## Bovina Schools Set Registration Date

Bovina Schools begin the 1972-'73 school year Monday, August 21.

Registration for kindergarten pupils, first graders, junior high and high school students is scheduled for Friday, August 18, Superintendent L. F. Jacobs announced this week.

Faculty members will begin their school year a week earlier than students -- Monday, August 14. They will report then for in-service work from 8:30 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. each day. A general faculty meeting has been called for 9 a.m. Monday in the high school library, says Jacobs.

Friday's registration of high school students will be in the library, according to Principal Gary Cox. The schedule is as follows:

Seniors -- 8 to 9 a.m.; Juniors -- 9 to 10 a.m.; Sophomores -- 10 to 11 a.m.; Freshmen -- 11 a.m. to 12.

New students are asked to register at the time their respective class registers.

Junior high students will register in their various classrooms. Eighth graders will register from 9 to 10 a.m. and seventh grade students will register from 10 until 11 a.m.

New junior high students will register at those times, according to Principal Jim Noyes.

Kindergarten and first grade students who did not pre-register this spring will register at Ridgelea Elementary School from 8:30 until noon Friday, says Wilson DiCuffa, elementary principal.

Pupils in grades two through six will register Monday, August 21.

Parents are reminded that under the state's compulsory immunization law, all school level children must be immunized against five communicable diseases -- diphtheria, measles, tetanus and poliomyelitis -- before they will be allowed to enroll.

Measles immunization is not required if there is a history of the illness. Smallpox, which was originally a required immunization, has been removed from the list by the State Board of Health.

Two positions on the faculty remain to be filled, said Jacobs.

Still needed are a girl's basketball coach and an elementary or junior high teacher.

A tentative school calendar for this year has recently been approved by the school board, Jacobs stated.

First holiday of the new year will be Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 4, with the first six weeks to end Sept. 29.

The end of the second six-week period will fall on Nov. 3 with a holiday set Nov. 10 for a district teachers' meeting.

Thanksgiving holidays will be Nov. 23-24.

First semester exams have been set for Dec. 21 and 22. Next holiday on the schedule will be Christmas beginning Dec. 23 through Jan. 2. Teachers

will report for in-service work on Jan. 2.

Jan. 5 will mark the end of the first semester.

Fourth six weeks will end Feb. 15 with the next day being a teachers work-day, April 6 marks the end of the fifth six weeks.

Easter holidays have been tentatively set for April 14 through 22.

May 21 will be a teachers work-day with final exams being given on May 22 and 23. May 24 will also be a teachers work-day.

Eighth grade graduation exercises will be May 24 with senior graduation the following day. Baccalaureate will be May 21.

Jacobs pointed out that the calendar is subject to change due to school days missed because of bad weather or other reasons.

## Railroad Gates Council Subject

Bovina's city council approved the audit of financial records at a regular monthly session Monday night.

The audit was for the 12-month period beginning May 1, 1971 and ending April 30 of this year.

Councilmen voted to continue to go along with a state-sponsored project to install railroad crossing gates at the east crossing in Bovina. The plan calls for 80 per cent of the cost to be paid by the state with the city and the railroad each paying 10 per cent.

Original estimate for the total project was \$15,000. The city's part of that amount would have been \$1,500. However, the actual cost figured to \$18,608.86, making the amount the city is responsible for \$1,860.87.

In the letter from the state highway department advising the city of the amount, no mention was made as to when the installation will be made.

The board formally approved the employment of Andy Garza as water and sewer superintendent. Garza succeeded Darrel Read at the position in mid-July.

The council agreed to seek the opinion of the city attorney in regard to allowing a trailer house to be located in a B zone.

Present at the session, which was postponed from Thursday night, were Mayor Johnnie Horn, Councilmen Don Spring, Vernon Estes, Vernon Willard and Dolph Moten and Mrs. Mary Ruth Martin, city secretary.

