# Army Air Corps Plans Rigid Defense Program for U. S.

### As and Personnel Increase Military Efficiency.

PHFIELD, TEX., Aug. 15.—Subject lessons in the art of aerial warfare now being applied without change to the air forces of European nations, the United States Army Air Corps is undertaking a program of expansion calculated to add materially to the military defense of the country.

While ground forces of the army are being streamlined into more mobile fighting field units the air corps is seen fit to keep pace by beginning a 10-year program of reorganization that should definitely assure the United States of adequate aerial action against any "potential military menace."

Under authority, and with funds made available by the last regular session of congress, the officers of the air corps plan their expansion along the main lines: increasing the number of fighting planes; increasing the number of pilots; increasing the necessary air bases; increasing the necessary air bases according to military and tactical requirements of the program.

5,500 Planes. The number of fighting planes, the first objective of the program, is being increased to 5,500.

More capacity for necessary increase in the new training program has been devised for the primary training at qualified flying schools.

New and new planes being ordered. Approximately 1,000 new planes of all types are being ordered during the expansion program in the American army.

Establishing 13 bombardment groups of the heavy, medium and light types and nine pursuit groups of the single-engine, interceptor and fighter types.

Operation of the new air force is impracticable from the bases now in existence and five new bases with one each in Alaska, northeast United States, southeast United States, Puerto Rico and Panama are planned.

More fortunate than any other major nation today, from a military defense point of view, the United States rests secure behind two great oceans too wide for any sustained direct aerial attack. The air corps must aim therefore to make it impossible for any potential enemy to establish adequate air bases anywhere within a reasonable flying range of this country.

He was silent. I sensed, strangely, that there was another he would like to ask about, yet was reluctant, a reluctance bordering on fear. I asked:

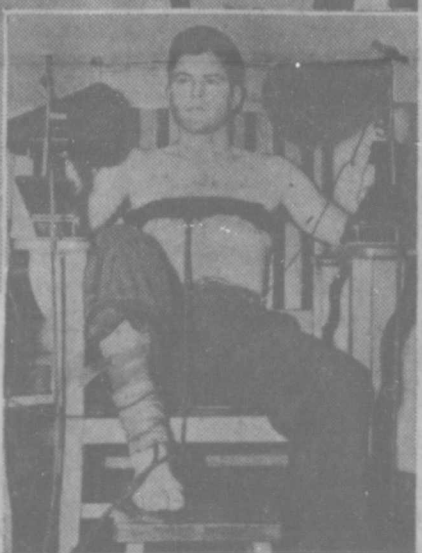
"You have not been in the States recently?"

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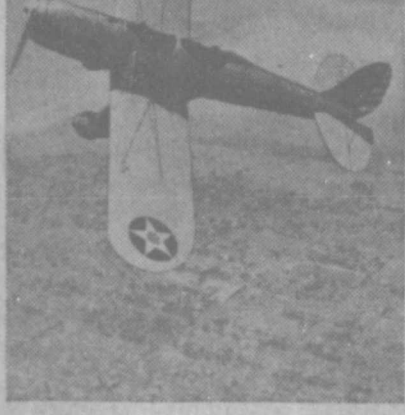

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# Scientific World Seeks Medicine For Fighting Tuberculosis Germ

"As far as is known, there is no medicine that acts directly on the tubercle bacillus in vivo or uniformly increases the defense reaction of the body," Allan J. Hruby, M.D., Chicago, declares in American Medical Association Journal.

Drug treatment in pulmonary tuberculosis embraces three distinct fields, Dr. Hruby says, the treatment of symptoms, complications and of associated diseases.

"The treatment of the complications and associated diseases leads into every province of medicine," he states. "To meet the indications as they arise, the sanatorium of today has become a highly specialized institution with a staff of visiting consultants capable of treating competently all nontuberculosis conditions, surgical and medical, that afflict the consumptive in addition to the 'primary malady.'"

"Fresh air, good food, high caloric, high mineral and high vitamin diets stressing vitamins A, B, C and D, sunshine, heliotherapy (sunshine treatment) for extra-pulmonary lesions, postural change for drainage of cavities, rest in its various implications, complete bed rest, localized immobility through the medium of shot bags, corsets, and other nonmedical or surgical procedures, psychic rest as well as physical, occupational treatment and other measures designed to complement rest of the body by promoting repose of the mind—this constitutes routine treatment."

