Hats off to the Mustangs, who defeated the Farwell Steers in basketball during the holidays for the first time in some 13 years.

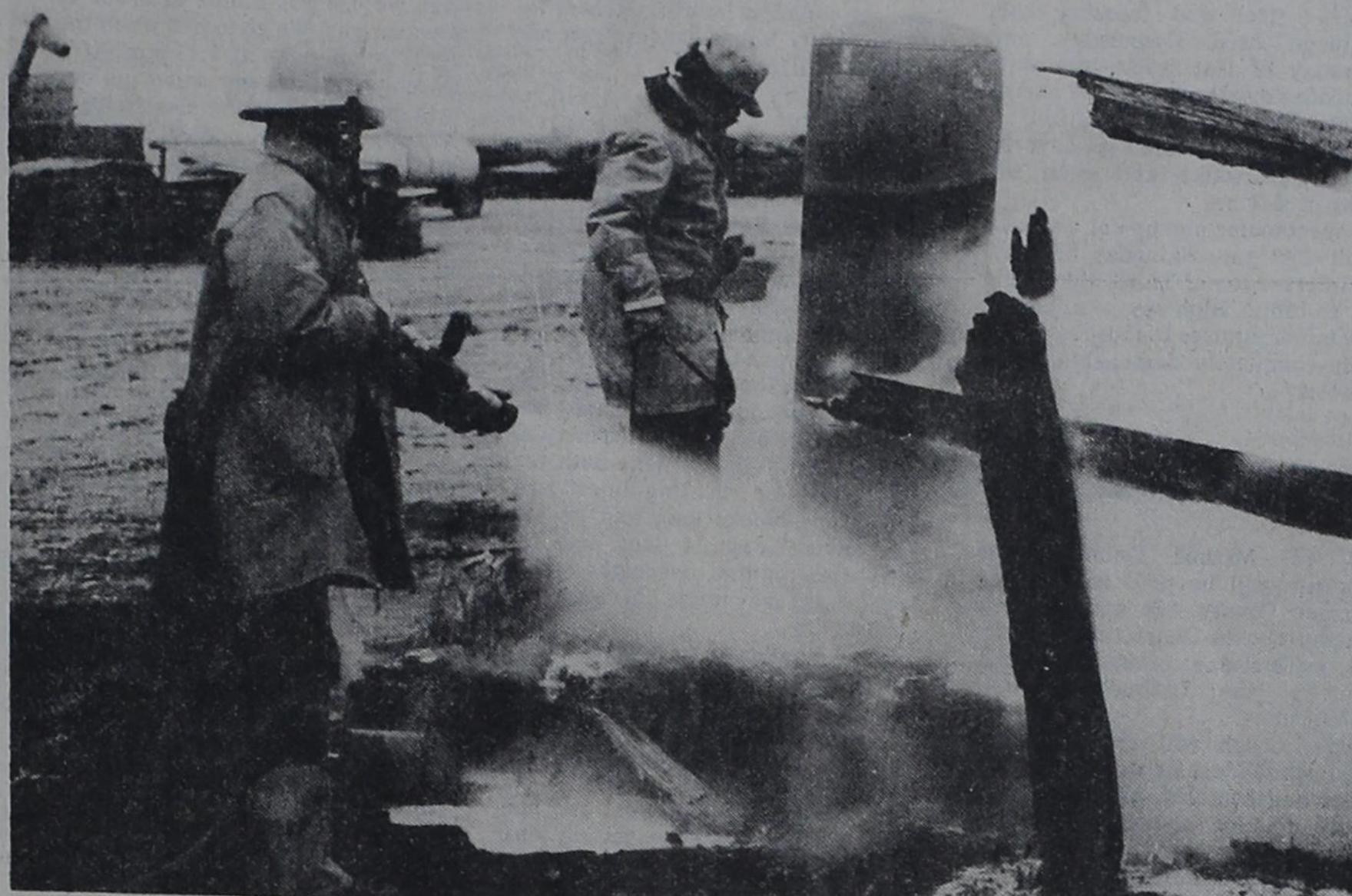

Ag Leaders Eye Washington Trip

Members of the American Agriculture Movement have been working recently toward sending representatives to attend the national tractorcade to Washington, D.C. next week.

Over 300 people were in attendance last Thursday at an AAM rally at Friona, and some 500 attended a similar rally the next night in Hereford. The crowds were considered good considering the adverse weather.

Then on Saturday, a number of the local AAM leaders attended an auction sale in Amarillo, which reportedly raised over \$20,000 in funds for the tractorcade.

Local AAM members have been huddling this week in an effort to determine how many from the local community and Parmer County will take their tractors and take part in the tractorcade to Washington, D.C.

At the Blade's press time, we were unable to find out who of the local leaders had made arrangements to go. One local AAM spokesman said it appeared that around ten farm leaders from Parmer County might join in the tractorcade.

It is the farmers' plans to drive the tractors all the way to Washington, leaving Amarillo on January 15. Additional AAM members are to go, and swap out with the driving duties. Plans were being formulated to take campers or mobile homes, in order to cut down on the expenses involved in making the trip, and also the motel expenses while in Washington.