## Arrest Three On Drug Rap

Three 20-year-old men were taken into custody and charged with possession of marijuana about 1 a.m. Sunday at Bovina's city park by City Marshal Ronald Mitchell and Deputy Sheriff Henry Minter.

Farwell Justice of the Peace Ray Mears set bond at \$2500 each for the three men. They were released from Parmer County jail Monday morning.

Mitchell discovered the alleged illicit substance after Fowler, driving a 1972 Pinto, tried to elude him in the vicinity of the park.

Upon a search of the car, he discovered one bag of a substance believed to be marijuana under the seat of the car. Two other bags were found on one of the suspects and cigarette papers and a cigarette-making machine on the other.

The odor of burning marijuana and incense prompted the

law official to search the vehicle and men.

The arrests were the fourth incidence of drug violations in the community in the past several months.

There is no shaft tunnel on the floor of the car to take up leg room, the back seat accommodates two adults and the trunk is a pretty good size. Are convenience foods worth high price tags? Or do they really cost that much?

A study has revealed that some convenience foods cost as much as three times the price of ingredients needed to prepare similar foods at home.

But the study also showed that some cost less than their homemade counterparts.

Homemakers generally pay a higher price for convenience.

In the study, each of four commercially prepared frozen, ready-to-heat dinners of meat loaf, beef, fried chicken and turkey cost more than if prepared at home. Costs for fried chicken dinners averaged 25 per cent higher.

Costs were based on home-prepared dinners that had the same amount of food (meat, potatoes, and a second vegetable) as commercial dinners. Cost relationships might have differed substantially if home-prepared dinners had used another cut of meat or poultry.

For example, the home-prepared fried chicken dinner used a whole ready-to-cook frying chicken (cut up) costing 42 cents a pound.

If the meal had served chicken parts -- breasts with ribs and legs -- at 65 cents a pound, the dinner would have totaled 35 cents instead of 25 cents.

The commercial fried chicken dinner, then, would have cost only 50 per cent more than the home meal rather than 110 per cent higher.

Some brands of frozen ready-to-heat main dishes cost much more than other brands, partly because they contain more meat or poultry.

One brand of beef pie, for instance, cost twice as much while another cost about the same as beef pie made from a home recipe.

The less expensive frozen pie contained only three-fourths as much meat as the homemade pie. Similarly, one brand of chicken pie cost 150 per cent more while another brand was only 20 per cent higher.

Cheese pizza made from a packaged mix cost only slightly more than pizza made from scratch. But frozen pizza, ready for the oven, cost 60 per cent more.

Apple pie, pound cake, brownies, sugar cookies, waffles and baking powder biscuits made from mixes ranged in cost from slightly less to one-third more than similar foods made at home. Frozen waffles, heated in the toaster, cost three times as much as homemade waffles, but canned chilled biscuits, ready-to-bake, cost only one-third more.

Apple pie bought ready-to-eat cost about 80 per cent more, but ready-to-eat brownies and sugar cookies cost about the same as homemade brownies and cookies.

Paying these higher prices for convenience may be a saving for persons living alone. Preparing some dishes at home can require too many ingredients and yield too many servings to be practical. Or a homemaker may simply prefer to use her time for activities other than cooking.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 1 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 58)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400). All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This amendment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the general appropriations bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1973, for the salaries of the Members of the Senate and House of Rep-

resentatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in of-

He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to these officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."

