THE GAS AND OIL situation is beginning to look just like 1974 all over again.

This time, it's the loss of oil from Iran. In 1974, it was the Arab oil embargo, which caused prices of gasoline to practically double, and for a number of independent companies to be forced out of business.

This time around, the government (they have to get into the act, you know), is talking in terms of Sunday closings for all gas stations, and once again, the possibility of gas rationing stamps.

They printed up the rationing stamps before, but somehow we managed to make it through the crisis without using them. But it would appear that the government is bent on putting out the stamps. For one thing, it would create one more government regulatory agency.

The rationing stamp program, according to government officials themselves, would cost \$350 million to start up, and another 1.5 billion dollars a year to run it. That's pretty high-priced medicine.

Not that the rationing stamps would accomplish anything, except to create a little more bookwork, plus this additional agency, and ostensibly in the long run, cause the prices of gas and oil to go up once again, (at least through taxes), to pay for the "added protection" of rationing stamps.

The stamp idea is not new. It was used extensively during World War II for items made scarce due to the war. There probably was not a more abused program until the advent of the food stamps in recent years.

But, if we were a betting person, we'd put our money on the rationing stamps. In addition to making us feel like the government was doing something about the gas shortage (which it hasn't), it would create a number of new government jobs, plus a lot of havoc.

THIS LATEST CRISIS makes us wonder just what has been done on the oil front since the last embargo.

The television commercials would have you believe that the major oil companies have really been working on the oil problem (after they forced out many independents, who helped for years to keep the price of gasoline competitive).

Personally, we'd rather see the oil industry solve the shortage situation than take our chances with the government. Washington has tried to solve other "ills" such as with price ceilings and the like. But nothing ever works like supply and demand.

The oil companies are talking in terms of \$1 per gallon gasoline. You hear it more and more, so it must be the sales pitch to win us over. Sounds like we'd better get ready to dig a little deeper for our gas bills, or else quit "demanding" quite as much.

THE VEGA LONGHORNS struck quite a blow for District 3-A basketball by winning the state championship last weekend in Austin.

It really should be a boost to the egos of the Bovina Mustangs, who counted two victories during the recent season over the state champions, and even beat the 'Horns for the district's round-robin title, forcing Vega to take back-to-back wins over Bovina to even get into the playoffs.

Having watched basketball and playoffs for a number of years, we felt after watching Bovina and Vega teams play that both had the calibre of team to possibly go to the state meet, and do well. As it turned out, we were right, and it was the Longhorns who went all the way.

Since our neighboring larger-schools district 3-AA failed for the first time in eight years to make it to the state meet in basketball, looks like Bovina's district decided to take up the slack, and thanks to Vega's performance, did it in fine style.

Young Showmen Excel At Houston

Bovina FFA and 4-H showmen returned from the Houston Livestock Show with additional laurels to go with those they had already won in the showing this season.

Highlighting their performance was the showing of the breed champion Poland China by Sharlet Johnson, who ultimately sold the animal in the championship auction for \$13.00 per pound, or over \$2,700.00.

The Houston barrow show is billed as "the largest barrow show in the world." A total of 3,015 barrows were entered in the 1979 event, of which 1,919 actually showed up in Houston. From that number, another 397 were "sifted," or eliminated, and the remaining 1,522 animals were shown.

Of the animals entered by the Bovina youngsters, 17 of the 31 entries placed in the show. Even more impressive was the fact that this represented 17 places won by 22 animals entered in the barrow show, as the chapter's nine lambs failed to place.

"We feel that we have had a very successful year, considering our showing at Houston and also at the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show," said Bovina vo-ag instructor Lawrence Widner.

In addition to Miss Johnson's breed champion, other Bovina youngsters winning places and making the sale were Chip Grissom's second place lightweight Hampshire, which sold for \$4.00 per pound, and Mike Read's third place lightweight Duroc, which went for \$3.50 per pound.

Also, Laura Widner, sixth place lightweight Chester, Scotty Johnson, eighth place mediumweight Duroc, Mike Read, ninth place Yorkshire, Charles Johnson, ninth place lightweight Cross, Ronnie Cary, tenth place lightweight Hampshire and David Steelman, tenth place lightweight Spotted Poland.

Also, Dale Turner, 11th place medium Yorkshire; Jim Rhodes, 12th place medium Yorkshire; Thad Rains, 16th place lightweight Cross; Sharlet Johnson, 13th place lightweight Chester White.

Also, Del Ray Sudderth, 17th place lightweight Berkshire; Ryn Rains, 21st lightweight Yorkshire; Randall Ritchie, 24th place heavyweight Poland and Pam Rhodes, 24th place lightweight Cross.

Miss Johnson's breed champion was the last breed champ to be auctioned, which might have accounted for the unusually good

price. It brought considerably more than some of the other champions. Other animals which placed brought an average of \$1.00 per pound.

