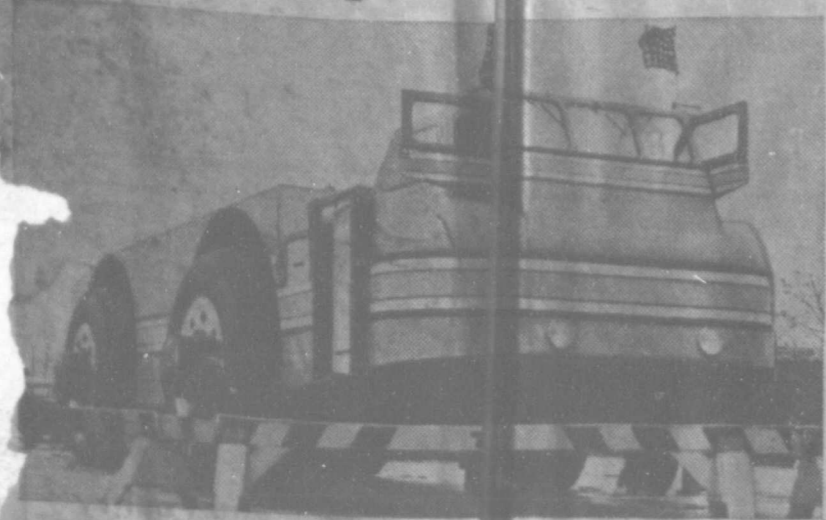

### U.S. Domestic Use of Cotton May Register New Increase

Federal Bureau Forecasts Favorable Picture for 1940 Season.

WASHINGTON.—If general conditions in the cotton market continue to improve, the upward trend in domestic use of cotton during the 1940 season...

European countries actually involved in the conflict but not enough to meet the decline elsewhere.

In the Orient, cotton mill consumption may show some increase. In Japan, there is the possibility of increased consumption as a result of larger exports because of reduced competition from British goods.

In India, mill consumption may increase somewhat as a result of reduced imports of cotton textiles from Great Britain. It is significant, however, that Indian mill consumption during the past season reached an all-time high. In China, there is a somewhat less unsettled situation in many areas is somewhat more favorable to increased cotton consumption, but this is at least in part, by poorer crops during the current season.

Other than the United States and Asia, cotton mill consumption may also show some increase. The above-mentioned increases may about offset the decline in Europe. At present, it seems improbable that the total world mill consumption will show any substantial increase or decline by a significant amount.

### Wright Brothers' Aide Fears War Bombs Will Destroy Inventors' Original Airplane

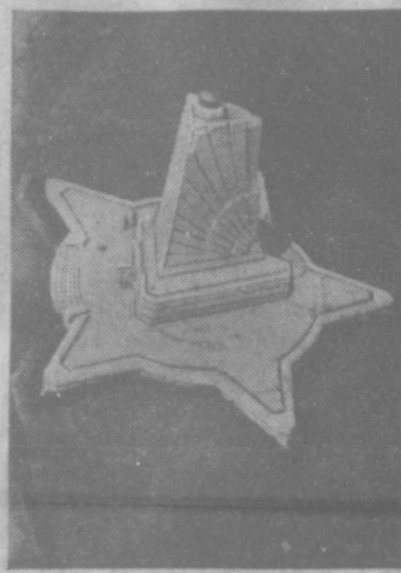
COINJOCK, N. C.—Cap'n Bill Tate of this city is fearful that the war planes of Germany will devour their own mother. The captain, who helped the Wright brothers make the first airplane flight at Kill Devil hill 36 years ago, wants the United States to return the original Wright plane from England at once.

"One bomb would destroy this ship and rob all of us of this treasure," said Captain Tate. "It certainly is not safe at Kennington museum."

Tate visualizes the monsters which sprang from the humble plane raining destruction down upon the fragile ship which birthed them all. He is one of the few persons who were confidants of the Dayton, Ohio, bicycle makers when they came east to experiment with their "kite."

Dispute Led to Shipment. The original plane was sent to the English museum as a result of a dispute between Wright and Smithsonian officials over the wording of the plaque to be placed upon the exhibit. Ever since then, natives of this vicinity have been dreaming of bringing the plane back to Kill Devil. Beneath the soaring pylon of Wright Memorial beacon, the coastland people hoped to erect a museum building to house the plane and other aviation relics.

Captain Tate, veteran of the light-house service, also urged that steps be taken to force publication of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's findings as arbiter of the dispute as to whether

Langley or the Wrights deserve most credit in the invention of the airplane. Lindbergh has reported in favor of the Wrights, Tate said, but he asserted that the report had been "suppressed."

### Liver Has Nutritional Value

Man seems to have known instinctively many facts about nutrition, which have taken centuries and centuries to prove scientifically. For instance, it was the custom to reserve for the chief and the young warriors the liver, the kidney and heart of a freshly killed animal which were believed to contribute to both physical strength and bravery of spirit.