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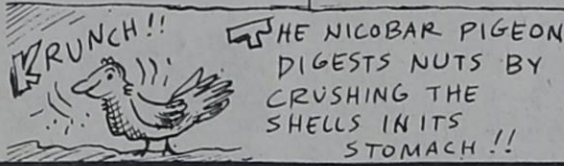

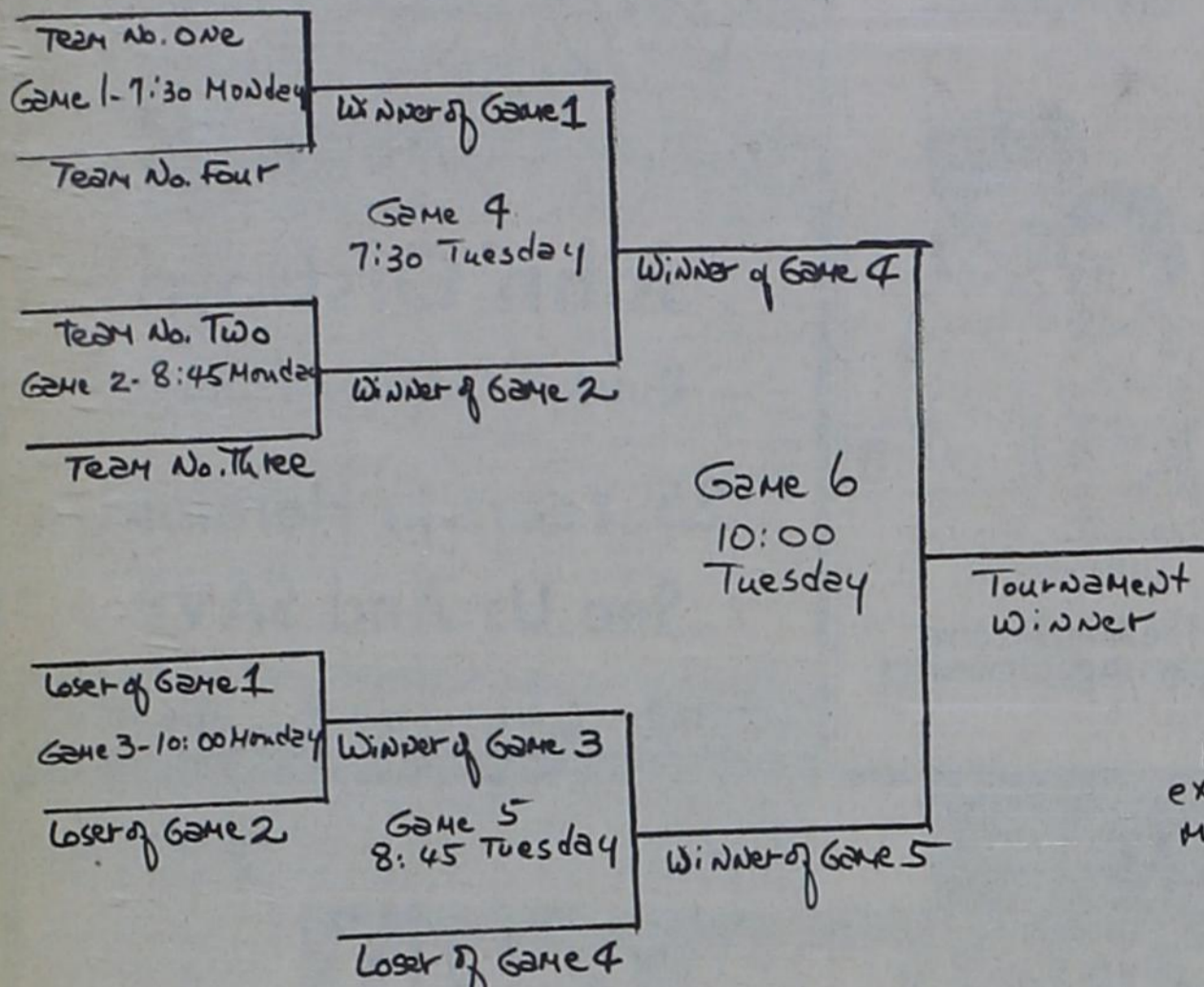

you can handle it, too much power could be a painful embarrassment on the tight turns and blind sweepers."