As to the outlook for the future, Dr. Hruby states that: "The chief hope for a specific treatment in the future lies in research which should

extend along lines of study directed toward the development of a drug that will stimulate the body's defense reactions."

## EDITH BARBER SAYS Icebox Protects Pastry Mix

"CAN pastry be mixed up ahead of time and kept on hand in the refrigerator?" This question came from a reader recently who goes on to say that her family of boys like nothing so well as pies for dessert.

Pastry dough will keep satisfactorily for as long as a week. I find, however, that better results are generally obtained when the flour, fat, and salt are mixed together, put in a covered container in the refrigerator and then mixed with the water in amounts necessary for pie. I am giving the recipe for pastry-mix today with suggestions as to how much of it should be measured for each pie and how much water will be needed.

Another question which has come to the editor of this column recently has been in regard to peach pie, which is often too juicy to suit the correspondent. Peaches very greatly from dry to juicy. Mixing one tablespoon of sugar with one to three tablespoons of flour, depending upon the quality of the fruit, will take care of the question. The mixed flour and sugar should be scattered over the bottom crust before the fruit and remaining sugar are added.

If you make pie often you may like to use the quick lemon filling for which I am giving the recipe today. Pie of this sort may have either meringue or whipped cream as a garnish.

### Quick Lemon Pie.

- 3 egg yolks
  - 1 can condensed milk (sweetened)
  - Juice of 3 lemons
  - Grated rind of 1 1/2 lemons
  - 3 egg whites
  - 6 tablespoons sugar
- Beat egg yolks, add milk, lemon juice and rind and mix well. Pour in filling on baked pastry shell. Cover with a meringue made by beating the egg whites and adding the sugar. Bake in a slow oven, 325 degrees Fahrenheit, just until the meringue is delicately brown. Chill two to three hours in the refrigerator.

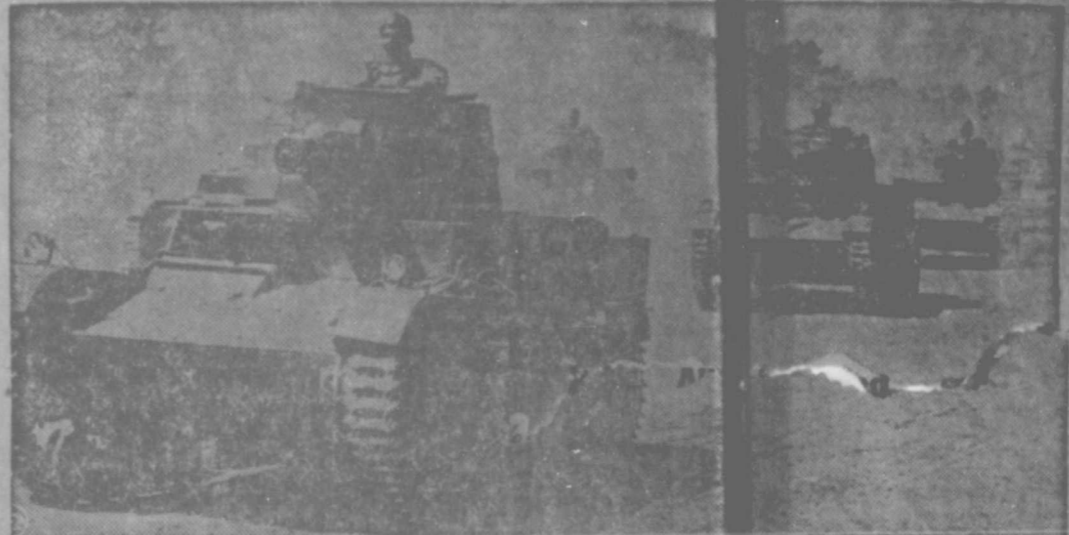

# WHAT to EAT and WHY

## C. Houston Goudiss Touches Upon the Food Values of Fish and Shellfish; Shows How They Can Help to Improve Nutritive Quality of the Diet

By C. HOUSTON GOUDISS

A PRESENT-DAY nutritionist might easily quarrel with the traditional distinction between fish, flesh and fowl. For the flesh of fish, cattle, swine, sheep and poultry is commonly referred to as "meat," and the nutritive values of all these foods properly may be considered together. Their composition is very similar, consisting principally of protein, water and fat, with the chief variation occurring in the fat content. They also average about one per cent of minerals and contain some of the vitamins in varying amounts.

