuffing the tenderfoot" or "hazing the pilgrim." So if you would learn the most interesting "facts' in unnatural history, go to a lumberjack or a cow boy and by your unsophisticated manner and naive questions, give him a chance to tell you about some of the strange creatures which he has seen in the course of his career.

If it's a lumberjack you're talking to, the chances are that one of the first animals he will tell you about is the bodag. Although the bodag is now extinct, the one specimen having been cap tured near Rhinelander, Wis., years ago, all lumberjacks know about the hodag and how it came into being. Once upon a time there was an ox which had led an unusually hard fife at the hands of his various drivers up in the north woods of Wisconsin. Among lumberjacks it is believed that the hide of an ox is invulnerable to everything but the profanity of its drivers. When the animal dies, its customary burial ceremony is cremation, and it requires seven years of continuous fire to reduce to ashes all the profanity which has accumulated in its body during its life-

So when this particular ox died, a brush fire was built around its body and kept going for seven years to obliterate all the curses which had been beaped upon it in English, French, Irish, Scandinavian and German while it had tolled in the lumber camps. At the end of the seventh year the fire was allowed to die down but instead of there being left no trace of the ox, out of the heap of ashes, there rose, phoenix-like, a fearso creature, such as is pictured above, which exhaled obnoxious odor and the swish of whose tail the earth tremble.

After its capture the hodag was put to death, skinned and mounted. For years it was exhibited in an old barn near Rhinelander and thousands of people journeyed there to view it until the barn burned down and all traces of this creature vanished from the earth. But even though the hodag is extinct, there are other equally interesting creatures still in the north woods, your lumberjack friend will tell you, some of whom make it exceedingly dangerous for a tenderfoot to stray far from the lumber camp by himself. Of course, you may not see them, but that doesn't prove that they are not there. If you find in the woods a set of tracks that puzzle you, they were probably left there by the tote road shagamaw. Its hind legs have the hoofs of a moose and its forelegs the paws of a bear. When it is tired of traveling on one set of legs. is so baffling to hunters. The tote road shagamaw is shy and harmless but look out for the agropelter and the gumberoo! The agropelter has a long body and arms like a spider monkey. It has a perpetual grudge against mankind and it hides in hollow trees, out of which It springs, tears off a huge branch of a tree and cracks the skull of the luckless tenderfoot as he passes by. The gumberoo lives in burned-over forests and is therefore easily avoided. It is larger than a bear and has a round leathery body which nothing can pierce. If a hunter fires at it the bullet rebounds from its tough hide, strikes the marksman and usually kills him. The only thing that can kill it is fire and often during forest fires the lumberjacks hear loud explosions

which are gumberoos blowing up in the flames. All of the foregoing animals are known to lumberjacks of the north woods from Maine to Minnesota. When the lumber industry expanded west, the lumbermen discovered many other interesting creatures which are known both to them and to the cowboys, the scene of whose activities bordered on theirs. For instance there is the roperite which is as large as a small pony and has a long rope-like beak with a slip-noose on the end. With this natural lariat the roperite catches even the swiftest jackrabbit and sometimes rope derfoot. Then there is the tripodero wit two telescopic legs. Its beak is like the muz of a gun with a sight on the end. Going thr the brush it raises and lowers itself to lo game and, upon seeing some, tilts itse right angle, sights along its beak a fly with a pellet of clay, a quanti being always carried j dero has never bee

Although lumberfacks and cowboys have been the principal contributors to the origins of unnatural history, too much credit cannot be given to editors, and especially editors of country papers, for their part in preserving it for future generations of Americans who are unlikely to 'learn it at school." It is to a number of them that the author of this article is indebted for information about two creatures, without a description of which no unnatural history notebook would be complete. One is the gilly-loo or phillyloo bird and from descriptions furnished by R. F. Fuller of the Rhame (N. D.) Review, Larry Flint of the Sharon (Pa.) Herald, "Uncle Jimmy" of the Harlowtown (Mont.) Times, Ben E. Manning of the Riddle (Ore.) South Umpqua News, W. M. Huff of the Claffin (Kan.) Clarion and L. O. Johnson of Livingston, Mont., a fairly accurate idea of the appearance and habits of the philly-

The philly-loo is a comic supplement of the ancient rarustarus, is related to the wild coldshuts and fuzzy-billed sidewinders and in some respects resembles the galliwampus. It has a beak like a stork, one arm to guide itself, and a long lizard tail, which it usually carries in the shape of a Q and which leaves a track like a modern nonskid tire. It is covered with horse feathers and from it is obtained not only horse feathers but it slaw. Its most distinguishing characteristic is that it flies upside down and if it were not for this fact more would be known about it. For when the hunter shoots the philly-loo it falls up instead of down and therefore but few specimens have been collected. The reason for its flying apside down is that it can thus absorb more violet rays from the blue sky and stave off rheu-

The other interesting animal is the gyascutus. Editha L. Watson of the Colorado Graphic, Denver, the daughter of an old-time country newspaper man, has written the following description of this creature:

The gyascutus is about the size of a white-tail deer, has ears like a rabbit, and teeth like a mountain lion. Its coat is brindle, and its eyes are red. It has a long and prehensile tail, which it wraps around rocks when it turns around, for a little

It has a long and prehensile tail, which it wraps around rocks when it turns around, for a little extra leverage.

It has telescopic legs, which arrangement enables it to graze around the sides of mountains, the two right or left legs, as the case may be telescoping to about half the length of the other two. For this reason it can eat either to the right or the left, but has some difficulty in turning around, as it appears that the two hind legs or the two front ones will not telescope at the same time, only one side at a time having this power. Hence the long tail, which it wraps around the rocks, often pulling them out of the ground with the labor of its exertions in turning around.

The gyascutus eats the tan and green lichens which adhere closely to rocks on hills, and in the process, wears little trails around the mountainsides, which many people have noticed.

When disturbed, this animal digs a hole in the ground very rapidly, disappearing almost immediately, so that sight of one is very rare. The holes are often mistaken for prospect holes, but the seeker for ore would be amazed to find a gyascutus upon farther digging.

The gyascutus is seen only after a snake-bite—and the subsequent treatment—by the observer. This causes one to wonder if this animal and the snake are not in some way affiliated. This is a subject which will bear investigation.

Gyascutf, while rare, are not extinct, but have been run into the ground so often that they are almost unknown.