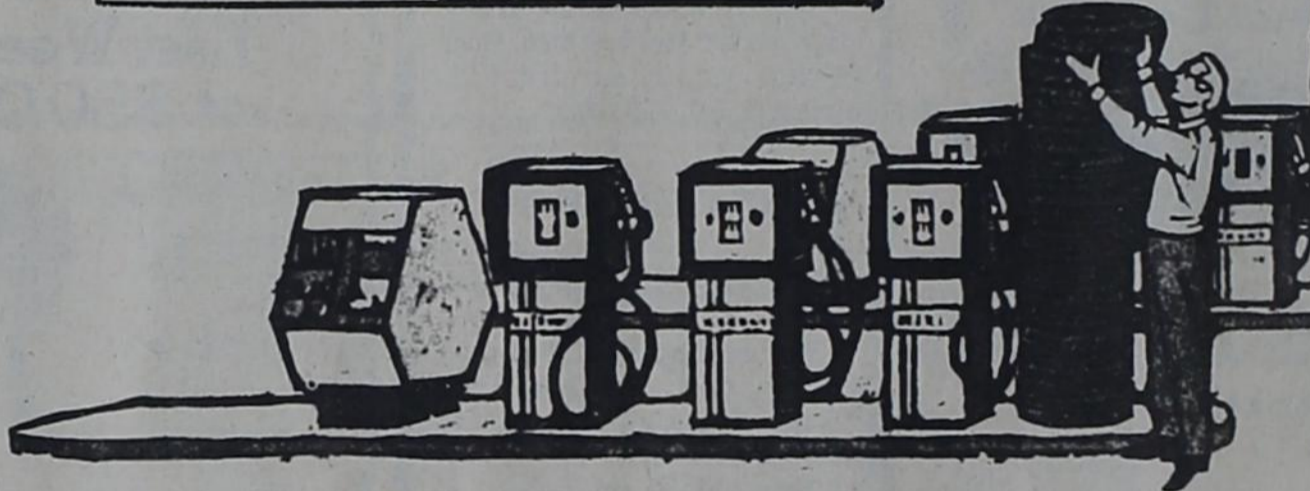

Sponsored by Kawasaki, whose superbikes are expected to make a great showing, the championship race will offer spectators the sight of professional racers from all over the world flashing through the short, tortuous course at speeds in excess of 130 miles per hour. It is also expected that factory teams from all the major motorcycle manufacturers, as well as individual European racing greats, will give our home-grown speedsters a terrific run for the money.

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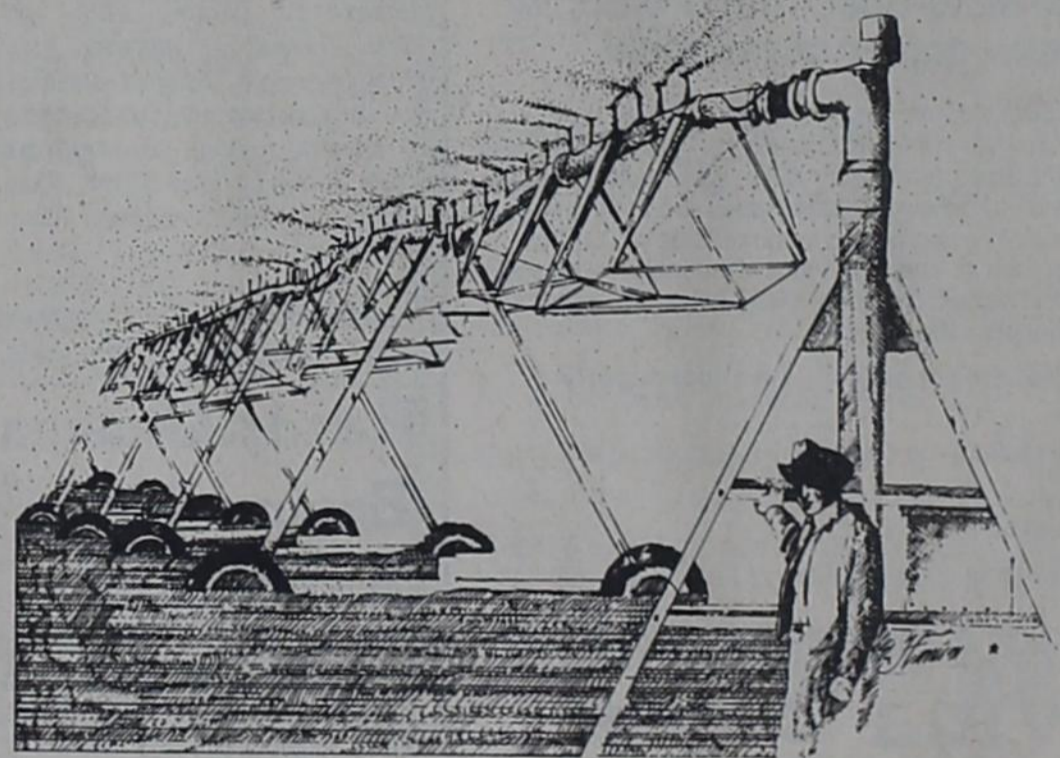