Science has shown us that these organs play a most valuable part in nutrition. Liver has been studied meticulously and found not only to contribute essentials to daily nutrition, but also to be a specific remedy for pernicious anemia. Recent reports have shown that kidney apparently has specific influence upon blood pressure. A kidney extract has been used to lower blood pressure and at the same time to play a part in reducing weight caused by retention of water in the tissues. More research work will, of course, be necessary before kidney extracts will be used generally as a remedy for such conditions. In the meantime, however, it will be well to use this organ in its natural form occasionally. And nothing is more delicious than a good kidney stew.

#### Kidney Stew.

- 3 beef kidneys
3 tablespoons butter
1/4 cup flour
2 cups water
2 teaspoons minced onion
Salt and pepper
2 tablespoons sherry

Split kidneys, remove fat and sinews, and cut into sections. Cover with cold salted water and soak one hour; drain. Saute in butter for a few minutes. Add flour, stirring until it is browned. Add water, onion

### RURAL SCENE

Interesting to cotton growers is the fact that maximum storage rates on government loan cotton has been reduced. For storing and insuring cotton already under loan or held by the government the rate will now be 12 1/2 cents per bale per month.

Glancing over live stock marketing reports and judging from the number of cattle now on the nation's farms it is safe to predict that the number of cattle fed for market this winter and next spring will be larger than last year.

Texas claims to have the oldest farm in the United States. Near Ysleta, this farm has been worked continuously since 1540, when it was established by the Franciscan Fathers who came to this country with Coronado.

Country Home Magazine says that burr clover makes "very fine winter feed for poultry." Once started, it reseeds itself every year, and makes a luxuriant green feed, which can be used for fall and winter pasture.

Farm products have over 400 different uses in addition to their food value, according to a recent scientific agricultural study.

Eight-five per cent of the farm families in the United States own automobiles.

### Use of Cotton Bagging To Wrap Bales Gaining

ATLANTA, GA.—A drive to persuade growers and ginners to use cotton bagging to wrap bales in order to absorb a part of the 11,500,000-bale surplus is beginning to show signs of success.

Reports from all sections of the cotton belt are that ginners are stocking cotton bagging as well as jute, which has been used to wrap cotton since the days of Eli Whitney, and many farmers are pledging co-operation.

To many growers, it makes little difference whether their cotton is wrapped in jute or cotton bagging. Thus the choice often is left to the man who gins it. In every community, ginners are promising to use the newer wrapper when the decision is left to them.