Bovina Man Wins National Title

Billy Marshall, a corn grower from Bovina, has won top honors in the 1978 National Corn Growers Association yield contest. His yield of 251.41 bushels (14,078.96 lbs.) was the highest in the nation and the State of Texas in the contest's irrigated division.

Marshall used the corn hybrid NC+ 59 for his winning entry. It was developed and released in 1975 by NC+ Hybrids, a farmer-owned seed production-marketing organization headquartered in Lincoln, Nebraska. The mid-season hybrid also topped all irrigated entries in Nebraska with a yield of 240.64 bushels per acre produced at Columbus.

The 1978 contest marks the second consecutive year that NC+ 59 has won the Texas State yield title. In 1977, Hi Plains Farms at Dalhart won the State title with NC+ 59, and in 1976, it produced the highest contest yield in the Nation—262.55

bushels per acre at Dodge City, Kansas.

Marshall harvested his contest entry from a field which grew corn the previous year. He planted on April 20 in 30-inch rows and harvested on October 2. His harvest population was near 27,000 plants per acre. Marshall's fertilizer program included 320 pounds of anhydrous applied in the fall and spring plus a total of 22N-48P-3K-3S-Zn plowed down in November. No insecticide or herbicide was used.

The National Corn Growers Association has conducted this Nationwide contest for the past 14 years. It is the only known non-commercial Nationwide competition, and with an entry requirement of 25 acres it is the largest field size requirement of any contest. In the 1978 competition there were approximately 1000 entries which included nearly 400 in the irrigated division.

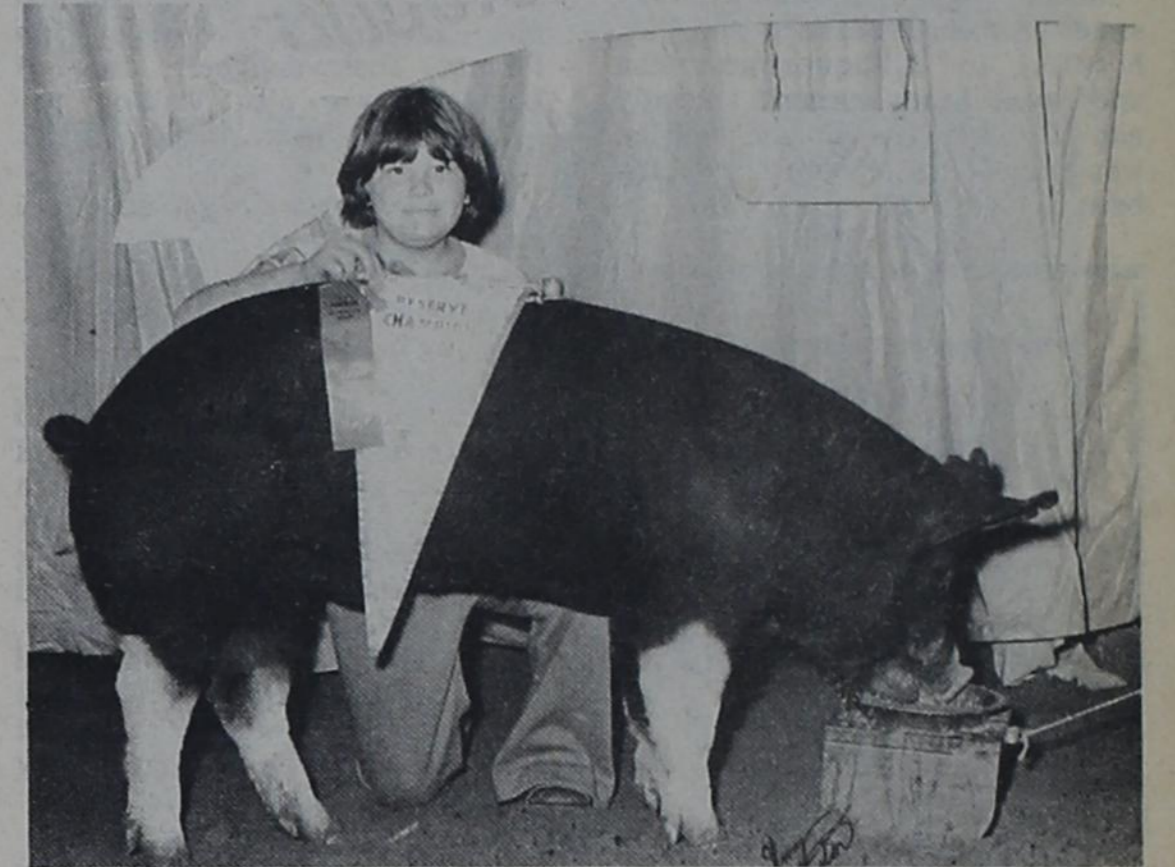
Donations will be \$3 per adult plate and \$1.50 for children under ten. Door prizes will be awarded during the dinner.
