
Feeds Six Ducks;

Brings Thousands Winnipeg .- Raids of swarms of

wild ducks, estimated to number at least 3,000, are causing great trouble to farmers in the vicinity of Rocky Mountain House, Alberta.

Lacking sufficient natural feed, owing to unusual conditions in the five-mile area of spring-fed marsh at the heads of Raven and Clear creeks, they are ravaging farmers' barnyards and stealing food laid out for cattle and poultry.

This situation is confirmation of the Biblical prophecy that bread cast upon the waters shall come back several-fold. Seven years ago a farmer, one Budden, fed three pairs of wild ducks over winter. Next year a larger flock came back to the vicinity and the number has increased each year, indicating that news has a way of getting around in birdland.



In This Gay Window Treatment Color Achieves an Effect of Sunshine, and Flowers and Foliage Give the Cheer the View May Lack.

HOW to curtain windows in sunless | In the window treatment of a living lies but a very short time, so that the light filtering through, or falling on, the material gives an impression of sunshine, is a subject that every homemaker has to consider at one time of another. It is amazing the difference in the cheerful aspect of the room, when the curtains are well chosen for this purpose, and when they are not. A dreary room can be transformed into a pleasant one through correct curtaining and since the aspect of a room reacts on the spirits and even the health of occupants, the matter assumes importance.

1/st us take one of the hardest probvery parrow street, or close to a wall, which in a common one in city apartments. The impression of sunshine and verdure can be instilled into the treatment by having pane or glass curtains of yellow, and hangings of green. The range of suitable glass curtain materials is from a good quality of cheese cloth or scrim, costing little, to expensive nets and lace. And for draperies the range is from crepe to choice silk damask. It is assumed that the best that the purse can afford without straining its strings will be chosen for the materials, and that the kind will be selected to accord with the room, whether a main one or a minor one. The effect that is sought is not of elegance but is one of color and artistry in bringing about specific

Curtain Arrangement.

It is important to remember that the curtaining must not be heavy enough to shut out the light. It will, of course, dim it somewhat but by arlems to solve, which is the curtaining ranging the draperies to fall over the of windows opening on an areaway, a frame of the window rather than the glass, and by having the pane curtains as sheer as possible a minimum of light is dimmed. It is only when the view through the window is to be actually shut off that the pane curtains need to meet.

A secondary color scheme is rose and green, either color may be used for the pane and either for the drapery curtaining. While this scheme does not convey the effect of sunshine but of galety the cheerful aspect is stressed. Firelight rather than sunshine is simulated. However, the color scheme of a room is a determining factor. For pane curtains, tones rather than strong colors should be chosen. Hangings may be more intense but pure tone is hard to harmonize with other colors in

a room.





The Iroquois Interpreter

IN THE courthouse at Canandaigua, N. Y., hangs the portrait of a manwho was once "a leading citizen" of that place. But that characterization tells only the least interesting part of the story of Jasper Parrish, interpreter for the Iroquois.

Born at Windham, Conn., in 1767, asa boy he was taken by his parents tothe headwaters of the Delaware river in New York where they were living at the outbreak of the Revolution. In 1778 eleven-year-old Jasper was carried away by a raiding party of Munsee Indians who sold him a few months later for \$20 to a Delaware Indian family. For the next two years helived as an Indian boy and learned to speak the Delaware tongue.

At that time the Delawares were under the domination of the Iroquois, or Six Nations, and after the defeat of the Iroquois by General Sullivan in 1779 some of the Delawares accompanied their masters to Fort Niagara. There Jasper was sold again for \$20, this time to a Mohawk called Capt. David Hill. For the next five years he lived among the Mohawks, learning their tongue as he had learned the Munsee and the Delaware and finally being adopted into the tribe.

After the Revolution, under the terms of the treaty of 1784 between the Six Nations and the United States by which the Iroquois agreed to give up their white prisoners, young Parrish was set free and traced his longlost family to Goshen, N. Y., where he joined them. Then began a slow and painful process for the "White Indian" of learning again his native tongue and of thinking and acting as a white man.

By 1792 the Iroquois were becoming restless under the increasing pressure white settlement and President Washington appointed Gen. Israel Chapin of Massachusetts as agent to them. Needing an interpreter and learning that young Parrish not only was skilled in all the six dialects of the Iroquois but that he had their confidence and love as well, Chapin appointed him official interpreter.

In 1803 President Jefferson appointed Parrish sub-agent to the Six Nations and so well did he perform the tasks of that office that he was continued in it during the next administrations-those of Madison, Monroe, Adams and Jackson-a record of continuous service by an Indian agent which has few, if any, equals. It was mainly due to Parrish's influence over the Iroquois that they remained loval to the United States, instead of joining the British, at the outbreak of the War of 1812, and to the day of his death in 1836 Parrish held their esteem and used it to promote better relations between red men and white.

"Envoy Extraordinary"

tiersman entered the stage station at Wheeling, W. Va., and finding that the coach for Cumberland, Md., had already left, demanded in a lordly tone that another one be provided for him forthwith, "Who are YOU?" demanded the stage agent disdainfully. Drawing himself up to his full height of more than six feet, the travel-stained frontiersman replied: "Sir, I am Joe Meek, envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary from the Republic of Oregon to the Court of the United States." He got the coach!

Envoy or not, there is no question but that Joe Meek was "extraordipary." He was a native of Virginia who had run away from his home as a youth and who had become a famous trapper and trader in the West. By 1840 the tide of migration to the Pacific Northwest had set in and Meek, realizing that it spelled the doom of the fur business, decided to go to the

Oregon country to make a new start

in life. Then came the meeting of the Amer-Ican settlers at Champoeg on May 2, 1843, for the purpose of forming a provisional government and Meek's historic words "Who's for a divide? Those in favor of adopting the report of the committee, follow me," So 52 voted for it and 50 against, and by the narrow margin of two votes and the force of Joe Meek's personality, the first step in saving the Oregon country

for the United States was taken. Joe Meek was elected sheriff, thus giving him the honor of being the first American peace officer west of the Rockies. In the troublous times that followed, when Great Britain threatened to assert her sovereignty over this country and when the hostility of the Indians culminated in the Whitman massacre, the settlers turned again to Joe Meek.

It was he whom they selected to go to Washington and lay before President Polk the plea of the Oregon settlers to be taken into the fold of the United States. So, during the first week in March, 1848, he set out upon his epic journey across the continent which ended the last week in May. The result of his journey was that the federal government decided to accept Oregon as a territory and the appointment of Joseph Lane of Indiana as terri-torial governor. When Lane started for Oregon to assume office, his guide was Joe Meek now United States marshal for the country which he had helped save for the Stars and Stripes, and from that time to his death in


