Bovina Roping Club has the reputation of being an individualistic-type organization. That's a nice way of saying it has a tendency to be hard-headed and unorthodox.

Well, it should, though, because what started out as a little sure-enuff calf roping organization has evolved into an important civic club which is one of the most powerful when it comes to getting worthwhile community projects accomplished.

But, we're getting off the subject. With the club being by nature a little rebellious, it wasn't too surprising that the group would fall to go along with daylight savings time. For instance, the meeting for this month, which was Monday night, was called for 9 (nine) p.m.

But this aids in pointing out just how absurd and ridiculous daylight saving time is in this particular locality.

Maybe if lights were installed on the golf courses in metropolitan areas we could do away with this time-changing business.

Believe it or not, this department is sincerely proud of Parmer County Republicans. They have arranged a primary election for everyone in the county!

Bovina Republicans, for instance, will vote at the main school building. As far as we know, this is the first time Republicans have had a place to cast a primary ballot in the agricultural center of Parmer County.

We've had at least one come to the Democratic primary and request a Republican ballot. The request was impossible to comply with of course, and we didn't have any place to advise the potential voter to go . . . to vote.

This year, though, it will be understandable for voters to possibly go to the wrong primary election polls by mistake. As we've pointed out in this space previously, this is a great step forward for our area politically and we're proud to see the advancement made.

We believe that a stronger Republican party across the state would aid to a great extent in making the Democratic party stronger and more unified. That sounds like a left-handed way to go about strengthening the Demos, but we believe it would eventually work that way.

Bovina people we know are about as interested in being included in a junior college district with the facilities to be located at Hereford as they would be in a mump epidemic.

Sentiment here is that the junior college idea, on the aforementioned basis is premature and unneeded. At the present time, they argue, area students are having no difficulties in being enrolled in institutions of higher education in this vicinity and the time when this situation will change is not in sight.

The Hereford junior college idea has as its biggest drawback the fact that taxes, local ones—that's the worst kind, would be necessary to finance it. And these might be excessive, especially on the start.

An idea which was advanced two or three years ago which would have established a junior college at Muleshoe and would have included Parmer County in its district has been abandoned, evidently.

We haven't heard lately, but we assume that plans for the junior college are continuing. Included in the four county district are Parmer, Castro, Deaf Smith and Oldham.

Muleshoe voters, incidentally, turned down an opportunity to annex with the South Plains Junior College District (Level-land) in a recent election.

Their opportunity was considered greater than the one Parmer Countians are faced with, as we see it, because the Levelland school is already established and in operation. This would mean a lesser tax rate than for a district just starting out to build a college.

Too, there's a considerable amount of oil around Level-land and Whiteface which helps pay the overall tax. That's a big help, the figures show, and the four counties in our proposed district don't have any of that black gravy to boost the cause.

Primary Elections Slated Saturday

GOP Balloting Makes History

For the first time in history, a Republican Primary election will be held in Bovina this Saturday, according to Glenn Lust of Lazbuddie, county chairman.

Polling place for both Bovina and Rhea precincts will be Bovina Schools cafeteria with Herman Gerles serving as election judge. Precinct convention will be held in the cafeteria at 7:30 p.m.

In fact, Republican Primary elections will be held in all county precincts this year, with Farwell and Oklahoma Lane voting in Farwell City Hall and the precinct convention set for 2 p.m. there. John Getz is election judge.

At Friona, Republicans will vote at the American Legion Hall, Glenn Reeve, Sr., election judge, with the precinct convention beginning in the same location at 8 p.m.

The Lazbuddie school cafeteria will be the site of the election in that precinct with the convention set for 3 p.m. J. W. Gammon is election judge.

At 8 p.m. in the County Court House, Farwell, the Republican County Convention will be held, Lust said.

Leading the Republican Primary ballot is Bob Price for Congress, 18th District. Three candidates appear for the Republican nomination for governor, Paul Eggers, Wallace Sisk and John R. Trice.

One candidate each appears for the remainder of offices on the ballot, including Douglas DeCluit for lieutenant governor; Sproesser Wynn, attorney general; John M. Bennett, Jr., comptroller of public accounts; Manuel Sanchez, state treasurer; Millard K. Neptune, commissioner of the general land office; E. G. Schuhart, II, commissioner of agriculture; Jim Segrest, railroad commissioner; Frank Ford, state representative, 72nd District; Hugh Burdette, member, State Board of Education, District 18; R. L. (Bob) Jones, county commissioner, Precinct 3.

