PATIENCE PAYS OFF.

Sometimes, at least it does. Many Parmer County residents have worked for the past 12 or 13 years toward a floodwater control system of dams on Running Water Draw Watershed.

Finally, beginning this next week, their labor will begin to pay off, as work begins on the dam on Catfish Draw, and Official Groundbreaking Ceremonies are held.

Original application was made to the federal government for construction of the floodwater control dams back in 1959. Next week, some 14 years later, construction will begin.

In fact, the actual work could begin sooner. Wilson Construction Company of El Reno, Oklahoma, moved onto the site the past few days, and the company spokesman told Herb Evans of the Soil Conservation Service that he was ready to get underway "If I can get some diesel." (Uh-oh).

TWO THINGS ARE feathers in Bovina's cap in regard to the project. First, the fact that the Catfish Draw site will actually be the first construction on the project; hence the groundbreaking ceremony locally.

Secondly, the appearance of U.S. Congressman George Mahon at the groundbreaking ceremony.

Mahon, one of the most influential men in Washington, is arranging his busy pre-Thanksgiving schedule, which includes winding up all pending legislation prior to adjournment of the session, in order to be in Bovina for the occasion.

This tells you something about our county's "new" congressman. For the past number of years, Parmer has been in the 18th Congressional District, represented lately by Bob Price of Pampa.

This is one of the first occasions for Congressman Mahon to be asked to officiate for something of interest to Parmer County, and he quickly responded.

A good turnout of area residents for the ceremony would be nice, to show their appreciation for this support.

Bovina Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture is to be commended for taking the lead in arranging the groundbreaking ceremony and reception for the Congressman. Led by Madame President Pat Read, the chamber is shaping things up in fine fashion.

Now if the weather will just cooperate.

SOME COMMENTS concerning the energy crisis. Things sure look like they could get worse before they get better. Perhaps we'd better hope that we don't have an "instant replay" on last year's winter hereabouts.

Mahon To Speak At Ceremonies

AT LIONS MEET

Sen. Sherman Raps Voter Disinterest

Speaking to the Bovina Lions Club Wednesday of last week at a luncheon at Bovina Restaurant, state senator Max Sherman deplored the low voter turnout in Tuesday's constitutional amendment election.

"The greatest tragedy was not how people voted, but the fact that so few bothered to vote at all," said the senator.

Sherman said he was personally disappointed about the failure of the legislative pay raises. "We will definitely lose some fine young legislators, who were seeking a mandate from the people as to whether or not they would get a full-time salary," the senator said.

"People of Texas have indicated that they want a

part-time legislature, but this doesn't necessarily work. Even when the legislature isn't in session, you need to be working.

When there is something going on in Bovina, you're (the legislator) expected to be there. When there's something in Follett, Levelland or Muleshoe, you're expected to be there. It's hard to justify on the present salary, but somehow it must be done," Sherman told the Bovina Lions.

Because of the Sharpstown scandal, and the Watergate episode, Sherman said he had not picked a "good time to be in politics," but stated that he was determined to stick with it, convinced that there are important jobs that need to be done.

The Amarillo legislator, who has been rated as one of the state's "Top ten legislators," referred to the current energy crisis. "This is a real problem in an area such as this, when you can't get gas, diesel and fertilizer," Sherman commented.

He thought the president's plan for combating the problem was good, but pointed out that he (the president) currently was at a low ebb of power with the congress, and that this might hurt his efforts.

Groundbreaking Set For Dam

Congressman George Mahon confirmed this week that he will be the principal speaker at the groundbreaking ceremonies for the Running Water Draw Watershed Project. The ceremonies have been scheduled for Tuesday, November 20, beginning at 10 a.m.

A reception honoring the congressman has been scheduled for 11 a.m. at the First State Bank in Bovina.

Appearance of the longtime congressman from the 19th Congressional District was arranged by F.F. (Flip) Calhoun of Plainview, one of the leaders in the long fight for

construction of the floodwater retention structures.

The ceremonies will be held about a mile and one-half northwest of Bovina on the site where dirt work will be underway on the dam project. To get to the site, turn right at the blinker light at Bovina and watch for the sign about a mile up the highway.

A.L. Black of Friona, a member of the local Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors for over 20 years, and former state director, will serve as master of ceremonies.

Actual groundbreaking will be done by County Judge Archie Tarter and Leon Grissom, present SCD district chairman.

Prior to the main address, Judge Tarter will give the official welcome to the visitors to Parmer County.

In the event of bad weather, the entire ceremony will be held at the Bovina School Auditorium.

A check of the records this week revealed that the original efforts on the Running Water Draw Watershed project were started back in 1959.