"We estimated that we left \$23 million to add to the economy in Washington last winter. We don't want to spend quite that much money this time around, if we can help it," says Ralph Roming, local AAM spokesman.

The AAM leaders were told by key people in Washington, including Senator John Tower, that this could be the year for agriculture in Washington, D.C., but that congress won't likely pass favorable legislation unless the farmers come back in force, like they did in 1978.

So, farmers will be meeting January 15 to begin a long, lonely trek to Washington, in their tractors. We expect that the local area will be represented in their number.

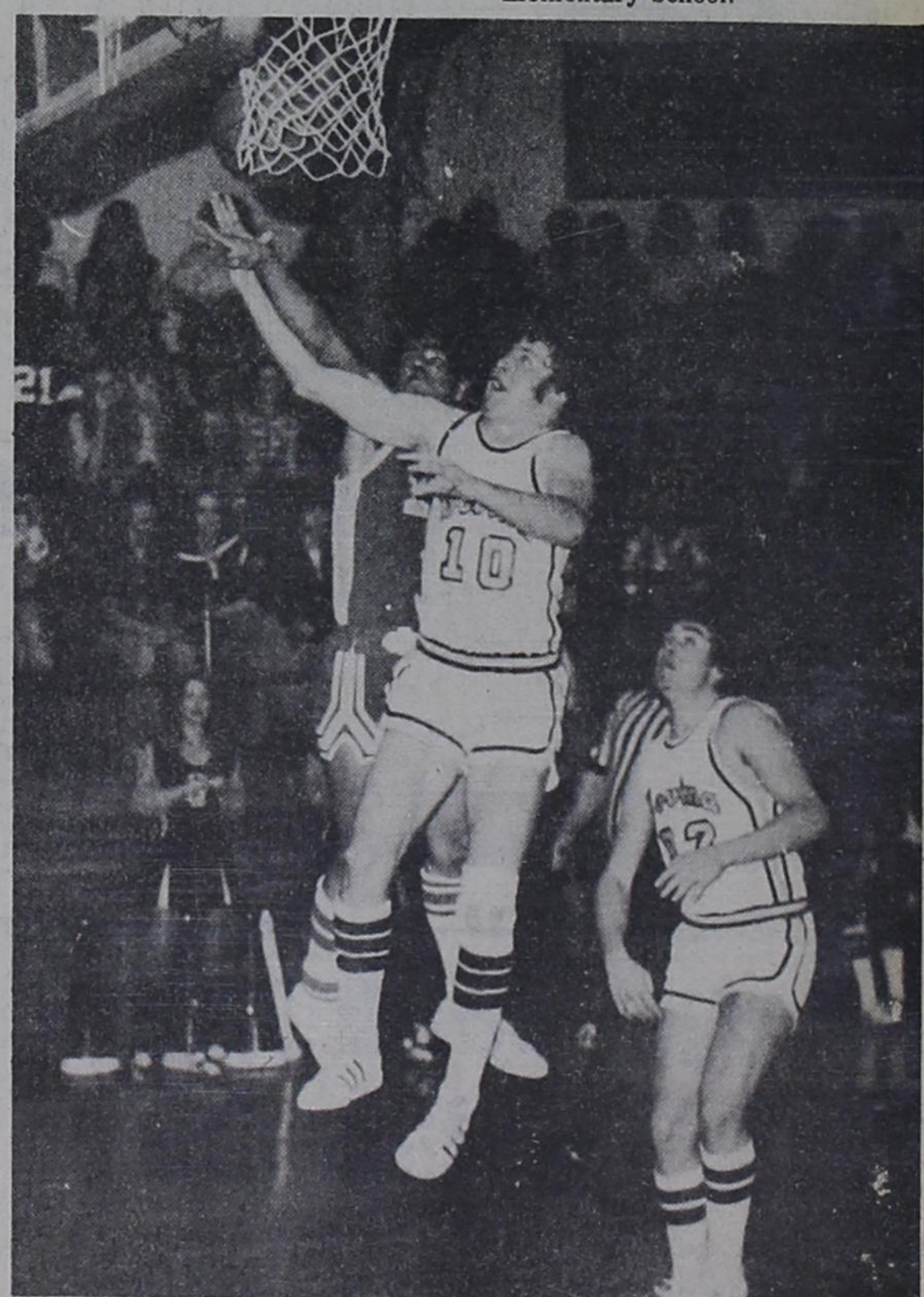

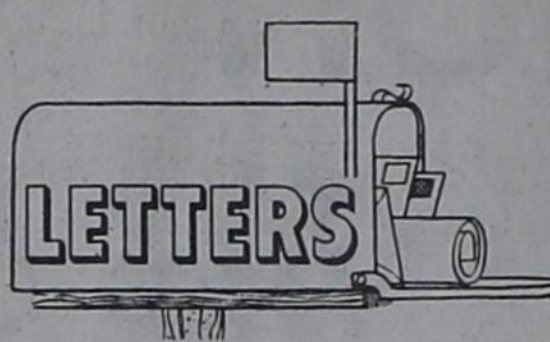

To The Editor

(Editor's note: The following letter was written to members of their Bovina family by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Dixon. Robert is the brother of John Dixon and the son of Mr. and Mrs. P.O. Dixon of Bovina. The letter gives a first-hand view of the current situation in Iran. Robert is employed by Butler-Culvern, an oil company in Iran.)