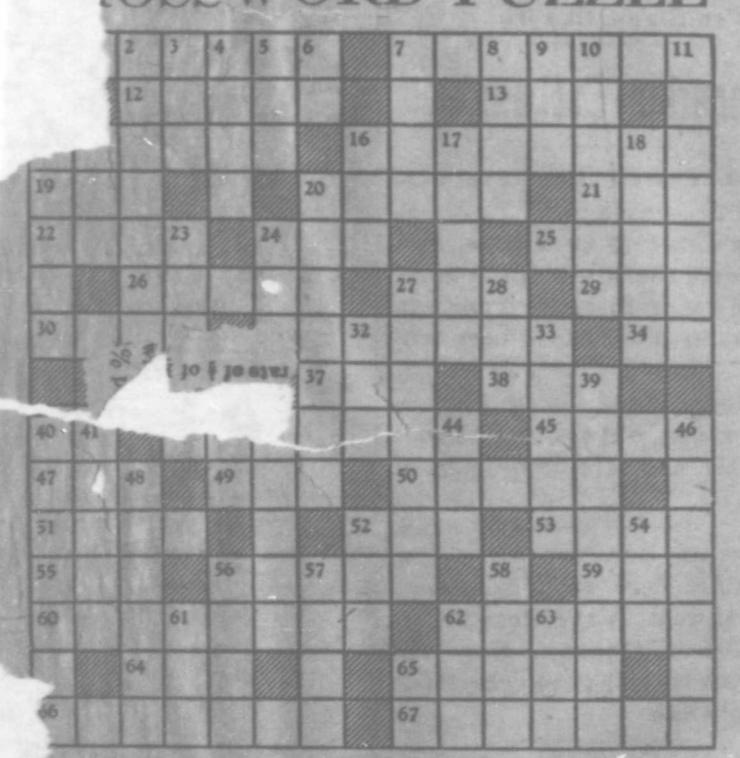

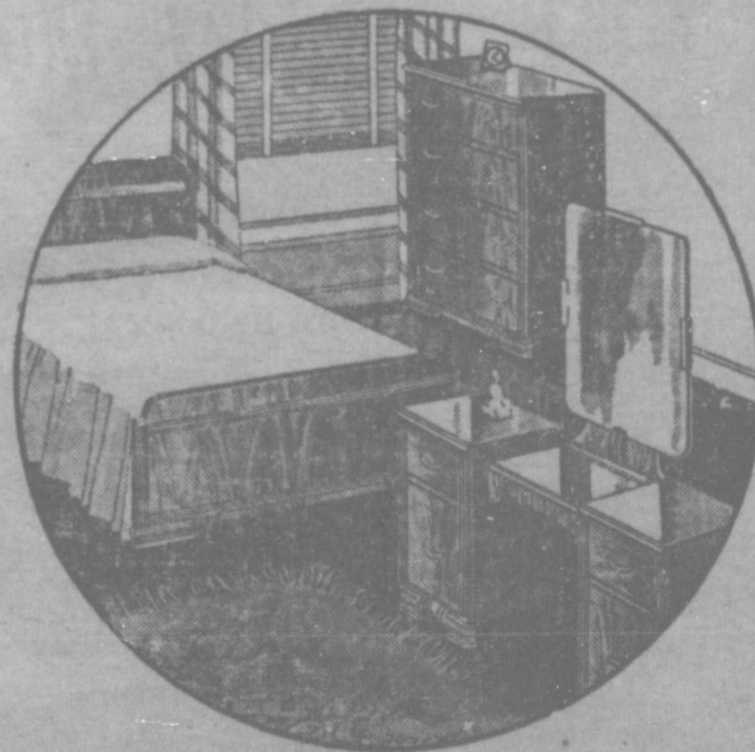

# Roadside Classes Aid in Solving Miami's Traffic Problem

### Southern Resort City Faces Yearly Congestion of Tourists.

MIAMI, FLA. — Scientific treatment of the problem, plus an ingenious educational campaign, have brought a solution to the complex problem this American resort city faces every year in handling one of the greatest congestions of automobile traffic of any city in the United States.

With a normal concentration of one automobile for every 2.8 persons—the highest in the country—motor travel leaps to an unprecedented height in a given area when a million or more visitors descend on the resort.

Cars in a steady stream continually pour in from every one of the 48 states, British West Indies, Canada, Cuba, Mexico and some from abroad, and in the absence of a universal system of traffic regulation, chaos would result were it not for the fact that Miami's traffic department is prepared to meet the crisis.

In effect now for two years and a half, this city's traffic system has proved its worth, as evidenced by the fact that accidents and injuries are running 15 to 20 per cent less than they were before the plan was inaugurated.

How, you may ask, is it possible to keep drivers who are accustomed to a wide variety of traffic regulations in proper order and prevent accidents when they concentrate in one city?

Careful planning from an engineering standpoint, in synchronization of stop and go signals, the use of a model traffic ordinance designed to meet universal requirements, plainly marked directions on where and how to turn, how and where to park—all these are helpful, but one distinctive service is provided the out-of-state motorist

that helps probably more than any other else to guide him properly and safely during his vacation here.

Patrolman Hails Driver.

Out along the major highways leading into the city a motorcycle patrolman waves to the side of the road a visiting driver. The visitor thinks, perhaps, that he's facing arrest, but his fears soon are dispelled.

The driver is directed alongside a portable radio sending truck and a lieutenant steps up with a microphone in his hand. He asks the driver's name and address, explains briefly the major traffic regulations in effect here, inquires if he can be of any assistance in directing the visitor to his destination, and gives the motorist a copy of the city's traffic rules.

The traffic lesson at the same time is being broadcast by a local radio station to resident listeners

and it thus serves a double purpose.

System Pleases Drivers.

A handshake, and the motorist drives on, impressed with the seriousness of traffic regulation and pleased at the courteous, official welcome he receives.

This roadside school is conducted throughout the winter vacation season. Fifty thousand cars have been checked passing one intersection in Miami during a 12-hour period. That's why Miami concentrates on solving the automobile traffic congestion problem before it arises. Accidents are prevented before they have time to occur.

## China Is Exploiting Its Mercury Mine

HONGKONG, CHINA.—Stimulated by the demand from the West for more and more mercury from new sources, China has turned to the exploitation of its rich mercury deposits in the southwest.

Development of these sources is in the hands of the Kweichow Mining administration jointly controlled by the national resources commission and the provincial government of Kweichow, and plans are being made to raise the present rate of mercury production to 500 tons annually.

Before the outbreak of hostilities China produced from 300 to 500 tons of mercury annually, almost all of which was exported. The mercury was mined in Hunan and Kweichow provinces. Owing to the present situation in Hunan production has been almost eliminated.

The projected mercury exports from Kweichow will prove of importance in China's struggle to obtain as much foreign exchange as possible.

It is expected that as soon as the administration has introduced modern technique in the mines, a steady supply of metal will be available in sufficient quantity to the markets of the world.

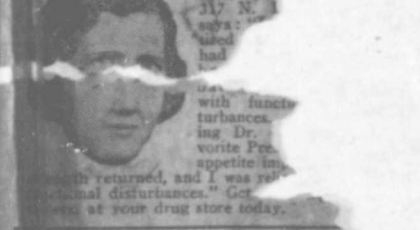