Some of the sponsors of the watershed are the Parmer County SWCD, Parmer County Commissioners Court, the Central Curry SWCD, the Curry County Commissioners Court and the City of Clovis.

The project covers 227,782 acres in five counties spanning across the state line into New Mexico. Counties involved include Curry County, N.M., Parmer, Castro, Swisher and Hale counties of Texas.

There are three flood control structures planned, one in New Mexico and two in Texas. The two on the Texas side are both in Parmer County. Besides the dam to be constructed on Catfish Draw (the groundbreaking site), another will be built just inside the county east of Lazbuddie.

In addition, some four dams are programmed for the lower Running Water Draw in Castro and Hale Counties.

Groundbreaking was scheduled at the Bovina site, which is labeled "Site Number Two," since this will turn out to be the first dam to be constructed.

Originally, a dam on the main draw was planned to be built first in Curry County, but due to legal problems involving rights-of-way in the Curry project, the Bovina site was the first to be ready.

BHS Senior Wins; Two Tie For Lead

Six contestants emerged from another week of upsets in high school, college and professional football games to pick eight winners from a slate of 10 games with the tiebreaker game between Bovina Mustangs and the Springlake-Earth Wolverines determining the winners.

Galen Carson, Bovina High School senior, took first place and prize money of \$5 by picking Bovina to win by a 27-13 score, only nine points off the actual 36-13 victory for the Ponies.

Carson missed the outcome of the Dumas-Perryton and Colorado-Kansas tilts, as did a large number of the 96 contestants.

Taking second place and \$3 for the second time this year was Mrs. Mary Jane Wilson. She picked Bovina to win, 28-6, 15 points off the tiebreaker score. She missed the Perryton

win over Dumas and the Rice upset of Arkansas.

Mrs. Roberta Mager took third place and \$1 by picking Bovina as the victor, 20-8, 21 points off the score. She missed the Rice win and the outcome of the Oakland-Pittsburgh professional game.

The other three contestants who missed out on the prize money were Tom Ware, who picked Bovina to win, 14-7, 28 off the score; Lupe Salazar, who picked Bovina to win, 12-8, 29 off; and Joyce Hughes, who picked the Wolverines to win, 28-14, 37 points off the actual score.

Ware missed Perryton and Rice, Salazar missed Kansas and Pittsburgh and Mrs. Hughes missed Perryton and Kansas.

Of the remaining contestants, 19 had seven right, 22 had six, 25 had five, 18 had four,

four had three and one had two correct guesses.

Only three weeks remain in the 1973 Bovina Businesses Cotton Bowl Football Contest. In addition to the grand prize of an expense paid trip for two to the Cotton Bowl game, a total of \$27 in prize money remains to be awarded. TUESDAY ELECTION

Few Voters Mark Ballots

With less than ten per cent of the eligible voters casting ballots in Parmer County, a dribbling of voters expressed their opposition to amendments in general, opposing six of the nine proposals.

Like the vote tally statewide, Parmer County voters nixed the legislative pay raises and annual sessions, 232-122. Only one box voted in favor of the raises, Lakeview, where the vote was 4-2. It was close at Black, with five favoring and six opposed.

Bovina voters favored proposals number two, three and seven. Number five, the sea

wall construction amendment, drew a 25-25 tie. Only 56 Bovina voters marked ballots.

Besides objecting to the legislative pay raises, county voters were heavy against number 8 (broadening the ad valorem tax), 227-124. This amendment failed in all eight county polling places.

Also not favored in Parmer County were numbers four (conservation districts), 190-147; six (district court jurisdiction), 256-86; seven (increasing veteran's land fund), 179-177 and nine (water tax exemptions), 193-153.

Written requests for stickers and instructions may be made at the IRS office listed above. Retailers should notify the number of stickers they will need.

with a one yard plunge by Quarterback Wood.

Putting the ball into play on their own 20, the Wolverines lost seven yards on a good tackle by Guard Elbert Shelby but came roaring back with a pass from Wood to Back Edwin Fuller that was good for 62 yards. On the next play, a pass interference call on the Mustang secondary gave the Wolverines a first and 10 from the 11. A second penalty, a face mask violation, put the Wolverines in scoring position with a first and goal from the one.

The Mustang defense held for two plays, however on a third and goal, Wood drove over for the TD with 30 seconds remaining to be played in the half. On the extra point attempt, a bad pass from center forced the holder to run for the extras. The attempt failed and the Mustangs held a slim one-point lead, 14-13, at halftime.