.22 Moisture Falls Sunday

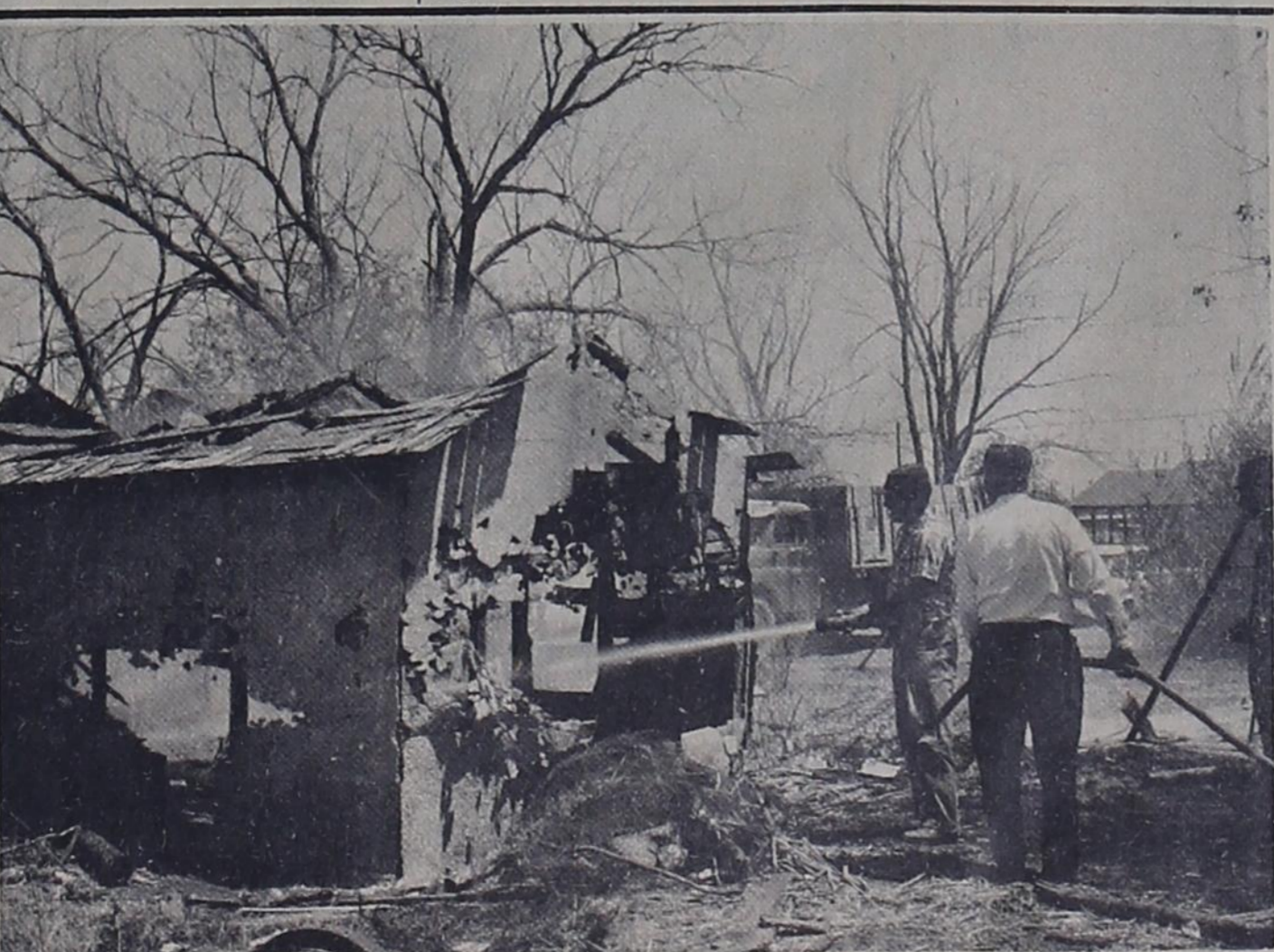
Rainfall measured .22 of an inch here Sunday, bringing the first measurable moisture to Bovina area this month.

North of Bovina up to .50 was measured on several farms, and south of town one farmer reported .30, although some received no rainfall at all.

Freezing temperatures were again recorded Monday morning, when the thermometer dropped to 25 degrees, leaving a heavy frost on the ground.

Whether or not wheat received damage in last week's freeze, which was thought to be less severe than the Monday morning one, has not yet been determined.

A Bovina grain man said it would be difficult to tell if there is damage until the wheat heads out.

county party chairman, Glenn Lust is on the ballot and there is a place for a write-in.

For precinct chairman, Precinct 2 (Friona), Glenn E. Reeve; Precinct 4 (Farwell), John Getz; Precinct 5 (Lazbuddie), Jimmy Briggs; and for a precinct that is not numbered, two write-in spaces.

Republicans will vote for three propositions, along with Democrats, that are an expression of public opinion and have no direct force or effect as law.

These include for or against liquor by the drink in wet areas only on a local option basis; for or against pari-mutuel wagering on a local option basis; and for or against the price control of retail and wholesale milk. Ten Hopefuls For Governor

Texans will go to the polls Saturday to mark their choices for state and county officials in the Democratic Primary election, the governor's race taking the widest interest this year.

Polling place in Bovina will be the American Legion Hall. Election judge is Precinct Chairman Dolph Moten. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Ten candidates are seeking the Democratic nomination for governor, which has in the past been the same as putting him in office. Appearing on the ballot in the following order will be Preston Smith, Pat O'Daniel, John Hill, Waggoner Carr, Eugene Locke, Dolph Briscoe, Edward L. Whittenburg, Don Yarbrough, Alfonso "Al" Veloz and Johnnie Mae Hackworth. Ben Barnes, Don Gladden and Gene Smith are seeking the office of lieutenant governor of Texas.

Only contested race in Parmer County is that of county commissioner, Precinct 3, (Farwell/Oklahoma Lane) with Neil Stewart and Guy Cox on the ballot.

Also receiving the attention of the voters are three propositions, which are stated on the ballot as being only an expression of public opinion and "has no force or effect as law."

No. 1 is for or against enactment by the Texas Legislature of a law permitting the legal sale of liquor by the drink in wet areas only after approval by local option elections, and which sale would be subject to strict regulation, effective controls and taxation thereof.

No. 2 is for or against enactment by the Texas Legislature of a law permitting horse racing with pari-mutuel wagering on a local option basis; creating a Texas Horse Racing Board with the power to regulate pari-mutuel wagering on horse races; granting two per cent of the total pari-mutuel pool each day to each county where there is a licensed race track; and apportioning among all other counties one-half of the

total state net revenue from that source.

No. 3 is for or against enactment by the Texas Legislature of a law creating the Texas Dairy Commission with the power to regulate and fix the retail and wholesale price of milk.