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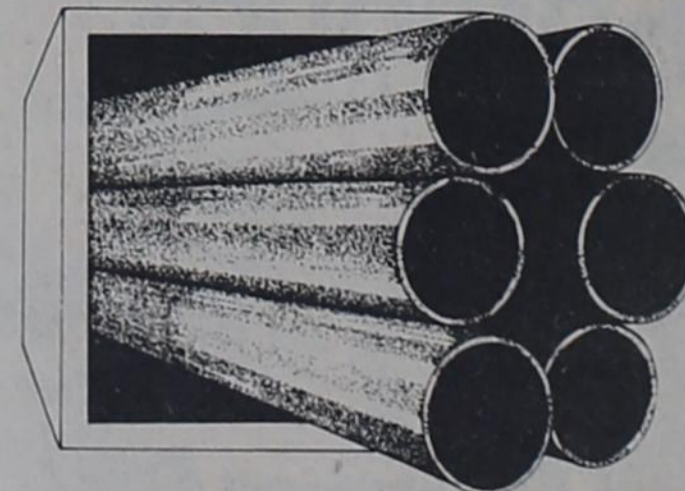
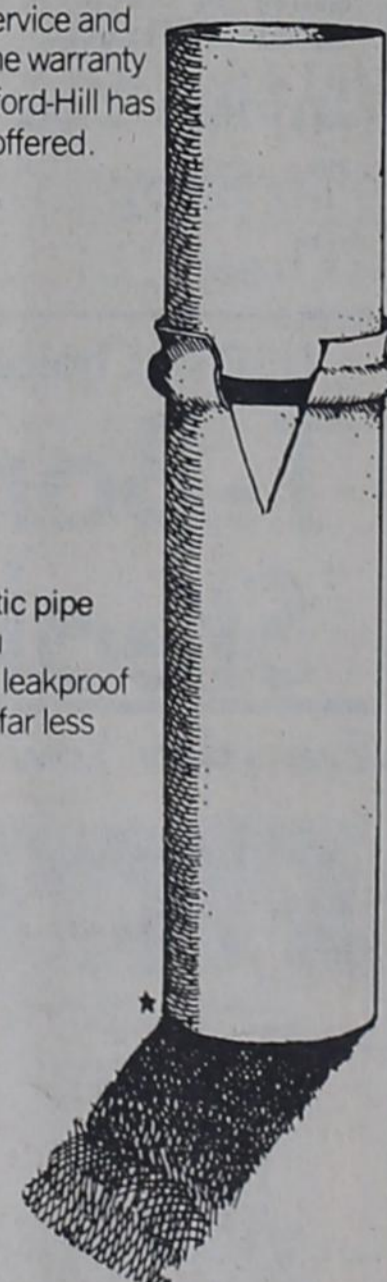


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
