declined and fewer loans are being made for machinery purchases. Interest rates have decreased for

The downturn in farm income is
not reflected in the land market.
Bankers believed the price of
"good" farmland widely repre-

ranchand values increased one per
cent. More than a fifth of the

appreciation of land values in the
