#### cents for a five pound bag to \$3.14 for the same bag of sugar-and higher. Buyers were appalled. So they stopped using so much sugar. They found substitutes, or did without.

The price of sugar leveled off and has been coming back down. The price came down because the supply increased as demand fell off.

The law of supply and demand has a way of adjusting these things out to everyone's benefit -- if the government doesn't set artificial controls or subsidies.

The same thing would have worked in the cattle industry, when the government decided to step in instead and set price ceilings.

If we leave the producers and the consumers alone, they usually find an equitable way to buy and sell. It's called supply and demand.

SPACE IS BACK in the news this week, with the United States and Russian cooperative venture finally here. Although this week's mission doesn't sound as glamorous as going to the moon, it could be the most ambitious to date.

The Appolo-Soyuz mission could be another "giant leap for mankind," if it helps break down the cold war that formerly existed between the two countries.

The expected handshake 140 miles in space on Thursday is seen as the height to which the policy of "detente" has been carried.

The Russian people and their government are still a suspicious lot. Russian officials just can't overcome their old policy of secrecy. It was believed that the Russian people would get to see Tuesday morning's blastoff of the Soyuz mission, and if they did, it would be their first glimpse of a space mission.

On the other side of the coin, up to a million Americans were to be on hand at Cape Canaveral, Florida for the blastoff, while millions of others watched on television, as they have done throughout America's space program.

Personally, we hate to see the Apollo space program ending. Those of us living during the past decade have been privileged to see history in the making, by our nation conquering space and sending men to the moon and back.

Many have said that the program was a waste of money, when the billions of dollars could have been better spent curing ills here on earth.

Plane Clips Pickup


In Bizarre Collision

Three men narrowly escaped serious injuries in a bizarre plane-pickup collision Wednesday morning of last week at the Agri-Sprayers landing strip west of Bovina on the Pleasant Hill highway.

Tommy Williams of Bovina and Stan Jenssen and Rick McConnell of York, Neb., agronomists with Pioneer Seed Company, were the men involved.

Williams had taken the men, who were visiting him, back to the runway and was sitting in his 1975 Chevrolet pickup parked near the Agri-Sprayers office when the accident occurred.

The pilot, after taxiing to the south end of the runway, was attempting to take off. The plane, apparently failing to gain sufficient power to get airborne, clipped Williams' pickup


on the driver's side with the fuel tank on the left wing of the Piper 180 four-place plane. The plane bounced across the highway, coming to rest about 100 yards north of the highway on an abandoned air strip. The fuel tank, which clipped the pickup landed a short distance behind the plane.

Williams estimated \$1000 damage to his pickup. Preliminary damage estimates on the plane ranged from \$10,000 to \$15,000. The plane sustained damage to its wings, nose and undercarriage.

Bovina's fire department and ambulance was called to the scene, but were not needed. One of the men suffered a scraped knuckle for the only injury in the rather odd accident.

School taxes in the Bovina district will be raised for 1975-76, to meet the needs of the school's expanding budget. The exact amount of the raise has not as yet been determined by the school board.

It was stated that the exact budget for 1975-76 has not been finalized, hence the question about what the raise will be.

At the present time, the tax rate on school district property is \$1.83 per \$100 evaluation. Property is taxed on the basis of thirty-three and one-third per cent of its evaluation.

Every taxpayer's taxes will be raised an equal percentage. The last raise in taxes came eight years ago, and school officials point out that spiraling operating costs in virtually every area have pushed the school to where it has no alternative but to raise taxes for the coming year.


#### 15 YEARS AGO-JULY 13, 1960

A temporary permit will be issued Salt River Valley Produce Co. to operate a cantaloupe packing shed on Highway 86. City Commissioners voted last week to issue the permit on an 80-day basis to allow the firm to operate this packing season.

A statement, issued by the commissioners, pointed out that the cantaloupe firm had no other place to go with a shed and that the commissioners would like to have the business enterprise here although they realize the location is out of zone.

Bovina rain gauges that were emptied often enough registered some 10 inches of rainfall from Monday afternoon to Saturday morning. A funnel cloud was spotted northwest of town Friday evening. Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter said he watched the cloud for several minutes.

Lightning that apparently tra-



veled down a television antenna started a fire in the Boyd Gilreath home in Bovina during a thunderstorm Friday afternoon. Gilreath estimated damage at from \$2500 to \$3000.

Duane Rea, outstanding Bovina FFA member, was notified this week that his American Farmer application has been approved by the state commission and will be sent to national competition. The letter also said that Rea could expect the results from the national judging by August 10.

Mrs. Dottie Stark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. I.W. Quickel of Bovina, has been appointed director of special education for Iving Schools.

In the democratic primary and general election of 1962, Parmer County voters will elect for the first time a district clerk separate from the county clerk. Separation of the two offices, which have in the past been held by one man, will take effect due to the county's population exceeding 8,000 in the 1960 census. The county population in 1950 was 5,787 and this year's census showed a populace of 9,494. + + + +





The most humorous speaker at the recent Texas Press Association Convention in El Paso was Abe Lemons, basketball coach and athletic director at Pan American University in Edinburg. On another occasion, his star player failed to attend a banquet at which all team members were instructed to be present. "Naturally, I had to discipline the boy, so I told him he'd have to play every minute of the game .... he couldn't come out and rest at all. It was real tough on him and, besides, he scored 35 points." Lemons said he wasn't worried about the future of college athletics--the women's movement, new rules and regulations, etc. "I remember when I was a little boy, my dad took me on a train ride to a place near Wichita Falls to see more buffalo. He told me that the buffalo would soon be extinct, and he wanted me to see some of them before they were all gone. "Well, we have more buffalo now than ever, but the TRAIN is extinct. So, I just do my job and have fun at it and let other people worry."

+ + + +**BEEF FACTS** The United States is the world's largest beef producer.

Each major beef producer puts beef on the table of 2,120 Americans each day.

The industry is made up of ranchers and farmers with beef cow herds or stocker operations producing feeder cattle, and the cattle feeders and feedlot operators who purchase the feeder cattle and finish them for market.

Eighty-three per cent of our land is not suitable for producing crops for human consumption, but nearly half of that land grows grass and forage which feeds cattle. Seventy-eight per cent of a beef

animals' diet is composed of materials humans cannot use.

Beef prices fluctuate because supply and demand are ever-chang-

It is wiser to consider meat at the cost per serving rather than cost per pound.

Most beef cuts contain less than 250 calories for a 31/2 ounce serving,

so weight watchers may enjoy beef, too.

> A 31/2 ounce serving of cooked lean beef will provide 50 to 60 per cent of the protein required each day for teenagers.