### Fish vs. Other Flesh Foods

There is a wide variation among the different kinds of fish in the amount of fat they contain. In general, fish have less fat and more water than other forms of meat. Their tissue fibers are also shorter, which makes for ease of digestion. In many cases, their flavor is less pronounced because there are fewer extractives.

For this reason, fish is considered less stimulating, and that is also why it is often served with some sort of sauce, or with a lemon garnish to point up the flavor.

The proteins of fish are regarded as equally useful with other forms of meat for helping to build and repair body tissues. Most lean fish are richer in minerals than fatty fish; in this respect, they resemble lean meats.

Salt water fish are notable as a source of iodine, required for the proper functioning of the thyroid gland. It is desirable that this mineral be included in the dietary to help prevent simple goiter.

### The Cattle of the Sea

The most significant difference between fish and most other flesh foods is that with the exception of certain shellfish which are produced under government regulation, "crops" from the sea are neither planted by man, nor cultivated by him.

Unlike the farmer or the cattle man, the fisherman gathers his "harvest" without the previous effort of sowing seeds or cultivating plants; without the necessity of providing shelter or fodder.

To a man or woman who has never enjoyed the experience of catching fish for dinner, the sea may suggest nothing but an expanse of blue-green water. But to those who are familiar with the habits of its denizens, the sea is a fascinating place . . . teeming with life. It contains many forms of vegetable materials, of which seaweed is the best known. These provide food for the lower forms of animal life which inhabit the waters. They, in turn, are eaten by larger creatures. In the final analysis, all forms of animal life

### Fish as a Source of Vitamin D

The sun is concerned, too, with the production of vitamin D, as it is by means of sunshine that our best source becomes available. Fish liver oils are the richest natural sources of vitamin D. This vitamin is necessary for the proper utilization of calcium and phosphorus in building strong bones and sound teeth. We prize highly the liver oils of the cod, halibut, salmon, swordfish and tuna for their fine amount of this precious vitamin.

The body oils of certain fish are also valued for their vitamin D. Some varieties that are notable in this respect are salmon, herring and sardines. It is agreeable as well as economical to obtain vitamin D by serving seafood, because fish supplies so many other valuable nutrients at the same time.

### Fish Is Universally Available

There are perhaps more varieties of fish than any other type of first-class protein food. A government bulletin has listed 40 kinds besides smoked and salted fish and the various shellfish.

Thus the use of fish provides ample opportunities for varying the menu. Moreover, though fish is more perishable than other flesh foods, it is available today in every town and hamlet, however remote from the waterways.

No matter where she lives, the homemaker can choose from a wide variety of canned, dried, smoked, salted and quick-frozen fish. And both transportation and refrigeration have been so improved that fresh-caught fish are distributed far inland.

The quick-frozen fish should be handled as carefully as fresh fish, kept under refrigeration, and used within a reasonable time after purchasing. Canned fish, naturally, requires no refrigeration, and a supply can always be kept on hand both for everyday use and for emergencies.

The most important canned fish, in terms of the amounts packed and sold, is salmon. This flavorful fish is an excellent and economical protein food which is also notable for its energy value: its calcium, phosphorus and iodine; and as a source of vitamins A and D. Other canned seafoods that are sold in volume include tuna, sardines, shrimp and

clams. Canned crab and lobster meats and oysters are also to be found upon the shelves of most grocers, together with other varieties of seafood, some packed in tomato sauce.

When using canned salmon and other kinds of fish that have been put into the cans before cooking, it is advisable to conserve the juices which cooked out during the sterilization process, as these contain valuable nutrients.

### Varieties of Shellfish

Clams, oysters, shrimp and scallops differ somewhat from other forms of seafood, chiefly in that they contain some carbohydrates. They have very little fat. Oysters are rich in iodine and they might be compared to the glandular organs, such as liver and kidney, as a source of three vitamins, A, B and G.

