**Parent-Teacher Assn.**

The Home and Its Relationship in the Character Building of the Modern Youth was the theme of the program for the Parent Teacher Association in its regular monthly meeting, Thursday afternoon, Jan. 19, 1939. Like wise the school has many contributing factors in the molding of the characters in our boys and girls. How may the problems arising from the needs of the present day youth be met were the questions discussed during the program, which had been arranged by Mrs. Luls B. Owen, leader.

Mrs. Robert Watkins explained that the school could prepare the child for future citizenship by cultivating in him a personal pride in appearance and endeavor, honesty and dependability, through the curriculum and extra curriculum.

Mrs. W. C. Bridges outlined the responsibilities of the home as a background for the child, a place for the child to have sym-thesis understanding of his needs, welfare and interests. She further pointed out the need of the parents' providing adequate social activities to guide the child in the shaping of his character and ideals.

During the business session, the organization voted to spend the money which it had raised on the arrival and the Stutterin'-am Show in paying for equipment and buying some new equipment for the school. This equipment is a cabinet for the primary grades shelves for the lunch room, maps for the intermediate grades, aid the basket ball boys and girls pay for their sweat suits and new books to the high school library, to add some money to the old piano in the high school auditorium and trade for a better piano.

This month the Senior class surprised the grade school and earned the dollar by having more parents present.

The next meeting will be the Founders Day Program, Feb. 17.

**Notice to Farmers**

To the Farmers of Donley County: The ACP-89 that has been through the mails, notifying you of your cotton allotment and tilled acreage on the farm is misleading in one respect. The card stated that the local committee made these adjustments. The fact is these adjustments were made by the State Board at College Station, Texas, and the local or the county committee had nothing whatever to do with these allotments. It does not state that if you are dissatisfied with this allotment to contact the county committee, but does state that if you believe the cotton allotment is incorrectly determined that you may contact your committeeman within 15 days. We would like for the farmers to understand this thoroughly.

Last year we were allotted 81.75% of tilled acreage for cotton. This year the percentage is 80.41%, a difference of 1.34%. The allotments were arrived at in most cases by multiplying the tilled acreage times the 80.41% or less the farm carries the 50.40 ratio or is a Class B which is a 5 to 15 acre farm.

