Education Agency and, last year, was one of the first schools approved under the new accreditation



Jacobs came to the Bovina Schools as high school principal in mid-term, 1966, and assumed the superintendent's position at the start of the 1968 school year.

During this period, Mrs. Jacobs has been a classroom teacher and librarian in the Bovina Schools.

The resignations of Mr. and Mrs. Jacobs are effective as of July 1, after which he will assume the night, anticipating a public hearing concerning expenditure of Revenue Sharing Funds, but the hearing never took place. No one appeared to suggest anything.

Diane Gilbreath, who runs on three Fillies' relay teams, sprained an ankle just prior to Saturday's finals, and for awhile it appeared that Bovina's hopes for a second shot at a state meet title might go down the drain.

But Miss Gilbreath competed in spite of her injury, and competed well.

All three of Bovina's relay teams, the 440-yard, 880-yard and mile relay foursomes, qualified for the state meet, each one finishing second.

"Considering what happened, I suppose we were real fortunate to have come out like we did. Diane's performance, although she was injured, showed a lot of character," said Fillies' coach Joel Nelson.