Opening the second half with more determination, the Ponies scored on their initial possession, taking the kickoff from the 39 to paydirt in 14 plays. With the three backs sharing the running chores, Shelby put the Maroons on the board again from the two with 5:10 remaining in the third quarter. Shelby tackled on the extra points to put the Ponies into a 22-13 lead.

Springlake-Earth, however, didn't roll over and play dead for the Ponies. Recovering a Mustang fumble on the Bovina 43, the hosts drove to the 19 before losing the ball on downs. Again, the Wolverines couldn't move the ball on the ground, netting a minus one yard in five attempts. However, Woods continued to plague the Bovina secondary, completing one pass in that drive that went for 24 yards and a first down.

Taking over on their own 19, Bovina scored seven plays later on a 39 yard gallop by Shelby around right end. Martinez ran the extras and Bovina added to their lead, 30-13, with 9:35

remaining in the game.

Taking to the air again, Wood again threatened to score on the Ponies via the airways. Facing a third and eight, he found a Wolverine in the open for a 27 yard pass play. Halfback Joe Delgado chased the runner out of bounds on Bovina's 41 to save a sure score.

Surprisingly Wood stayed on the ground after that play and failed to pick up any yardage in four running attempts to turn the ball over to the Ponies.

The Mustangs picked up two quick first downs on a 16 yard gallop by Fillpot and a 15-yard penalty on the Wolverines. Shelby added five and Martinez two to give the Maroons a third and two on the 16. A five-yard offside penalty and an incomplete pass moved the ball back to the 21 where the Ponies failed to pick up the first down.

This time, Tackle Tony Serna gave the Ponies a second chance to score, falling on a Wolverine fumble on the nine. Shelby picked up seven and Fillpot wound up the scoring for the night with a two yard dive. The extra point kick attempt by Martinez was blocked and the score remained at 36-13 with 2:41 on the clock.

DeLeon intercepted his second pass of the evening five plays later with the Ponies content to let the clock run down.

The Wolverines got the ball back for one more play from their own 46, however, Elbert Shelby threw Woods for a 16-yard loss and Serna fell on the fumble to end the game.

The Mustangs held a decisive edge in every statistic with the exception of passing. Woods completed four of 10 passes for 141 yards while Bovina failed to pick up any yardage on two passing tries.

Bovina's defensive line again proved to be immovable against the run, with the Wolverines losing 16 yards on the ground. At the same time, behind excellent blocking from the offensive line, the Ponies piled up 322 yards rushing for 22 first downs.

Shelby was the workhorse for the Mustangs, picking up 166 yards in 20 carries for an 8.3 average. Martinez picked up 80 yards in 20 carries for four yards per carry and Fillpot picked up 80 steps in 17 carries for a 4.7 yard average.

Defensively, Shelby was credited with 14 unassisted tackles and eight assists and recovered one fumble. Elbert Shelby was credited with 10 tackles. End Ricky Stanberry, DeLeon and Delgado were credited with eight tackles each. DeLeon intercepted two passes and Sherrill and Serna recovered two S-E fumbles each.

May, 1970--Project was approved for operations.