### Place of Fish in the Diet

The most important contribution of all forms of fish is their proteins, which as we have seen may be used interchangeably with those of beef, pork, lamb, veal and poultry. The iodine of seafoods and shellfish is also extremely important, and in some varieties, the content of vitamins A and D. The more fatty fish, including mackerel, salmon, eels, herring, catfish and shad are comparatively rich in energy values. The fuel value of cod, flounder, perch, smelts and haddock, which are low in fat, and halibut and whitefish which have a moderate amount, may be increased through the use of a rich sauce, or they may be cooked in fat.

Taking into consideration its food values and economy, and when the preserved forms are utilized, the homemaker who desires to feed her family well should serve fish or shellfish, in some form, much oftener than once each week!

### Questions Answered

Mrs. L. C. A.—There is absolutely no basis for the old superstition that fish and milk should not be taken together. Some persons might have been made ill by taking fish and milk at one meal. But in that case, we must conclude that the individual must have been allergic to one of these foods; or possibly the fish was not fresh.

Mrs. M. McK.—It has been calculated that the amount of vitamin G now believed to be necessary for helping to maintain good health might be supplied by a pint of milk, one serving of grapefruit, one whole egg, five slices of whole wheat bread and one serving of turnip greens.

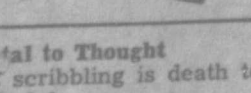

THUMBNAIL BIOGRAPHY  
British Envoy to United States  
Is 'World-Federation' Advocate

WASHINGTON, D. C.—One of England's biggest jobs, that of ambassador to the United States, has fallen to a man credited with having written more clauses of the Versailles treaty than any other man—the Marquess of Lothian. In the days following the World War he was a close advisor of Lloyd George and thus his influence on the treaty of peace that has now been torn to shreds.



LORD LOTHIAN is pictured here reading a copy of Adolf Hitler's "Mein Kampf" (My Life). The present British Ambassador to the United States was once a Nazi sympathizer. Just before the Munich conference last year he lost his regard for Hitler and is now earnestly opposed to him.

In those days he had no title. He was known as a prominent liberal named Phillip Henry Kerr. In 1930 he inherited his cousin's title and it's Lord Lothian now.

Likes United States

Fifty-seven years old and a bachelor, he likes his work in the United States. In his first year of diplomatic work here he has found in this country what he calls an "air of social freedom." He has visited the United States frequently before his assignment to the governmental post and he feels "completely at home."

Believes in Federalism

He has a favorite topic on which he will converse with anyone at any time. That is the ideal of federalism in government as exemplified by the United States. When in South Africa, 30 years ago on a governmental mission connected with problems of state sovereignty resulting from the Boer war, he read Alexander Hamilton's, "The Federalist." This started him thinking along the lines of an international "United States"—a union of free nations banded together on a world-wide scale.

He firmly believes that the nations of the world would all benefit from such a plan as they then could present a unified front for attacking such problems as unemployment, poverty, and even—war. He takes much stock in the proposal for such a union as suggested by Clarence K. Streit, an American newspaper man.

Would Have Power

Pressure of events and not propaganda will eventually bring about such a world-wide state in the opin-

Country Will Need  
16,000,000 Homes  
In Next Ten Years

Since relatively little residential construction has been undertaken since 1930, the resulting tremendous reservoir of potential building for present and future use in the United States will challenge the ingenuity of both government and private enterprise, according to a survey of the building industry made by the Index.

"The United States Housing authority," the publication points out, "basing its conclusions upon studies made by the department of commerce and by the WPA, estimates that the country today needs 6,000,000 new dwelling units and that by 1950 increases in the number of families and the depreciation of existing homes will require an additional 10,000,000 dwellings, so that, in all, about 16,000,000 new dwellings will be required by 1950."

Two factors which may lead to greatly expanded activity in the building industry, the report continued, are the further development of large, well-organized and properly financed building corporations and a greater stability of labor.

