Wright Brothers' Aide Fears War Bombs Will Destroy Inventors' Original Airplane

COINJOCK, N. C.—Cap'n Bill Tate of this city is fearful that the war planes of Germany will devour their own mother. The captain, who helped the Wright brothers make the first airplane flight at Kill Devil hill 36 years ago, wants the United States to return the original Wright plane from England at once.

"One bomb would destroy this ship and rob all of us of this treas-ure," said Captain Tate. "It cer-tainly is not safe at Kennsington

Reports from all sections of the cotton belt are that ginners are stocking cotton bagging as well as jute, which has been used to wrap cotton since the days of Eli Whit-







Development of these sources in the hands of the Kweichow Mir ing administration jointly controlled by the national resources commis sion and the provincial governmen of Kweichow, and plans are being made to raise the present rate of mercury production to 500 tons an

Before the outbreak of hostilitie China produced from 300 to 500 tons of mercury annually, almost all of which was exported. The mercury was mined in Hunan and Kweichow provinces. Owing to the present situation in Hunan production has been almost eliminated.