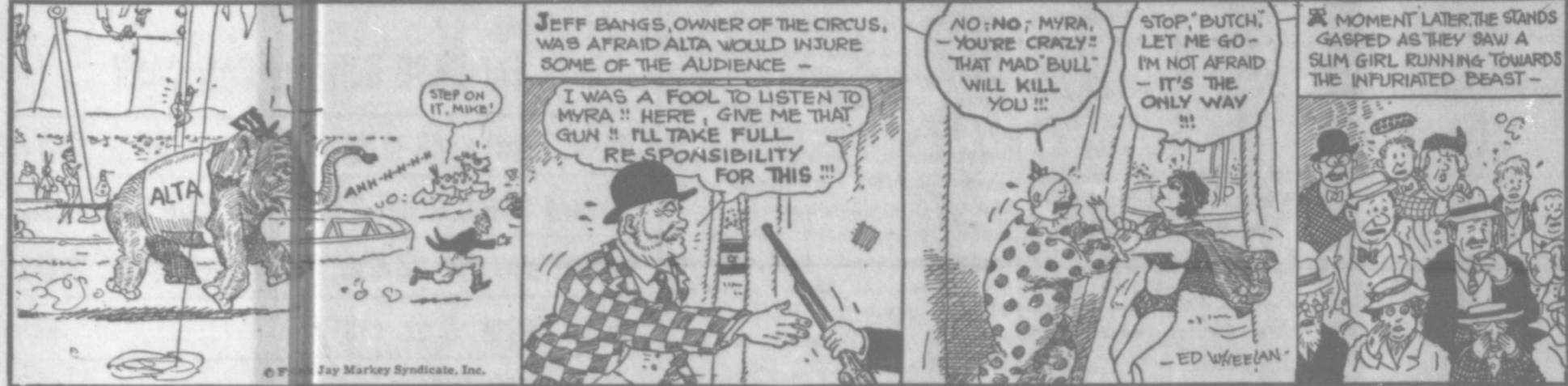

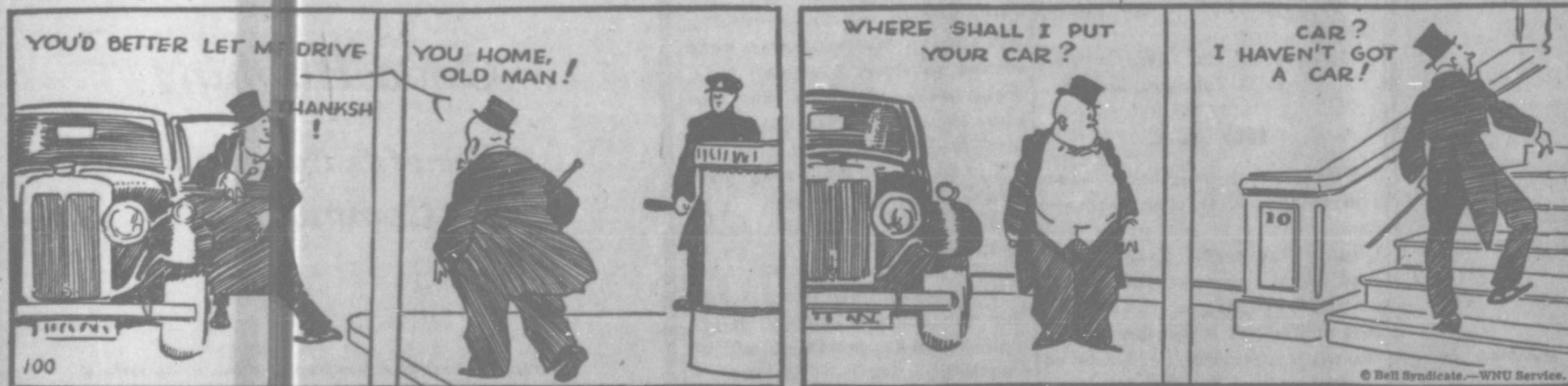

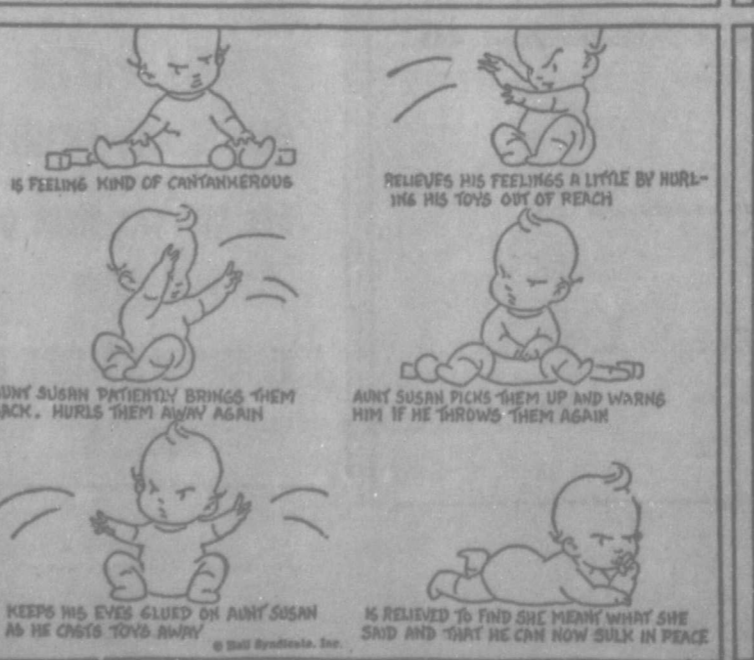

## How to Serve a Meal

A table to be attractively set should have clean linen, polished silver, glassware, china and flowers. A very charming table can be set with inexpensive furnishings if they are in good taste and well arranged.