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Dear Family:

Things are moving fast these days—many, many companies have closed down either permanently or temporarily. Butler-Culvern today closed down officially for one week and sent all expatriates out indefinitely—that is, they are in the process of sending them out, one family leaves tomorrow and all others leave January 3rd except for Bob and one other expatriate. We will probably be last. The country is at a standstill—fuel is gone both for cars and for heating—lines are blocks and blocks long and people wait several days in lines, leaving their cars in line overnight when they must go home because of curfew.

Bob volunteered to stay on until the last as he feels a responsibility because of his position over here. He also wants to see that all others are taken care of before we leave. Our tickets have been purchased.

So far, we have had heat and hot water, but the water is getting less hot each day, and we find that we must put on sweaters tonight. We

have no idea how long we will have any hot water or heat, but we do have gas and electricity to take the chill off bath water. I guard my resources very carefully so as to have both electricity and gas to depend upon. We use candles more than we use gas lamps in order to save our gas. We go to bed when the lights go off—even at 5:15 p.m.—it is the only way to keep warm as our heat goes off when the electricity is off. We have the oddest hours. I wash clothes at all hours of the night, iron clothes the same.

We started to sort things out pretty carefully last night for going home. We have a round-trip ticket—will come to the States, but do not know how long we will stay as we are troubled with income tax—need our 510 days outside the U.S. for bona fide residence—or we lose about \$7,500. I guess we would lose even more than that because we can use foreign tax credit only in proportion to the number of days we are in and out of the country. The \$7,500 is lost to begin with before even considering the other factors—probably would mean at least a \$10,000 tax loss for last year—pretty sizeable. Also, we do not know what is going to happen relative to our income—cannot transfer money out and my Collins people are sending most of their people home. They have been our source for getting rials changed to dollars via travellers checks and personal checks. I fear that is just about to end.

We are well fixed for about 6 weeks—I have powdered milk, cereal, eggs, meat (including tuna), 4 kilos rice, dried beans, dried vegetables, etc., to see us through 6 weeks. We could get by without ever leaving the house for that time. I even have corn meal and flour for corn bread, have soda water to drink that is unflavored, unsweetened, have dried green peppers, dried celery, bullion cubes, etc., and enough money to buy a few fresh fruits and lettuce if such should arrive at the shops—which I doubt because of no gasoline. Few people are geared to survival like I am. Bob tends to think I am a little daft, but I feel the responsibility for survival is on my shoulders so far as food is concerned.

When Bob was in Mashad early this week, I stood in line 40 minutes to fill the car with gas, and we are going to walk to work most of the time just to be sure we have gas for emergencies. Tomorrow, Bob says we are driving, but after that, we intend to walk. I pack lunches so we do not have to drive home at noon. People are now standing in lines for days for gasoline and fuel—I have both—Bob stopped a truck in the street a few weeks ago to get cooking fuel so he gets credit for that. But it is cool in the house tonight.

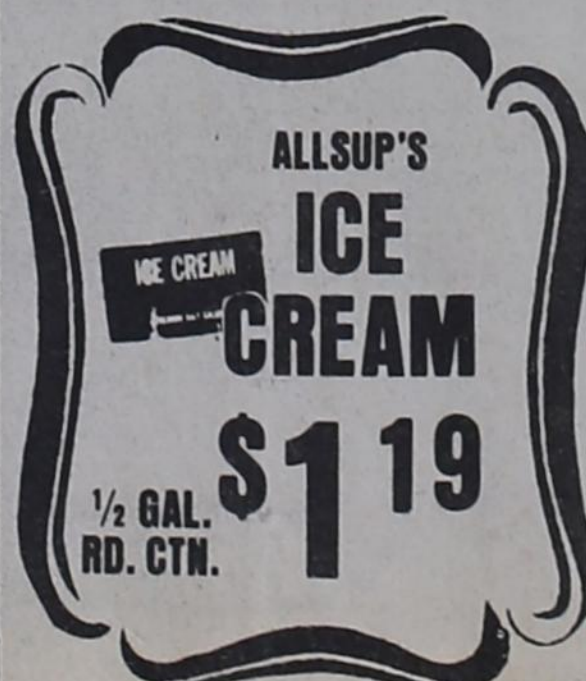

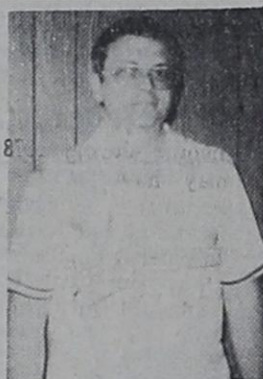