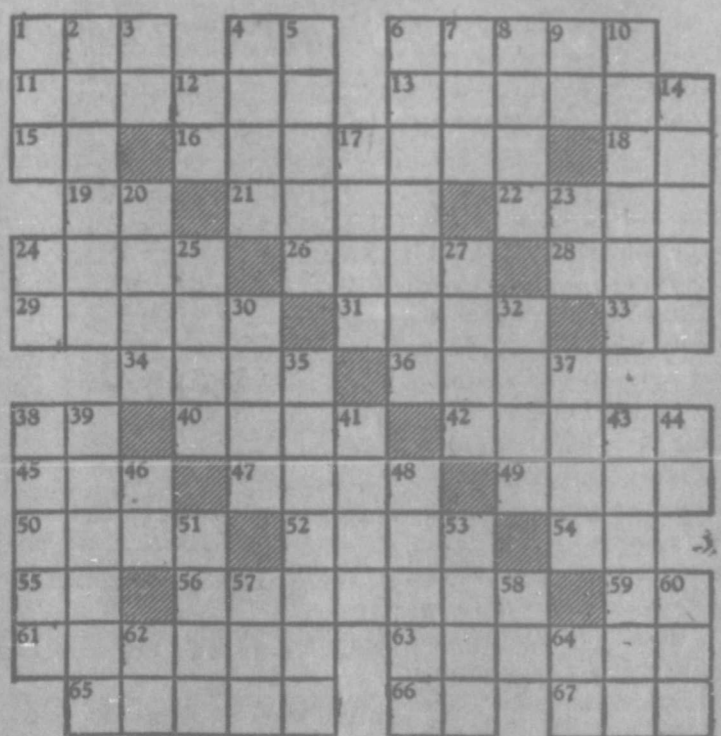
As Influenza Remedy

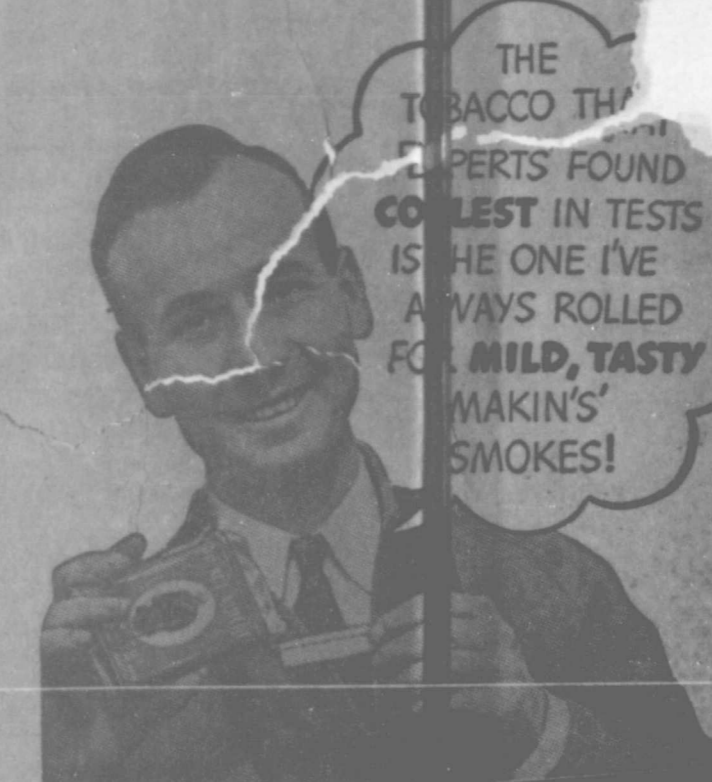

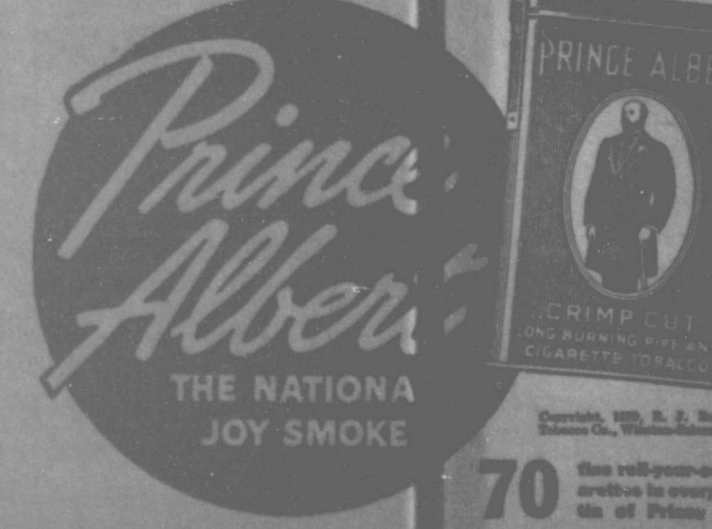