Avoid crowding the table. Space the covers equal distance apart. If the table is small, do not arrange to have too many served from it at one time. A tea wagon or serving table will solve the difficulty.

The lines on the table should be as few as possible, and lengthwise or crosswise never diagonal.

Lines are made of the covers. Weave in the table linen and they are also formed by the manner of placing silver, dishes, glasses, and other articles.

For breakfast the coffee percolator may be put at the hostess' right, with the handle parallel to her silver. The cups and saucers may be placed above her. It is best not to stack the cups, but if that is necessary, no more than two should be stacked together. Handles of cups should be parallel the edge of the table. The cream and sugar should be placed to the right of the cups, above the percolator.

Prepared cereal may be served in individual bowls and placed on the tea wagon or above the hostess. Cooked cereal may be placed in a covered dish above the hostess. The cereal bowls should be placed to the left of the hostess. A member of the family may rise from the table and act as waitress. In this case she places her napkin, partially folded, at the left of her cover. The rules for removing, placing and passing dishes are the same whether the service is rendered by a member of the family or by a maid.

The hostess may serve a meal to a small group without any one's getting up from the table, provided no dishes will be polished by standing. A tea wagon or a small serving table with one or two shelves is necessary. It should be placed at the right of the hostess.

The hostess asks members of the group to assist by serving themselves to dishes that are convenient to them, by passing plates or dishes to others, and by passing soiled dishes to the hostess. These soiled dishes can be placed on the lower shelves of the serving or tea wagon. The host serves the soup, dessert, coffee or tea. Salad may be served by the hostess or may be on the table when the meal begins. Members of the family pass those dishes that are near them, bread, butter, jelly or vegetables. A member of the family other than the hostess or the hostess fills the glasses with water, brings in any hot food, and removes dishes.