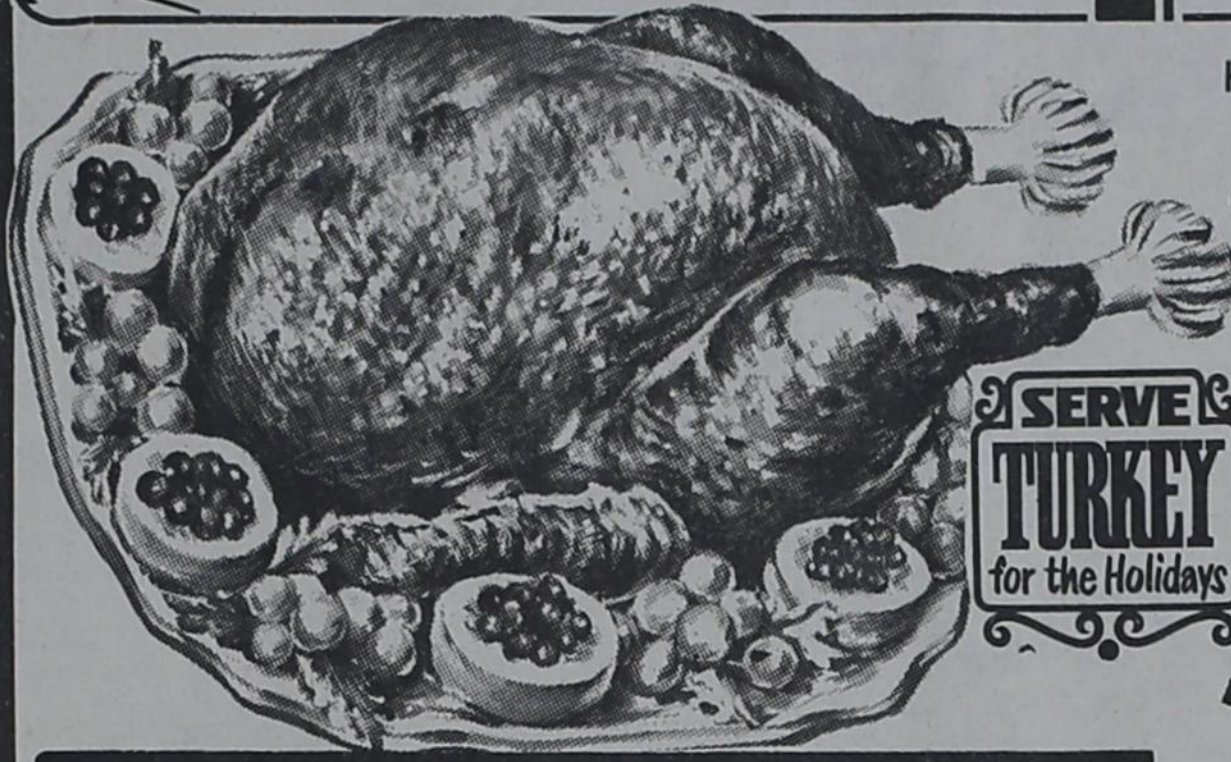

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Brown Brings TD Show To Town

Gridiron Finale Matches Mustangs Against 'Horns

Bovina's Mustangs will bring the 1973 gridiron season to a conclusion Friday night at Mustang Field when they host District 3-A's most explosive 11, the Hart Longhorns.

The game will get underway at 7:30 p.m. at Mustang Field.

Hart, the Panhandle area's Cinderella team last year, comes into the tilt with a 7-2 season record and a 4-1 record in district play. The two losses for the season were to the Morton Indians, a Class AA team, and a district loss to Vega, who is currently unbeaten and has the championship wrapped up.

The Longhorns own victories over Lazbuddie, Shallowater, Anton, Sudan, Farwell, Kress and Springlake-Earth. Lazbuddie is a Class B club and the remainder are Class A squads.

Bovina's Mustangs, gaining momentum over their last three games, will enter the contest with a 3-6 record overall and a 3-2 in district play.

Coming back from injuries to several key players and six consecutive losses, the Mustangs have been impressive in their last three outings, scoring decisive wins over Farwell, Kress and S-E.

Bovina and Hart shared the District title last year with the Longhorns advancing to the playoffs by virtue of a 25-8 win over the Ponies in a game played in ice and snow at Hart.

The Longhorns lost a crew of seniors from the championship squad, but Coach Lonnie Phillips has put together a strong and well balanced team, spearheaded by Jimmy Brown, the Panhandle's top scorer.

Brown, a senior this year much to the relief of at least five coaches (those in District 3-A), rushed for more than 2000 yards last season and scored 22 touchdowns. Using his 9.7 speed in the 100, he is almost impossible to catch once loose around end.

Joining Brown as returning offensive regulars are tackles Jesse Perez, 185-lb. junior, and Cecil Jackson, 212-lb. senior. Both are two way starters along with Brown at the safety slot.

The 'Horns have the size to go with Brown's speed. Guards

Sonny Mancias, senior, and Freddie Mancias, junior, weigh in at 217 and 194, respectively. Center Mario Martinez, junior, tips the scales at 185. Ends Randy Finch, sophomore, weighs in at 180.

At the fullback position is Terry Hill and Barry George starts at the flanker back position. Both are sophomores. Quarterbacking the team is James McLain, a senior.

"McLain throws the ball well and has the speed to run," says Head Mustang Mentor Roger Ezell.

"We are going to have to play error-free ball to stay with them Friday night," he continued. Ezell said the 'Horns have a well rounded team, both offensively and defensively.

"Hart has about as good a team as last year," Ezell commented. "What worries us is no one has been able to move the ball with any effectiveness on Hart. Vega couldn't move the ball from deep in their own territory. They beat Hart on breaks.

"We can't just concentrate on Brown and win, we have to respect the other backs because they can get the job done, too," Ezell concluded.

"Overall, we played real well against Springlake-Earth," Ezell said. "Offensively, fumbles continued to hurt and the defensive secondary had a bad night."

Ezell pointed out that the Ponies moved the ball more consistently than in previous games, with the exception of the fumbles.

"Doc Shelby had an exceptional game on defense," Ezell stated. Shelby racked up 14 unassisted tackles and eight assists in addition to recovering a fumble.