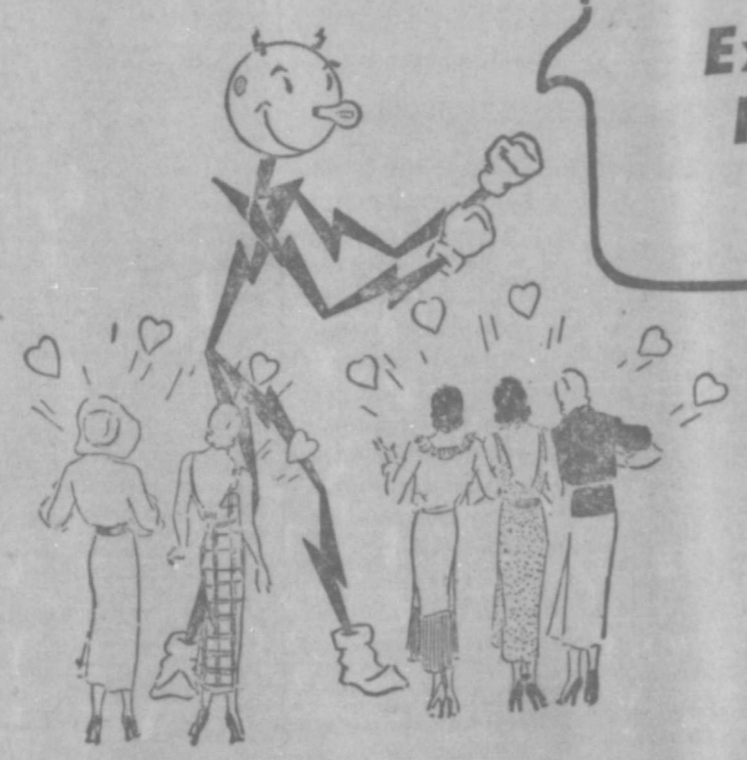

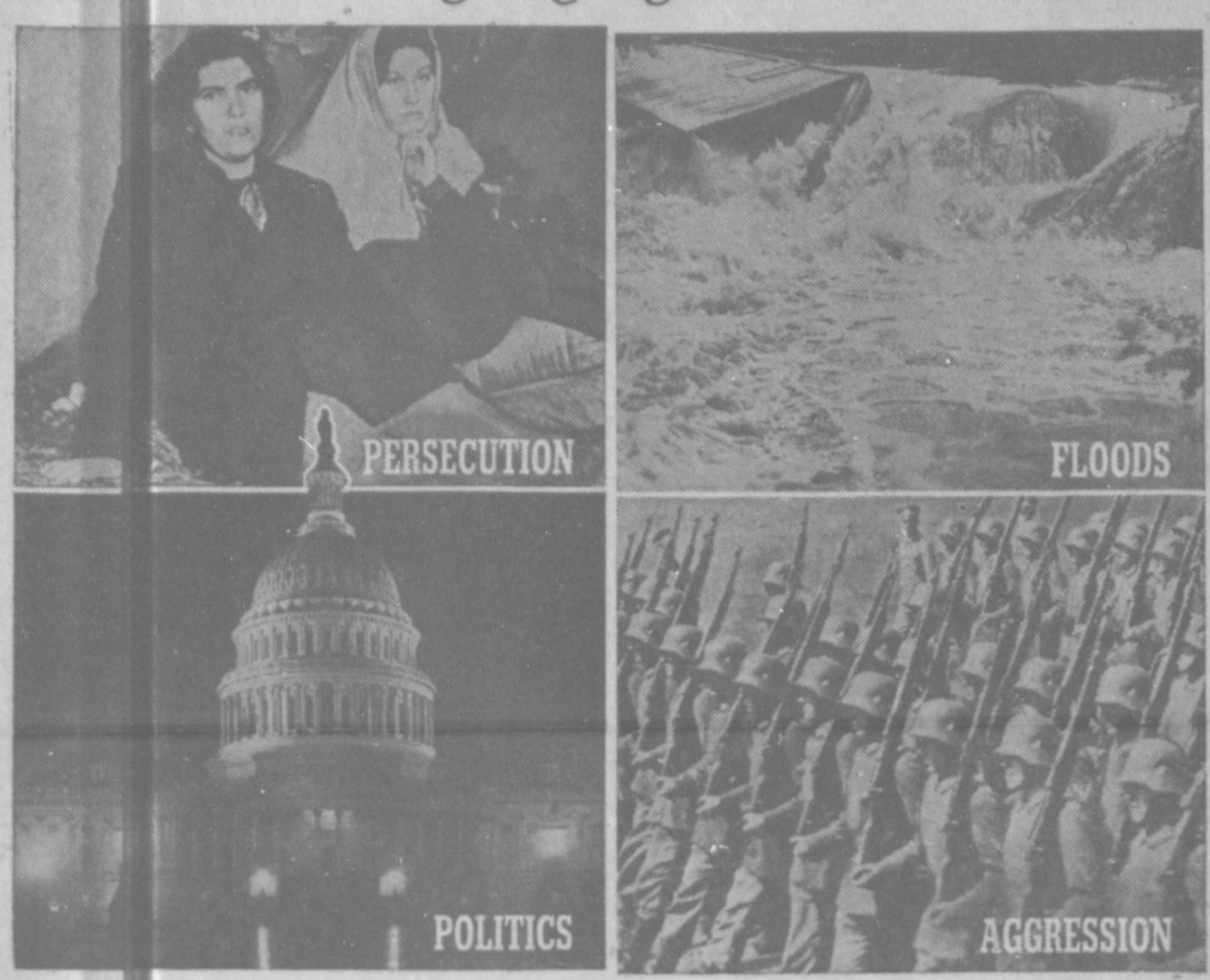