"Our defensive line had a great game; the best all year," Ezell continued. Line Coach Corky Criswell followed up with "...as far as doing what they were supposed to do, the line executed much better than they did in the Farwell game." Ezell pointed out that Tommy DeLeon, sophomore cornerback, and Joe Delgado, senior defensive halfback, also had excellent games. DeLeon inter-

cepted two passes and had eight tackles. Delgado saved a TD and had eight tackles.

"Offensively, we were getting the blocking from our line. They were opening up tremendous holes for the runners," the coach commented. "If we had not fumbled so much, it would have been our best offensive game."

The Mustangs came through the S-E game in top physical form with no injuries sustained in the game.

Junior Halfback Alton McCormick remains questionable with an arm injury suffered several weeks ago. He was due to see a specialist this week.

Ponies Come From Behind 36-13 Win

Bovina's Mustangs, gaining momentum the past three weeks, scored a touchdown in each of the first three quarters and two in the final quarter Friday night to down the Springlake-Earth Wolverines, 36-13, in a District 3-A tilt played on the Lamb County school's field before a homecoming crowd.

The game kicked off at 7:30 p.m. before a sparse crowd in a cold, misty rain which left the field, and pigskin wet and slick.

The Mustangs drew first blood with only 43 seconds remaining in the first quarter when Fullback Ray Martinez dove across the goal line from three yards out, capping a 16-yard drive.

The Wolverines won the pregame toss and elected to receive the opening kickoff. Putting the ball into play on their own 30, the Wolverines

netted only two yards in two running attempts before putting the ball into the air. Cornerback Tommy DeLeon stationed himself below the Hal Wood pass which originated at the 32 and ran it back to the Bovina 46 to give the Ponies the ball in good field position.

Quarterback Dennis Willard lost one yard on the first play from scrimmage. Martinez picked up four yards and Halfback Bryan Fillpot added six more to the S-E 45 where the Ponies elected to punt with a fourth and one. It turned out to be the only punt of the night for the Maroons with Roy Hartzog kicking to the S-E six-yard stripe.

The Wolverines could pick up only seven yards in three attempts as the Mustang line shut down the running game of the host team almost completely all night.

Following a 29-yard punt, the Ponies began a scoring drive from the S-E 42 which was interrupted only temporarily by the Wolverines.

Halfback Billy Shelby picked up the initial first down for the Ponies with a 12-yard sprint. A Mustang fumble cost the Ponies four yards, but Fillpot picked up five and Shelby 12 to give the fired-up Mustangs a second first down on the S-E 19. On the next series of downs, Martinez lost one, Fillpot picked up seven in two tries but lost two yards on the fourth and four play to turn the ball over to the host team on the 15.

Defensive Guard Terry Sherrill put the Ponies back into scoring position three plays later when he covered a S-E fumble on the 16 yard stripe. Martinez scored four plays later from the three and the running attempt for extras by Willard failed to put the Ponies into a 6-0 lead.

The Wolverines put the ball into play on their own 34, but were forced to kick the ball away after picking up only four yards in two running attempts and an incomplete pass. A 15-yard penalty for holding put the Ponies back deep into their own territory on the 23 with a first and 25. On the second down play, a fumble in the backfield turned the ball over to the Wolverines on the 25.

Picking up only two yards in three running attempts, the Wolverines took to the air again, with Hal Wood hitting End Junior Saucedo for a 23-yard scoring pass. The kick for extra point was good and the Wolverines took a one-point edge, 7-6, with 9:31 remaining on the clock in the first half.

Springlake-Earth kicked off from the Bovina 45, following a 15-yard penalty assessed the Mustangs on the TD play. Delgado ran the kickoff back to the 25 and on the first play from scrimmage, the Mustangs nemesis, the fumble, again turned the ball over to S-E on the 27.

Sherrill turned the game around once more for the Ponies three plays later. With

Woods attempting to pass, the charging Mustang line forced the S-E quarterback to scramble, hitting him 16 yards behind the line of scrimmage, where he was dropped and lost the handle on the ball with Sherrill recovering.

The Mustangs put the ball into play on their own 41 and drove to the three yard stripe in 11 plays. With a second and goal from the three, the football sputtered through Willard's hands into the backfield.

Shelby turned what ap-

peared to be at least a big loss for the Ponies into a score when he went back, scooped up the ball and threaded his way through the defenders into the end zone. Willard ran the extra points and the Ponies regained the lead, 14-7, with 2:49 on the clock.

With the aid of a 62-yard pass play and two penalties on the Mustangs, a pass interference call and a face mask penalty, the Wolverines got on the scoreboard two minutes later
